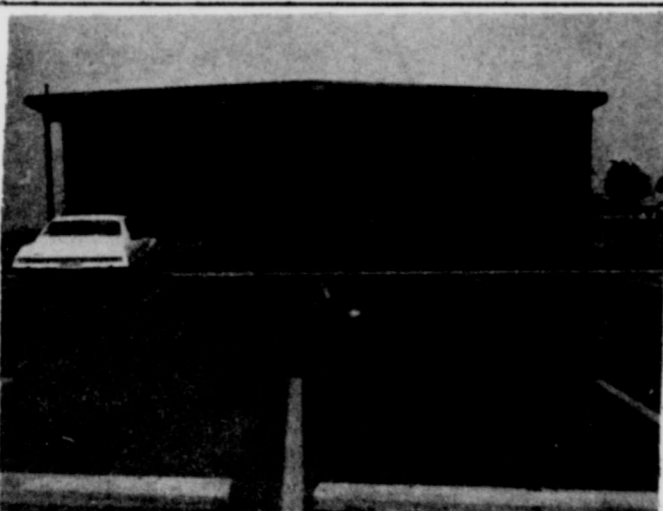
Artists' Display Planned July 5th At City Hall

More plans being made by the Bicentennial Committee are getting underway as the big July 3, 4, and 5 celebration is getting nearer.

A new contest this year will be a Rocking Chair Endurance Contest. This event will begin at 1:00 p. m. Sunday, July 4, and last until the last person left stops rocking. The winner will receive a prize of \$100.76. The rules for the contest are: (1) you must bring your own rocking chair, (2) you must have a continuous rock, (3) there will be one ten-minute break each hour, and (4) the contest is open to all ages. There will be a judge on duty at all times through the contest to time the ten-minute breaks and to make sure that everyone continues rocking.

The parade kicks off the celebration on Monday, July 5 at 10:00 a. m. Following the parade will be the flag-raising ceremony, and the presentation of awards in front of the City Hall.

The prizes for the floats will be \$150.76 for first place, \$125.76 for second place, and \$100.76 for third place.

There will be a mini-float division for Jr. High age and under. Prizes for first and second place mini-float winners will be \$25 U. S. Savings Bonds.

Ribbons will be presented to cow chip throwing winners, and egg tossing winners.

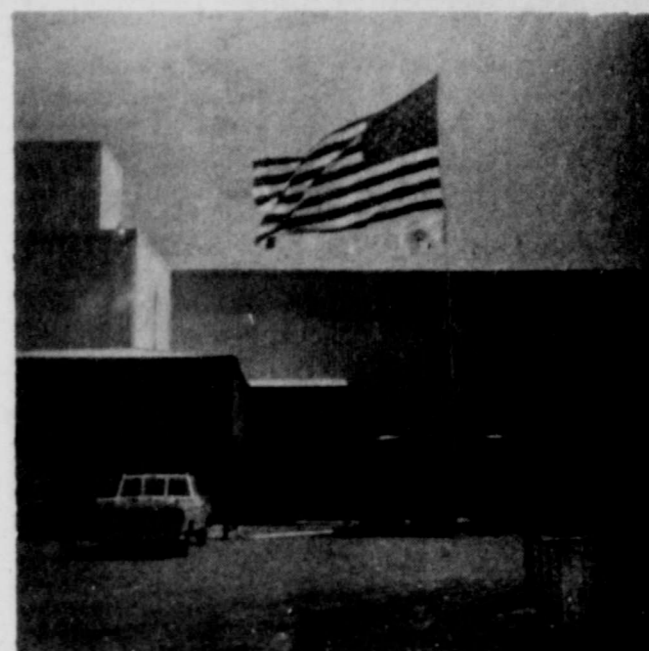

Also under construction is the new service department building at Joe Thompson Implement Co., local John Deere dealership.

