The City of Abernathy residents, and area rural residents, will pause to honor two organized Volunteer groups here during Texas Volunteer Recognition Week April 24-30. Proclamations by Abernathy Mayor Pete Thompson and Governor Dolph Briscoe express the thanks from the community and state to these Volunteers, who serve their neighbors and friends without thought of receiving remuneration.

The two local volunteer organizations being recognized are the Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department, which has served since the late '30s or early '40s, and the Emergency Medical Technicians who are relatively new in their offering of volunteer service... new, but very professional and efficient. Both of these groups serve not only the City of Abernathy but a wide area of South Hale County and North Lubbock County.

The spotlight is focused on these two organizations, fire department and Emergency Medical Technicians, for Volunteer Week because of the life-saving and property-saving potential of their services to the people of this area.

Dr. Kenneth Gregory is Abernathy's lone, over-worked, physician, who also has life-saving potential. But, for the protection of his own health and well being, he cannot be expected to stay on the job or on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week. With this in mind, it is a sense of security for area residents to know that the EMTs, who work in shifts, are available for service around the clock and around the calendar. They have spent a lot of time and effort to qualify themselves for administering semi-professional aid to a victim who is being taken to hospital emergency rooms in the area by Abernathy's well-equipped EMS ambulance. They are Volunteers providing a service for their community. Their names are listed later in this story.

Also listed later in this story are names of Abernathy Volunteer Firemen now in service. A list of all former Volunteer Firemen is not available. To these men no longer in this Volunteer service, also are due the thanks of a gratefully community.

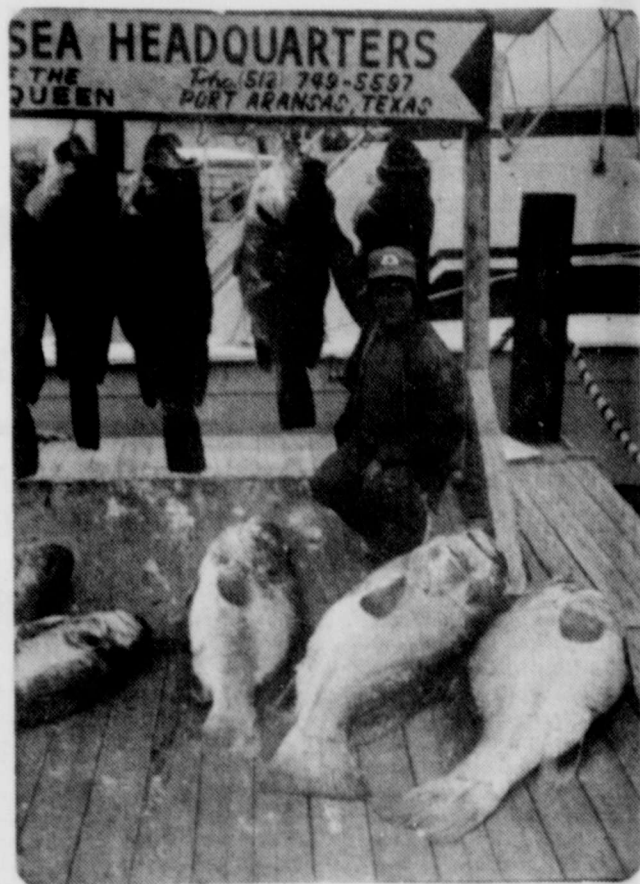

Storm Shelter Information:

The weather warning and observation plan for the city of Abernathy provides three types of warnings:

1. Tornado Watch--the area roped off by Kansas City to warn of the possibility that tornadoes could occur in this area for a certain time period.

2. Tornado Warning---this warning is given by the National Weather Service when a tornado is sighted and confirmed and is a threat to an immediate area or city.

3. Hall Warning---this warning is given when hail is possible for a given area or city.

II. Mr. Curtis Davenport and Mr. Charles Bowen as members of the Abernathy Civil Defense Team will be stationed at the Junior High School and will open the building when a tornado warning is issued. Other administrators will have a key and their names and phone numbers will be listed with the Civil Defense officers in case of emergency.

The building will be opened only for a warning--when a tornado is sighted or confirmed by members of the Civil Defense Weather Service and is a threat to the immediate area or City.

