



Abernathy Pioneer To Celebrate 100th Birthday June 15

(Editor's Note: Granting our request, Arno Struve prepared the following information concerning his mother, Mrs. Fritz W. Struve, who will observe her 100th birthday June 15. Mrs. Struve, who has been staying at the Hi-Plains Nursing Home in Hale Center, will be at home in Abernathy, 411 Avenue E, June 15, from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m., and friends are invited to come by and help her celebrate her birthday.)

Hermann Rudolphine Richter was born in the centennial year of the USA, June 15, 1876 on a rocky 51 per acre farm-ranch in Burnet County, Texas. The woods were full of game and a great part of the family subsistence was the venison provided by her father who loved to hunt. The box-and-strip house of her birth still stands; no running water was ever in this house until the 20th century was 2/3 gone. She was no stranger to field work. She picked cotton while at the same time looking after some of the younger children who were supposed to be "helping" her. Uncle Bill and Uncle Hugo who were in her charge had the contents of their cotton sacks augmented by more than an occasional boll placed there by their big sister.

She thought of her childhood and youth as happy days and when in later years she would see a nice field of open cotton she had the unfulfilled urge to get out in it and pick. Even though her sisters had to do little field work she was never resentful nor jealous of their more ladylike pursuits, after all somebody had to help the mother. Envy, coyness, regret were attitudes that never burdened her. She was a "whither thou goest" wife who had complete trust in her husband, who, in 1901 brought her to the prairies of the South Plains to live in a two-room shack

that, believe it or not, also still stands, though in mighty poor condition. Even looking forward, never toward the past, she failed to show any sign of recognition of the shack when she was taken by to see about 10 years ago.

One of the first amenities of this relatively unprosperous household was a piano. She had been taught by a kinsman-instructor to play and it was an important element of her life. Incidentally, the old piano that her husband bought for her is still in use and is enjoyed by her great-grandchildren.

A side-saddle was her transportation seat when she was a youth and young-lady at home. It is doubtful that the Richter family ever was able to own such a luxury as a buggy, or a surrey with or without a fringe! Anytime the family traveled together it had to be on the farm wagon. Her pride and joy was her own horse named "Rattler". Rattler had the habit, to her delight, of putting on a miniature rodeo anytime he was mounted. The animal seemed to enjoy the fun as much as the kids rode him.

Another of her possessions was a wonderful old dog named Pluto who came to the Plains with the young couple. As the newlyweds traveled to their new home in a hack they made camp wherever nightfall caught them. One morning as they broke camp Pluto was nowhere to be found; thinking he'd eventually follow, they started the day's travel, but after several miles it became apparent that Pluto wasn't going to find them, so the "caravan" turned around and went back to the previous night's encampment where old Pluto was patiently awaiting their return.

Pluto was later enthroned as a hero when he held at bay a run-away saddle horse upon which the oldest daughter was riding to school as

a first grader in Hooper School.

Though they were ignorant of the potential of the flat land they came to, the absence of tree stumps to grub and the total lack of rocks were appealing conditions to them. Also the more than ample wind-pumped water was pure luxury to the young bride who in her youth had taken thousands of steps carrying water from a distant spring.

Manna Richter Struve became the mother of 4 daughters and 2 sons. One of the daughters was lost as an infant, probably because of the lack of adequate medical attention. Her skills in addition to her music were her simple but adequate cooking, her capability in handling the mass of meat that flooded her kitchen at hog-killing time, the expertise of canning quantities of fruit and vegetables in season for the winter's provisions, and her mastery of the art of cheese-making (kochkaese and handkaese).

In leisure times such artistic pursuits as needlework and oil painting provided hours of recreation.

Many youngsters got their earliest introduction to playing the piano from her. Monetary remuneration was entirely absent from her mind for such a service. She knew how to pause and smell the roses along the way. One of her pastimes was the reading of romantic novels by such authors as Zane Grey. The happy stories appealed to her Victorian character. And if a story had a tragic ending it wasn't a good book!

