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





Fortunately, such a difficult choice is not necessary. Let's modify the rule and say, 'Keep part of it and eat part of it.' Which brings us to the choice that is necessary. Cotton Classing

ABILENE

Receipts of cotton samples at the USDA Cotton Classing Office at Abilene have been low. The volume increased late this past week, as fields began drying enough for farmers to resume harvest in most areas.

Seventy-five hundred samples were graded during the week ending March 9. This brought the season total to approximately 421,000 samples, as compared to 243,000 graded at this date last season. Quality statistics were little changed from the previous week.

The price of cotton declined about one cent per pound for all grades during the past week. The price for premium micronaire, grade 42 cotton, with staple 31 was about 26.50 cents per pound. Premium
