BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE MAKES ADDITIONAL PLANS FOR CELEBRATION

More plans being made by the Bicentennial Committee are getting underway as the big July 3, 4, and 5 celebration is getting nearer.

A new contest this year will be a Rocking Chair Endurance Contest. This event will begin at 1:00 p.m. Sunday, July 4, and last until the last person left still rocking. The winner will receive a prize of \$100.76. The rules for the contest are: (1) you must bring your own rocking chair, (2) you must have a continuous rock, (3) there will be one ten-minute break each hour, and (4) the contest is open to all ages. There will be a judge on duty at all times through the contest to time the ten-minute breaks and to make sure that everyone continues rocking.

The parade kicks off the celebration on Monday, July 5 at 10:00 a.m. Following the parade will be the flag-raising ceremony, and the presentation of awards in front of the City Hall.

The prizes for the floats will be \$150.76 for first place, \$125.76 for second place, and \$100.76 for third place.

There will be a mini-float division for Jr. High age and under. Prizes for first and second

place mini-float winners will be \$25 U. S. Savings Bonds.

Ribbons will be presented to cow chip throwing winners, and egg tossing winners.

The Old Fiddlers contest will begin around 1:00 p.m., and the Church volleyball play-offs will be sometime in the afternoon. There will also be a square dancing exhibition by the County Cousins that afternoon.

The beard judging contest will be held sometime Monday. Prizes will be awarded for the fullest beard, scraggliest beard, and other categories. A committee is being formed to canvass the town, and any man found clean shaven will be asked to make a donation of \$2.76 for a Bicentennial keychain; it will be \$3.00 if you don't have the correct change.

SENIOR DIVISION GIRLS WIN STATE; TAKE 3RD IN NATIONAL TOURNAMENT

JUNIOR DIVISION LITTLE DRIBBLERS CAPTURE RUNNER-UP SPOT IN NATIONAL TOURNAMENT AT LEVELLAND

Texas Dome on the campus of South Plains College, Levelland, Texas, was the site of the 5th annual Girls Little Dribblers' National Tournament June 9-12, 1976.

Junior and Senior Division teams from Abernathy were entered in the tournament and represented their home town very well.

Junior Division play began Thursday with a loss to the East Texas Runner-Up Championship team from Brownboro, 35-32. Our spunky 9 and 10 year olds came back later that same day to defeat the East Texas Champions from Fairfield, 36-32. In this game, Vicki McKenzie broke the tournament record for Individual High Scorer in one game scored in the Texas Dome by scoring 34 points

and setting a new tournament record. Friday, through magnificent teamwork and stamina, Abernathy drilled Brownboro 30-16 in a rematch. Play began early Saturday morning with Idalou, the West Texas State Champions. This group of girls and Abernathy have battled all year with wins and losses alternating with each game. But, Abernathy evened up this contest Saturday with a victory over Idalou 23-18, making them eligible to compete for the National Championship against Levelland. Tremendous excitement filled Texas Dome as the game began. Abernathy took a slim lead in the first quarter and maintained that lead through the first half and on through the third quarter. It was a great

game both defensively and offensively; but as the fourth quarter progressed, Levelland made a few surprising moves and came out ahead of Abernathy 30-27 as the final buzzer sounded.

These girls have done a fantastic job playing basketball and representing Abernathy in both conduct and performance. By taking second place in the West Texas State Tournament and rebounding to defeat those State Champions plus the East Texas State Champions to second place to the National Champions, coaches Larry Griffin and Barbara Webb, plus parents and interested fans, feel these girls are truly NUMBER ONE!

SCHOOL BOARD CALLS FOR ESTIMATES ON ADDITIONAL TENNIS COURTS; REPORTS 96.53% OF TAXES PAID

The Board of Education called for cost estimates to be made for the construction of additional tennis courts in the local schools. The estimates for 4 additional courts will be presented at the next regular meeting of the board. At its June 7th meeting, regular reports given were budget progress, enrollment, health report, and tax collection report showing 96.53% of the taxes as having been collected.