She was always content with traditional ways, and had considerable adjustment to make when her husband provided modern labor-saving devices such as her first electric washing machine, a waterless cooker, and the kerosene cookstove, and

finally the electric range. The latter she never fully mastered.

Abernathy became her home in 1912, the year her youngest child was born. The motivation for the move to Abernathy was to provide convenient schooling for the children. After the education of the children was assured, the goal became the development of the community. Never was the pursuit of

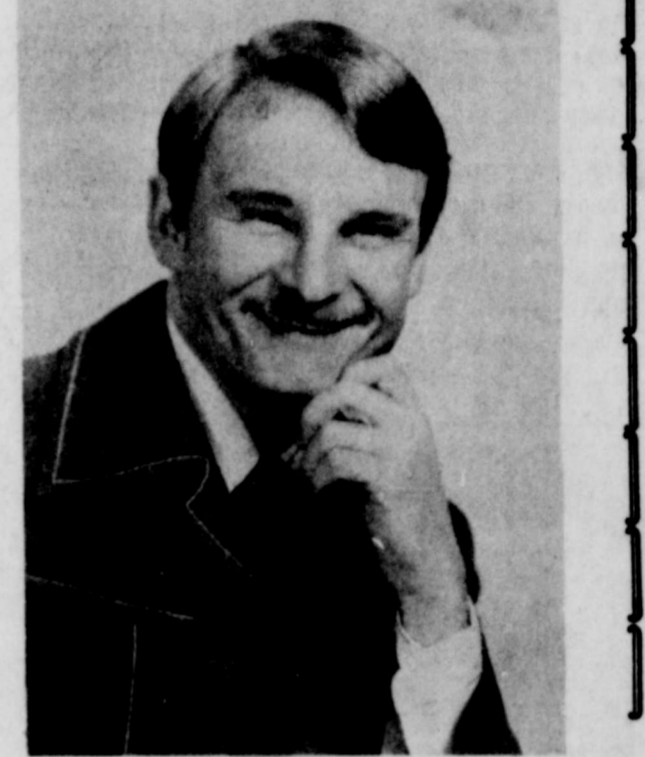
A Veteran of the Vietnam War, Marques was buried with Military Honor.

Life is full of surprises, but who could imagine that Henry "Hank" Rodgers, a little ole skinny, red haired, freckled faced kid would, in the first place, every get out of grammar school, much less, graduate from Abernathy High School with honors in 1946. From Abernathy, Rodgers struggled to enter Texas A&M in the fall of 1947 where it took him 6 years to finish with a degree in Aquatic Management and Seaweed Nutrition. He left College Station for England where he received a Doctor of Philosophy in Psychology from Oxford University. Upon completing this degree in

1929, he was appointed Chief of Clinical Psychology, Work Project Administration, of the Federal Government. His department is also in charge of Food Stamp distribution for the State of Rhode Island.

Dr. Rodgers topic as he speaks to us on Saturday afternoon will be "Get Up and Go or Rust in Peace." "Hank" and his wife, Dolores, and four of his eight children will arrive in Abernathy on July 2nd for a one week visit, his first since he left many years ago. He stated in a phone conversation that he was anxious to see all his old classmates.

HENRY RIEFF WINS COMMISSIONERS RACE IN PRECINCT 3 RUN-OFF

In light voting Saturday in the Second Democratic Primary, Henry Rieff, in Hale County, and Sheriff Choc Blanchard and James Lancaster, both in Lubbock County, were winners.

Henry Rieff polled 660 votes to win over incumbent Jack Eason, with 611 votes, in the Hale County Commissioner, Precinct 3, race. Rieff's name will appear on the General Election ballot, in the Democratic column, in November.

How ballots were cast in Hale County Commissioner, Precinct 3, election by voting precinct numbers: For Precinct 3: (4) Rieff, 194; Eason, 359; (5) Rieff, 172; Eason, 44; (6) Rieff, 145; Eason, 21; (9) Rieff, 127; Eason, 163. Absentee: Rieff, 22; Eason, 24.