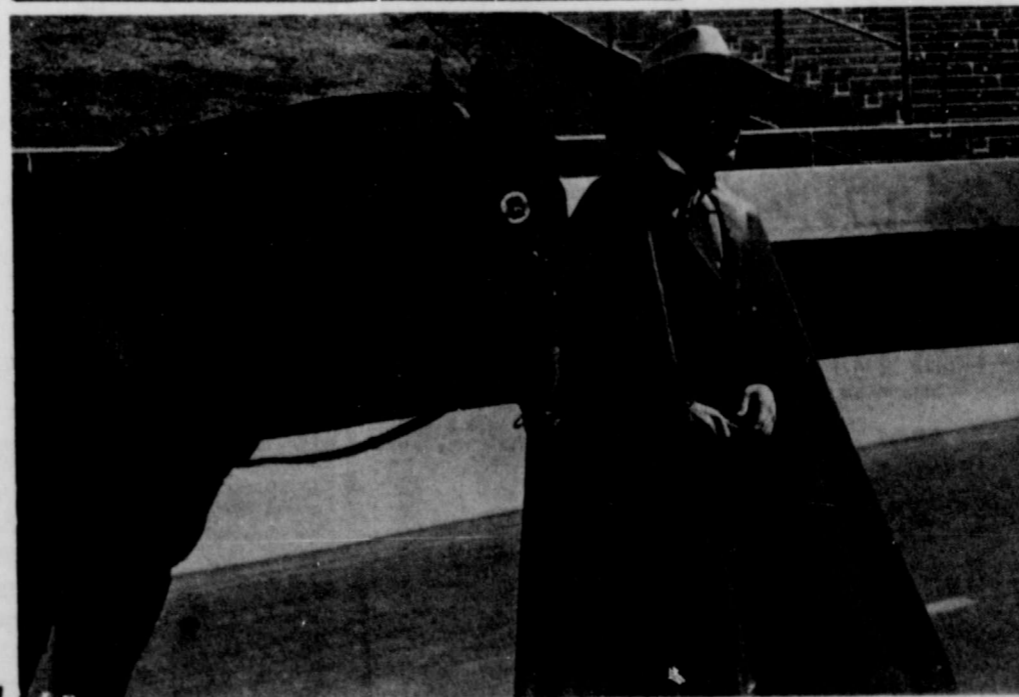
Reports said that the construction between West Service Street and Loop 369 in South Abernathy will be a building for a Dairy Queen operation.

NEWS AND COMMENT

NGC---The Count-Down has started on Abernathy's July 3-4-5 event. If it is not a rousing success it will not be the fault of the many people who have worked so long and so hard to put the three-day celebration together. I can say this because the "worked so long and so hard" does not apply to me. Our thanks to these people.

NGC---At least one Florida resident is expected here for the Abernathy School Reunion... Kermit Woodriddle of Pindas Park, Fla. He is the brother of Mrs. Joe B. Lovelace. Billy Barrick, the artist, and his family will be here from Austin. Another AHS graduate doing well as an artist is Carroll Dean Powell, who is a teacher in the school at Boys Ranch northwest of Amarillo. Not all art is done with brush and colors. Charles Ray Owens uses a torch and metal to look as good to me as some I've seen bearing high price tags in studios. He also produces windmills and stock tanks in miniature from metal, and a pole balancing figure.

(After this was written, we saw Kermit Woodriddle, who arrived here late last week.

NGC---This is a time for remembering our Exes who have scattered across the states. They have gone into various fields of endeavor. Among them are doctors, nurses, attorneys, politicians, public accountants, teachers and numerous other professions. Some are making their mark in commercial aviation. Don Cunningham of Denton is a pilot for Eastern Airlines, who commutes from Dallas/Fort Worth airport to the Atlanta, Ga., airport, his base of operations. We have lost track of him, but a son of Mrs. Clyde E. Rhodes, Sr., was a pilot for Eastern Airlines the last we heard. Another son, Clyde E. Rhodes, Jr., World War Two pilot, was flying jets for an airplane club of wealthy persons. Lavern Cope is in an aviation-connected profession, serving with the FAA, working out of the Salt Lake City region. Stationed at Continental Airlines home offices in Los Angeles, Bucks now is Executive Vice President-Marketing. The Review receives news reports from the various airlines. Last week one came from Continental Airlines. It was announcing a new service.

Starting Sept. 13, Continental will begin flying its newly awarded route San Diego-Denver, with three daily round trips.

NGC---Take time to look at the show windows at Struve Hardware & Dry Goods. They are in keeping with the current Bicentennial theme. See the large flag that Mrs. Minnie Northcutt made (looks like it was knitted). It's a masterpiece. Among other things, see the home-made quilts. They are beautiful. NGC---The Review gets stacks of mail from various out-of-town organizations asking that we publicize their upcoming events. It announced a Film Festival event on the subject of painless childbirth for July 6, in the Mesa Room of the University Center at Texas Tech. NGC---When Abernathy celebrated its 50th Anniversary in 1959, I prepared three packets containing The Review copies from January to July, containing historic news stories and pictures. Also in the packets were Review editions of earlier dates in which very important news stories and pictures appeared. In addition, there were local telephone directories for two different years, photographs and other items that will be of interest to future editors of The Review. Two of the packets, to be opened when Abernathy celebrates its 75th Anniversary, were turned over to Ralph Wolf and Elbert Harp, who are keeping them in their homes. They are instructed to give these packets to the editor of The Review in January of 1984. They will provide the editor with a comprehensive history of Abernathy's first 50 years. The editor will need from January to the anniversary month of July, 1984, to handle this history. The third packet, with similar contents, is in the vault of Abernathy First State Bank, with instructions on top to deliver this packet to the editor of The Review on January 2, 2009. This will give the editor who prepares Abernathy's 100th Anniversary edition some help on Abernathy history for its first 50 years. The bank was instructed not to turn this packet over to anyone until Jan. 2, 2009, and the "anyone" also means to me. Although I prepared the packet, it no longer belongs to me. It is this community's property... to be used on, or after, Jan. 2, 2009, and not before.

