



High speed chase nets Missouri man

Hale County sheriff's deputies fired three shotgun blasts at a vehicle driven by a 21-year-old Exeter, Mo., man which had been pursued for about 25 miles at speeds in excess of 100 mph through the southern part of the county. The vehicle, a pickup truck, earlier had been reported stolen from Lubbock.

About noon Friday, Deputy Lupe Canales spotted the pickup truck and attempted to stop it about eight miles northeast of Abernathy but the suspect accelerated and the chase began. The chase wound through the southern part of the county on dirt roads.

About a mile and a half northeast of Abernathy Deputy

Dayton Marr set up a roadblock which the suspect attempted to run, almost hitting Marr. It was at this point, according to Sheriff Charles Tue, that the three shots were fired at the suspect.

The shotgun blasts hit the pickup truck blowing out three tires and putting several holes in the vehicle's radiator. The suspect sustained several puncture wounds to his buttocks from metal fragments. He was treated and released from Central Plains General Hospital.

The suspect had been reported by the Department of Public Safety to be armed and possibly a mental patient.

The suspect remains in the Hale County Jail pending the filing of a formal charge of auto theft on Monday. He also will be charged with evading an officer, speeding in excess of 100 mph and failure to yield to an audible and visible emergency signal.

Assisting in the capture of the suspect was Abernathy Chief of Police, Clyde Vandrygriff.

CAR STOLEN HERE LAST WEEK

When Douglas Chapman, 1215 3rd St., Abernathy, started to work early Wednesday morning of last week, he discovered that the 1977 Pinto demonstrator he was using had vanished from his driveway.

While looking around the area, he discovered a Chevrolet Vega parked in the alley between his house and the Pete Thompsons' home. The hood of the Vega was still warm. He called the Abernathy police and reported the incident, and they put it on the air. Later that day, the Tahoka police department reported they had picked up the Pinto and were detaining two Amarillo girls, one 15 and the other 16. They said they left Amarillo in a car belonging to the grandmother of one of the girls. Later, that car was abandoned, and they stole the Vega in Canyon and drove it to Abernathy where they switched to the Pinto. Local police had the Vega impounded here, and later that day the owner picked it up. Chapman said that the Pinto was not damaged, and that Mr. Pollard of Pollard Ford in Lubbock, where Chapman is a salesman, did not file a complaint against the girls. We do not know what happened to the case of the Vega.

LETTER REVEALS THE CAREER OF TEACHER, BUD MOORHEAD

Dear Editor,

I was sorry to hear of the untimely death of Jerry Moorhead. I had sent him some questions last fall concerning the last years in the history of Reed School, and these were the answers he sent me. He was the last teacher at Reed, and went with the school to become a part of Abernathy. Robert Lutrick, who was on the Reed School board from its beginning to its end, stated that the consolidation agreement with Abernathy included employment for Jerry Moorhead. They did not want him to be without a job.

Mrs. Mildred Reed Rankin wanted to record an interview with Jerry concerning Reed School. His illness made it impossible for them to get it done. I am sending you this copy as Jerry Moorhead's years in Abernathy proved to be quite a gift to Abernathy.

Jerry Moorhead. A gift to Abernathy.

Question: When did you start teaching at Reed School and where did you teach before?

Answer: I came to Reed School in Sept. 1937 from Eagle Springs School where I had taught my first 2 years.

Question: What was the situation?

Answer: Reed was a one room school and I had grades 1 thru 7 with about 25 pupils. Some times there were only 2 or 3 in each grade. The school ground was small with only a slide and swings for equipment. We usually played games and ball. (Reed School was located on the southeast corner of the Will Sandidge land, father of Mrs. Raymond Marques. It occupied 1 acre of land which reverted to the former owner when no longer used for a school.)

Question: What was your daily schedule?

Answer: My schedule was only a few minutes per class as I tried to teach every subject to each pupil every day. Usually, I let the larger pupils help the smaller ones while I was having some of the other classes.

Question: Do you remember any of the students names?

Answer: I can't remember the names of all the pupils as many came and went during the year. Most of the pupils, however, were permanent families.

Question: What did the students do at recess?

Answer: The students played games or ball, during recess and at noon. We had a 15 min. recess in the morning and another in the afternoon, with 1 hour for lunch. They all brought sack lunches, and each one ate his lunch at his desk if the weather was bad. If it was pretty, they ate outside.

Question: How did you feel about the consolidation?

Answer: The consolidation was a relief. I had been teaching in a one room school for 40 years. I had seen the school grow from a one room school to a 12 room school. I had seen the school become a part of the community. I had seen the school become a part of the history of Abernathy.

Question: How did you feel about the consolidation?

Question: Who did your janitor work?

Answer: The teacher did his own janitor work except when some one did something that he shouldn't. Then the punishment was sweeping, and was done after school.

Question: What kind of heat did you have?

