### GROUND WATER SOURCES WILL BE AIM OF SEARCH

Washington, D.C.--Congressman George Mahon, Chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, reports that in the Public Works Appropriations bill approved by the Committee this week \$150,000 is provided to begin a multi-year study of availability of ground water supplies in the High Plains area of West Texas and Eastern New Mexico. The total estimated cost of the study is \$1 million. Final House action on the measure is scheduled for mid-June.

Mahon points out that this new program in no way reduces the urgency for a water import program, but could be significant in meeting short-term needs. He continues to emphasize the urgency for a viable water import program and is working with West Texas and State of Texas officials toward that goal.

Also in the Appropriations Committee-approved bill is \$200,000 for advanced engineering work by the U. S. Corps of Engineers on the flood control project at Plainview. The design work for the Plainview project is now in its final stages, preliminary to a \$10 million effort to

improve floodways and flood barriers within the City. Mahon's Committee also okayed an expenditure of \$60,000 for continued study of the salinity at Lake Meredith on the Canadian River, which is a major source of municipal water in the High Plains area.

### Security Income Information Given

(By Ray Purcell Social Security Representative)  
Q. I am receiving Supplemental Security Income. I have received notice to bring my "papers" such as tax receipts on my house to the social security office. I took all of these "papers" last year. Why must I do it again and what will happen if I don't?  
A. The Law provides for an annual re-determination to ascertain if there have been any changes in living arrangements, income, resources, etc. Your failure to comply could cause your benefits to be suspended. It generally takes several months to get your checks started again once they are stopped. It is most important that you comply with this request.

### AUTHORITIES CONTINUE INVESTIGATION IN SHOOTING DEATH OF LOCAL MAN

(Editor's Note: Due to the early deadline, and hampered by the holiday Monday, The Review was unable to obtain details on this story. Tuesday morning, local officials were involved in the investigation process. This information is believed to be accurate, but is subject to change.)

According to reports, Chief of Police Charles Coats and Policeman Floyd Bankeston, while patrolling in the city police car about 11:30 p. m. Monday, received a tip on the CB radio that a burglary apparently was in progress at Clyde Pittman's Service Station on West Service Street and on the south

side of Main Street. They went to the scene, and Coats went one way around the building and Bankeston went around the building another way.

Reports said that Bankeston was the first to come in contact with the man, Manuel Marquez, about 21, of Abernathy. Reports also stated that Bankeston shot Marquez in self defense. Marquez was either dead on arrival or died at Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, according to reports.

Texas Rangers, along with local and county law enforcement officers, began investigation here Tuesday morning.

### Lubbock County Museum Will Open In Shallowater June 6

The Lubbock County Museum will open officially to the public with dedication ceremonies at 2 p. m. Sunday, June 6, in front of the museum.

Alton Brazell, County Commissioner of Precinct 4 and Director of the Lubbock County Museum, will open the ceremonies with remarks on the museum and its featured outdoor exhibit of historic farm equipment.

County Judge Rod Shaw will give the dedication address, after which ribbon cutting ceremonies by the four Lubbock County commissioners will follow.

The Lubbock County Museum will highlight its newly-produced outdoor exhibit. The exhibit will include historic farm equipment rebuilt from authentic equipment donated by West Texans.

On exhibit will be 18 pieces of horse-drawn equipment and 10 tractors, each with interpretations identifying the equipment and telling how it was used on the farm.

Also on display will be 50 other pieces of authentic farm equipment, without interpretation.

The Lubbock County Museum is located in Shallowater, one block north of the Santa Fe Depot on Avenue G.

The public is invited to attend the museum's opening ceremonies and to view its various exhibits.

### VOTERS WILL SETTLE RUNOFF ELECTIONS IN SECOND PRIMARY JUNE 5

Texas will go to the polls Saturday, June 5, in the Second Primary to fill nominations for various offices that were not settled in the First Primary May 1.

Of interest to voters in The Review coverage area are races to nominate candidates on the Democratic ticket for the General Election in November.

Of interest to voters in Precinct 3, Hale County (Abernathy City Hall ballot box) is the race between incumbent Jack Eason of Hale Center and Henry Rieff of Cotton Center for the office of Hale County Commissioner, Precinct 3. The polls at Abernathy city hall will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. June 5.

