ONE HOUR COTTON REFERENDUM PROGRAM TO AIR DECEMBER 9

Reports on current and projected cotton research and promotion programs on behalf of cotton growers will be presented Thursday, December 9 at 9 p. m. on KCBD television, Channel 11.

Moderators Ed Wilks, farm director for KFYO radio and Bob Etheridge, KCBD's farm editor, will interview J. Dukes Wooters, Cotton, Inc. president, and High Plains cotton producers L. C. Unfred, New Home; Lloyd Cline, Lamesa and J. D. Smith, Sudan.

Ten years ago, cotton producers voted a one-dollar -per-bale assessment to meet costs of advertising and product development for cotton. Thursday's program is expected to outline the progress made through that assessment and to outline cotton's present research and promotional needs and opportunities. A question and answer period is scheduled in

the program. Also explored will be the issues at stake in the upcoming referendum for increased assessment for cotton research and promotion.




