Considering the Santa Fe Railway as the local authority on change of times, The Review thanks station agent H. E. Culver for providing the information for the paper.

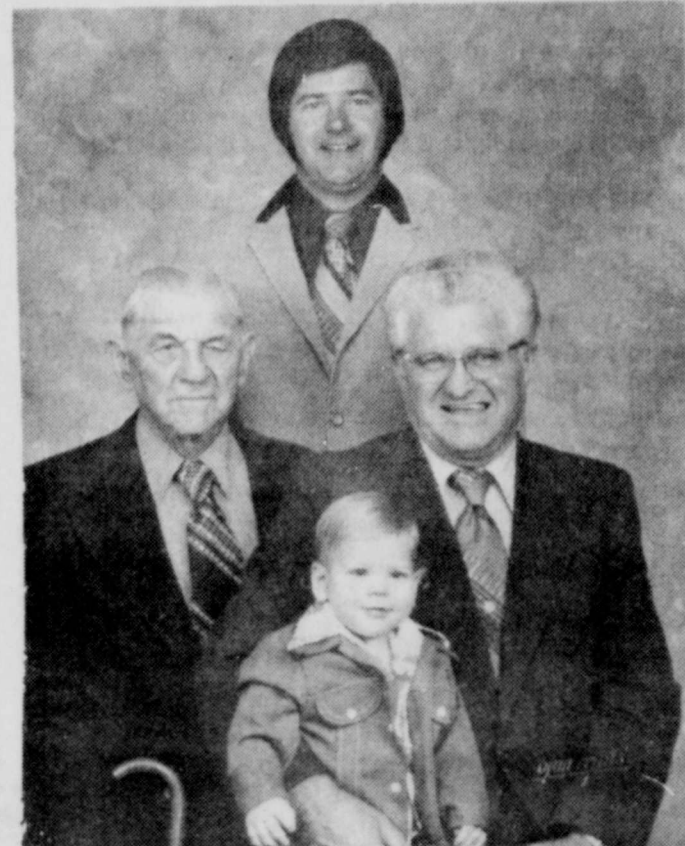
Diamond Shamrock Banquet Here

These persons who are chronically ill will need to have a statement from their doctor to the effect that they need to have the Bivalent vaccine.

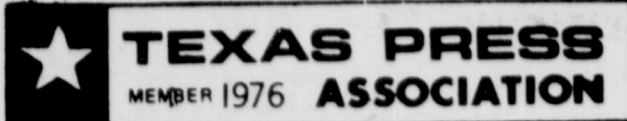

County Voter Rolls Increase

Hale County has approximately 3,000 more registered voters eligible for the upcoming presidential election than in 1972. According to figures released by County Tax Assessor-Collector Bill Hollars, there are now 16,366 persons registered in Hale County compared to 13,624 in 1968 and 13,416 in 1972. Hollars cites several reasons for the increase, including a larger population and a massive voter registration push conducted by Texas Secretary of State Mark White which included making registration forms available at various grocery and convenience stores throughout the state. A total of 10,387 Hale County residents voted in the '68 race while only 9,512 cast ballots in 1972.

The City of Abernathy proposes to request the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to release Federal funds under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (PL 93-383) to be used for the following project:

EXTENSION OF SEWER FACILITIES

The purpose of the project will be to provide approximately 350 residents with sanitary sewer service. The project will be located in the eastern portion of the City of Abernathy, Hale-Lubbock County, Texas at an estimated cost of \$100,000.00.

It has been determined that such request for release of funds will not constitute an action adversely affecting the quality of the human

environment and, accordingly, the City of Abernathy has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (PL 91-190).

The reasons for the decision not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement are (1) no changes in land use will be necessary, (2) no individuals will have to be relocated because of the project improvements, (3) no archeological or cultural sites are known to exist in the project area and (4) potential health hazards will be eliminated by the project.