Abernathy city hall voting box is in voting precinct 9. I do not know what voting precinct numbers go with Hale Center, Cotton Center and Plainview.

In the most hotly contested

race in the area, C.H. (Choc) Blanchard received 11,089 votes to be re-elected Sheriff of Lubbock County. His challenger was Jackie Sullivan of Lubbock, who received 4,455 votes. Blanchard will be the Democratic nominee on the General Election ballot in November.

James M. Lancaster of Idalou received 1,671 votes for Lubbock County Commissioner, Precinct 3, and his opponent, Adolphus Cleveland of Lubbock, received 1,289 votes. Lancaster, the Democratic nominee for this office, will face a Raza Unida candidate in the General Election in November. Current Commissioner Les Derrick of Idalou was not a candidate for re-election this year.

State-wide, Jon Newton defeated Jerry Sailer for Railroad Commissioner, and W. T. Phillips won over Carl Dally for judge, Court of Criminal Appeals.

Abernathian James Albert Hill Is White River Lake Drowning Victim

A young man's second attempt at a swimming feat in White River Lake southeast of Crosbyton resulted Thursday morning in the lake's first drowning in two years.

The body of James Albert Hill, 21, of Abernathy was pulled from the lake at about 11:30 a.m. by diver Bennie Michulka from a depth of 10 to 12 feet.

Accompanying Hill at the lake were Abernathy young people Bud Shadden, 16, and Laquita Dillinger, 16, and her sister, Teresa, 15. The group said Hill expected to swim from the west bank of the lake to a small island, a distance of about a quarter mile, when he disappeared from sight about 10 a.m. They said Hill had successfully made the swim the day before.

Michulka, who operates a food and fishing supply store at the lake, was assisted in pulling the body into a boat by his son, Benjie, and Maynard Brown, while other divers and help from the sheriff's department in Crosbyton were en route to the scene.

Crosbyton Justice of the Peace Clyde Davis ruled death due to drowning.

Funeral services for Hill

were conducted at 2 p.m. Saturday in Northside Baptist Church in Abernathy with the Rev. Douglas Gardener, pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Murry L. Brewer, Baptist minister of Plainview. Burial was in the Abernathy IOOF Cemetery under direction of Chambers Funeral Home.

A lifelong Abernathy resident, Hill was an Air Force veteran, a carpenter and a member of the Northside Baptist Church.

Survivors include his father, J. W. Hill of Abernathy; three brothers, J. M. of Fort Worth, Jerry of Abernathy and Douglas of Lubbock; and four sisters, Kathy of Fort Worth, Donna and Brenda, both of Lubbock and Mary Lynn of Coppertown.

July 4th Celebration Plans In Motion

"BEARD GROWING CONTEST" IN TOWN IS OBVIOUS

Plans for the city's upcoming Fourth of July celebration and related activities highlighted the agenda as the Abernathy Chamber of Commerce met last Thursday morning at Graham's Restaurant, south.

The first topic of discussion centered around the Abernathy Ex-Student and Teachers reunion, scheduled for July 3, as Ex-Students chairman David Pinson reported to the group, asking that all Abernathy businesses help make the exes feel welcome by displaying "Welcome Exes" signs at their places of business. Pinson also reported to the chamber that the cost of the noon meal during the reunion activities had been set at \$3.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children.

As a part of the Bicentennial theme around which this year's celebration will be centered, Hoppy Toler announced to the chamber the implementation of a patriotic "beard growing contest" in the city. According to Toler, the fine for men found without beards during the celebration period will be set at \$2.76. Prizes will be awarded for the best looking, fullest and "scraggiest" beards.

In other business, plans were brought before the chamber for a Sunday morning worship service, scheduled for July 4th, which would be a cooperative project for the city's churches. Rev. Al Jennings, pastor of First United Methodist Church and president of the Abernathy Ministerial Alliance, was placed in charge of plans for the service.

