NEW FIRE TRUCK DELIVERED IN NEW DEAL

The Texas Forest Service delivered a new fire truck to New Deal Wednesday, July 27. This truck is a military excess property vehicle which has been refitted by the Texas Forest Service to serve as a rural fire truck.

The Rural Fire Defense program was established to provide basic fire fighting equipment and training for communities which have no fire protection and who also have limited funds. Under the Texas Disaster Plan of 1973, the Texas Forest Service has primary responsibility for planning and coordinating natural-cover fire protection.

Since September 1973, about 200 trucks have been outfitted by the Texas Forest Service for use by local volunteer fire departments throughout Texas.

The program is funded and authorized under federal and state legislation. Funding to date has been on a 50-50 cost share basis between the state and local communities. Recently increased federal funding will make it possible to extend the program to more communities.

Two types of vehicles, including 1 1/4 ton and 2 1/2 ton excess property federal government vehicles are obtained through the Division of Disaster Emergency Services of the Department of Public Safety and are repainted by the Texas Department of Corrections at Huntsville. Texas Forest Service personnel modify the vehicles by outfitting them with water tanks and pumping equipment and basic

fire-fighting gear. They also provide training for the volunteer fire departments that request it.

Although most rural communities use these units for structural fires, the intent of the program is to provide protection against wild forest and range fires.

The people of New Deal first heard of the program through Abernathy. They then made application for the truck. Another truck is in the process of being built to complement this new one.

There are 33 charter members of the New Deal Volunteer Fire Department. A new fire station has also just been completed in New Deal.

A young Cone woman was killed and four persons were injured about 8:00 p.m. Thursday, July 28, in a two-car collision three miles north of Abernathy at U. S. 87 and FM 54.

Sketchy reports indicate the vehicles collided broadside, killing Sarah Rodriguez instantly. The woman was believed to be in her early 20's.

Mrs. Rodriguez's 4-year-old daughter, Rachel, was sent to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, where she underwent treatment and x-rays.

Juanita Mendoza, 36, of Abernathy also was taken to the hospital, but her injuries were not believed serious.

Bob and Martha Lotspeich of Hale Center also were injured, and the couple was taken to High Plains Hospital in Hale Center, where a hospital spokesman said they were expected to be admitted.

Mrs. Rodriguez's body was taken to Chambers Funeral Home here.

A fluke in the central printing plant in Lubbock Wednesday of last week switched pictures on The Abernathy Weekly Review and The Anton Star, two of the several area weekly papers printed there. If you went crazy trying to pick out Cindy Davis and Carrie Lee Lutrick in the 4-H Electric Camp, in New Mexico, photo on page one, bottom right, last week, that photo was the one that should have been in the Anton newspaper. Our paper had been mailed out before the switch was noticed. We called the Lubbock central printing plant in time for the printers to correct that mistake in the Anton paper.

NGC--Also, in this column last week, Dallam County, Texas, came out as "Dalla" and Eddy County, New Mexico, came out as "Edd." You can't win 'em all.

NGC--Life is never the same for Texans after a session of the State Legislature, or a special session. That's par for the course after all sessions, regular and special, that have gone down in the state's history. Why did the Legislature wait until the July special session to trim five days off of the state's public school year... effective for the 1977-1978 term? Before their special session decision to shorten the term by five days, The Review already in the office the school calendars for Abernathy and New Deal Schools. Both schools had to print revised schedules with all the changes, including their later dates for teachers to begin in-service and for students to report for the first day of school. The actual cost of reprinting the school calendar at one school was not excessive, but multiply that cost by the number of schools in the state and you will have a lot of thousands of school dollars wasted...wasted by the time-wasting state legislature. Actually, for this farming area, the later starting of the school term is good. Farmers usually are just about ending the last round of irrigation near mid-August... too late for a family vacation before school started on the earlier schedule. Now, with the start of school near the end of August, maybe the farmers will have a few days for a vacation before sending the children to school.

