Lane Thompson Attends Range Camp At Junction

Lane Thompson was chosen to attend Range Camp at Junction, June 26-July 1. Selection was based on outstanding projects and interest in range management.

Lane's local sponsor is Abernathy Young Farmers a strong supporter of range education and leadership development of local youth.

The weeklong Range Camp, sponsored by Texas Section, Society for Range Management, was arranged to honor outstanding range and ranch youth and provide them an opportunity for complementary training in range management and leadership skills. According to Dan Rodgers, Range Camp Chairman of College Station, participants learned to identify range plants, evaluate rangeland potential and current condition, manage wildlife habitat and practice ranch planning. Leadership training was featured workshops in interpersonal relations, communications skills and group leading practice. Field trips away from camp included tours of Kerr Wildlife Management Area and a Kimble County ranch.

Range Camp instructors included Extension Service range specialists, teachers from Texas AGM and Texas Tech, range conservationists of Soil Conservation Service, a VoAg instructor and County Extension Agent and other members of Texas Section, Society for Range Management. Applicator School Set For July 21-22

A commercial applicator school for certifying commercial applicators for applying pesticides, herbicides, and rodenticides will be held in Flatview on Thursday and Friday, July 21 and 22. The school will be held at the Hale County Agricultural Center beginning at 8:30 p. m.

County Agent Ollie Lier stated that this would be a 2 day school, and a test will be provided by the Texas Department of Agriculture at the end of the training session. Those planning to attend should pre-register by calling the County Agent's office at 296-7466.

This school is not designed for farmers unless they are applying pesticides for hire. All commercial applicators should be certified by Oct. 21, 1977.

Piano Workshop Set For July 20-21

McQuary, shown above, started regular trips to Abernathy soliciting sign painting from local businesses, and painting Coca Cola signs on the sides of local buildings. Mr. McQuary and his "Mack Signs" truck have been on the local scene so long that he seems to be a part of Abernathy's business community.

Mack has been in the sign business over 35 years. He did signs for the Coca Cola Company for 24 years, working out Lubbock as far west as New Mexico, as far east as Quitaque, north to Tulsa and south to Tahoka. Mr. Mack got in on the ground floor of the neon sign business. In his plant in Lubbock, he blew the glass shape of the letters and numerals and installed the signs.

TAES Field Day Set Sept. 13

LUBBOCK----The 68th annual edition of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Field Day for Lubbock and Halfway, which highlights a variety of crop research programs on the Texas High Plains, has been set for Tuesday, Sept. 13.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock, is host this year, according to Dr. Bill Ott, resident director of the Lubbock-Halfway Experiment Stations, and Dr. Bill Lyle, field day chairman. The Lubbock Station is part of the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center complex located three miles north of the Lubbock Regional Airport, just off Highway 87.

Scheduled for this year's event is a five-stop field tour of the Lubbock Station research plots and facilities. Machinery displays presented by area implement dealers, garden vineyard tours and a grade information booth will be added attractions.

Stops along the field tour include research plots for weed control, cotton varieties, cotton disease control, soil fertility, nematode control and water use efficiency of the row diking system.

NGC---Hale County is one of many in the 30th Senatorial District of Texas. And, Senator Ray Farabee represents that District in the Texas State Senate. Farabee, 44, is a conservative Democrat from Wichita Falls. In its July edition, the TEXAS MONTHLY magazine picked in version of the ten "Best" and the ten "Worst" legislators in the Texas Senate and House of Representatives based on their performances in the session that ended the last of May. In this day and age it is refreshing to read in the media high praise for a politician. TEXAS MONTHLY lavished great praise on the performance turned in by Farabee. I would like to print the complete text on Farabee, but we might be sued by TEXAS MONTHLY. I will, however, risk quotes from the comment on Farabee: "All of the cliches fit this rising Senate star observers describe him as conscientious, hardworking, smart, fair, independent, someone who does his homework." "One of a regrettably small handful of senators who can't be seduced, coerced, or otherwise convinced to support sleazy bills (voted against loan sharks, insurance sharpies, and the more outrageous realtor positions)." And, on and on the magazine praised Farabee. You who vote in Hale County had better hold onto a man who gains such acclaim from a magazine that seldom has that many kind words to hand out.

