### Homemaking Tips

FROM THE OFFICE OF COUNTY EXTENSION AGENT

Adolescence is a time of many changes of young people -they're striving for independence and responsibility.

Teenagers are trying to find their place in society, and parents can help them best by accepting them as unique individuals. This means being willing to acknowledge and respect the teenager's feelings and ideas.

A family council is a good way to exchange ideas and decide on rules by which the family can live. In a family council, everyone can have a part in the decision making. It's important to find time to talk and really listen to what others are saying.

THROUGHOUT adolescence, teenagers do need some limits and supervision. Rules should be flexible enough to fit the situation and meet the needs of individuals involved. Through a family council, a teenager can help decide which rules are fair and appropriate.

All family members need privacy - and this is especially true of teenagers. By allowing teens to have some privacy, parents show respect for their

children. When parents pry too much into their teenagers' lives, their actions create resentment and a lack of trust. A feeling of respect between family members must be mutual.

Teens also need opportunities to become self-directing. Parents can help their teenagers to think for themselves and act responsibly. Set a good example for the teenager and let him know what is expected of him. But keep expectations realistic and don't expect perfection.

ENCOURAGE the teenager to use his own initiative to find solutions to his problems. Acknowledge accomplishments openly but restrict criticism. Too much criticism, or name calling, causes resentment and self doubt

Younger children should not be overlooked in the growing maturing process.

Give children opportunities to tell you what they are thinking, and encourage children to ask questions about things which puzzle them

Daily routines for an adult can be exciting experiences for a young child.

In a young child's eyes, every activity, situation, pleasure and disappointment represents new opportunity for growth and

FAR TOO OFTEN, families and teachers become too caught up with their own problems and responsibilities to take advantage of all the opportunities they have to broaden their child's experiences.

Children derive untold pleasures when allowed to 'help' adults, especially their parents. Each experience they participate in helps build a strong self-concept - it tells them "Yes, I can do that." It also enables the child to develop independence and a sense of accomplishment. Parents would also notice a decline in disciplinary problems, for a child who is occupied and not bored is less likely to be

Parents need not be educated in child development to implement these concepts. The keys to success are imagination and creativity. Here are some possibilities

LET YOUR CHILD help with meals, setting the table, cracking eggs, turning pancakes, putting dishes away.

At the post office, children can lick stamps, seal letters and put them in the mail box.

At the grocery store, children can lead the cart, pick out items, pay the cashier, and collect the stamps.

Children also like to push elevator buttons, dial telephones, clean bathrooms and run simple errands.

An old stump or piece of wood can be used to hammer, saw, and drill holes. They may be handy with a broom or rake (though they may not be up to your standards, it is the experience that counts).

The District requests that all machinery being moved into or from place to place within the county be cleaned by the approved method of water under pressure.

The District also requests that all land owners refuse entrance to all non-clean machines and that all machines be cleaned before leaving the farm or before moving from one farm to another, or from one portion of the farm to another.

The District believes their motto, "One year's seeding equals seven years weeding."
To be true and that the process of complete eradication will be slow, but with the cooperation of

every county farmer this process of eradication can take on a new speed with an end result of a clean county.

The Weed District's program is designed to help protect Hale County farms against noxious weeds and to help eradicate existing infestations. If the farmer will do his part in watching for bindweed and bindweed seed, this eradication can be brought about much faster and easier than if the Weed District has to do it alone.

'Noxious weeds can be killed during the cold winter months just as successfully as in the summer months," says W.R. Churchwell, Supervisor of Hale County Noxious Weed Control District. "Now is a very good time to rid non-cropped areas of noxious weeds. If you have any of these weeds on your fence rows, turn rows, around wells. elevated ditches, and parking areas for farm equipment, be sure to contact the Weed Control District for any spraying required," he said.

It is extremely important that any non-cropped area be sprayed during the winter months as this is a lull period for the Weed Control District. During the late spring and summer momths, spraying is concentrated on larger areas of bindweed, also on bindweed that appears in the farmed areas.

In past years the Weed Control District has been spraying the highway right-of-way, but the Highway Department no longer furnishes the District with the necessary chemical. Therefore we can no longer spray the right-of-way without cost to the farmers.

Hale County farmers having problems with noxious weeds are invited to bring their problems to the Weed Control District office located upstairs in the Agriculture Building on the Courthouse square, Plainview.





Cool, damp weather has slowed maturity of most crops. Corn harvest, while underway in some areas, has not reached full swing. Grain sorghum harvest is not far away, according to Gene Latham, Hale County entomologist.

INSECT SITUATION Most crops in our area are not being subjected to insect pressure. Sorghum midge in the few fields of sorghum still on the bloom stage and bollworms in cotton are the main concerns as of this time.

Midge numbers averaging 2 per head of blooming sorghum have been observed this week. This pest can be very destructive to late blooming sorghum and should be monitored very closely. Spider mites are still present in some fields but do not pose a problem under weather conditions we've

experienced the past two weeks. Cotton bollworm pressure appears to be decreasing. Egg deposition has decreased and the cool weather appears to have slowed or stopped egg hatch. If hot, open weather returns, this trend may change and bollworms continue to be a problem for a few weeks.

"This will be the last regular weekly newsletter for the 1976 crop year. If insect activity warrants, I will write additional letters. I hope the information in these newsletters has been of benefit to you. If I can assist you in any way, please feel free to give me a call," Latham said.





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
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