The board accepted student transfers, subject to state approval for 1976-77 school year. Transfers reviewed included 3 from Cotton Center, 6 from Hale Center, 8 from New Deal, 5 from Idalou, 2 from Petersburg and 1 from Lubbock. Transfers out of the district included 4 to Shallowater and 2 to Anton.

In other action, the board voted to participate in the Media Services of the Education Service Center for the next school year. The board officially adopted a policy regarding payment of student fees in accordance with the Attorney General rulings. Also, a rate was set for mileage for student activity trips. The amount will be transferred from the General Fund to Transportation Fund to pay for extracurricular trips when school buses are used.

Bollinger, Segars, Gilbert, Moes and Company were appointed as fiscal auditors to audit all records at the end of the fiscal year on August 31st.

Summer maintenance Program was discussed and proposals were accepted to: (1) Install new curtain on the cafeteria stage, (2) Repair desk tops on high school desks, (3) Investigate sprinkler

system for school yards, (4) Install retainer fence around playground area, (5) Refinish auditorium seats in room 117, (6) Install new showers in Jr. High Gym.

The members of the Board

discussed the July 3-5 activities in which school facilities will be used during the class reunions.

Thursday, July 1st has been set for the next regular meeting of the board.

SPECIAL RECIPE
Fresh Pear Cake

THIS WEEK

2 cups sugar	3 eggs
2 teaspoons vanilla	2 tablespoons lemon juice
1 1/2 cups cooking oil	1/2 teaspoon salt
3 cups flour	1 1/2 teaspoon soda
3 cups chopped fresh pears	1 1/2 cups chopped nuts

Combine sugar, oil, eggs, vanilla and beat well. Mix flour, salt, and soda to first mixture and beat well. Add fresh pears with lemon juice (like you would add milk). Mix well. Bake at 325 degrees in a greased and floured loaf or bundt pan for 1 1/2 hours. This cake freezes well.

