

# First Bloodmobile Visit Tuesday

Charles Thornhill, Blood Chairman for Haskell County, under the Red River Red Cross Blood Center of Wichita Falls, held the final organizational meeting of his committee Monday evening at Haskell National Bank's community room.

Haskell County's quota is 70 pints of blood. Each Donor Recruiter has an appointment sheet. When you contact them to list your name, you may give a convenient time you wish to be at the van—it will be in Haskell at the Community Room of the bank between 1:30 and 6:30 Tuesday afternoon, May 23—and if at all possible, this time will be made available to you, so that you will not be inconvenienced by waiting. Ap-

peintment sheets need to be in the hands of Charles Thornbill by noon Saturday.

Donor recruiters — people who's work is vital in getting a list for use to set up appointments for donors before arrival of the giant Bloodmobile vanwere appointed from each town in Haskell County.

Every resident of the County is urged to consider this—our acceptance into the Blood Center—which already is approved—means that the TOTAL BLOOD NEEDS OF HASKELL COUNTY WILL BE MET by the Wichita Center. Because of this, every resident is urged to call or contact one of the donor recruiters, and list their name withthem. If you are not eligible to give blood, this will be ascertained quite simply on

the first arrival of the Bloodmobile van, by competent registered nurses who travel with it. Only in this fashion, though, will the Blood Chairman be able to compile an adequate list of donors.

# Time Extension Asked By Engineers

"It's merely a matter of saving money," reported Jim Nichols to the Board of Directors of North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority in Munday, Tuesday night. The meeting, called by manager Pete Beecher when Freese, Nichols & Enders engineering firm of Fort Worth asked for a 24-day extension on the bid-opening date, was for the purpose of hearing a first-hand explanation of why they asked for the time extension

The Munday Water Authority board has been assured, over and over, that they have met every requirement to every state and federal agency, on the preparation of the lakebuilding project.

"The extension of the bid opening date to June 15 is requested for a very simple reason-to save some money on the cost of the over-all project," Nichols explained. "We did not get the needed approval from the state and federal agencies soon enough to give the bidding contractors time to consider their bids properly. We can save some money by waiting for the simple reason that, if the bidders are rushed and don't have time to check all costs involved, they will automatically give a higher bid than might be necessary, for their own protection. By giving them this additional time, their bids can be more accurately figured, and the Water Authority's costs can be lower."

## **Guard Against** Poisonous Plants

While vegetation helps sustain life, some common plants, trees and shrubs are potential killers. says the Texas State Department of Health.

We eat herbs and the fruits, leaves and roots of many plants in our daily diet, but some plants we deliberately cultivate are deadly.

To the average person, the term "poisonous plant" usually brings to mind visions of poison ivy, or some similar plant that poisons or irritates upon contact. But most poisonous plants are harmful only when they are eaten. In fact, more than 700 species of plants in the United States are known to have caused death or illness. Every year about 12,000 children in this country chew or swallow potentially poisonous plants. A study conducted several years ago revealed that 10 per cent of all child poisonings were caused from eating toxic plants - yet over half of the parents were unaware of the dangers of the plants. Eighty-five per cent of all poisoning cases involving poisonous plants involve chil-

It is difficult to believe that one leaf of the graceful poinsettia could kill a child, or that tea made from mistletoe berries has killed adults. Who would expect that the beautiful oleander bush - grown indoors and Step 4: Combine chicken, outdoors all over the countrycontains a deadly heart stimulant, similar to the drug digitalis? So powerful is this poison that a single leaf of an oleander can kill a child. And many people have died merely from eating steaks speared on oleander twigs and roasted over a fire.

It's easy to be deceived by plants, for one part may be edible while another is poisonous. All parts of the buttercup, rhododendron, and laurel are harmful. In other plants, only certain party are toxic. A classic example is the rhubarb which has a perfectly edible stalk, but the leaf contains a deadly poison.

In the strict sense of the word, poison ivy and its cousins are not really poisonous. 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
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
