



City, School Elections Set for April 2

Developments Spark Added Interest In Local School Vote

Developments March 17 and March 24 have added interest to Abernathy School District's annual school trustee election. March 17, Lon Carmickle, an incumbent, published a legal form in The Review to have his name removed from the printed ballot to be used in the election Saturday, April 2, March 24 it was announced that Bobby Cunningham, a partner in Sixty-Six Butane & Fertilizer Company, will wage a campaign as a write-in candidate for school trustee in the April 2 voting. Space is provided on the official ballot for write-in candidates.

The changing events leave the name of only one incumbent on the school trustee ballot, that of Board President Billie Harrison. In addition to his name, the printed ballot will include those of contenders Don McKenzie and Max Garza. Voting will be for two school trustees.

Leland Phillips will be election judge for the school trustee voting, which will be held along with the city election in Abernathy City Hall from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m. Saturday, April 2. Mrs. John (Zelma) Hale will be the election judge in the city voting at that time.

Holdover members of the School Board are Bob Riley, vice president; David Pison, secretary; and Dan Fondy, Richard Howard, and Jerry Oswald.

Abernathy takes stock show honors

The second day of judging at the 42nd annual Plainview Stock Show Wednesday belonged to Abernathy FFA and 4-H members. The southern Hale County students took both Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion awards in swine judging, all six swine breed championships and two reserve breed championships.

Sam Billingsley, Abernathy FFA member, took Grand Champion honors with his 224 lb. Chester White. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Condy Billingsley.

Ricky Rhodes, Abernathy 4-H member, showed the Reserve Grand Champion, a 245 lb. Duroc. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Rhodes, he also showed the champion Hampshire in the final competition for the top two awards.

The swine judging kicked off at 9 a. m. Tuesday and continued until the naming of the Grand Champion shortly after 5 p. m. Approximately 320 hogs were in Tuesday's competition.

BEFORE NAMING the Grand Champion barrow, judge Mack Heald of Farwell told the large crowd "When I judged this show last year, I said that it was the best county show I had ever judged. This year, it is even better."

Taking top honors in each of the swine divisions were Sam Billingsley, Abernathy FFA, Chester White; Ricky Rhodes, Abernathy 4-H, Duroc; Ricky Rhodes, Abernathy 4-H, Hampshire; Brad Bowen, Abernathy 4-H, Poland China; Becky Adams, Abernathy FFA, Spotted Poland China; and David Kennedy, Abernathy FFA, other breeds and crosses.

Bowen is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Bowen, Miss Adams is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Adams, and Kennedy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Max Kennedy.

The coveted showmanship award went to Coke Fullingim, Petersburg FFA member. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Fullingim.

In Tuesday's competition, Plainview 4-H member Patt Terrell took Grand Champion steer honors with his medium-heavy weight Maine Anjou-Angus Cross. The Plainview High School senior, Patt is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Terrell. Mr. Terrell is 1977 president of the Plainview Stock Show Board.

Joan Davis, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Davis, showed the Reserve Grand Champion steer. The Abernathy 4-H member took top honors in the heavy weight class with the animal.

The showmanship award went to Carrie Lee Lutrick, Abernathy 4-H member. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Lutrick.

Steer judge Ronnie Wood of Big Spring, before picking the Grand Champion, said, "For the top animal, I look for a steer that I think is a perfect animal. This one isn't my ideal animal, but it is pretty darn close."

On the quality of the animals shown Tuesday, Wood said, "This is one of the best county shows I have been fortunate enough to judge. The showmanship, sportsmanship and the animals are outstanding."

Winners in the lamb competition Tuesday were Sharla Myatt, Abernathy FFA, fine wool; Scott Pinkerton, Halfway 4-H, fine wool cross; Mike Overman, Hale Center 4-H, medium wool; and Sherry Evans, Hale Center 4-H, Southdown.

Sharla is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Myatt, Scott is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Pinkerton; Mike is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Overman and Sherry is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Evans.

The coveted showmanship award in lamb competition went to Jerry Don Bright, Petersburg FFA member. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Bright.

A record-breaking premium sale for lambs that brought the 42nd annual Plainview Stock Show to a conclusion Thursday began with the auction of Patt Terrell's Grand Champion Maine Anjou-Angus steer, but the real excitement started with the sale of championship sheep.

The old high price per pound mark in the lamb division was \$6.20, but three of the first four animals in that division topped that mark during Thursday's sale.

Scott Pinkerton's champion fine wool cross opened the record-setting bidding with a price of \$7 per pound or \$721.

SHERRY EVANS' champion Southdown sold at \$6.75 per pound or \$553.50 paid by Doc Cross Carpet, James Kruse Auction Service and Shook Tire Company. The Hale Center 4-H'er's lamb weighed 82 pounds.

The bidding backed down a little for Sharla Myatt's champion fine wool. The Abernathy 4-H lamb brought \$6 per pound or \$612 from First State Bank in Abernathy.