Voting in Lubbock County will be at Joe Thompson Implement Co. in Abernathy, the New Deal School and the New Deal Clubhouse. The main race for all three of these Lubbock County boxes is for Sheriff. Incumbent Choc Blanchard is being challenged by Jackie Sullivan. Also of interest to voters who cast ballots at the New Deal Clubhouse is the race for Lubbock County Commissioner, Precinct 3. Northeast Lubbock County. Seeking the commissioner post are James Lancaster and Adolphus Cleveland. Les Derrick, currently filling that post was not a candidate for re-election.

All Lubbock County polls open at 7 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

The top state race on the ballot will be for Texas Railroad Commissioner. Jerry Sadler and Jon Newton are in

the race for the Democratic nomination.

In another state runoff race, for Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, will be Judge Carl Dally and W. T. Phillips.

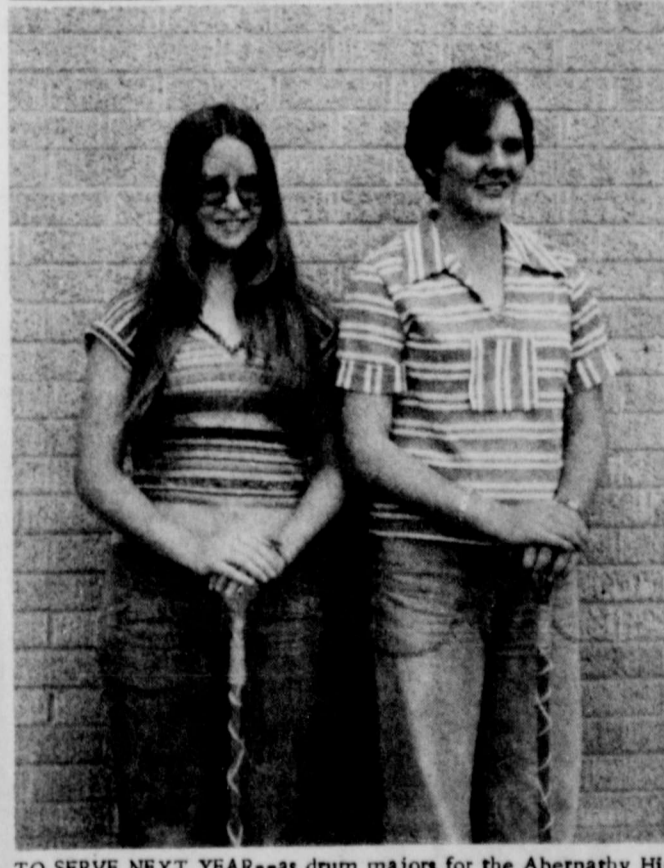
Due to the small number of offices for the Democratic nomination in the June 5 Primary, candidates are worried that the vote count will be small.

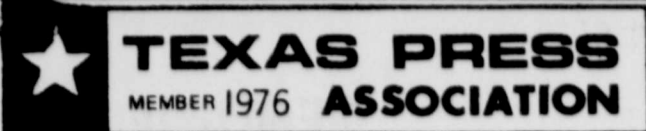

#### Veterans May Be Unaware Of Medical Benefits

##### NOTICE: VETERANS---

Many veterans of the Armed Forces are unaware of their entitlement to receive medical care in Veterans Administration hospitals. According to Herbert Hardin Service Officer for Barton-Hood Post 500, some of these former servicemen and women are not receiving the medical care they need because of limited finances, or they are in private hospitals and paying their own bills. In many instances, veterans have suffered long periods of illness and exhausted their life savings, leaving destitute families at time of death.

Under present laws, a person is eligible for admission to a VA hospital if he or she served on federal active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States at any time, either wartime or peacetime, and was discharged under conditions which are considered honorable. For many years, peacetime veterans were eligible for VA hospitalization only if they were discharged from service because of disability, were seeking treatment for a service-connected disability, or were in receipt of VA compensation. The entitlement was expanded on August 2, 1973, with the enactment of Public Law 93-82 by the Congress. In order to be admitted to a VA hospital at this time, a veteran need only present proof of his honorable military service and have a medical need for hospital treatment.

Depending upon his needs, a veteran may personally visit the VA hospital nearest his home, where he will be examined to determine the need for hospitalization. If a medical emergency exists, ambulance travel may be authorized by the VA if requested in advance by the veteran's private physician.