NGC-----TEXAS MONTHLY listed Republican State Representative Joe Robbins, from the west district in the City of Lubbock, in the "Worst" ten. The magazine had nothing at all good to say about Robbins. Froy Salinas, who represents the east district in the City of Lubbock, was not listed in the ten "Best" nor was he named in the ten "Worst". The same applies to Senator Kent Hance, who represents a number of South Plains Counties, including Lubbock County.

NGC---Only if he runs for re-election will Senator Hance know how badly his "Rod Shaw Salary Mike" bill in the last session damaged his career.

(State Senator Kent Hance is among those who are potential seekers of Mr. Mahon's seat in the U.S. House of Representatives.)

NGC--Hey, Students, I hate to remind you that summer holidays will end when you report for the first day of the 1977-1978 school term the morning of Thursday, August 18. Abernathy faculty members will be in-service at the school August 15-16-17. Monday, Sept. 5,

NGC---Constituents regretfully accepted the news last week that The Honorable George H. Mahon will step down as the U.S. Representative of District 19 of Texas at the end of his current term Dec. 31, 1978. He and Helen Mahon have served their District well since the mid-1930's. They have served with honor. They confounded the media gossip mongers in Washington by providing them with no tid-bits whatsoever for their columns, TV or radio. Years ago, a national news magazine, in a long, comprehensive article, listed George Mahon as one of the two most powerful men in Washington. Staying on the straight-and-narrow path of politics and Washington society, Mr. Mahon will leave his office as a powerful man in the Nation's Capital City.

NGC---Going over the list of potential successors to Mr. Mahon published in The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal 7-7-77, my pick at this early date is Bill Clayton of Springlake, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives. The big election fight for Mahon's post will be between voters in the City of Lubbock, on one hand, against the combined voters of the City of Midland and the City of Odessa on the other. The potential Republican candidate having the inside track within his party at this time is former Odessa Mayor Jim Reese, who was Mr. Mahon's opponent in the 1976 race. I favor Clayton because I believe he is the best qualified of any who were mentioned. His stint as Speaker of the House in Austin has seasoned him as a qualified successor (or as close as any successor could be) to The Honorable George H. Mahon. (Speaker Bill Clayton says he "is removing himself from consideration." May, '78, Demo Primary is a long time off. Everyone has the right to change his mind.)

On Saturday, September 10, 1977, at the Norfolk, Virginia, Naval Station a new USS TEXAS will be commissioned into the fleet of the United States Navy. This nuclear-powered, guided missile cruiser will be the fourth U. S. Navy ship to bear the proud name of TEXAS.

Texasans have a special interest and pride in this ship. And, to make sure that the ship receives a proper Texas send-off, the Governor has named a USS TEXAS Liaison Committee to work with the ship on its commissioning and on future visits to its home state. It is my privilege to serve as chairman of the liaison committee.

That's the background, now here's what's happening. First, it is traditional for a state to provide its namesake with silver serving pieces. That has been an item of top priority with the committee, and we expect to have suitably engraved silver ready for presentation to the ship at the commissioning ceremony. A coffee and tea service, punch bowl and 36 cups, four candelabra, two fruit bowls, two oval bread trays and a large serving tray have been ordered. The cost of this silver will be

about \$25,000.

We are at this time officially beginning our statewide fund drive to raise funds for the silver and commissioning expenses.

The two days after the commissioning, we plan to give the crew of the TEXAS and their families an old-fashioned Texas barbecue, with Texas entertainment. Two parties are required because, as you are probably aware, once a ship is commissioned in the United States Navy, it must at all times maintain part of its crew on board in ready status. Thus, we plan to fete half of the crew and their families on each of the two days.

Texasans across the State are already giving their support. The meat packers of Amarillo have donated 1,200 pounds of beef for the barbecue. Chuck Gallimore, the Panhandle's restaurateur of the year, and Sutphen's Pit Bar-B-Que have volunteered to fly to Norfolk and oversee preparation of the meal. The reigning chili champion, Albert Agnor of Marshall, also plans to fly up and serve the crew and their families a bowl of red that will make them appreciate the State's official dish. For the crew's entertainment, we have Texas stars that are indeed big and bright. Donating their time and talent for the Texas party are: The Astro-Country-Gold group from Astroworld, Ray Price, Willie Nelson, Johnny Rodriguez, and Dottie Brodt.

