**STORYBOOK TRIP TO GERMANY BECOMES REALITY FOR ABERNATHY COUPLE**

(Editor's Note: Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Coombes returned home shortly after midnight on the morning of November 17 after spending almost three weeks in Germany with their eldest son, Larry Jack, who is stationed there with the U. S. Army. Larry Jack will be returning to the States next month and will be stationed at Camp Polk, La. Following is an account of the Coombes' visit to Germany.)

We have just completed, what was for us, a fabulous trip to Germany—a gift from our son, Larry Jack. We will have memories for a lifetime.

We left Lubbock on Oct. 28th in a snowstorm and arrived in Frankfurt on the morning of the 29th to begin our storybook stay in Germany.

The autoban on the way to Ansbach was lined with tall pine trees and part of the way with vineyards, but the thing that impressed me most was the small villages every two or three miles. They were clusters of homes—mostly white with red tile roofs—Biederbach, where we stayed, contains 18 houses. Most of them have the barn built onto the house. One house contains a little store and that is the only business in the town. Most of the inhabitants are farmers or small farm hands. They use small tractors and trailers (some 2-wheel trailers and some 4-wheel trailers), as compared to the farmers here using pickups. We even saw one ox cart. Inevitably watching them. They were harvesting sugar beets and another green crop, which I never learned the identity of.

The sugar beets are not used for sugar, but for cattle feed. The farmers dig long trenches and fill them with sugarbeets that are mounded up. Then they cover them,

first with plastic and then with soil. Sometimes straw is used.

I found it interesting the way they prepare potatoes for their pigs. They have a machine that washes, steams and grinds the potatoes and then they are put into a concrete vat and covered. When the potatoes are very sour then they are fed to the pigs. The aroma of the steaming potatoes made me hungry, but I didn't ask to eat them.

We traveled around the area on the narrow twisting roads. They are all paved. I didn't see a dirt road, except through fields.

We saw castles at a distance, but never had the time when they were open to tour them, but did tour the Ansbach palace. It had 523 rooms, but only 27 are now open to the public. There is an art gallery with an impressive collection of art treasures.

Nearly all of the rooms had large portraits of the various members of the family. Some of them had very large and beautiful chandeliers of crystal and porcelain. One was a gift of Frederick the Great.

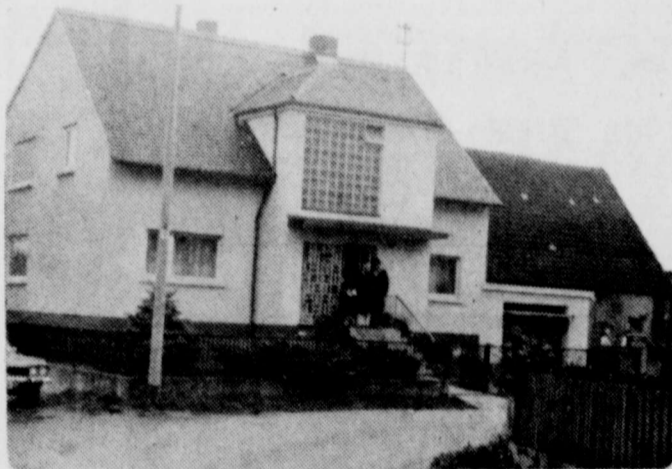
Some of the rooms have fire places and others have huge stoves, some of which are very ornate.

With all its beauty, I wouldn't want to live in a palace.

We also visited Rothenburg, the walled city, and walked the wall. However, we were unable to climb the tower as it was closed. It is a very picturesque city.

While in Germany, I had my first train ride—549 miles long. Their trains are very punctual. We timed them and about two seconds was all they were ever off.

We came home from Amsterdam on the big 747 jet. All in all, a wonderful trip!

## NEWS AND COMMENT

NGC---I hope the Jimmy Carter are not making a mistake by sending daughter, Amy, to a public school in Washington. Family members of the president should have all of the protection they can get. Snobbery reasons should not be a factor, but it seems that it would be easier for the Secret Service to protect her in a private school.

NGC---Commenting on the early freeze and snows in his church newsletter, the Rev. Roswell Brunner, pastor of Abernathy First Church of the Nazarene, said what we have been experiencing in October and November compares with Wisconsin weather. He is a native of that state.