If a veteran is eligible for admission, there is no charge of any kind for his medical care. When a veteran needs medical care, and desires admission to a VA hospital, his local Veterans Service Officer can provide information and assistance.

Dependent upon his needs, a veteran may personally visit the VA hospital nearest his home, where he will be examined to determine the need for hospitalization. If a medical emergency exists, ambulance travel may be authorized by the VA if requested in advance by the veteran's private physician.

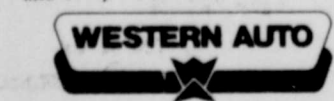
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#### NEWS AND COMMENT By Buford Davenport

### Rabid Bats Pose Little Threat To Area Residents

About 50 per cent of the area's bat population is rabid, advised the Plainview-Hale County Health Department in an announcement released Thursday.

However, bats very seldom attack people, the statement noted: "In the past ten years, (we) have been informed of only two bat biting incidents, and in both cases there was a possibility of the bats (attacking) for their own protection."

Area bats migrate here in the spring and summer from caves in the Edward Plateau region of Central Texas and return to the caves in late fall.

They can be found in tile roofs; between inner and outer walls; and in dark warehouses; under bridges; in rock formations; and under such things as signs, gutters, and drain pipes.

"They leave these day-time retreats at dusk and feed until dawn," the report said, adding: "If contact is made with a bat—either human contact or pet contact—get in touch with the Plainview-Hale County Health District for further information."

## DROUGHT-TOLERANT, TALL MEXICAN COTTON MAY BE "PARENT STRAIN" FOR NEW VARIETIES IN AREA

LUBBOCK--Ten-foot tall, wild cotton plants from Old Mexico may become the parents of a new line of cotton varieties for the High and Rolling Plains.

The wild seedlings, which grow into large trees eventually, have characteristics of special importance to High and Rolling Plains cotton producers. That is, they are tolerant to drought or long periods of moisture stress.

A team of USDA-Agricultural Research Service scientists based at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock believe the germplasm found in the wild cotton plants can be bred into lines suitable for cotton production on the Texas plains. But they won't be 10 or 20 feet tall. They will look like the other short, storm-proof varieties currently grown in the area.

Dr. J. E. Quisenberry, cotton breeder, and Dr. Bruce Roark, plant physiologist, says the material will take several years to develop. But if their goals are reached, area cotton producers may not have to start irrigating as soon when they enter a prolonged dry period during the growing season.

"Of course, all plants must have water," Quisenberry says. "What we hope to come up with are new lines

that can hold up longer under moisture stress than those currently being grown."

Quisenberry says most of the varieties produced on the Texas High Plains were derived from varieties primarily bred for humid areas of the Southeast. Characteristics that were useful for drought tolerance were probably lost, he said, during this development period because of the heavy rainfall associated with the region.

The reason these wild cottons can withstand moisture stress, Roark adds, is the ability of their enzyme systems to efficiently adapt to conditions to that all phases of the plants' growth are carried on without interruption.

Most of the data he and Quisenberry have collected reveal several morphological, anatomical and physiological characteristics useful in the development of drought tolerant cottons. These characteristics will be selectively bred into plants that can be grown in this area.

The research is of special significance to dryland cotton growing areas where producers are totally dependent

on rainfall and winter moisture. Prolonged dry periods during the growing season in these areas essentially wipe out cotton production if there is not enough deep moisture available to get the plants through critical stages. Losses running in the millions of dollars are suffered during these periods.

"As irrigation water continues to decline in irrigated cotton producing areas," Quisenberry adds, "drought tolerant crops could take on much more importance for those producers, as well. We're looking at drought tolerant varieties for all the High and Rolling Plains areas, whether or not those areas are presently irrigated or dryland."

Quisenberry and Roark have found unexpected characteristics in these wild cottons that could have equal importance to High and Rolling Plains cotton growers, he said.

## County sets immunization

The Hale County swine flu immunization program will get underway Aug. 1 when people 65 and over start receiving vaccine provided by the federal government and administered by health departments.

Nursing Supervisor Mary Lou Truesdale of the Plainview-Hale County Health Department says all other age groups will begin receiving shots on Sept. 1 and emphasizes that the program is "purely voluntary."