Your residential electric meter will have either 5 or 4 dials

Electric meters are easily read from right to left as you look at the meter. If the pointer on a dial is between two numbers, write down the smaller number. When the pointer is directly on a number such as one (1) (see center dial above) then read it as 1 if the pointer on the next dial immediately to the right has passed zero (0). However, read it as zero (0) if the pointer on that dial to the right has not reached zero.

The dials above read (from left to right): 9-3-1-1-5. If, however, the pointer on the second dial from the right above was between 9 and zero then the center dial would read as a zero.

Now let's read the same meter 24 hours later

This later reading is 9-3-1-3-8. Subtracting the first reading, 93115, from the new reading of 93138 - the answer is 23. Thus you would have used 23 kilowatt hours in the 24 hour period.

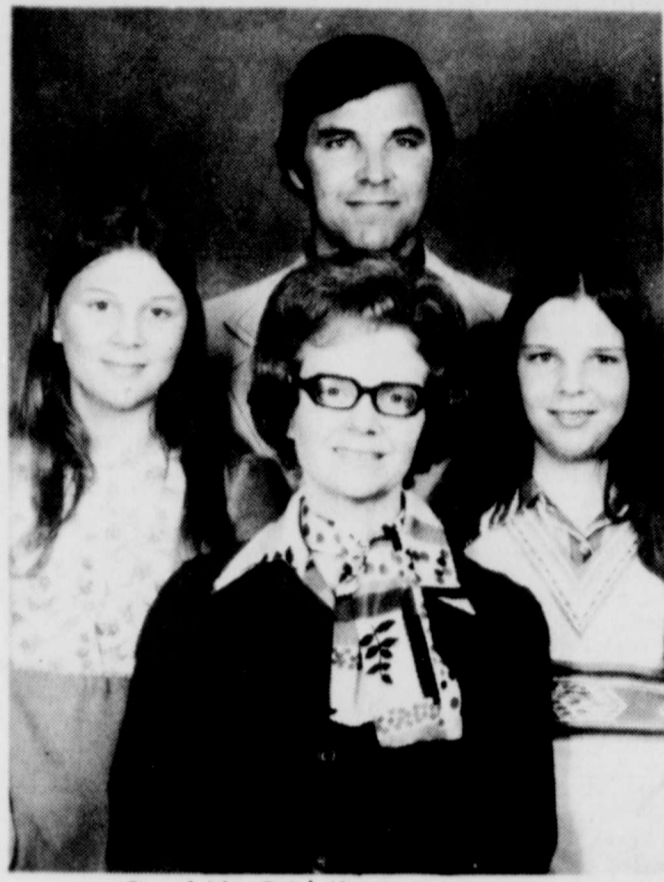

Hale County Ranks Third in State in Corn Production

Hale County ranked third in 1976 corn production for the state, producing 9.3 percent of the total Texas crops, according to Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown.

County production was 16.7 million bushels. Corn production in the Hale Center-Cotton Center-Mayfield area scored a dramatic gain, qualifying for a role of a major crop. But for the exception of ensilage contracts, corn was produced in previous years for little more than "roastin' ears" for family consumption.

Because of the disappointing price of corn last year, corn production dropped this year in the Hale Center area, with many farmers turning back to the production of cotton and milo.

Other counties in the top five in Texas in corn production were Palmer County with 40.2 million bushels, Castro County with 24 million bushels, Hale County with 16.7 million bushels, Deaf Smith with 16 million bushels, and Lamb County with 14.7 million bushels.

Texas farmers produced the largest corn crop on record in 1976 with production totaling \$432 million. Reports indicate that the 1977 crop will be even bigger in Texas, with a 9

percent increase in acreage. According to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, yield per acre in 1976 was 120 bushels, this mark was a substantial increase from the 103 bushel yield in 1975.

With searing temperatures prevailing every day, crops continue to look good in the Hale Center area. The hot weather has been good for cotton, delayed in most cases by heavy rainfall during the planting season. But moisture is needed to save farmers from the heavy cost of irrigation.

A big increase in production of soybeans in the area north of Hale Center has been reported during the planting season ruined much of the cotton crop, resulting in many farmers turning to soybeans to fill the gap.