NGC---Usually church nursery attendants are women. I noticed in First Baptist Church newsletter that men are included in the volunteer nursery workers listing. Checking this with a Baptist lady, she says the men are doing a great job in the nursery.

NGC---When you say "one billion" fast like they do in Washington, D. C., it sounds not so much, but according to the Plainview Daily Herald, it's a lot: "It is said that one billion seconds ago, the first atomic bomb had not been exploded; one billion minutes ago, Christ was still on earth; one billion hours ago, men were still living in caves--but one billion dollars ago, in terms of government spending, was only yesterday."

NGC---You could say to the City of Abernathy, "You've come a long way, Baby." In the matter of rolling stock, I can remember when the only "vehicle" the city had was a wheelbarrow. Now, you can count 16 or more vehicles and rolling equipment. They are the fire trucks and two ambulances housed in the spacious new fire station, and the others in the city barn on 6th St. at Ave. H, and the police units. And, in the early days, the only structure on the city square was the tabernacle.

One City Marshal handled law enforcement duties 24 hours a day seven days a week, 365 days a year and 366 days on leap years, and he doubled as city water superintendent when the original system began in 1935. He was Ocie Rutledge.

NGC---Back in the 1950's, a Tucco employee, Alvis Gregory, predicted that someday TV receiver sets would be small and the picture would be projected on a screen mounted on a wall. After some 20 years without reading anything about or seeing an illustration of that prediction, I have found one. Reading the December, 1976, issue of the TEXAS MONTHLY magazine, I ran across a page color advertisement showing a TV receiver projecting a picture on a 6-foot-wide screen mounted on a wall. Make of the TV is Advent, with the trade mark-registered name of Video-Beam 750. The console unit is no bigger than an end table and easy to roll away when not in use. It projects the 6-foot TV picture onto a separate screen. It's as easy to operate as a standard color TV set. The advertisement listed firms in Austin, Dallas, Houston, Corpus Christi, and San Antonio where the Advent TV can be purchased. No price was listed.

The mounted, wide screen concept has been in commercial use, including closed circuit sports shows, but this is the first I have seen it offered for home use for open TV shows.

NGC---Friend or foe, however he is considered by Texans, Comptroller Bob Bullock is following the letter of the state sales tax law to collect every penny owed to the State of Texas. To the State Treasury, he is an Angel, to the tax-dodging business place he is a devil. Not all businesses that have to dig up back sales taxes owed to the state are deliberate tax-dodgers...they just don't understand the complex state sales tax law.

In the 20-county area served by the State Comptroller's Enforcement office in Lubbock, 41 audits were made in September and October and yielded \$102,433.00 in additional sales taxes owed the state by businesses. Those 41 audits yielded an average of \$113.00 in additional taxes owed the state per audit hour. This report came from Bullock's Austin headquarters.

If any business person has a question about their sales tax status, they may go to the Lubbock office, Suite 400, 4902 34th St., in the Terrace Shopping Center. Or, they may use the toll-free phone number 1-800-252-5555 from any where in Texas to call the Comptroller's in Austin.

Bullock made a believer out of many Texas businesses soon after he went into office. First to feel the crackdown were firms that were keeping the sales taxes they collected from customers.

Who knows, YOUR books may be the next audited by Comptroller's office. Keep your records straight and ready for inspection on a moment's notice.

NGC---It seems that the Avalanche-Journal and the Civil Liberties Union have teamed up against the Lubbock Police Department. I thought the second Democratic primary election in which Sheriff Choc Bianchard rolled up heavy, lopsided vote against his opponent taught the Avalanche-Journal that smearing law enforcement officers is not popular with the law abiding citizens of Lubbock County.

NGC---Sunday, Nov. 21, must have been the Day of the Underdog, the Dallas Cowboys should have beaten Atlanta, St. Louis was favored over the Redskins, and the seldom-winning team, San Diego, downed Buffalo. The Red Raiders seem to choke up when their football games are on regional television... just as they did several years ago when they were in a crucial game with the Hogs at Fayetteville.

In that reporting period checks totaling \$13.2 million went to 640 Texas cities. Total for the calendar year to that date was \$252.2 million to Texas cities. This was an increase of \$28.5 million... or nearly 13 percent... over the same period a year ago.