The nationwide effort to prevent an outbreak of swine flu similar to one that took the lives of some 20 million people worldwide in 1918 has an estimated price tag of \$180 million.

IT INVOLVES transferring vaccine from federal health agencies to state agencies, from where it will be allocated to regional health offices. From there it will be distributed to the general public and private physicians by local health departments.

"There will be no charge whatsoever by the health department," notes Mrs. Truesdale, adding: "Private doctors are not allowed to charge for the vaccine, but they are allowed to set a fee for their time and supplies—such as syringes, sponges, and the like."

Volunteers, both professional and nonprofessional, will be called upon for assistance in administering the program. Wynon Mayer, county extension agent, is in charge of the non-professionals. They will be asked to help with clerical duties involved.

Mrs. Velma Mitchell, RN, of the health unit is coordinating professional volunteers. State and federal authorities currently are working on legal aspects of professional

liability connected with the program, according to Mrs. Truesdale.

"WHAT WE PLAN to do," she says, "is increase our present three-hour-a-day immunization program to eight hours a day until the flu program is completed, probably in November. That way, we can offer other immunizations while administering the flu vaccine and make efficient use of our staff."

In Plainview, plans call for all-day immunizations every Wednesday at the health office on Ash Street. Hale Center's schedule calls for shots on the third Wednesday of every month; Petersburg, the second Friday, and

Abemathy, the third Friday. Clinics are also to be set up in Edmeston, Halfway, and Cotton Center. Their schedules will be announced later.

"We are prepared to take the vaccine into some of our larger area industries and provide immunization to the employees on the job if the companies would like us to do that," Mrs. Truesdale adds, noting that some 30,000 Hale County residents are eligible to participate in the program.

Flu vaccinations will also be available in conjunction with other immunization programs in area schools if the school district is willing, she says.

Drawing upon experience gained from the health department's polio immunization program in the early 1960's, Mrs. Truesdale says at least three weekend clinics will have to be set for people unable to attend the existing ones. The weekend schedule will be announced later.

germination rates and an abundance of weeds and unidentifiable grains.

But in 1927, all that changed. That year, the Texas Seed Law was enacted. Administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA), the law covers all agricultural seed—lawn grasses, commercial vegetables and grains.

According to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, the law requires that all agricultural seed sold in the state be labeled according to kind and variety, percent purity and name and address of the person or firm labeling the seed.

The TDA's seed labs in Giddings, Stephenville and Lubbock test samples of seed collected by departmental inspectors or sent in by private individuals.

Percentages of variety and kinds of seed, weight of weed seed and weight of inert matter are determined and compared with the labeled amounts.

A portion of the seed from the test sample is germinated, and the percent germination for the seed is determined. In addition, grow-out tests for most grain and pasture grasses are performed under field conditions.

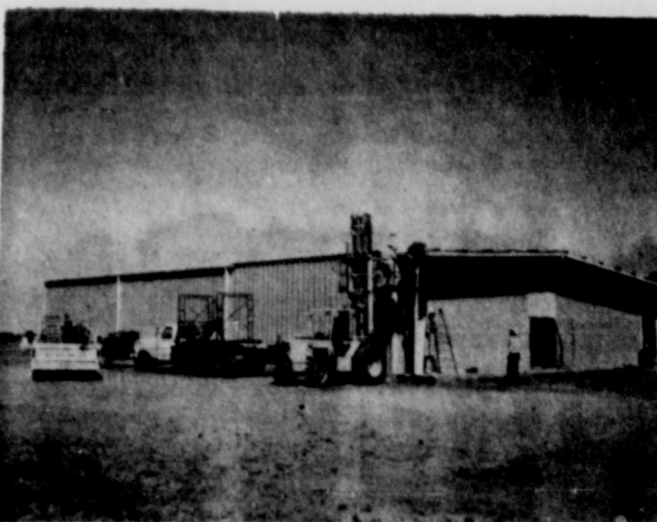
The seed labs typically do not test vegetable and flower seeds sold in small packets since they do not meet the minimum weights required for accurate tests. In addition, these seeds usually have no weed seed, inert matter or other crop seed; hence, no requirements for labeling these factors have been established, and none are listed on the seed packets, Commissioner White explained.

