New Deal Lions Win Homecoming Game Friday Night

(Editor's Note: The following account of the New Deal-Shallowater game, played at New Deal Sept. 17, should have appeared in The Review dated Sept. 23.)

NEW DEAL (Special) - New Deal linebacker Rusty Aho almost singlehandedly shackled the Shallowater defense while the Lion Offense steamrolled to score in each quarter and a 34-7 whumping of the Mustangs.

Aho's performance, which included 19 tackles two interceptions and a fumble recovery, helped hold the Mustangs to only four first downs while New Deal walked to 21 first downs and the easy victory before a large Homecoming crowd of Lions supporters.

Randy Vines opened New Deal scoring with two touchdowns romps in the first period from 21 and 22 yards out. Shallowater lighted its half of the scoreboard in the second period on a 1-yard plunge by Ruben Gomez. Kerry Miller of New Deal matched Gomez's effort with a 1-yard drive later in the period and Kelly Howell hit Rex Kirk with a 2-point conversion toss to give the Lions a 20-7 halftime lead.

Howell found Eddie Ramirez open in the third quarter to extend the New Deal lead and then connected with Vines on the 2-point conversion. Howell ended the Lions' scoring and a personal spectacular offensive effort in the final period with a 27-yard scoring sprint.

The victory left New Deal at 2-1 for the season and dropped Shallowater to 1-2.

New Deal was edged, 11-14, by AA Idealou in their season opener; downed Springlake-Earth, 21-0, and won their Homecoming game against Shallowater.

The Lions play another home game at 8 p.m. Sept. 24, when Plains come to New Deal.

Vote registration deadline near

Hale County's unregistered voters have less than two weeks to complete the registration process. Otherwise, they will be ineligible to vote in the Nov. 2 general election.

However, all Hale County residents who voted in any election this year are already eligible to vote in the November election. Registration can be done at the Hale County Tax Office, at 8th and Broadway, or at one of three sub-stations throughout the county, according to County Tax Collector Bill Hollars. Sub-stations are located at Struve's Dry Goods in Hale Center, Abernathy Insurance Agency and Kelly-Suits Agency in Petersburg. Also, registration forms can be picked up at

various grocery stores throughout the county and mailed to Hollars' office.

Registration deadline for the November 2 races is October 1. Those registration cards mailed in must be postmarked no later than October 1.

THIS YEAR'S added push to increase voter registration has been aided by Texas Secretary of State Mark White's decision to make registration forms available at grocery stores, convenience stores and drug stores throughout the state, Hollars said.

In Hale County, according to Hollars, more than 15,000 persons are registered and by the Oct. 1 deadline it is hoped the number will climb to the 16,000 mark. Of

that figure, Hollars estimates approximately 60 to 65 per cent will likely vote on Nov. 2, a slightly higher percentage than voted in 1968 and '72, but nowhere near the 90 per cent for 1964.

"The reason for such a high percentage in '64 was Lyndon Johnson's popularity in this area," Hollars said, adding it was unlikely either President Ford or Democratic challenger Jimmy Carter could create that kind of support in Hale County this year.

"The biggest disappointment in the '72 general election was the lack of voter response in the 18-21 year-old age group. Only about 10 per cent of registered voters in that age group went to the polls," Hollars said.

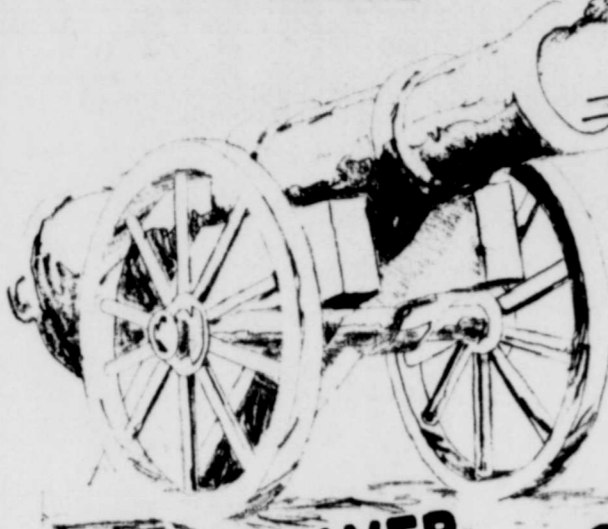

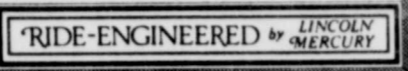

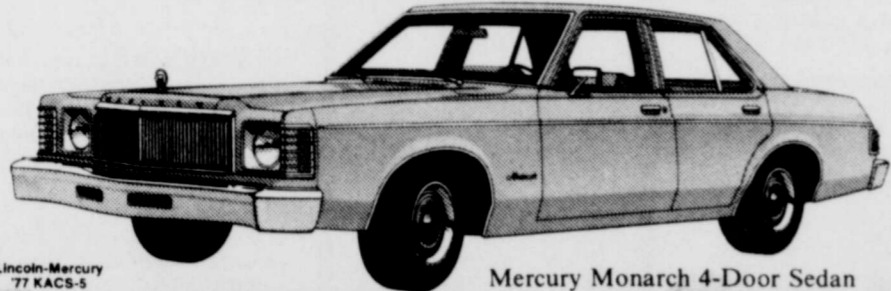

DPS REMINDS MOTORISTS OF SCHOOL BUS LAW

"This school year, as in the past, the School Bus Loading Laws confuse many drivers," states Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The Uniform Vehicle Code in Texas states that the driver of a vehicle, meeting or overtaking from either direction a school bus displaying red flashing warning lights that is in the process of loading or unloading passengers, shall stop until the school bus starts moving, the red lights are no longer flashing, or the driver directs motorists to proceed.

"Freeway and divided highways add to the drivers' confusion," Major Bell added. "If a bus is on an access road, only the traffic on the access road must stop. However, if the bus is on a divided highway and pedestrian traffic does not normally cross the median or barrier then only the traffic on the portion of the roadway occupied by the bus must stop."

It is most important that drivers observe the School Bus Loading Laws for the protection of our school children.

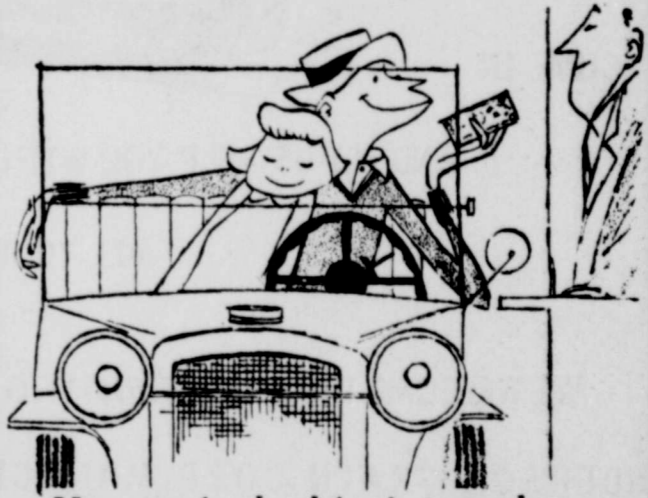


