TIME CAPSULE TO BE BURIED SOON AT CITY HALL SQUARE

Material is being gathered to be placed in a Time Capsule which is to be preserved in the ground on city property until the year 2009. Extreme protective measures to control moisture and other deleterious forces will be taken to protect the material. The capsule itself is to be a steel cylinder, itself moisture tight and containing silica gel to keep the relative humidity in the cylinder very low.
Current newspapers will be placed in the capsule recording our recent celebration. Microfilm of older Abernathy papers will be included. A magnetic tape copy of the "I Love America" performance will be in it. And any other information that might be deemed appropriate will be included.
Any suggestions about what might properly be placed in the capsule would be greatly appreciated. Polly Tucker or Arno Struve would be glad to receive any such suggestions.
Incidentally a file of historical material is now stored in the vault of the First State Bank of Abernathy that was placed there in 1959 by Buford Davenport, and which is to be opened for inspection also in the year 2009.

FUNERAL RITES HELD MONDAY FOR MRS. DORA GOEBEL HERE

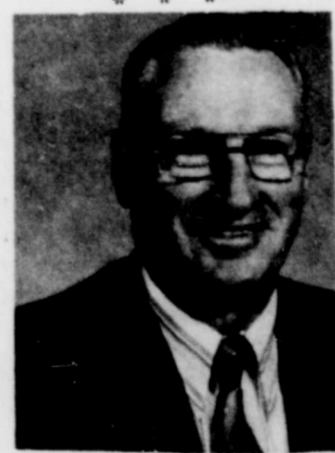

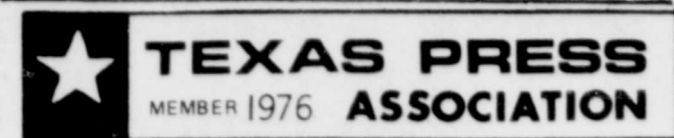

Common Treatments For Animal Poisoning Are Often Dangerous

If you suspect your pet has been poisoned, you may think that you are helping by giving it an emetic (something that induces vomiting) but you may actually be harming it, according to a scientist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

The remedies and techniques available to the average pet owner are usually ineffective and sometimes even dangerous, according to Dr. E. Murl Bailey, Jr., TAES scientist with the College of Veterinary Medicine at Texas A&M University.

"Animals that are unconscious, or severely depressed, or that have been poisoned with tranquilizers or similar drugs should not be forced to rid themselves of the poisonous substance," Bailey says.

Animals that have been poisoned by acids or alkalis will actually be harmed if they try to rid themselves of the poison. Such animals will show signs of corrosive damage about the mouth and forepaws and will suffer damage to the esophagus and oral cavity if forced to vomit.

Contacting your veterinarian quickly is one of the most important things you can do for your pet. Bailey stresses that instructions given over the phone may prove to be very important in the later treatment of the animal, and may even save its life.

Your veterinarian will usually recommend such precautionary measures as keeping the affected animal warm and protecting him from any unnecessary stress. People in contact with the animal should be warned about its condition. If the animal becomes excited, it may be desirable to place a muzzle on it.

If your pet was exposed to contact type of poison, which will act directly on the skin, you should wash the animal's skin or eyes with large amounts of water. You should be careful while handling the animal not to expose yourself to the poison and should wear some type of protective clothing," Bailey says.

"Allowing the animal to drink as much water as it wants is an effective way to dilute many poisons. In most cases, milk or egg whites may be safely administered by the pet owner as long as the animal is not convulsing, depressed or unconscious.

"You should get your pet to a veterinarian as quickly as possible to avoid further absorption of the poison into its body. Carry along any suspected materials that may

have poisoned your pet, as well as specimens of any discharges from the animal's mouth.

"These specimens will help speed your veterinarian's identification of the type of poison and will help him treat your pet more effectively. Although there are no 'magic antidotes' for curing poisoned animals, specific treatments are available for certain kinds of poisoning and may be used once the substance is identified," Bailey concludes.

