Vocational Agriculture Students Place In Texas Tech University Contest

LUBBOCK -- A team of vocational agriculture students from Abernathy won 3 lace in Texas Tech Contests competition Saturday (April 23) in the 50th annual Texas Tech University Vocational Agriculture Judging Contest.

Approximately 1,700 students participated in 11 competitive events held in the Agricultural Sciences departments of animal science, food technology, plant and soil science, and agricultural engineering and technology.

Six events served as elimination contests for Future Farmers of America Areas I and II. These were judging contests in livestock, dairy cattle, milk and dairy foods, poultry, meats and in agricultural mechanics skills.

Contests in cotton, wool, crops, land and range, and pasture plants were Texas Tech contests, held because

of their importance to the West Texas economy.