Answer: The heater was a large coal stove with a big jacket around it that sat in one (northwest) corner of the room. There was a small coal shed (outside on the north side) that was filled with coal in the fall to be used thru the winter if it lasted that long. The teacher usually came about 1 hour ahead of the pupils to build the fire so the room would be warm. The waste paper was used to start the fire.

Question: What did you have for lunch?

Answer: Everyone brought sack lunches which was usually a sandwich, fruit and cookies. There was no way to have a hot lunch.

Question: What families did the pupils come from?

Answer: The families all lived on farms and they were all very nice people. They always turned out for all the programs etc. that we had at school and helped with anything that they were called upon to do.

Question: What kind of bell did you have?

Answer: It was a hand bell that was rung by the teacher. The children lined up to march in and out of the room (orderly). It was only used to bring the children in from recess and noon.

I taught at Reed 3 years and had a contract for my fourth year, but they transferred the school and me into Abernathy School. They also moved the building to Abernathy and made an Agg. shop out of it. Later, they moved the building near the depot and made it into a dwelling. It is still in the same location but in terrible condition.

(Reed school was consolidated with Abernathy in the fall of 1940. Bud Moorhead continued to teach in Abernathy schools. His wife Beverly was also a teacher in Abernathy school. They contributed greatly to the community.)

(Editor's Note: Our thanks to Mrs. Ruth Auge (a daughter of Robert Lutrick) for this extension of information on the long and successful career of Jerry (Bud) Moorhead. He retired from the Abernathy School faculty as principal of elementary school in 1974. However, he frequently served after that as substitute teacher when the regular teachers could not be in their classrooms. He died May 27, in Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, following a brief illness.)

NGC---There will be a meeting at 11:30 p.m. Friday in the Shallowater Community Club House to discuss the organizing of a chapter of the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) in that community. See the news story in this paper. AARP is open for membership to persons 55 years of age and above. A person does not have to be retired to become a member... just 55 or above. Membership dues are \$3.00 per year or \$8.00 for a 3-year membership. AARP is the older citizens' "lobby" in Austin and in Washington. A national organization, it also represents members of other states in their respective state capitals. Some of the benefits now enjoyed by the older citizens may be traced to AARP's contact with state and national representatives and senators. Some may say: "I'm just 55 and don't need to hook up with an old folks' group." You'll be surprised, buddy, how short the time is from 55 to 65. At age 55 you may not need all the benefits derived, but your membership in AARP will give it more strength in dealing with Austin and Washington... and, maybe, by the time you are 65 AARP will have accomplished a lot in the intervening 10-year period. The \$3 annual dues will bring to your home the monthly AARP News Bulletin and the quarterly magazine... I think it comes quarterly. Also, members may make certain purchases at a savings... I haven't tried this phase of my membership. California offers many more advantages for the elderly than does the State of Texas... much of it due to heavy AARP membership in that state. I neither sell memberships nor receive anything for touting AARP... I just think it is good for the older citizens to have a strong voice on their behalf in Austin and Washington. I have the address for anyone who might want an AARP membership... just \$3 for a year.

