Southwestern Public Service Co. Sets Open House July 30-31 At Harrington, New Coal-Fired Plant Near Amarillo

Southwestern Public Service Company will hold open house at its newest generating facility, Harrington Station, Saturday and Sunday, July 30 and 31. The plant, located northeast of Amarillo, one mile north of Nichols Station on Lake-side Drive, will be open to the public on Saturday from 12 noon to 6 p. m. and on Sunday from 1 p. m. to 6 p. m.

Harrington Station is the first generating plant on Southwestern's system to use coal as its primary fuel. The first unit, rated at 356,700 kilowatts, was put into service in mid-1976 and is using about 3500 tons of coal per day. During some of the summer months this consumption will be in excess of 4000 tons per day.

The second generating unit at Harrington is under construction and is about fifty percent complete. It is scheduled to go on the line next summer and will also have a capability of 356,700 kilowatts. Construction of the third unit of the same size will begin in the next few weeks and is scheduled for completion in 1980.

All three of the Harrington generating units will use coal-fired boilers.

The coal used at Harrington Station is low-sulphur western coal, mined and brought in by unit train from Gillette, Wyoming. The trains have about 110 cars and are designed and built specifically to haul coal. Each train brings about 11,000 tons of coal to the plant on a twice-a-week schedule.

The boilers at Harrington Station are equipped with the most advanced equipment, available at this time, for preventing objectionable products of combustion from reaching the environment.

Each electrostatic precipitator and stack gas scrubbers were installed on the first unit at a cost of approximately \$20-million. The number 2 unit will utilize a fabric filter stack emission control system known as a "baghouse". This environmental control equipment is necessary for compliance with the Texas and Federal air control and regulations.

The use of sewage effluent for boiler and cooling water—a practice pioneered by Southwestern Public Service Company at Jones Station in Lubbock, Nichols Station in Amarillo—will continue to save millions of gallons of fresh water per day. The three plants use an average of 9-million gallons of sewage effluent water to serve the residential, commercial and industrial needs of a city of 100,000 people. It takes about 450 gallons of water per month to generate the power for a residential customer using 600 KWH per month. The investment for water quality control equipment was about \$6-million.

The principal plant capability of Southwestern Public Service Company is presently 2,746,800 kilowatts. This includes 2,613,200 in steam plant capability and 133,600 kilowatts in gas turbine and expander turbine capability.

With the completion of the number 2 unit, Harrington Station will become the largest plant of Southwestern's system. In 1980, when the third unit goes on the line, Harrington will have a capability of over 1-million kilowatts and at that time, approximately 30% of the system generating capability will be coal-fired.

The design, engineering and construction supervision was done by Southwestern's own generating plant design department, under the direction of Jim Matthews, manager, generating and design construction, Missouri Valley Constructors, Inc. of Amarillo, was the mechanical and structural contractor and Budwine Electric Service Company, Carlsbad, New Mexico, was the electrical contractor.

J. B. Bottoms was the resident engineer for Southwestern Public Service Company during the construction of the first unit, and Jerry Hermesmeier is the plant manager. Bottoms will also serve as resident engineer for construction of the second unit.

Harrington Station was named in honor of the late Don Harrington, Amarillo oilman, investor and philanthropist. He served continuously on the SPS board of directors from the time the company was organized in 1942 until his death on April 27, 1974.

BIDS ON I-27 THROUGH CITY SET AUGUST 18

AUSTIN—A \$5,827,563 state highway project will extend and make improvements on Interstate 27 in Hale and Lubbock counties. The work will grade, erect structures, install storm sewers and provide one and three course surface treatment for the highway from the Lubbock County line to north of Abernathy (1.50 miles) and from 1.30 miles north of Monroe (New Deal) to the Hale County line (7.80 miles).

The project also will fund water and sewer line construction in the City of Abernathy.

Work should take 400 days to complete and will be engineered by Jack Moore.

THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF Highways and Public Transportation is accepting bids on the project until 9 a. m. Aug. 18. A proposal guaranty of \$90,000 is required.

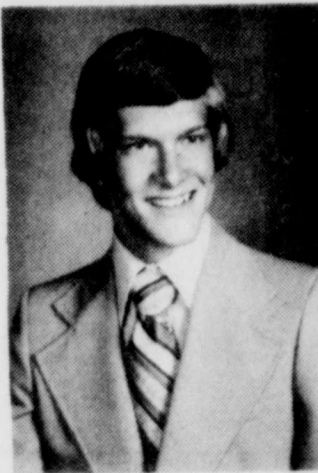

FARM SAFETY WEEK PROCLAIMED BY GOVERNOR BRISCOE

AUSTIN—Governor Dolph Briscoe has proclaimed July 25-31, Texas Farm Safety Week built around the theme "Safety is a Good Investment". Purpose of the observance is to call attention to methods of preventing the needless accidents on Texas farms and ranches that annually take 200 lives and cause multi-million dollar losses.

Governor Briscoe pointed out that safety must be a personal commitment and an integral part of everyday living. It's up to each farmer, he said, to protect priceless human resources through such practices as developing a home fire escape plan, storing clearly marked poisons well out of children's reach, training family and workers to perform tasks safely, and providing and wearing appropriate protective equipment so that accidents aren't given a chance to happen.

Since traffic, firearms and drowning accidents pose the greatest hazards for Texas farm families, a specific investment in their prevention would be well during Farm Safety Week. Drivers can learn to avoid collisions in the eight-hour National Safety Council Defensive Driving Course. Offered regularly around the state, it can also save graduates 10% on their automobile insurance. More information is available from the Texas Safety Association, P. O. Box 9345, Austin, TX 78766.

1977 CHAMPION RED SOX

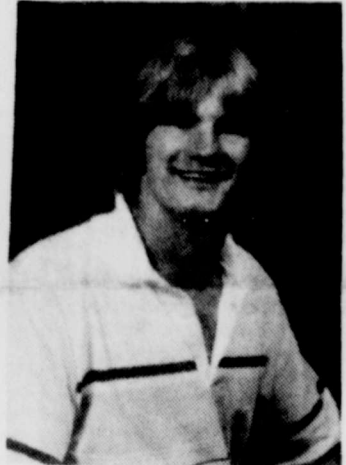

SOCIAL SECURITY Questions and Answers

By RAY PURCELL, Social Security Administration Q. I will be 72 on March 31, 1977. I have Medicare coverage but have earned too much to ever qualify for any checks. My company requires compulsory retirement at 72, so my \$1200 a month salary will end March 31, 1977. Do I need to report anything to the social security office since I'll be 72 next year anyway?

A. You should report your estimated earnings for January and February 1977 now. Since you will earn less than \$3000 in the two months before you attain age 72, you will be due checks for these two months as well as for the months you are 72 or older. Unless you report the facts as stated above, your first check would be sent for the month of March when you become 72.