NGC---A feature not appearing on the printed July 3-4-5 schedule will augment the packet to be opened in the year 2009. Arno Struve had the very good idea to bury a time capsule containing Abernathy history through June of the year 1976. This

will be helpful for the first 50 years, and will fill in the gap between 1959, when the packets were prepared, and 1976. As I understand the plan, the capsule, which will be buried near the historic marker on the city square, is to be opened in the year 2009. The capsule burial ceremony will be on July 5, shortly after 10:30.

NGC--State Comptroller of Public Accounts Bob Bullock sent a report on amount Texas cities received for sales tax for May, 1975. That must have been a good business month in Abertathy. City Manager Larry Fields was surprised at the larger than usual \$6,540.19 check received here. Other area towns received sales tax checks in the following amounts: Anton \$2,543.12; Crosbyton \$7,443.86; Hale Center \$4,350.40; Idalou \$3,456.55; Lockney \$4,226.71; New Deal \$711.91; Olton \$5,832.60; Petersburg \$2,627.85; Plainview \$99,506.24; Ralls \$5,700.24; Tahoka \$6,007.95. Apparently, Shallowater does not have a city sales tax. The city is not listed on the state reports from Bullock.

NGC--A California egg-producing firm may bring back to life the hamlet of Heckville on FM 400 southeast of Abertathy. Reports say that the California firm has purchased some 100 acres of land across the railroad tracks west of the Co-op Grain Company elevator at Heckville. Plans are being made to produce cage-laid eggs on a massive scale. The project, when in operation, is expected to employ some 30 persons. The Heckville store and service station have been closed for several months. The Co-op Grain office, gin office and an automotive repair shop are the only places now open.

NGC--High Schoolers working this summer are learning the facts of life as concerns supporting the federal government. One who had been multiplying her number of hours worked by \$2.30 per hour was shocked when her first paycheck came to somewhat less, after deduction of income tax and social security. "Now she knows that it is the white collar and blue collar workers and the one-stapender farmers that pay the bulk of the income taxes in the United States...with help from business and industry. The government recently reported that the number of millionaires in the nation paying no income tax at all are decreasing. However, the same report stated that the number of persons with annual incomes of \$200,000.00-plus who are paying no income tax at all are increasing. There's something wrong with an income-taxing system that lets the millionaires and \$200,000.00 income people get by without paying a cent to Internal Revenue. Write your Congressman. Write your Senators in Washington. (Also, write them about the Postal Service cutting post office box service Sundays and holidays.)

NGC--Vacation plans taking you to San Antonio during the period of August 5-8? You and your family might enjoy the Texas Folklife Festival to be held on the 15-acre HemisFair Plaza grounds. If you attended the HemisFair in the 1960's, you'll enjoy a return visit to the Plaza grounds. The Review has brochures and maps covering the Texas Folklife Festival, and you are welcome to come by the office and check this information. If you go to San Antonio, extend your trip to include the Galveston Island, where they are celebrating the Bicentennial in many interesting ways. The Review also has brochures, maps and information on Galveston Island and City. You are welcome to check the Galveston material. Also, The Review has a supply of brochures to give those who plan to attend a showing of "TEXAS" in Palo Duro Canyon this summer. There is information on seating, ticket prices and reservations.

NGC--Soft drink and beer producers should be required to put their products in glass bottles instead of cans. The U. S. likely will run out of the stuff cans are made of quicker than we will run out of sand, from which glass is made. NGC--You expect situations and conditions to improve with time, but that is reversed in the U. S. Postal System. Compare what we have here today with postal service Abertathy once had: Four daily Santa Fe passenger trains, with U. S. Mail cars, some in daytime, some in early evening. Mail was delivered here and picked up here four times every day. If you missed the mail tie-out at the post office, you could go to the railway depot and hand your mail to the clerk on the mail car or drop it in the slot of the mail car. Going north, your letter placed on the mail car would be delivered in Hale Center in a matter of minutes.... now it's more like a matter of days before a letter gets to the person to whom it is addressed in Hale Center and on the routes. When I was

running The Review, I lost some subscribers on the Hale Center routes because The Review was delivered late... their Review left Abertathy on Wednesday afternoons the same as to other area towns. Also, going south, your mail would get to Lubbock in minutes. Currently, a small pickup truck brings the mail to Abertathy each morning, and the mail is taken to Lubbock each afternoon at 5 by the same pickup truck. That's it for the day. Further service cuts start July 4, when mail no longer will be placed in post office boxes on Sundays and holidays. Most postal holidays are observed on Mondays...that's two days without mail being put in post office boxes. Mail service is the lifeblood of many businesses. The new rule will further hamper operations of those who depend on the mails in their business. We have done a lot of complaining about the U. S. Postal Service, which inherited a big bag of troubles from the former operators, The U. S. Post Office Department. We can't charge all our problems up to the current administrations, the