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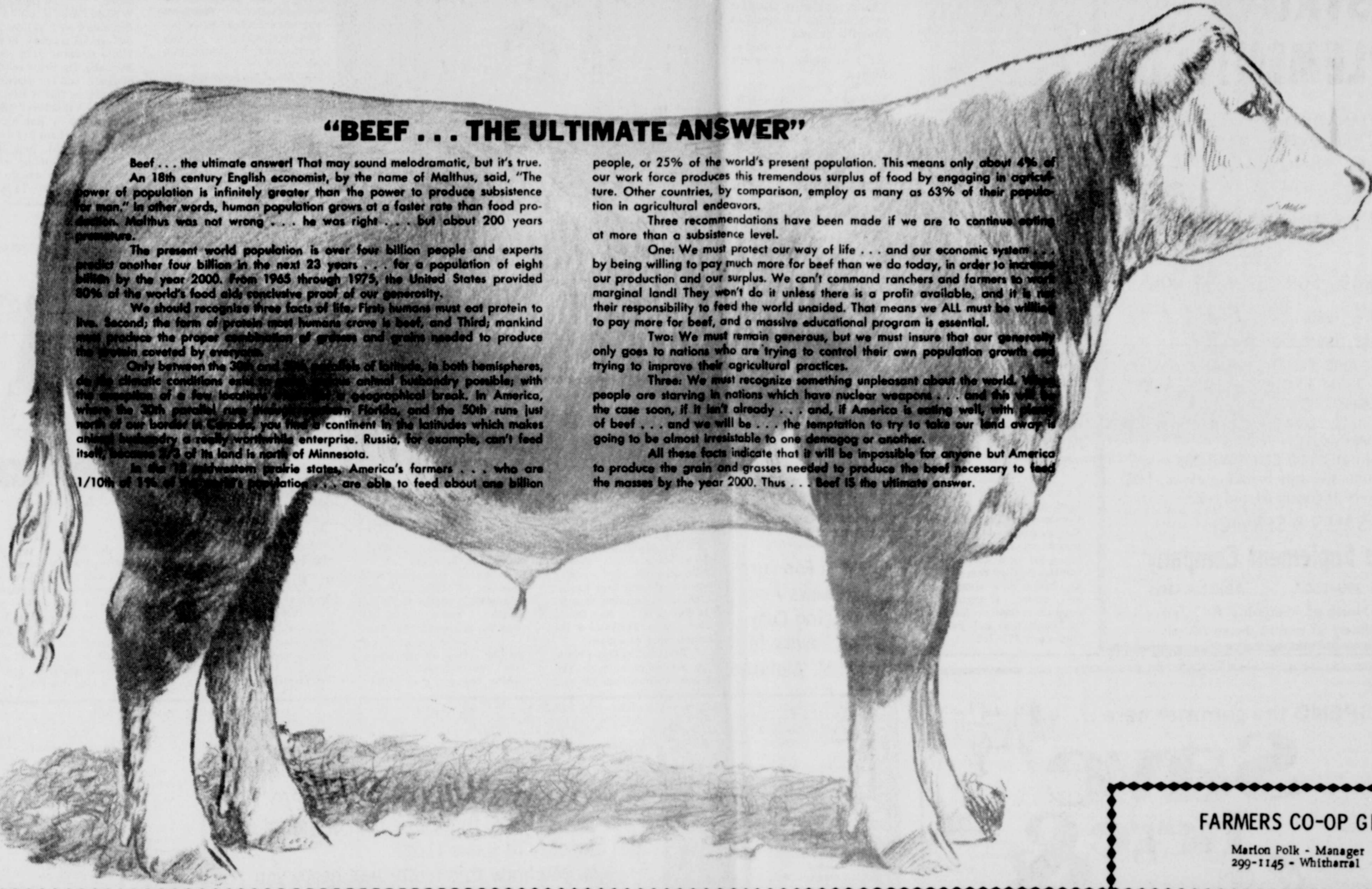

Beef . . . the ultimate answer! That may sound melodramatic, but it's true. An 18th century English economist, by the name of Malthus, said, "The power of population is infinitely greater than the power to produce subsistence for man." In other words, human population grows at a faster rate than food production. Malthus was not wrong . . . he was right . . . but about 200 years ago.

The present world population is over four billion people and experts predict another four billion in the next 23 years . . . for a population of eight billion by the year 2000. From 1965 through 1975, the United States provided 30% of the world's food and conclusive proof of our generosity.

We should recognize three facts of life. First, humans must eat protein to live. Second, the form of protein most humans crave is beef, and Third, mankind must produce the proper combination of grasses and grains needed to produce the protein coveted by everyone.

Only between the 30th and 50th parallels of latitude, in both hemispheres, do the climatic conditions exist to produce the animal husbandry possible, with the exception of a few localized areas, is a geographical break. In America, where the 30th parallel runs through southern Florida, and the 50th runs just north of our border in Canada, you find a continent in the latitudes which makes animal husbandry a really worthwhile enterprise. Russia, for example, can't feed itself, because 2/3 of its land is north of Minnesota.

In the 48 contiguous prairie states, America's farmers . . . who are 1/10th of 1% of the world's population . . . are able to feed about one billion

people, or 25% of the world's present population. This means only about 4% of our work force produces this tremendous surplus of food by engaging in agriculture. Other countries, by comparison, employ as many as 63% of their population in agricultural endeavors.

Three recommendations have been made if we are to continue eating at more than a subsistence level.

One: We must protect our way of life . . . and our economic system . . . by being willing to pay much more for beef than we do today, in order to increase our production and our surplus. We can't command ranchers and farmers to work marginal land! They won't do it unless there is a profit available, and it is their responsibility to feed the world unaided. That means we ALL must be willing to pay more for beef, and a massive educational program is essential.

Two: We must remain generous, but we must insure that our generosity only goes to nations who are trying to control their own population growth and trying to improve their agricultural practices.

Three: We must recognize something unpleasant about the world. Many people are starving in nations which have nuclear weapons . . . and this will be the case soon, if it isn't already . . . and, if America is eating well, with plenty of beef . . . and we will be . . . the temptation to try to take our land away is going to be almost irresistible to one demagog or another.

All these facts indicate that it will be impossible for anyone but America to produce the grain and grasses needed to produce the beef necessary to feed the masses by the year 2000. Thus . . . Beef is the ultimate answer.

It happens most typically to older persons but it can happen to anyone.

Everyone should learn how to recognize when someone is choking and learn the Heimlich maneuvers to save the life.

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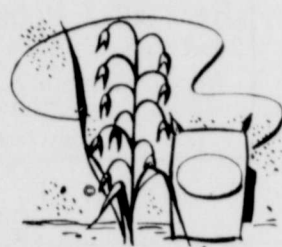

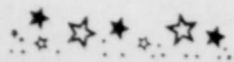
