



**DECREASE SEEN FOR  
 HALE COUNTY CAR INSURANCE**

AUSTIN — In the Plainview area, the Insurance Board's action will cause auto insurance rates to decrease by \$22 per year for the largest class of motorists if they accept the new deductible limits.

Rates for drivers in the 1B category, with no male drivers under 25, no unmarried female drivers over 21, no drivers over 65, and the car is not used for business but is driven to and from work, will decrease from the current rate of \$244 to \$222 beginning Oct. 1.

Bodily injury liability and property damage liability will rise \$10 in the 1B category. The \$200 deductible collision coverage will be the same as the present \$100 deductible collision and the \$50 deductible comprehensive will be \$32 less than the current full coverage comprehensive insurance.

Other material covered in the workshop included research recently done in helping students to transfer easily from whatever method they have studied to the new Frances Clark Method.

Mrs. Williams says she feels this new material will prove invaluable, both to her and to her students in the coming year.

**Area corn crop  
 nears maturity**

Crops continue to progress well. Hot, dry weather has aided maturity of cotton and corn. Much of the early corn is in the "dent" stage and maturity of this crop is not far off. Some hot spots have developed as producers have difficulties getting irrigation water across their fields, according to Hale County Entomologist Eugene Latham.

**INSECT SITUATION**  
**COTTON:** Insect activity remains light in cotton. Some bollworm eggs have been observed but beneficial insects are keeping bollworms in check in scouted fields. Cotton that has been watered and has fresh, green growth will be more attractive as bollworm egg laying sites than hot, tough cotton.

**CORN:** Insect activity has greatly decreased in corn due to the stage of maturity, time of year and insecticide applications. Spider mites appear to be the greatest threat to the corn at this time. In some areas the mites are decreasing without insecticidal control while in others rapid population increases are occurring. Control difficulties are being encountered in some areas.

Armyworm problem seems to be subsiding as the "worms" are completing their cycle and are entering the soil to pupate. The probability of another cycle of armyworms is unknown, but the possibility does exist. Southwestern corn borer activity has decreased except in fields with high populations and in young corn. In fields with high first generation populations egg masses can still be found on up to 50 percent of the plants. Stalk lodging is evident in many fields due to girdling activities of the first generation of the corn borer. The individual larvae that have

girdled at this time are those that did not pupate to initiate the second generation but prepared to overwinter. Up to 16 per cent of the stalks have lodged in one field as of August 11th.

**GRAIN SORGHUM:** Greenbugs have all but disappeared from the fields. Parasitism by the parasitic wasp approaches 100 per cent in all observed fields.

Armyworms have been a problem in several fields but, as in corn, appears to have ran their cycle for now.

Spider mites have not increased to problem levels in any scouted fields as of this time. Producers should be reminded that we are approaching the time of year when the sorghum midge can be a problem. Sorghum that is blooming is subject to midge attack and should be monitored closely for this pest.

The adult midge, a small, gnat-like insect, is red or orange in color and lays eggs on blooming sorghum. After the anthers turn from bright yellow to orange the sorghum is no longer subject to midge attack. If 20 per cent of the heads in a field are in some stage of bloom and an average of 1 midge per head is found, chemical control is usually justified. Consult Extension Publication MP-339, "Suggestions for Controlling Insects and Mites on Corn, Sorghums and Small Grains", for effective insecticides.

**Second Presentation Of Musical

 A large audience was thrilled Sunday evening July 4th by the presentation of the Peterson-Wyrtan Musical: "I Love America", conducted by George Riddell, Abernathy School band director, and sponsored by the Abernathy Music Club, Lajuna (Peterson) Grindstaff, president. The choir was composed of volunteers from the church choir of Abernathy. The theme of the musical was appreciation for God and the United States. Expressions in superlatives from knowledgeable listeners testify to the quality of the production. The audience and the performers alike came away with the feeling that the experience of the evening was and will be a memorable one.

A musically discriminating audience demonstrated approval by its generous applause. Especially notable was the professional accompaniment via magnetic tape which seemed to elicit from the singers a quality of performance to match.

The conductor had only two weeks with the group to develop the production although prior to that there had been scattered rehearsals with limited attendance under Rusty Tomerlin. Never was there a full complement of singers present until the night of the performance. Of course the singers themselves were not satisfied with the final effort because of a few rough spots encountered but the brilliance of the rest of the performance more than made up for the errors.