Then the bidding went through the roof. With some quick urging from auctioneer Raymond Akin, the bid for Mike Overman's champion medium wool lamb rose to an all-time high of \$7.50 per pound.

THE HIGH BIDDING for the lambs was not enough to pull this year's total to the 1976 record sale total price of \$95,616.26. The 48 steers, 78 hogs and 61 lambs sold in individual auction brought a grand total of \$88,546.67, topping the second highest figure of \$81,660.71 set in 1975.

Patt Terrell's steer began the auction Thursday by selling for \$1.50 per pound or \$1,659. Making out the check were Hale

County State Bank, Hale County Farm Bureau and Plainsman Elevator.

The Reserve Grand Champion steer, shown by Joan Davis of Abernathy 4-H Club, brought \$1.25 per pound or \$1,273.75. It was purchased by Riverside Chemical and City National Bank.

The Grand Champion barrow, exhibited by Sam Billingsley of Abernathy, sold for \$3.10 per pound or \$734.70 to Gary's C.B. Shop, C.B.'ers of the Hi-Plains, Plainview Gin Co., Lane-Burnett Oil Co. and Smokey's Bar-B-Q. The Reserve Grand Champion, shown by Ricky Rhodes of Abernathy, was purchased for \$2.70 per pound or \$642.60 by Big M. Insulation, Goodyear Tire Co., and Service Grain of Abernathy.

IN THE AUCTION, 48 steers sold individually for an average price per pound of \$4.21 cents or a total of \$42,945.22. In the hog sale, 78 were sold at an average price of \$1.2857 per pound or \$22,659.80. The 61 lambs sold brought an average price per pound of \$3.98 or \$22,941.65.

In the commercial sale, Cripple Creek Cattle Co., of Anton bought commercial and resale steers for 37.75 cents per pound. Resale hogs were bought by Farmer's Hog Market of Plainview for 38.75 cents per pound and commercial hogs went to Texas Farm Bureau, TAMDA Slaughter Hog Division in Amarillo for 37.50 cents per pound.

Resale and commercial lambs were bought by Andy Taylor of Plainview for 48.25 cents per pound.

THE HERDSMAN Award in the beef division went to the Plainview FFA chapter for keeping the cleanest pen. Abernathy 4-H Club won the award in the swine division. A Herdsman Award in sheep division was not awarded.

He then attended Bethany Nazarene College, Bethany, Oklahoma, to prepare for the ministry. During college days, he and his wife, Jane, were very active in revival campaigns.

In 1964 he graduated with a major in religion. In 1965 he was ordained while pastoring in Scottsbluff, Nebraska. He has also pastored Longview First Church in Longview, Texas. Following that pastorate the general church requested the Kristoffersens to pastor in Denmark and they labored there temporarily. They pastored in Madison, Wisconsin, where they served 5 1/2 years. Presently, pastoring Southwood Church of the Nazarene in Kansas City, Jane Kristoffersen was reared in Nazarene parsonages in Texas. She graduated from Bethany Nazarene College with a major in religion and a minor in education. Mrs. Kristoffersen was ordained a minister in the Church of the Nazarene in 1965. She has been a substitute school teacher in the public schools, and also she has written religious stories and articles for church periodicals. The Kristoffersens have two children, Carol and David.

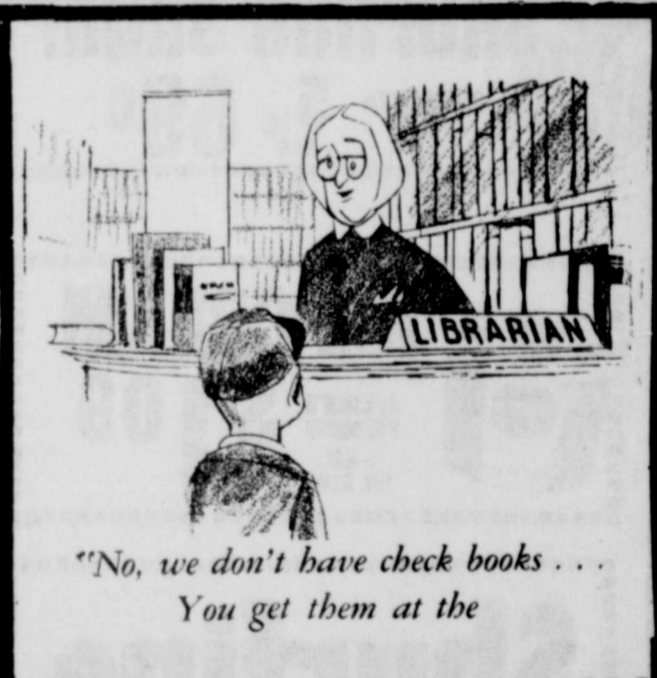

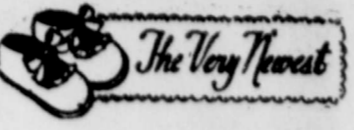
