IMMUNIZATION ACTION MONTH NOW IN PROGRESS

Children needing immunizations for entering school or a child care facility are urged to get their immunizations early by Plainview-Hale Co. Health Department.

August is Immunization Action Month, and it's a good time for all parents to review the immunization status of themselves and all their children.

Anyone needing immunizations against such diseases as diphtheria, polio, pertussis, measles, rubella, tetanus or mumps should see their physician or visit one of the public health department clinics.

"Measles and rubella (German measles) have been showing a dramatic increase in Texas this year, and they are two diseases for which immunizations are readily available. "

Severe complications and even death may result from measles, and it is senseless for anyone in our society today to go unprotected. These complications can include ear infections, pneumonia, deafness, blindness and convulsive disorders or other forms of brain damage.

Rubella is a disease which has a devastating effect on the unborn. Rubella, sometimes called German measles or threeday measles, can cause babies to be born with abnormalities, or the pregnancy can end in stillbirth or miscarriage. The problem arises when the pregnant woman gets the disease. Some of the common defects of rubella-affected babies are cataracts, deafness, heart defects and mental retardation.

Your health department or your private physician can help young women discover if they are susceptible to rubella through a simple screening test. Young adult females, if they need

NEW FIRE TRUCK DELIVERED IN NEW DEAL of Abernathy at U. S. 87 and

The Texas Forest Service delivered a new fire truck to New Deal Wednesday, July 27. This truck is a military excess property vechicle which has been refitted by the Texas Forest Service to serve as a rural fire truck.

The Rural Fire Defense program was established to provide basic fire fighting equipment and training for communities which have no fire protection and who also have limited funds. Under the Texas Disaster Plan of 1973, the Texas Forest Service has primary responsibility for planning and coordinating natural-cover fire protection.

Since September 1973, about 200 trucks have been outfitted by the Texas Forest Service for use by local volunteer fire departments throughout Texas. The program is funded and authorized under federal and state legislation. Funding to date has been on a 50-50 cost share basis between the state and local communities. Recently increased federal funding will make it possible to extend the program to

more communities. Two types of vehicles, including 1 1/4 ton and 2 1/2 ton excess property federal government vehicles are obtained through the Division of Disaster Emergency Services of the Department of Public Safety and are repainted by the Texas Department of Corrections at Huntsville. Texas Forest Service personnel modify the vehicles by outfitting them with water tanks and pumping equipment and basic

fire-fighting gear. They also provide training for the volunteer fire departments that request it.

Although most rural communities use these units for structural fires, the intent of the program is to provide protection against wild forest and range fires. The people of New Deal

first heard of this program through Abernathy. They then made application for the truck. Another truck is in the process of being built to complement this new one.

There are 33 charter members of the New Deal Volunteer Fire Department. A new fire station has also just been completed in New