For commissioning decorations, the Lone Star Nursery of Tyler is providing 200 dozen yellow roses,

Six Flags Over Texas is providing a specially-made Texas flag for the ship's quarter deck. The Naval ROTC Unit, University of Texas, Austin, has given the ship a set of longhorns (not Bevo's). Fort Worth has provided Texas hats for the ship's skipper and executive officer, and Tony Lama and El Paso have provided proper ceremonial Texas boots bearing the ship's seal. That's what's taken place to date.

Now we are inviting interested Texasans, businesses, and cities to join in this USS TEXAS project by sending contributions for the ship's silver to the USS TEXAS Liaison Committee, Box 12428, Austin, Texas 78711. All gifts are tax deductible and will be acknowledged.

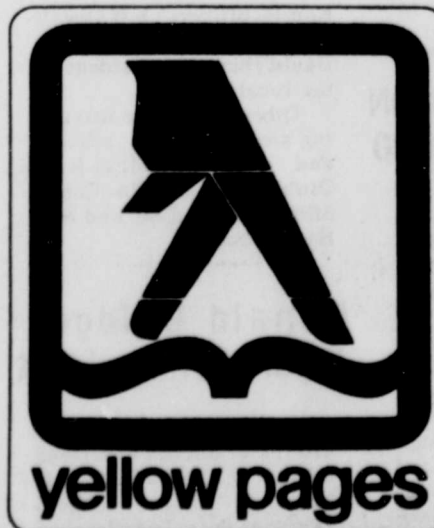

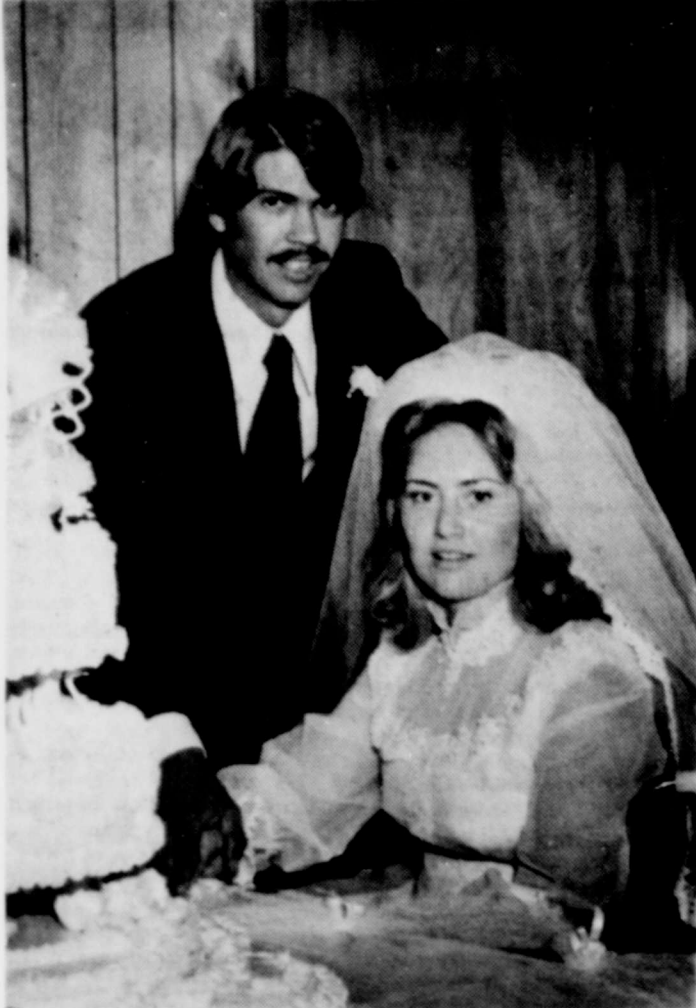

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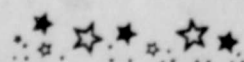

Mahon signals end of career

George Mahon, dean of the United States Congress, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee and the only Congressman the 19th District of Texas has ever had, has announced that he will not be a candidate for re-election to the House of Representatives in 1978.

In announcing his decision, Mahon told The Herald Wednesday afternoon, "At the end of my present term, I will have served 44 years in Congress and a total of 52 years in public office. I promised myself long ago that I would not seek to serve in Congress after reaching age 80, a milestone I would pass prior to the conclusion of another two-year term."

Representative Mahon was elected to Congress in 1934. At that time, he was a resident of Colorado City in what was then the southern part of the district and was serving as a district attorney. Mahon was the first United States Congressman from the newly created 19th District which at that time covered 25 counties from Haskell County on the east to the New Mexico border on the west.

