

Not 1-not until one day last week when Mrs. Brooks Middleton graciously supplied us with the following facts:

In the fall of 1932 Miss Maxine Simmons, now Mrs. Frank Junell of San Angelo (the daughter of Mrs. I. N. Simmons and the late Mr. Simmons) was head cheerleader at Haskell High. She, collaborating with the pep club sponsor, Miss Jessie Vick, now Haskell County School Superintendent, arranged the following words to the tune of 'Maryland, My Maryland." Within a few years this came to be known as the Haskell School Song. Note that the first word was originally written as 'thy', though some students have learned it as 'our'.

With four starters on the sidelines due to injuries, the Haskell Indians limped through a 28-20 loss to the Olney Cubs here Friday night.

This was only the second loss for the Indians and snapped a three-game winning streak that started after a loss to tough, top-ranked Eastland.

Things looked up for the Indians early in the game when a bad snap from center resulted with Haskell taking over on the Cub 14-yard stripe. Bobby Cobb proceeded to hit Randy Ivy in the end zone for a quick 6-0 Haskell lead. Jim Mickler tried the extra point kick and failed.

But late in the first period, Frank Bailey got his hands on an Indian punt to go 35 yards to the Haskell 35 yard line . After Bailey had scampered another 24 yards to the 11, and changing to the other end of the field and the second period. Cub QB Teddy Scobee worked the ball down to the one, where he plunged for the Olney score. Bailey's kick moved the Cubs out to a one-point lead.

There was 6:20 left in the second period when Cobb swept left end and went in to score, and after Eric Whitaker ran the extra point, the Indians pulled the lead back to their side.

However, an Indian fumble on the Olney one-foot line in second period fizzled a drive and would later be what Haskell needed to tie the game.

Olney owned the third quarter. Mike Pace started the stampede on an 81-yard bomb that startled the Indian defense. The PAT failed. The Indians didn't recover quick enough to keep the Cubs from marching down and scoring again as Donnie Blair pushed from the one. A short punt, a 15-yard penalty, and a 26vard pass had moved the Cubs quickly downfield. But the Indians determined to come back. It still was anybody's game when Whitaker

His private practice is limited to cardiovascular disease. He is active on the staff at Kentucky Baptist Hospital, St. Anthony Hospital, St. Joseph Infirmary, and Methodist Evangelical