A feature of the program was the projection of scenes

of America on screens on each side of the stage during the theme song at the beginning. Charles Bowen, the production manager, and Herbert Hardin, his assistant, were the projectionists although the scenes went by in rapid progression the story of America in pictures pleased those who were physically capable of turning their heads from side to side rapidly enough.

During the first half of the performance the singers wore self-designed costumes choosing whatever historical personality to depict that they wished. The personalities portrayed were George Washington, Martha Washington, a bearded Daniel Boone, a gambling gunfighter, early American ladies, 19th century judges, a Mafia slick, an Indian in full ceremonial regalia, a hill-billy, a farmer, an English lady, a Yankee Doodle Boy, and a cowboy. Other costumes included a square dress, a "flapper" dress, gay nineties costumes, high fashion 30s as well as modern dress.

In the second half the singers wore more formally dressed in robes provided by our First Baptist Church.

**Harrington Station  
 Uses Coal For Fuel**

Bob Brummal, Southwestern Public Service Company's Division Manager in Lubbock has announced that Southwestern Public Service is now burning coal at its new Harrington Station Power Plant.

This is the first time in the modern history of the Company that coal has been used to fuel the boilers that produce steam at Southwestern plants. The low-sulphur coal is being brought in from Wyoming in 110 car unit trains on a twice a week schedule and will be used at the rate of 3500 tons per week when the generating unit is operating at capacity.

Construction of the second 350,000 KW generating unit is underway at Harrington Station with completion scheduled in 1978. Plans call for additional coal fired units to be in service in 1980, 1982 and 1984.

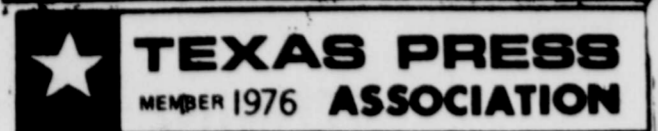

PRAISE ye the LORD: for it is good to sing praises unto our God; for it is pleasant; and praise is comely. Ps. 147:1

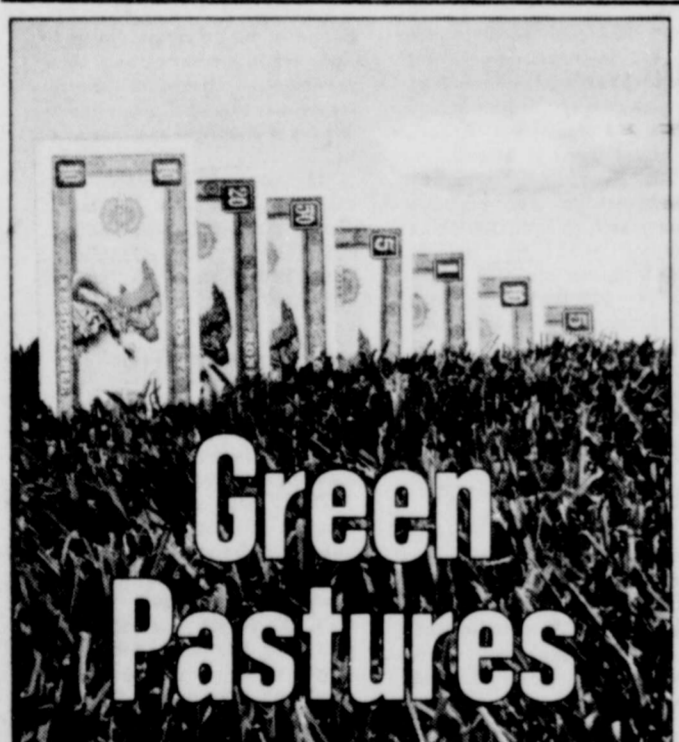

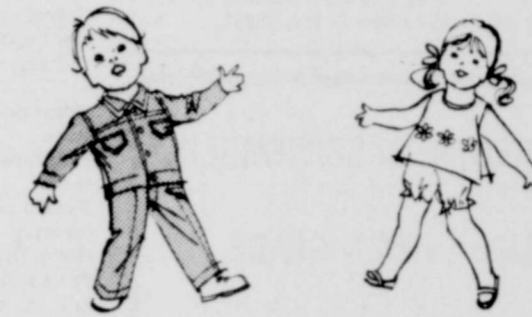
