## PWIA applies for permit

Members of Plains Weather Improvement Association of Plainview have begun legal steps in securing a permit to engage in weather modification activities over a portion of the High Plains.

In recent years, the permits have run into vocal opposition from throughout the area. In a series of elections in 1977, voters from Swisher, Randall, Lamb, Hockley, Bailey, Castro, Floyd and Briscoe Counties turned down the projects.

PWIA officers received permission from the Texas Department of Water Resources on Friday to advertise intent to apply for the 1978 permit, the first step in securing permission to again make the weather flights which were halted after the 1977 elections.

Legal notices stating the intent to engage in the activities will begin appearing in several target area newspapers on Thursday and will continue once a week for three weeks.

ACCORDING TO a spokesman for PWIA, the 1978 target area includes all of Hale County except election precinct 9 (the Abernathy area); Swisher County election

precinct 12 (the southwest corner of the county); Lamb County election precincts 1, 2, 3, 4, 6, 9, 12, 13, 15 and 16 (the northern and eastern portions of the county); Castro County election precincts 6, 7, 10, 11 and 16 (the southern portion of the county) and Floyd County election precincts 3, 4, 7 and 16 (Sandhill, Barwise and Providence areas).

According to PWIA, the intended purpose of the four-year, year-round weather modification activities is "to increase rainfall and decrease hailfall in the target area... (with) pyrotechnics (flares) and wing-tip liquid generators for dispensing silver-iodide nuclei near cloud base."

According to the spokesman for the weather modification firm, opponents may circulate petitions calling for an election over the entire target area to decide on whether the permit will be granted, but 10 percent of the registered voters casting ballots in the last election must sign the petitions within 30 days after the first notice is issued.

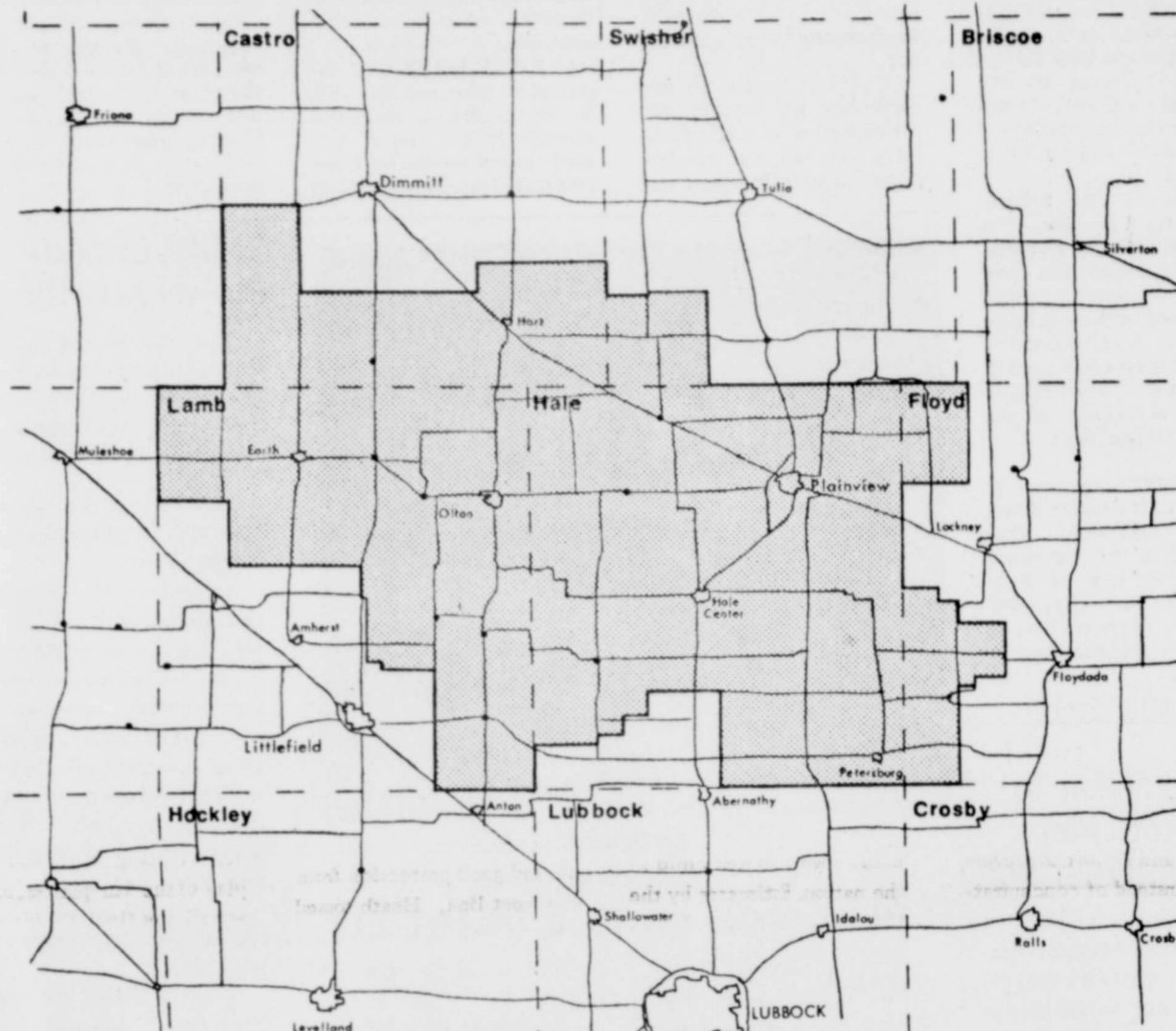
"WE DON'T EXPECT much opposition from the target area, but we don't know if an election will be called this year," the spokesman told The Herald this morning. He said that elections held during 1977

