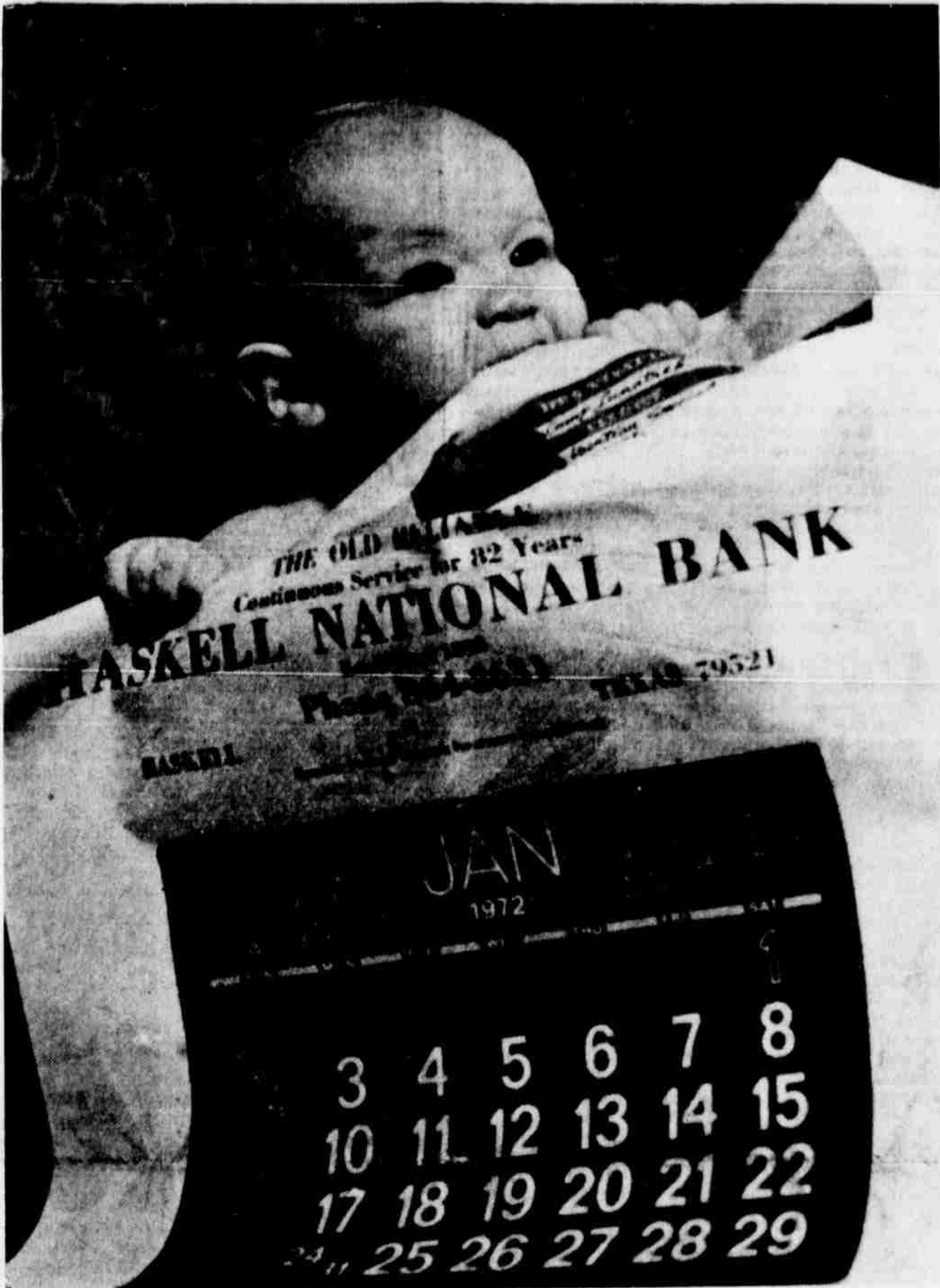

Lengthy Session For Council

The Haskell City Council met in regular session Tuesday night with Mayor H. V. Woodard presiding. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved before the Council started to work on the agenda.

The plan to re-zone Block O and P of the Johnson Addition and C and D in the Carney Ad-

dition was sent to the Planning and Zoning committee.

The Council agreed to approve the addition to the Rice Springs care home if the plans are approved by the State Health Department. The addition will be built over a main sewer line and must pass State specifications before it is approved.

The Airport ordinance was read and approved for the third time and with its publication (elsewhere in this edition) it goes into effect.

The Council voted to sell the Warren Larned property to B. D. Kirkland for a price of \$200.

Carl Anderson gave a report on the cutting back of the sidewalk on the West side of the square. Loraine Johnson requested that construction be delayed until spring so that weather won't be likely to delay the project and be an inconvenience to merchants. All Councilmen agreed and added that the job should be finished in the least amount of time possible.

