### Abernathy counting on defense in early going

ABERNATHY — In 1976, Abernathy had an offense that could explode like a bicentennial firecracker.

This year, Larry Aldridge is figuring the defense has to do the job. "I think we're very ahead of last year, defensively. We've looked good in our two scrimmages," he notes.

Graduation robbed the team of five all-district players including a pair of great backs in Roddy Shipman and Ken Davenport who ignited offensive outpourings of 54, 49 and 33 points. In one of the wildest games on the South Plains in years, Abernathy outlasted Littlefield, 54-43 last year.

"We were in mid-season form early last year but I think maybe our offense this year will still be improving by the time district play comes around," Aldridge observed.

**LEADING** the offense are quick running backs Lee McCune, a 173-pound junior who enjoyed a stellar sophomore season in the secondary, and 158-pound senior letterman Lon Mason with promising sophomore Roger Lindsay (138) to join them in the starting lineup. Senior letterman Brent Harkey (173) also can help out. Senior Scott Cunningham (160)

returns at flanker with senior Ted Heard at split end.

The job of running the Houston Veer offense rests with Tony Heath, one of three sophomores vying for the job. "He has really been improving," says Aldridge. Gilbert Cuevas has been hurt and may be out for a couple of weeks and Dean McGuire will try to beat out Heath.

"We're pretty good up front in most spots," says Aldridge who has three big lettermen lads back on the offensive and defensive front in 6-3, 207-pound tight end David Hunt and tackles Mike Hill (5-11, 217) and Mark Pope (6-3, 210), all seniors. Hill was named to the All-Top 'O Texas team.

**DAVID KENNEDY** (168 junior) and Micah Blalock (161 senior) are a pair of lettermen who will start at guards while 175-pound senior Joe Jack Connell will play center.

Seniors Chad Majors and Lee Knight will operate at ends while 210-pound sophomore Ruben Olguin and senior Steve Presley back up the tackles, juniors Jimmy Runnels and Eric Harkey (6-2, 206) will provide depth at guard and junior Rusty Powell and senior Joe Rodriguez will operate at guard.

Defensive starters figure to be Hunt and Runnels at ends,

Pope and Olguin at tackles, Hill, Kennedy, Powell or Connell at linebackers, and Knight, McCune, Blalock and Mason in the secondary.

**AFTER OPENING** at Petersburg, the Antelopes return home for three straight games. They're hoping the home field advantage will pay off in helping them get off to a solid start.

"For the first time in my 14 years of coaching, I really don't feel I can predict what my team is going to do. It should be interesting," Aldridge concluded.

## NEWS AND COMMENT

NGC---"TEXAS" along with other summer attractions over the state have ended their season. But, all the fun is not over. Some are scheduled for autumn, which is a favorite time of the year to travel for those not blocked-in by school and harvest. The summer vacation crowds have vanished. Restaurants and inn-keepers are happier to see you and the service is better.

NGC---Such may not be the case in summer/winter resorts such as Ruidoso, Cloudercroft and Red River. The business people in those places take their vacations in the fall, after Labor Day and before the ski snow falls. You may find a number of accommodations "closed for vacation."

NGC---The Great State of Texas is the best year-around place to travel. You have mountains, Gulf coast, lakes, pine thickets of East Texas, and my favorite part of the Lone Star State, the Hill Country of Fredericksburg, Junction, Kerrville, Ingram, Wimberley, San Marcos, New Braunfels and LBJ Hill Country. This year, I suppose, you could include "Luckenbach, Texas"..... that's in Gillespie County.

NGC---Also a beautiful part of Texas in autumn is the Big Bend area, the National Park portion and the territory around it, and the towns, Fort Davis, Alpine, Marfa, the National Park settlement, Chisos Basin, in the Park's Chisos Mountains. And, there's a place called Study Butte. It's the neighboring town to the ghost mining town of Terlingua, where the Wick Fowler World Championship Chili Cookoffs have been held for a number of years. The cookoff site this year, on Saturday, October 8, will be a short distance from

Terlingua, at Arriba Terlingua, which offers better facilities than does the ghost town.... once a booming place when mercury ore was being mined. If you are ever in that territory at night, drive out on the highway between Alpine and Marfa, park and watch for the famous, and unaccounted-for, "Marfa Lights". It's weird. The lights appear, run and race, dip and bounce, disappear for a while then re-appear. Millions of words have been written about the puzzling "Marfa Lights". Scientists have come from all over the world to study the phenomena of the numerous lights. An Army Air Base was built in that area to train World War II pilots. The bouncing, traveling lights blended with the base runway and other control lights to the extent that pilots had trouble picking the proper place to land coming in from night flights. The base operations had to move.

NGC---The big show coming up this fall is the 17th Annual Wurstfest at New Braunfels, from Nov. 4 through Nov. 13. It is a big show and celebration the likes of which you probably could not find anywhere in the world except in Germany. TV star Myron Floren, of the Lawrence Welk Show, will make his 10th consecutive appearance at Wurstfest '77. A member of civic clubs in New Braunfels, a former Abernathian will be working at the Wurstfest events. He is Robert Enshel L'Roy. For further information and tickets, write Dept. broadcast chain, has business interests in and near New Braunfels. He was through Abernathy earlier, and I ask him to send brochures on the Wurstfest and the New Braunfels city and area. NGC---Another big show in Texas in the fall is the Texas State Prison Rodeo at Huntsville, with performances every Sunday in the month of October. A large number of people from here have been to that rodeo, and the consensus is "You haven't seen a rodeo until you've seen the Texas State Prison Rodeo."