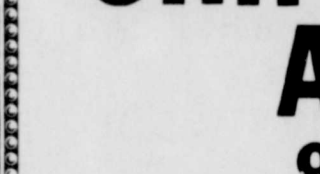

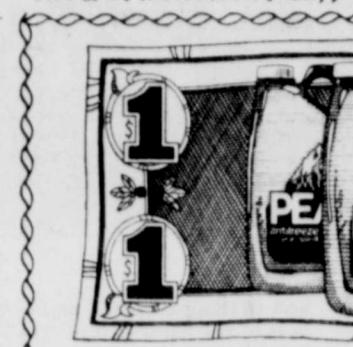

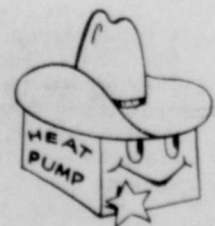

Thirty-two members of Abernathy's First Baptist Church and Mexican Mission were in Old Mexico this past week. Ralph Wolf, Waunice Newton, and Bro. Jacky Newton left Monday, October 11 to join a group from Faith Baptist Church of Iowa Park, Texas to work in Cedillos, Old Mexico (pronounced say dee-yoe). The combined group worked to complete a mission building which had been begun by the Iowa Park church earlier this year. The ladies of the two churches working with the Mexican women completed 25 quilts and left several more to be finished. These will be given to families of this border town of some 750 residents. Cedillos is located across the Rio Grande River from Ft. Hancock, Texas in the El Paso Baptist Association.

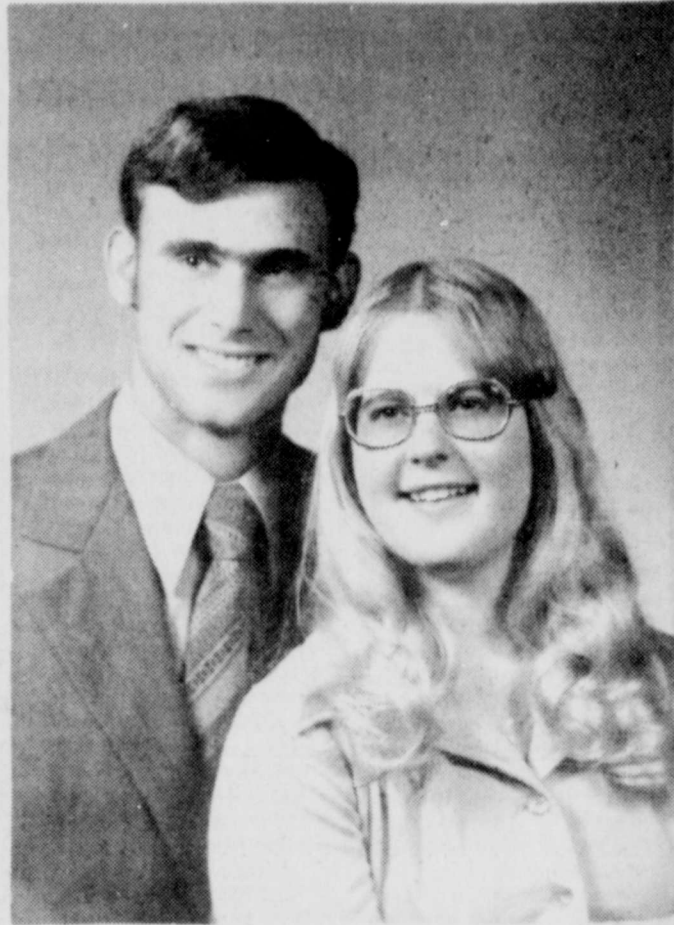
On Friday, Mike O'Donnell Minister of Music and Youth of the First Baptist Church, and Matthew Rendon, Music and Youth Director of the Mexican Baptist Mission of Abernathy, bought a group of 29 adults and young people to hold Bible Study and worship services along the Rio Grande River. They worked in Cedillos and Ojas Caliente on Saturday and Sunday. The services were done entirely in Spanish with the members of the Abernathy churches in charge.

Plans are being made to consider working somewhere along the Rio Grande River in Old Mexico on a permanent basis. It is hoped that a group can return during the Christmas holidays to conduct a Vacation Bible School and Revival.

