



Gary Rieken Is In DeKalb Club

Gary W. Rieken of New Deal was recently named a member of the DeKalb Yieldmasters Club for producing 7628. 79 lbs. of sorghum per acre in 1976.

His yield, based on 14% moisture, was mechanically harvested from a solid block measuring 1. 782 acres. An impartial third party verified the high yield which was recorded from a field of DeKalb F-67-

Rieken planted the field April 29 in 40-inch rows at 8.3 lbs. per acre and harvested the crop on October 11.

His fertilizer program included 197 lbs. of nitrogen. and 69 lbs. of phosphate. Rieken controlled weeds with Milogard at 1 1/4 lbs. per acre and Parathion at 1 pint and Toxaphene at 1/2 gallon was used for Army worms. An estimated 11 inches of rain fell on the crop from planting to harvest. Another 10 inches of water was applied through

irrigation. Concerning the hybrid's performance, Rieken says, F-67- standability is excellent. Greenbug resistance worked (never had to spray) much better than I thought it would. Liked the amount offoliage for plants produced for grazing and baling

Here they will be kept 72 hours, and if not claimed in that length of time, they will be destroyed. the owner wishes to

claim his pet, he must pay a \$3 per day (or part of any day) fee, plus he must have the dog vaccinated and buy a dog tag before the animal is released from the







Chili Hominy Bake 1 can (1 lb. 13 oz.) white or golden hominy 2 tablespoons bacon drippings Salt and pepper to taste

1 jar (2 oz.) pimientos drained and diced 1 can (1 lb.) chili without

1 cup grated cheddar cheese cup chopped onion 1/4 cup sliced ripe olives

Drain hominy and blot on paper towels. Cook in hot bacon drippings until tinged with brown. Add salt, pepper, and pimientos. Place in 1 1/2 quart casserole. Heat chili in same skillet. Scatter a layer of half the cheese and onions over hominy, pour chili over all, then top with the rest of the cheese and onions. Decorate with sliced olives. Heat in oven (350 degrees) 20 to 30 minutes until cheese is glazed and dish is hot. Onions should still be crunchy, so do not overcook. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

Mexicali Meat Pie 1/2 lbs. lean ground beef 1/4 cup chopped onions

1/4 cup chopped green 1 can (15 1/2 ounces) chili with beans cup sifted flour 1/2 te aspoon salt

1/2 cup commeal 4 to 6 tablespoons shortening 2 to 4 tablespoons cold water 1/2 cup shredded cheddar

Cook beef, onion and green peppers in small amount of bacon drippings until beef is lightly browned. Pour off excess drippings. Stir

To make pastry, mix flour, salt and commeal. Cut in shortening until mixture has a fine even crumb. Addwater and mix lightly with a fork. Roll out on lightly floured surface to 1/8 inch thickness. Line a 9-inch pie pan with pastry crinys edges.

Spoon ground beef and chili mixture into pastryline pie pan. Bake in a 425 degree oven 15 minutes. Sprinkle with shredded cheese and continue baking 5 minutes. Makes 6 servings.

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how the Hurons had built a small chapel of cedar and fir branches to house the manger of the Christ Child, and how they prepared themselves to receive the Infant Jesus into their hearts on Christmas Day by performing some sort of penance. He wrote, "Even those who were at a distance of more than 2 days' journey met at a given place to sing hymns in honr of the newborn Child."

Father Brebeuf wrote the lyrics to his carol in 1641; on March 16, 1649, he was martyred by the Iroquois, along with other prisoners. But after the villages of the Hurons had been destroyed

by the Iroquois, the surviving parishioners of Father Brebeuf resettled near Quebec, preserving the carol along with their tribal traditions. Later on, the Catholic Mohawks, who

had settled south of Que bec, learned the hymn from the Hurons. The carol has since been translated into English, retaining a few of the original Indian words