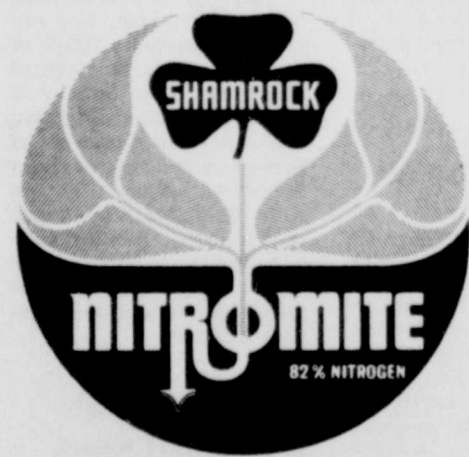

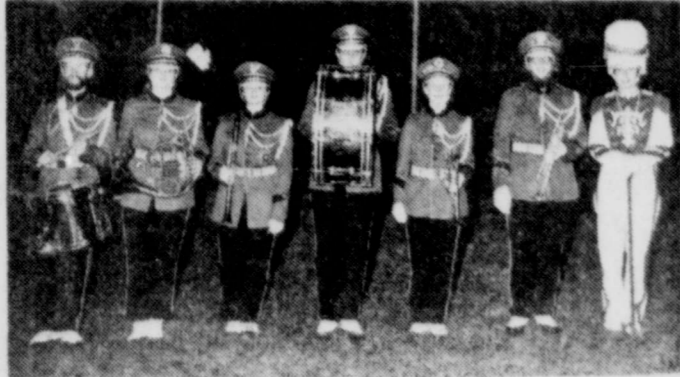

**Toll Free Call For Cancer Information**

A new "weapon" against cancer is now available in Hale County to provide the public with current, factual information on cancer, its prevention and early detection.

Called the Cancer Information Service, the new program utilizes a toll-free phone line (1-800-392-2040) to answer public inquiries on cancer. The service will be extended to all residents of Texas by late this year.

The CIS is part of a public educational effort sponsored by The University of Texas M. D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute with assistance from the American Red Cross, American Cancer Society and many other health agencies in Texas which provide services to cancer patients and their families.

Funded by the National Cancer Institute, the CIS functions as part of a nationwide network.

Open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. on weekdays, the phone lines are operated by trained American Red Cross volun-

teers. All background material used to answer questions is reviewed by physicians to insure accuracy.

The program is designed to help create a positive sense of awareness about cancer that will encourage the public to seek physician evaluation for early detection and prompt treatment of suspected cancers.

"Important diagnostic, treatment, rehabilitation and research developments are occurring more frequently now. If people could overcome their fear of cancer many more people would seek medical help at an earlier stage--when the rate of successful treatment is much greater," said Dr. R. Lee Clark, president of M. D. Anderson.

In addition to answering questions on the telephone, the CIS staff mails many pamphlets published by health organizations, professional societies and government agencies involved in health education.

Information not readily available from existing files can be obtained by the staff from an advisory panel of over 75 clinicians and other

qualified sources outside Houston.

"Because the CIS is based at M. D. Anderson and is part of a national communications network, we have easy access to information on important work being done at many other cancer centers," explained Dr. Clark.

Similar programs are in operation at the other 18 Comprehensive Cancer Centers which are designated by Congress for outstanding work in cancer treatment and research.

The new program enjoys the support of the Texas Cancer Coordinating Commission and the Texas Medical Association, having been endorsed as a "worthwhile educational program" by TMA's committee on cancer.

Other public services of the program include a monthly news column "Cancer Answerline." Jointly sponsored with the American Cancer Society, the column is run in many Texas newspapers to provide readers with current information on cancer.

## MS Read-A-Thon Program Grows

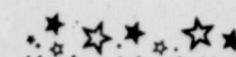

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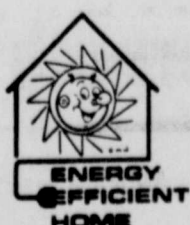

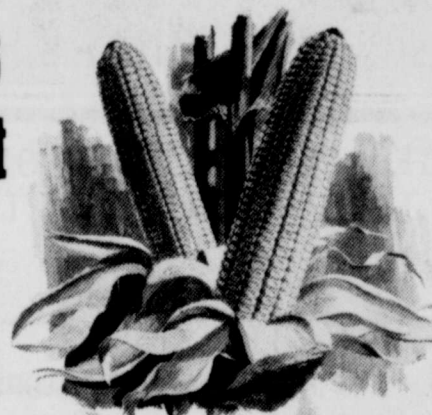