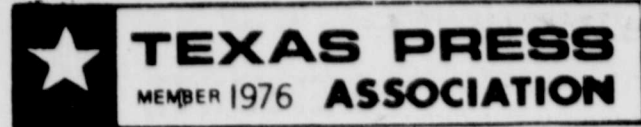

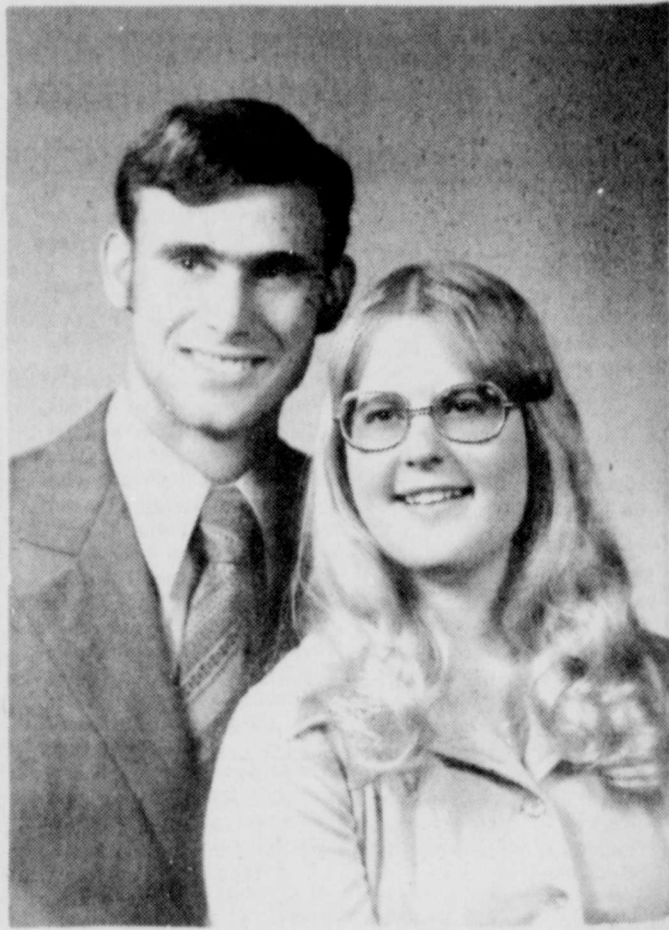

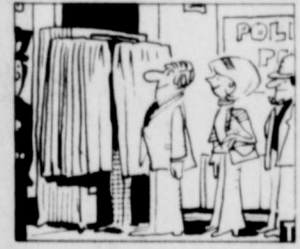

EARLY UNITED STATES MAIL HISTORY FOR AREA (by Mona Toler)

In the 1880's people who were settling the area between Amarillo and Lubbock, Texas wanted better mail service than making an occasional trip on horseback to the railroad or receiving mail every few months from a freighter. Enterprising men began to fill that need. The railroad had reached Amarillo in 1888 and mail lines out of Amarillo were at first weekly affairs, with mail delivered south to the T-Anchor Ranch. Hale County people began receiving their mail regularly through the efforts of W.L. Tharp who carried the mail from Amarillo through Plainview to Estacado in July and August 1888. It took him six days to make the round trip. T.B. or Bert Clisbee or the Clisbee brothers, who ran a livery stable in Amarillo, had secured the mail contract from the U.S. Government for two months and had hired Tharp to carry the mail. The first trip Tharp made was over

the stage was about 8-10¢ per mile and the distance was about 90 miles from Amarillo to Plainview and about 160 miles from Amarillo to "Old" Emma. To quote J.H. Lutrick, an 1892 settler, "It was good traveling for those who could stand it, but the tenderfoot had to hold on for dear life, for every one of the mules was full brother to the other and they were all rearing to go when they were hitched up."

The Post Office of Clisbee was first established on August 3, 1891 at a relay station on the land Stant Rhea later homesteaded in 1901, which was located southwest of Plainview. Postmasters were: Robert Montgomery, Aug. 3, 1891; Thomas C. Scott, Nov. 16, 1891; Robert Montgomery, Nov. 28, 1892; Samuel A. Spears, Oct. 30, 1893; T.L. Van Vector, July 6, 1894; Discounted, Sept. 11, 1894.

The mail was ordered sent to Hale Center, but the stage line continued to use the stage stand, a relay station for changing mules, and to service the rural people despite the sparse settlement. The area people had no formal name for the former Clisbee Post Office, but merely called it the "stage stand".

Stant Rhea and Robert Montgomery bought the Clisbee's mules and other equipment and continued servicing the area. They provided daily mail, small packages, and passenger service. Later Rhea bought Montgomery's interest in the line. The mules were operated about 19 years--1890 to 1909.