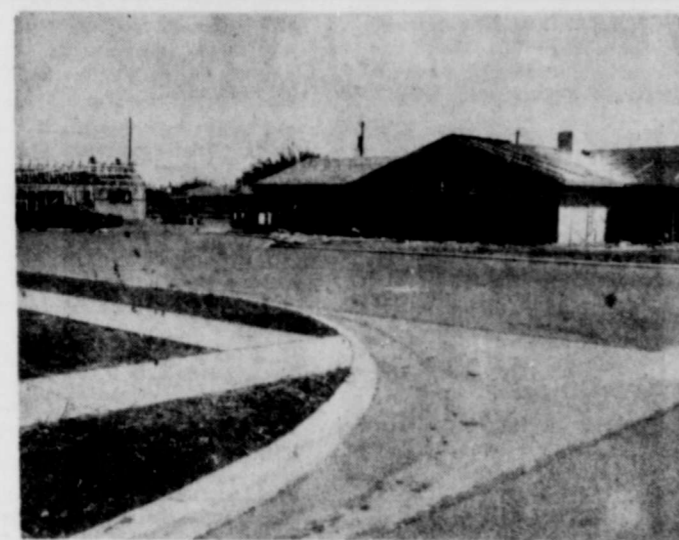

### BLALOCK, MCKENZIE TO ATTEND FARM ELECTRIFICATION WORKSHOP AT WEST TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY

Micah Blalock and Gary McKenzie, Abernathy High School vocational agriculture students, will attend the 16th annual farm electrification workshop sponsored by Southwestern Public Service Company. Kathi is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Guerrant. She is employed by Texas A&M and resides in Bryan.

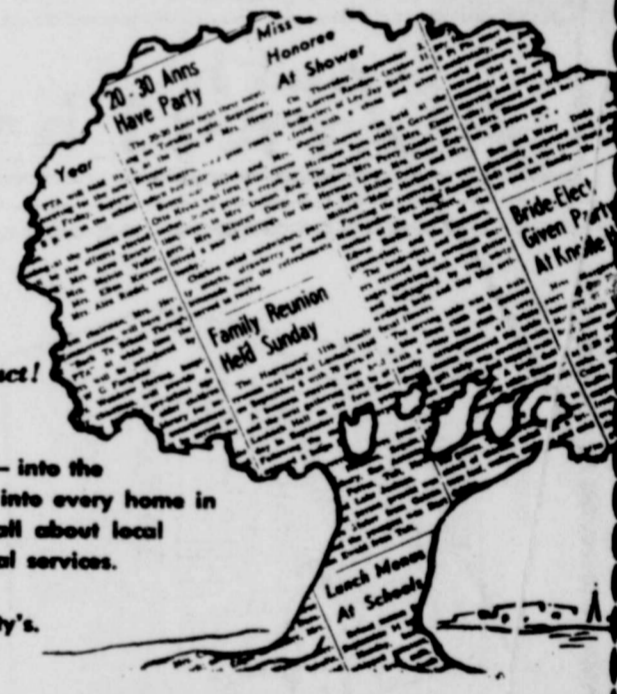

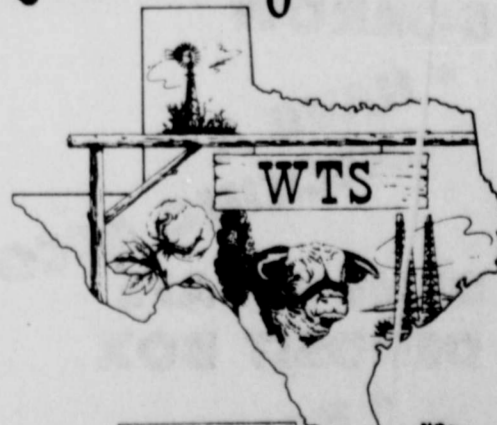

REMEMBER, 2-OUNCE LETTER DOES NOT COST 26 CENTS. Here's a point which some mailers may have overlooked with the recent postage increase.

When the price of a first-class stamp went to 13 cents, many persons failed to realize that the 13-cent rate applies only to the first ounce. Each additional ounce of the same piece of mail is 11 cents. Therefore, it costs 24 cents—not 26 cents—to mail a two ounce letter.

This 2-cent saving could result in a significant saving. One way to call attention to it would be to post a sign over the postage meter or in the mailroom.