Other activities slated for July 4th included a pancake breakfast to raise funds for the Abernathy High School Band, and a patriotic musical entitled "I Love America," which will be presented that

evening by the Abernathy Community Choir and the Abernathy Music Club. The chamber members agreed to help underwrite the expenses involved in the presentation of the musical production.

As discussion moved on to include the actual July 4th activities, (which will take place on Monday, July 5th this year,) the chamber heard progress reports from chairman of the various July 4th committees.

Laurin Prather told the chamber members that construction of permanent booths for the annual celebration was currently underway, and would be completed by July 4th. Prompted by a suggestion from Y. F. Snodgrass, the chamber agreed to accept donations to aid in meeting the expenses for the permanent structures, and anyone wishing to contribute to this fund may do so by contacting chamber president Milt Pope, or committee chairman Laurin Prather.

Committee chairman J. Pete Thompson and Marvin Stevens, respectively, reported to the chamber that plans were progressing at a satisfactory pace for the Old Fiddlers Contest and the project of protecting recently-planted memorial trees at the city square.

In other business, Hoppy Toler reported that there would be a "Mini Float" competition included in this year's Fourth of July parade, which would be designed exclusively for the city's youngsters. Prizes will be offered for the best floats in various age groups, and youngsters are encouraged to begin work on their "Mini Floats" now. The mini floats will be constructed upon the frames of the children's toy wagons, and must be pulled in the parade by the young-

sters who build them.

Mrs. Herman Lambert reported to the chamber that reservations for seven booths and two floats had been made to date, and added that anyone wishing to either reserve a booth on the city square or enter a float in the July 4th parade, should do so immediately by contacting her.

As a city-wide observance of the July 4th celebration and the Nation's Bicentennial celebration, the chamber urged all Abernathy citizens and businesses to display the United States flag each day, beginning on Flag Day, Monday, June 14, and continuing through the Independence Day celebration Monday, July 5.

In the evening will be meetings of individual groups. Can't you feel the excitement of old friends meeting with this greeting: "You haven't changed a bit!"

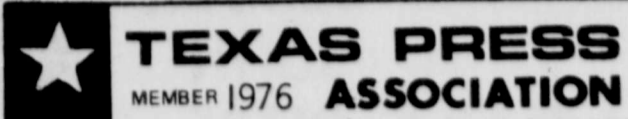
There will be only one program on Sunday, July 4. At 8:00 p.m., in the School

 wealth thought a worthy ambition...
 She was an excellent traveler as long as her body strength would permit, having seen both oceans in the company of her friends or of her children. She made a couple of trips to Mexico, experiences she would never have thought possible until after she was well past the age of 80. A trip to Europe in 1963 was a particular delight to her because of her complete ease in speaking the German language. Natural communication with village shopkeepers and people on the street filled her with delight.
 In 1959 her life-long partner went to his self-welcomed reward. Health problems, happily absent from his wife's life, were at least too much for him. He thought his days of service were past and that he had no reason to remain longer in the pain of arthritis, diabetes and a weak heart. Arguments that his wisdom was much needed by his children and grandchildren in no way influenced his pessimism relative to the value of his life and he was glad to accept the end. Most happily such depressive thoughts have never once seemed to cross the mind of his wife.
 Today the haven of a nursing home is her lot. Bodily health is still superior except for muscular strength, the weakness that requires professional physical care. She has a limited attention span growing out of her aging arteries, which condition probably insulates her from a limited attention span doesn't allow for effective entertainment. But such seems to be the natural process of a long and happy life.
 An incidental observation: The \$1/acre country of her birth is now valued at \$1000/acre because of its beauty.
 The years of her lifetime have encompassed the fastest changing age of all time from the primitive pioneer days of a newly won frontier of the prosperity of the nuclear age. It is almost too much for human adjustment.