NGC---Two 1978 New Ford car lines have been delivered to Abernathy Motor Co. The Fiesta is the smallest of the Ford line, similar in size to GM's Chevette. The Ford Fiesta is a front-wheel drive, and the 4-cylinder engine is transverse-mounted. Russell found these at the "highway lakes" in South Abernathy. Also, some good-size catfish have been hooked in the northeast "highway lake" at the underpass on FM 597.

NGC---If you thought last fall's new TV shows were sorry, just wait until the new ones come along this fall. I saw a list of some of the upcoming shows. None looked very interesting. NGC---Reports say that President Carter wants the USA to intervene in the religious war in Northern Ireland. That's Great Britain's problem to solve. Mr. Carter has more problems at home than he can handle.

NGC---The Experimental Aircraft Association's replica of Charles Lindbergh's famous Spirit of St. Louis has begun its commemorative tour of the United States. It is due for a stop at Lubbock International Airport Sept. 19. NGC---I was all set to write a story about the 5-acre, 1,200-tree commercial apple orchard on the Robert and Barbara Eddins place southwest of New Deal, but now I am too late. I received the information after the August 18th Review was distributed and had planned the story for the August 25th Review. In the meantime, a very good story by Keith Henley, Farm Writer, appeared in The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, which would make my orchard story a repetition. I will, however, give the location of the orchard where you can buy the red and yellow delicious apples. Go to the point where North University and FM 1294 (known as the Jobe Road) intersect, then go a mile west on the Jobe Road then north to the third house on the left. The last price I heard was \$6 per bushel, you pick'em. Robert Eddins is in fruit and grape research at the Texas A&M experiment station southeast of New Deal. Eddins was one of the researchers on the grape-growing plot on the Abernathy Airport section. That research plot was dropped after Abernathy Chamber of Commerce withdrew its funding of the project. The children of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Eddins attend Abernathy Schools.

NGC---What makes the Eddins' apple orchard news is the fact that there are so few commercial apple orchards in this part of the country. Abernathy's history includes two that long since have vanished. One was north of the current location of Struve Implement Co. north of town. Rudolph Struve said that orchard was owned by J. J. Merrill. The other was about 3 miles east of Struve's location, on what is now FM 54. It was on the

A retired farmer, he was a member of Calvary Baptist Church in Fayetteville, Ark.

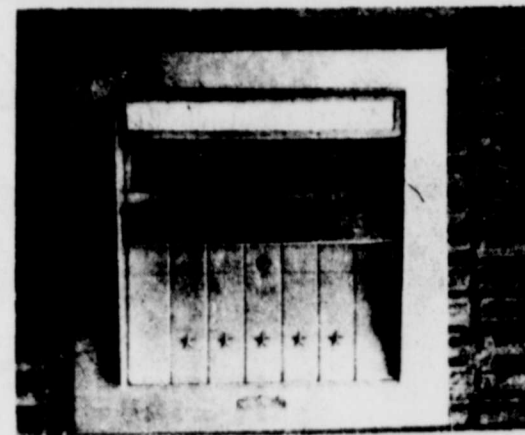

late E. M. Crow's place. There were so many of that Crow family living here then that people called him "Apple Crow" so they would know which Crow was being discussed. Also growing fruit on a relatively large scale many years ago was the late Franklin Benny, whose orchard was southeast of Tucco.

NGC---1977 has been a great year in the Abernathy area for fruit and vegetables. Fruit trees waited until after the last big freeze to bloom this time... the first time in a number of years. Pecans are better to grow than fruit. Pecan trees seldom miss bearing.

# An important message to our customers.

The House of Representatives has just voted to raise the price of your electricity. And the Senate is looking at the same legislation. These bills are going to cost you plenty -- nearly \$50,000,000 a year for the next ten years. That's almost half a billion dollars!

- 6 slices process cheese

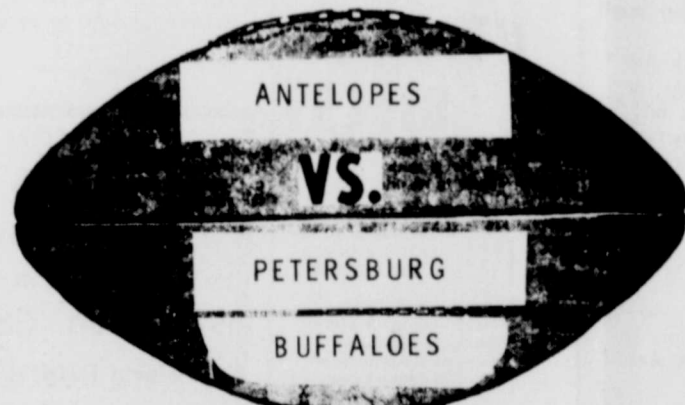