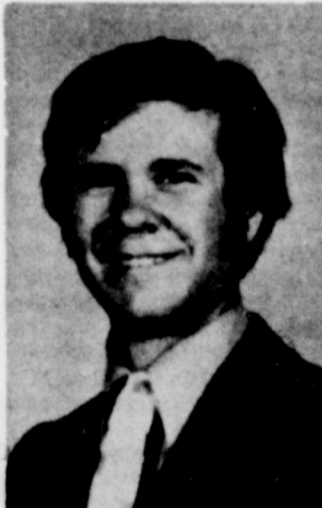

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COMMUNITY-WIDE PRODUCTION OF "I LOVE AMERICA" HIGHLIGHTS BICENTENNIAL OBSERVANCES IN ABERNATHY

A large audience was thrilled Sunday evening July 4th by the presentation of the Peterson-Wyrtzen Musical "I Love America", conducted by George Riddell, Abernathy School band director, and sponsored by the Abernathy Music Club, Louisiana (Patterson) Grindstaff, president. The choir was composed of volunteers from the church choir of Abernathy. The theme of the musical was appreciation for God and the United States. Expressions in superlatives from knowledgeable listeners testify to the quality of the production. The audience and the performers alike came away with the feeling that the experience of the evening was and will be a memorable one.

A musically discriminating audience demonstrated approval by its generous applause. Especially notable was the professional accompaniment via magnetic tape which seemed to elicit from the singers a quality of performance to match.

known to his neighbors. Why? Perhaps that is all that he did do--nothing about accepting the Lord Jesus and he was afraid that they would question him on his salvation and that he didn't want them to do. Again Matthew 10:33 comes to my mind.

In the early years of the church how often the Christians were persecuted in these arenas by the hungry lions, were often burned at the stake, crucified on crosses, and many more horrible sufferings, yet the power of the Christians never diminished and Christianity spread far and wide. Today there isn't so much persecution yet we are so mealy mouthed that we

won't tell anyone when we have accepted Jesus because we are afraid that they will laugh at us. What a difference! The scornful laugh of an unbeliever or accepting death for our faith -- of the two it would seem as though the laugh would be easier to endure. Evidently not, because we certainly don't have the zeal for Christ now that was evident two thousand years ago.

No wonder God uses a small child to bring rebuke on those who do not confess Jesus before their family and friends. Truly in these last days, "a little child shall lead them."

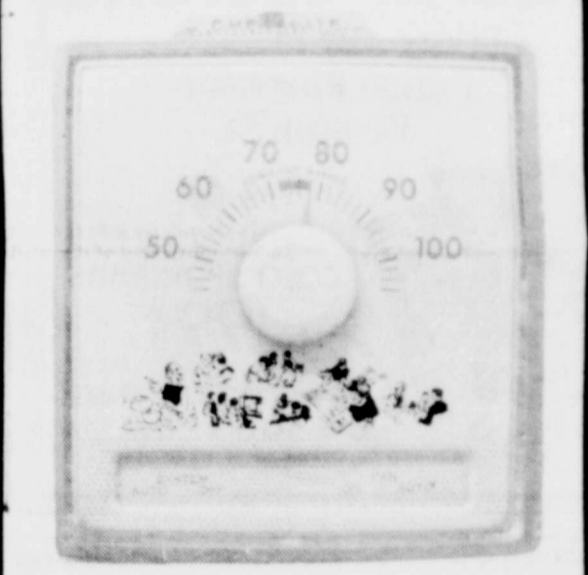

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GENERAL RAIN IN THIS AREA

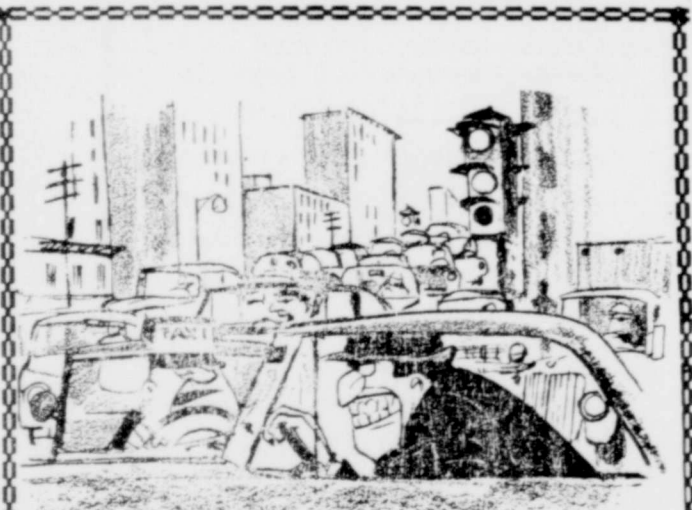