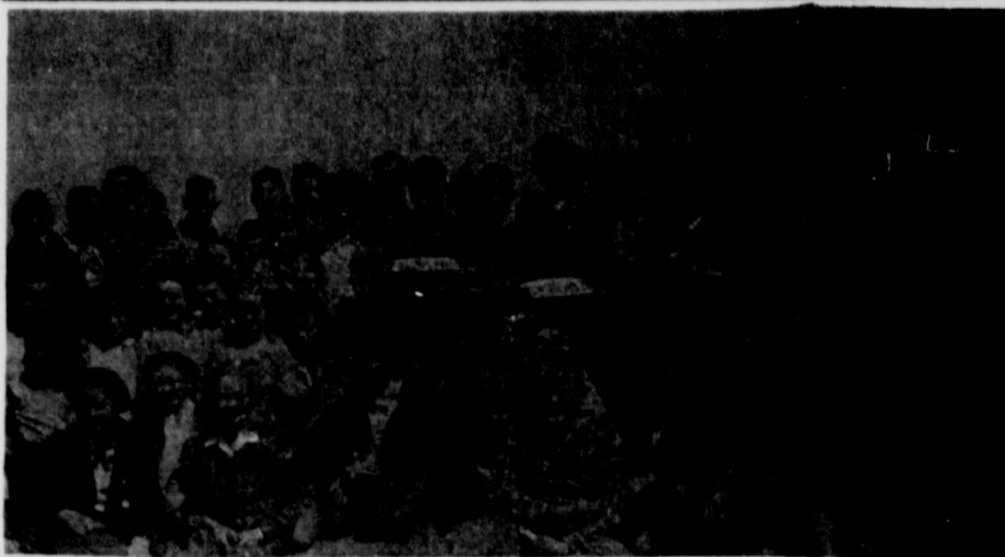

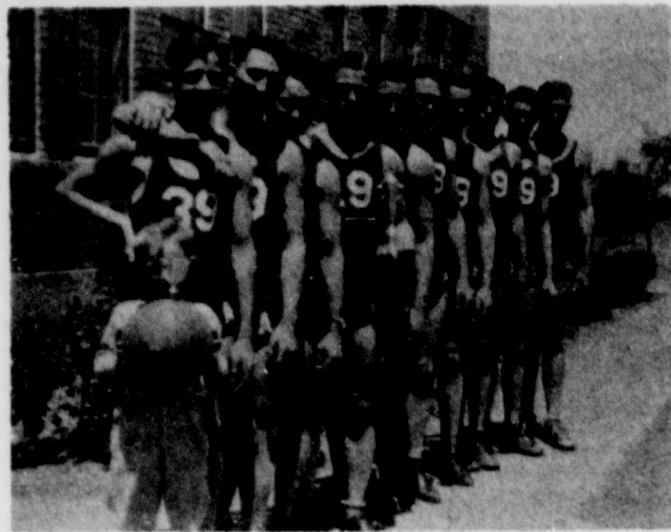

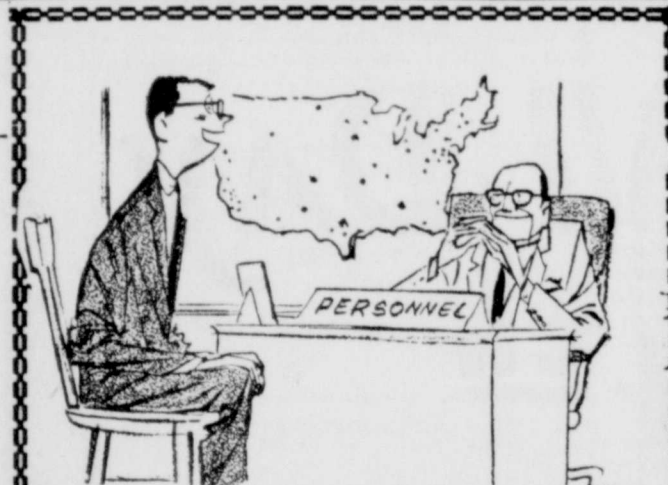