REGULATIONS:
A. Only the downstairs area will be opened.
B. Classrooms will not be opened into the corridor and mail area is full--approximately 300 persons.
C. The administrative area will be opened for radio, communications, and for sick room facilities and will be OFF LIMITS to the general public.
D. NO PETS will be allowed under any circumstances.
E. Smoking will be permitted only in designated areas.
F. Food will not be taken into carpeted areas.

TEXAS LEADS THE NATION IN TORNADO SIGHTINGS

It was May 26, 1976---the height of the tornado season in Texas.

The National Weather Service had posted tornado warnings for Hill County and the sheriff's office, following a standard procedure, alerted deputies out in the country.

Sure enough, an ominous black twister appeared in the sky. With sheriff's deputies tracking the twister by car and radioing in reports to a voluntary weather station, it was determined that the path of the storm would take it near a Presbyterian children's home where 75 youngsters lived.

Calling ahead in the nick of time, deputies warned of the oncoming

If a warning comes during school hours, adults will be admitted after all children are in areas of safety.

tornado and the children were evacuated to the safety of a nearby basement before the storm destroyed the north end of the home.

This is just one story out of many incidents that demonstrates how advance warning and preparedness saved lives in Texas last year.

It has been going on ever since the NWS instituted a system of tornado spotting and warning in the 1950's.

INDIVIDUAL'S ROLE
But it is just such preparedness and early warning--through a nationwide system of weather professionals and trained spotters--that have made too many people forget their own role in protecting themselves and their property against storms.

Catastrophes don't always happen to the "other guy." Each year communities that have never before been struck by a tornado became a disaster area.

Last year Texas was far and away the leader in tornado incidents in the nation with between 176 and 201 tornadoes sighted. The discrepancy in figures is due to the system of recording used by two reporting agencies--the National Weather Service (176) and the Department of Public Safety (201). There were, luckily, only two tornado-related deaths in the state in 1976.

Because this state is so susceptible to tornadoes, Texans should be especially aware of tornado safety rules. For this reason, the insurance industry, through TIIC (representing, for example, the Texas Insurance Advisory Association, a long-time leader in catastrophe planning), joins civil defense, weather service officials and interested organizations each year--especially during peak months (April, May, June)--to remind Texans of appropriate safety procedures in the event of a threatening storm.

KNOW WARNINGS
Two phrases that should be part of every Texan's vocabulary are "tornado watch" and "tornado warning."

A watch--usually posted for broad areas spanning hundreds of miles--is issued anytime a squall line develops which has the potential of spawning tornadoes. It is not uncommon for a city or town to be included in

watch dozens of times, without ever experiencing a tornado. For this reason, the TIIC says there is a danger of becoming complacent. No matter how often a watch is posted for a community, residents should monitor broadcasts and be generally aware of the potentially threatening weather.

Should a twister be spotted, a "tornado warning" is signaled.

Warnings are issued for much smaller areas and may mean that residents have only a few minutes to take shelter.

If a warning is issued, persons in the affected area should immediately watch for danger and be ready to take cover at a second's notice.

STAY LOW
The key word is taking cover is "low." The lowest floor in any building is safest. Small rooms--such as the bathroom--or a closet in the central part of the structure offer the best protection. If this hideout isn't available, taking cover under heavy furniture such as a tipped-over, upholstered couch is advised.

Neither a mobile home nor buildings with wide, free-span roofs--such as auditoriums--are desirable shelters.

Most deaths associated with a tornado are caused by flying debris and most injuries are to the head or chest. For these reasons, care should be taken to protect the head and chest no matter where shelter is taken.

AFTER THE STORM
Immediately after a storm has passed stay put for a few minutes. Make sure there is no leaking gas in the area before striking matches. Remember, too, downed telephone and power lines are a hazard.

Whenever a community begins mopping up after a wind storm or tornado, insurance companies put into force pre-arranged catastrophe procedures to help a community recover from the disaster.

If warranted, additional claims people are called in to help expedite claims processing. As a general rule, hardship cases get first priority. The individual property owner can help by making temporary repairs to prevent further damage--the cost of which is often covered by the insurance policy--and by notifying the agent or company representative immediately upon discovery and estimation of potential loss.

Beware of unscrupulous, fly-by-night contractors who often follow the storm into town. Deal only with reputable contractors.

Future Homemakers To Convene For State Meeting

Houston FHA representative. During the meeting nine scholarships of \$500 each will be presented to homemaking students, and 37 community leaders from around the state will be awarded honorary membership in FHA.

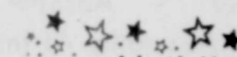