The Congressman was appointed to the powerful House Appropriations Committee in 1939, became chairman of its subcommittee on defense in 1949 and has served in his current position as chairman of the full 55-member Appropriations Committee since 1964 — longer continuously than any other member in history.

ONLY SIX MEMBERS in the entire history of the United States have served longer in the House of Representatives than George Mahon. During his tenure in office, Mahon has served with eight presidents beginning with Franklin Roosevelt. He currently ranks as the Dean of Congress, having served there longer than any other sitting member.

The Congressman expressed gratitude for the unwavering support he has had

over the years from the people of the 19th District and the cooperation he has received from his colleagues in the Congress and officials of the executive branch. "Having an opportunity to participate in some of the most momentous decisions of our times has been a great privilege. I have dealt with the high and the mighty in the government, but perhaps my greatest satisfaction has been helping the people of the 19th District who have called upon me. Throughout my service, I have been sustained by the feeling that I had the trust and support of the folks at home," Mahon said.

THE CONGRESSMAN normally announces his political intentions in the December prior to election year, but he felt that, since he would not be a candidate for re-election, he should let the people know so they would have ample opportunity to consider the selection of a successor.

Mahon made no announcement as to his plans for the future but indicated that he had many interests and intends to continue leading an active and vigorous life.

The Congressman said, "I am an apostle of the strenuous life. I look forward to participating in many exciting and challenging endeavors that my responsibilities in Congress have not allowed me to pursue but I have no time now to think of future plans. For the next 18 months, I shall continue to give my full energy and devotion to the people of the 19th District and the nation."

Land Purchase Set For 1-27

LUBBOCK---The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has begun negotiations for displaced property owners along Interstate Highway 27 from Loop 445 North of Plainview to 2.0 Miles North of Hale-Swisher County Line.

Any landowner or tenant may be eligible for certain relocation assistance such as moving cost and replacement housing payments. Any occupant contemplating moving should, to insure eligibility for moving and replacement payments, notify the State before moving.

All owner-occupants in order to be eligible for relocation benefits must sell to the State.

A brochure describing the relocation assistance program can be obtained from the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, District Right of Way Office, located at 5620 Villa Drive, P. O. Box 771, Lubbock, Texas 79408.

No person shall be displaced unless and until comparable or adequate replacement housing is available.

Coffee Break Substitutes

Give your coffee "a break" --replace it with more nutritious snacks and beverages throughout the day, a food and nutrition specialist suggests.

Instead of a "coffee break," have a "snack break," and try a glass of fruit juice, an orange, apple or other fruit in season, says Mrs. Sally Coble, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas AGM University System.

"These snacks are low in calories and high in nutrients. Fresh fruits also supply fiber--which most Americans need in larger amounts."

"Also, milk and cheese foods make good snacks. A glass of skim milk supplies only 90 calories and is packed with nutrients. Cheese cubes with fresh fruit are good choices, too," she said.

Other ideas that may require a bit more preparation time are celery and carrot sticks, green pepper rings, cucumber slices and radishes. If calories are not a problem, other tasty items are nuts or peanut butter and crackers, Mrs. Coble added.

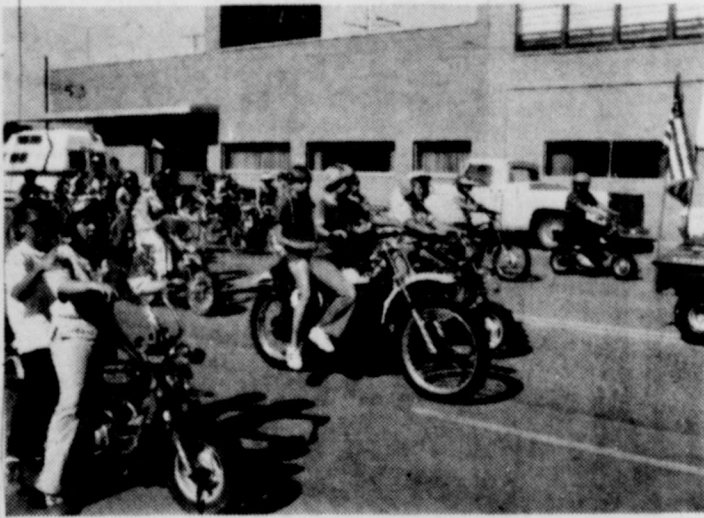