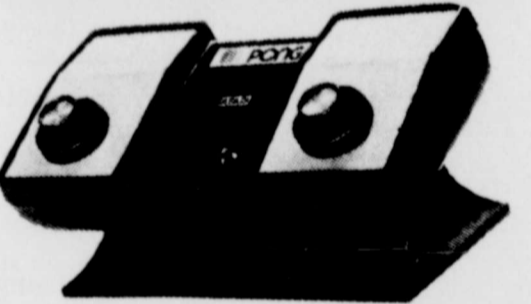

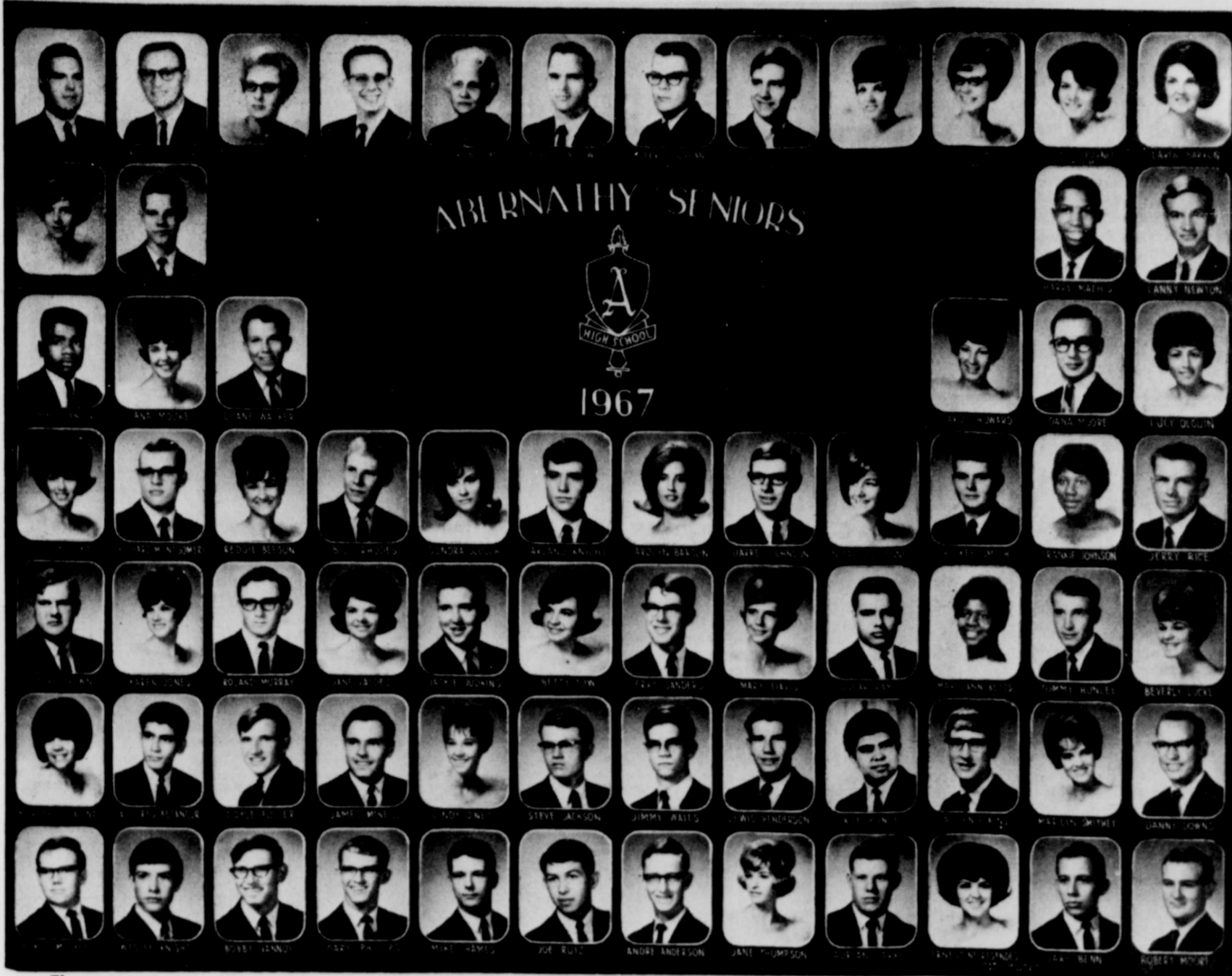

NATIONAL COTTON CONFERENCE TO MEET IN LUBBOCK JUNE 24-25

Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Richard Bell is among speakers scheduled for the third annual National Cotton Outlook Conference at Lubbock, Texas, June 24-25.

Mr. Bell is an authority on world trade in farm commodities and heads the U.S. Department of Agriculture's International Affairs and Commodity Programs Division. He will discuss U.S. international agricultural policy at the luncheon June 24, at Lubbock's Southpark Inn.

Also scheduled for conference is a bus tour of cotton-related points of interest in the Lubbock area.

The outlook conference is sponsored by The Cotton Foundation, in cooperation with the National Cotton Council, Memphis. Foundation President Frank M. Mitchener, a Mississippi cotton grower, will preside.

"The Foundation has selected speakers who will be able to examine factors that affect the outlook for cotton in many areas. Two special panels, for example, will outline programs to improve public understanding of the cotton industry and the impact of regulations on agriculture," Mr. Mitchener said.

The first session will begin at 8:30 a. m., June 24. The complete program: "Economic and Textile Outlook," George Wino, chief economist of the American Textile Manufacturers Institute; "Cotton Outlook," Dr. Don DeBora, executive vice president of The Cotton Foundation; "Credit Situation--What Does the Future Hold?," Jack H. Barton, senior vice president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston; "Weather Forecasting--Are Long-Term Patterns Changing?," Earl Finkle, consulting meteorologist; a panel on "The Industry's Programs to Improve Cotton's Image," Richard Goodwin of International Harvester, Greg Rich of Chevron Chemical Company, and Emmett Robinson of the National Cotton Council; "U. S. International Agricultural Policy," Mr. Bell; a panel on "Impact of Regulations," J. Ritchie Smith of the Council, Gus Dick of Deere & Company, Robert H. Leavitt of E. I. du