In the summer of 1892, the line used only one mule, but when the area was more thickly settled, two mules were used. A two-wire barbed-wire fence was stretched around the section of land in which Rhea kept about thirty head of Spanish

mules. The mules were cream colored, brown or gray. Some had black or dark brown stripes around their legs zebra fashion. The hack was a light-weight buckboard with a slatted floor (with space between slats) and an iron rail around the bed. The water-proof mail sack had a draw-string top. The draw strings were tied to the iron rail. Stamps cost 2¢ for a letter and 1¢ for a postcard. People received weekly newspapers like the Kansas City Star and the Dallas Weekly News. Mr. Rhea or his drivers carried the mail to Hale Center (formed out of Hale City and Epworth in 1893) where it was sorted by the Postmaster. The mail for the people who lived near the stage stand was handed back to the driver. This he placed in a tin bucket nailed on the outside lumber wall of a dugout near the corrals. At each person came to get mail, he would sort through it and take what belonged to his family and leave that of his neighbors.

The dugout was about 14' square with dirt walls and floor. It contained a bachelor stove, a homemade table and nail kegs for chairs. Repairs for harnesses were piled in a corner and hung around on nails on the walls. Passengers used the dugout when the stage had not yet arrived.

The drivers had no horse when they got to the stage stand, so they had to use the mail-carrying rig to help round up fresh mules. If there was someone on horseback waiting for the stage, they would often get the job of catching the animals. Spanish mules were sometimes contrary and would kick the cowboy or driver if they didn't want to come in. Young men and boys like Robert Lutrick, Clint Pearce, Arthur and Alfred Reed, Harry Spears and John Hollicker were among those

Parmesan Meat Loaf

- 1 lb. ground beef
 - 1 (8 oz.) carton cottage cheese
 - 1/2 cup quick cooking oats
 - 1 egg
 - 1/4 cup catsup
 - 2 tsp. prepared mustard
 - 2 tsp. onion powder
 - 1/2 tsp. garlic powder
 - 1 tsp. salt
 - 1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- Combine all ingredients except cheese. Place meat mixture into a greased 8x8x2-inch pan. Bake in 350 degree oven for 20 minutes. Sprinkle top with cheese. Bake 10 minutes longer. Remove from oven and allow to stand five minutes before cutting squares. Yield: 6 servings.

the route, and it took him a day and a half to get to Plainview using a one-horse buckboard. There were no towns between Amarillo and Plainview then, but there was a good trail. However, the first morning, he had to swim the Palo Duro Creek at the T-Anchor Ranch.

The demand for such extended service required a great deal more equipment. A man named W.H. Fuqua, who had immigrated to Amarillo in 1889, secured the government mail contract, and he, accompanied by James Gohar, drove south from Amarillo in a buggy hitched to a span of fine bays, and using a compass they laid out a mail and stage line. As they drove along they were attracted by the numerous antelope and few buffalo they saw on the way. Stations were established at Canyon, Happy Hollow, Tulla, Kress, Plainview and "Old" Emma where the line was met by drivers from Colorado City.

Fuqua formed a partnership with J.W. Weatherford and business prospered. Sometimes as many as forty people were hauled out by stage in one day to the South Plains.

In August 1890, Fuqua and Weatherford traded the mail and stage line contract to the Clisbee brothers for their five-rig livery stable in Amarillo. The deed was executed on March 13, 1891. After the Clisbee brothers obtained the mail route, they went to Mexico and purchased from 150 to 300 little wiry Spanish mules for use on the stage and mail route. The mules were wild and hard to harness and hitch to the buckboard wagon, but they took off like the wind, and the drivers regardless of frightened passengers, gave the mules full reign all the way to the next station. There the mules would stand quietly to be unhitched and fresh teams. Stage stands were 15-25 miles apart.

On February 2, 1895, the stage was advertised in the Amarillo newspaper as follows: "From Amarillo via Canyon City, Tulla, Plainview, 80 miles, making seven round trips per week. Good accommodations for passengers. All express promptly attended to, charge to suit time. L.T. Cochran, proprietor." (Government contracts prior to 1918 are not catalogued at the Archives in Washington D.C., so it is difficult to trace who had the contract when.)

One of the more prominent drivers and one of those that stayed with it for many years was Sidney Stanton Rhea. Stant Rhea was born on April 25, 1862 in White County, Tennessee. He was a red-headed small man who came to Texas, became a stage driver, got into the stage business and homesteaded land. Rhea went into the cattle business and finally acquired seven sections of land.