that defeated the activities in much of the South Plains apparently would not be binding because SB 632, a state law signed by Gov. Dolph Briscoe in June 1977, was not then in effect when the elections were held. "We maintain that the bill that allowed for the elections did not cover our permits because we had already applied for permits when the bill was passed. I guess the Department of Water Resources agreed with us because they told us to go ahead and apply again this year."

The proposed target area included a portion of the area covered in 1977 by Atmospherics, Inc., contracted agent for Better Weather of Littlefield. According to the PWIA spokesman, Atmospherics, Inc. will not be returning in 1977 to conduct modification activities in the High Plains and many of the Better Weather members have joined PWIA to conduct joint operations.

The enlarged operation will be conducted from the Plainview-Hale County Airport under the direction of Robert Swart, project meteorologist for PWIA.

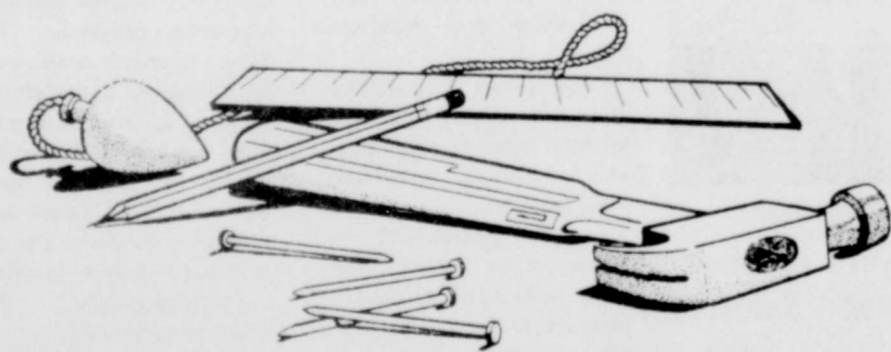

**FIRE PREVENTION WEEK IS OCT. 9-15**

COLLEGE STATION--- Fire Prevention Week is "observed"---not celebrated---in the United States each October. This year the date is Oct. 9-15, notes Dr. Gary S. Nelson, safety engineer with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The Oct. 9 date is the anniversary of "The Great Chicago Fire" of 1871 which marked the real start of community effort to prevent fires instead of concentrating only on putting them out, says the engineer.

Woodrow Wilson, in 1920, was the first President to issue a national proclamation in observance of what was then Fire Prevention Day. This tradition has been officially recognized by every successive President to this day.

The toll of the Chicago fire of 1871 was monumental in terms of the young frontier city and of the economy of those days: 250 lives lost, 17,430 buildings destroyed, and an estimated \$168 million in property lost.

Today, fires continue to

kill an average of 32 persons in the U.S. each day, adding up to more than 10,000 lives lost each year, points out Nelson. About 30 percent of the victims, or 3,500, are youngsters through age 15.

Fires cost the U.S. about \$4.4 billion in property loss annually. This means the average annual price of fire waste is \$20.40 for every man, woman and child in the nation. Estimate by the National Commission on Fire Prevention and Control place the total cost of fires--including lost wages, sales and production as well as buildings and contents destroyed--at \$12 billion annually.

Fire tragedies will continue, says Nelson, until Americans learn how not to burn through adherence to recommended fire prevention practices and through the use of fire prevention building and equipment designs.

Gilbert Cuevas extra point kick was partially blocked and Abernathy led 6-0. Littlefield retaliated, driving 60 yards on 7 plays, with Balza going the final 10 yards for the TD. Richard Soria kicked the extra point to put the Wildcats out front 7-6.

Antelope freshman Kenneth Sanders took the ensuing kick off on the 5 and returned it to the 23. Cunningham carried 45 yards on an inside reverse, McCune scampered 25 yards around end, and Lindsey, Mason and Heath hit for short yardage as the Lopes moved to Littlefields 13 yard line.