CITY ORDINANCE... An Ordinance regulating the use of the Haskell City-County Airport and the operation of motor vehicles thereon and providing for a penalty for violation of the provisions hereof. BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Haskell, Texas: ARTICLE I: That on and after the effective date hereof, it shall be unlawful for any person to operate a motor vehicle upon the runway of the Haskell City-County Airport, in Haskell County, Texas, or upon the parking aprons adjacent thereto, except for business purposes connected with the use of said airport. ARTICLE II: The term "business purposes connected with the use of said airport" shall mean and include the following: transporting of passengers embarking on or disembarking from aircraft taking off from or landing upon such airport; the servicing and fueling of aircraft located on such runways or parking aprons; the maintenance and repairing of such runway and parking aprons; and the transporting of freight to and from aircraft using said airport. ARTICLE III: The operator of any such motor vehicle violating the provisions of Article I of this ordinance shall upon conviction, be fined any sum not exceeding two hundred dollars. 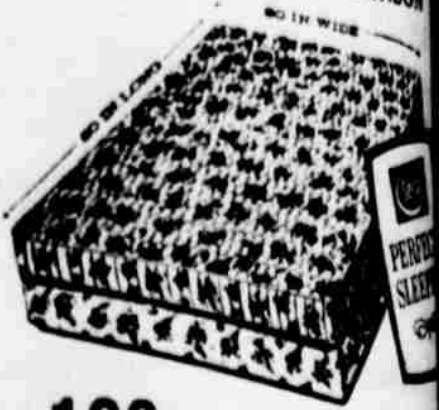

Farm Bureau Fights Strikes

WACO — (Sp1) — The Texas Farm Bureau is calling on its members to "put forth maximum effort toward solution" of strikes in the transportation industry, according to TFB President J. T. (Red) Woodson of Fannin County.

Woodson said strikes in the transportation industry during the past year have cost farmers and ranchers more than one billion dollars, have contributed to an unfavorable balance of payments situation for the United States, and have resulted in the loss of markets for agricultural products which may never be regained.

Legislative Director Ed McKay has sent an "action requested" letter to all county Farm Bureaus, urging their leaders to contact their respective congressmen during the holidays to explain the need for remedial legislation.

McKay said some 15 bills have been introduced in the U. S. House of Representatives and 11 in the Senate to deal with strikes in the transportation industry.

Of these, he said the Administration proposals in S. 560 (by Sen. Robert P. Griffin of Michigan) and H. R. 3596 (by Reps. Harley O. Staggers of West Virginia and William L. Springer of Illinois) come closest to aims of Farm Bureau policy on this issue.

These bills are applicable to strikes in the railroad, trucking, air, longshore and maritime industries. In strike situations, they provide that if no settlement is reached during the 80-day cooling period under the Taft-Hartley Act for "national emergency" strikes, the President could:

- (1) Extend the period for an additional 30 days;
- (2) Limit the strike to specified portions of the total industry; or
- (3) Provide for arbitration by arbiters who could choose between the final offer of the employer and the final offer of the union.

McKay said the House Commerce Committee and the Senate Labor and Public Welfare Committee have been holding "indifferent" hearings on the transportation strike bills. He added that "Congressional contacts tell us there has been no great public outcry for enact-

ment of transportation strike legislation."

Both the Texas Farm Bureau annual convention, held in November, and the American Farm Bureau Federation annual meeting, held early in December, passed strong resolutions calling for such legislation.

McKay suggested that county Farm Bureau leaders contact their respective Congressman and "ask him to use his influence to help move these bills through Committee and through Congress."

"This is an opportunity for each Farm Bureau member to let his elected representative know his own feelings on this matter which so vitally affects his net income and his future in farming and ranching," McKay said.

Economic Stabilization

(This column of questions and answers on the President's Economic Stabilization Program is provided by the local office or the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service. The column answers questions most frequently asked about wages and prices.)

Q—Are increases in pay resulting from promotions excluded from the 5.5 percent limitation set by the Pay Board?

A—Bonafide promotions are excluded from the 5.5 percent annual aggregate limitation, since remuneration goes with the job, not the man.

Q—May a retailer who does not have the required display of base prices in his store raise his price?

A—No. The Price Commission specifically requires the retailer to prominently display the base price of all food products unless exempt. For items other than food, the retailer is required to prominently display either those 40 items in each department which have the highest dollar sales volume or those items which amount to 50 percent of total dollar sales for the department, whichever is less. These displays must be posted on or before January 1, 1972 and no price increases are allowed until they are posted.

Q—How does a citizen or a

firm obtain information or a ruling with respect to the economic stabilization regulations issued during the post-freeze period?

A—The Internal Revenue Service will answer inquiries and issue rulings regarding the stabilization program. There are more than 360 IRS offices throughout the country where inquiries and complaints can be made.

Requests for rulings and for exemptions or exceptions to stabilization regulations should be in writing and directed to the IRS office in the area where you live or work. There is at least one IRS district office in every state.

Q—What court action can be taken against an individual or firm that violates a provision of the economic stabilization program.

A—The Justice Department may seek a civil injunction to stop persons from violating the economic stabilization program. The violator is liable for the amount of the fine and subject to civil penalties. In addition, the violator is liable for the amount of the fine and subject to a fine of \$10,000 for each violation.