Some of the men who worked for Rhea as stage drivers or cattle hands were: Lemmie Ragland, George Pott, Will Crawford, Bill Bryant. Rhea was a hard-drinking man who was married and divorced having three daughters: Sarah Francis, Mary Lou, and Gertrude. Rhea died on Nov. 25, 1922 in Hale County.

As the area began to be somewhat more settled, the stage and mail line began to include Hale City, Clisbee Post Office, Estacado and on into "Old" Emma. The stage line between Amarillo and Plainview ran three times a week and then improved to run each way each day. Fare

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Compulsive Overeating Viewed As A Progressive Illness

Compulsive overeating casts a shadow in the lives of many Americans. It is a bizarre form of behavior — not being hungry and yet eating beyond satiation.

Some Americans are open about their overeating and will consume large amounts in public. Some are secretive "garbage ball eaters" and will finish off others' plates or stove leftovers when no one is looking. However this type of self-indulgence is manifested, the attendant problems of guilt, shame, anger and frustration loom larger and larger in the overeaters' lives.

What is the answer? How does one deal with the inner irresistible forces which drive one to overeat? How does one "turn off" the mind's obsessive preoccupation with food? Where is the stopping point? The handle to the problem?

Various organizations have been formed to answer these questions and give relief to the overeater. One of these with the unique approach of viewing the problem as an illness — a progressive illness — and the solution as a three-level answer (physical, emotional and spiritual) is Overeaters Anonymous.

It originated in 1960, today has 2,000 chapters nationwide and is virtually a "child" of the nationally and internationally known group Alcoholics Anonymous (AA). It incorporates the "Twelve Steps" and "Twelve Traditions" of AA, substituting "food" for "alcohol" where necessary in the wording, but otherwise adhering to the premises and tenets of AA. The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop eating compulsively. There are no fees or dues for membership. Like AA, OA is self-supporting through its

members' contributions.

Rather than a diet, OA offers a "plan of eating" which consists of following a disciplined guide to eating and a daily report of food intake to a fellow member who is successfully abstaining from overeating and practicing the 12 steps. Not just a plan of eating but a "plan of living" actually characterizes the singularity of the group.

The plan follows 12 steps, the first of which is to admit one's "powerlessness" and lack of control over food. Once having done this, the other steps follow: belief in a power greater than oneself to restore sanity, the decision to turn one's will and life over to this power (God) according to one's own understanding of Him, a moral self-inventory, a confession of one's wrongs to God, oneself and another human being, a readiness for the removal of defects of character and the petitioning of God to remove shortcomings, a listing of all persons one has harmed with a concomitant willingness to make amends, prayer and meditation to improve one's conscious contact with God, and a willingness and effort to share the OA principles with other compulsive eaters.

The 12 traditions, also a part of this plan, are fundamentally the same as the steps but applied on the group level rather than the individual level. They are designed to insure the survival and growth of OA groups and state in part that personal recovery depends on OA unity and that the group is to be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or OA as a whole. Leaders in OA groups are

recovered compulsive eaters and do not hold office or govern. Central to the group's integrity and functioning is anonymity.

OA is not a religious organization, but it does have a spiritual program. It stresses not slenderizing figures as its primary purpose but the setting of values and priorities in order.

The Lubbock Overeaters Anonymous chapter was formed in January of this year. It meets at 10 a.m. Wednesdays in St. Luke's United Methodist Church on 14th Street and Memphis Avenue and at 7:30 p.m. Thursdays in the State Savings and Loan Building on 66th Street and Indiana Avenue. New members are welcomed and encouraged to attend.

In the words of one member: "It took the 'disease' to get me to the program. It took the program to get my life straightened out. I urge everyone with eating problems to come."

NEW DEAL LIONS DEFEAT SPUR, 21-9

(From Last Week)

SPUR—New Deal took advantage of two early Spur turnovers and then withstood a slew of its own mistakes to down the Bulldogs 21-9 here Friday.

The battle between the area's No. 1 and 2-ranked Class A teams evolved into a turnover bowl in the second half as the victorious Lions wound up with five turnovers, same as Spur.

Spur quarterback Eugene Solis fumbled a punt which led to a New Deal touchdown before the game was five minutes old and then fumbled the snap on the first two offensive plays with New Deal recovering the second and marching it in for another score.