Behind good protection from the front line, Heath tossed a pass to split end Joe Barrera who made a falling catch in the end zone. A pass intended for Barrera for two-extra points was batted away, but Abernathy led, 12-7.

The lead was short-lived, however. Littlefield moved to Abernathy's 40 yard line with 29 seconds left in the half when Gregory threw a desperation pass to end Mark Watts. Defender Lee McCune made a valiant attempt to intercept the pass, but the ball sailed through his arms into Watts' hands, setting up Balza's 1 yard TD plunge.

On the second play of the 3rd quarter, defensive back Ted Heard deflected a Gregory pass and Barrera picked it off on Littlefield's 41. Three plays later Littlefield got the ball back when Jett West intercepted a Cuevas pass and ran to Abernathy's 41. The Lopes got possession again a few plays later when Heard recovered a Littlefield fumble on the 27.

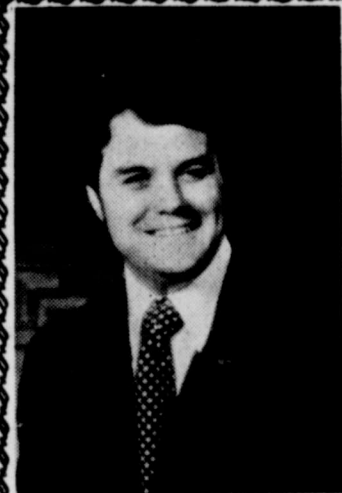

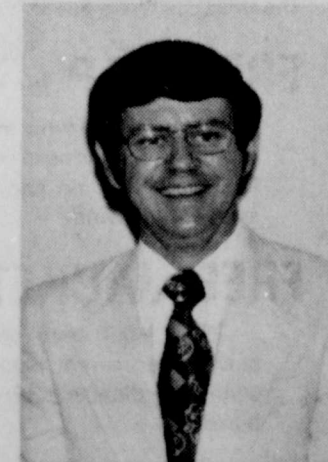

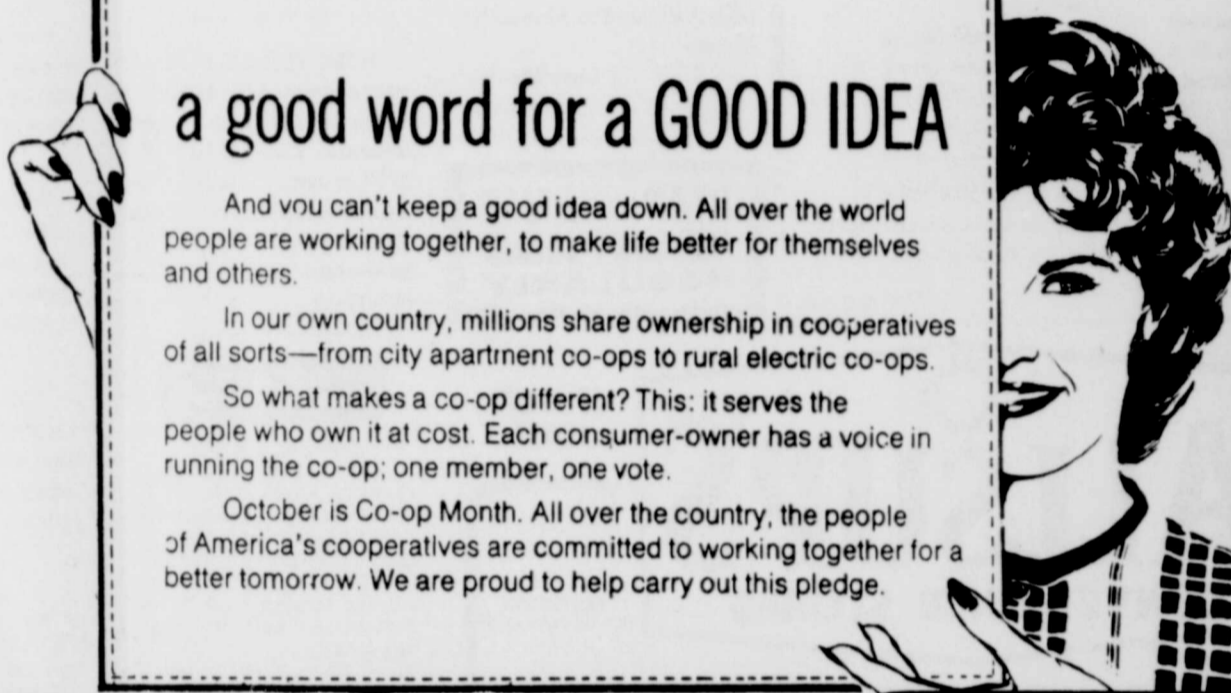