That made it 14-0 before the game was seven minutes old, and the undefeated Bulldogs were never able to recover.

Tommy Thiel recovered the fumbled punt at the Spur 21, and three plays later he took the pitch from Howell and swept right 9 yards for a score. Miller's boot made it 14-8 with 5:34 left in the quarter.

Randy Vines recovered Solis' second fumble at the Spur 21, and three plays later he took the pitch from Howell and swept right 9 yards for a score. Miller's boot made it 14-8 with 5:34 left in the quarter.

The Lions, now 4-1-1 on the season and 2-0 in District 3-A action, launched a 50-yard, nine-play drive late in the first quarter, and Aaron Stark climaxed the drive with a 5-yard run 53 seconds into the second period with Miller tacking on the PAT.

Spur got on the board late in the second quarter when New Deal center snapped the ball over Miller's head and out of the end zone on a fourth down from the Lion 13.

Spur had three penetrations in the third period but was able to get on the board only when Joe Travis intercepted a Howell pitchout at the Lion 9, and Tim Gauge scored two plays later. Bill Ashley booted the PAT with 13 seconds left in the third quarter accounting for the final score.

Stark, who did not start, finished as the leading ground gainer with 109 yards on 21 carries. Howell netted only 31 yards, but four quarterback draws resulted in 50 yards.

Gauge rambled for 99 yards—Spur had a net 88 yards rushing as a team—on 18 carries. Ashley caught five passes for 56 yards and also completed a 47-yard toss after taking a lateral from Solis.

The loss was Spur's first in five outings this year and came in the Bulldog district opener.

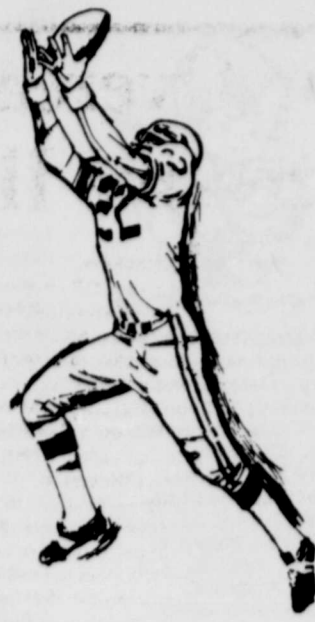

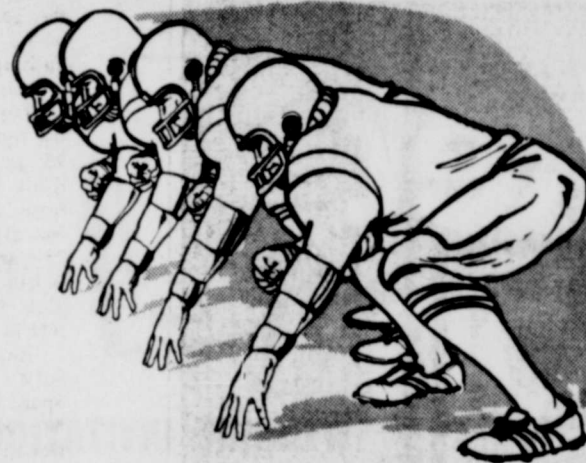

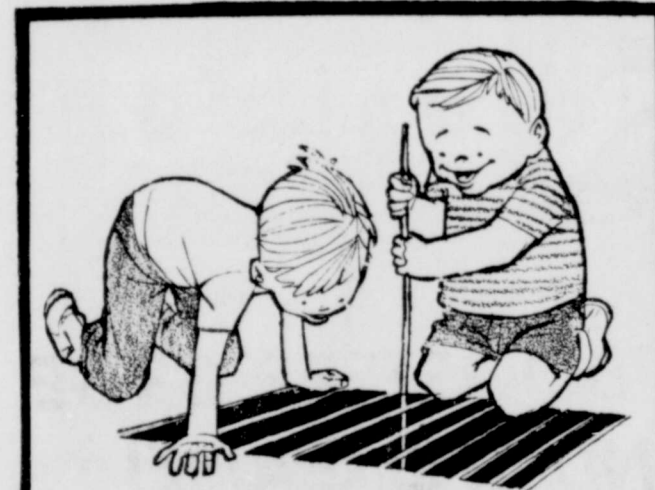
