among the first to avail themselves of the opportunity for the complete health screening service. They are shown in the photos below as they progress through the various stages on the testing.



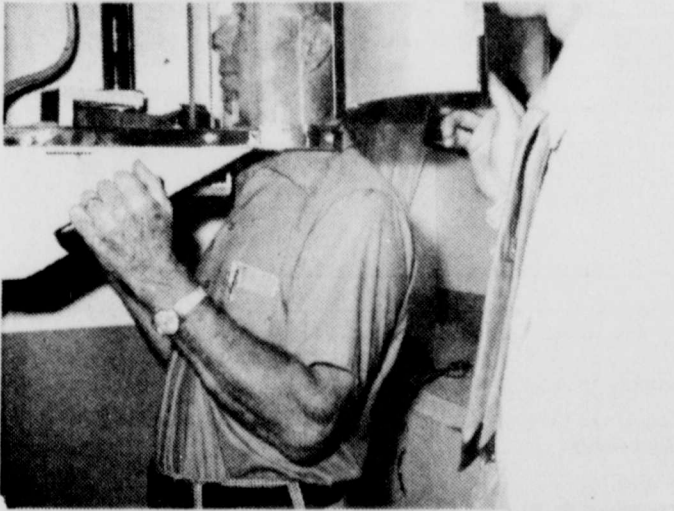

## BOARD MEETING OCTOBER 3

The Board of Trustees of Abernathy Independent School District met in regular session on October 3, 1977.

In formal action, the board accepted the certified tax roll for 1977. The 50% valuation of the district was officially set at \$151,737,966. The rate was previously set at \$.85 per \$100 valuation. Estimated 1977 taxes receivable are \$1,289,775. Delinquent taxes receivable are \$60,187.

Teaching objectives were approved in mathematics and language arts for grades 1-5 as proposed by the elementary teachers and presented by Mr. Adkisson. The board approved a passing grade of 60 based upon objectives or goals for the course. All grades to be given "on level."

The following items on the agenda were accepted without formal action: (1) The enrollment report showing an enrollment of 1131 compared with 1136 at the same time last year. Elementary-489; Junior High-265; and high school-377. (2) The cafeteria had an average daily participation of 574. (3) A report was given on the TASA-TASB Conference (printed in an earlier issue).

At the November meeting, the board will review the audit for 1976-77 and examine bids on maintenance vehicles.

Rev. Gollher will be speaking over the weekend at the Church of the Nazarene. He will speak at the Men's Breakfast at South Grahams at 6:15 a. m. on Saturday, October 22. He will also speak at the Ladies Luncheon in Fellowship Hall at 12:00 noon on Saturday. The Saturday evening services are at 7:30 p. m. Rev. Gollher will be the speaker at the Sunday morning Worship Services at 10:45 a. m. and again at 6:50 p. m.

During their first term on the field, Mr. Gollher served as evangelist at Plura, and later at Chota until 1956. Since that time, he has served as District Superintendent, Field Superintendent and Mission Director.

The missionary services will include a presentation of curios, and photographs depicting the work in Peru with a few slides. There will be a brief message challenging each individual to accept his responsibility to the work in missions.

Mr. Gollher has received education in the fields of machinery and electronics. He earned his B. A. degree in Religion at Pasadena College. Prior to being appointed as a missionary, he pastored in Northern California for three years.

The Gollhers will make their home in Upland, California during their furlough.

## ANTELOPES TO HOST IDALOU WILDCATS FRIDAY NIGHT

After taking a night off with an open date last week, the Abernathy Antelopes will host the state-ranked undefeated Idalou Wildcats this Friday evening at 7:30 on Antelope Field. The Wildcats are ranked No. 1 in the area and No. 4 and No. 5 on the UPI and AP state top-ten lists.

Friday night's contest will mark the opening of District 4-AA play for Abernathy. It will be the second game of conference play for the Wildcats, who defeated the Tulsa Hornets last week, 34-7. In other 4-AA action last week, Floydada outlasted Lockney, 23-19.

According to the AHS coaches, the Antelopes should be in better physical condition, especially injurywise, than in any recent games. Tackle-linebacker Mike Hill, who suffered a knee injury in the Slaton game, is almost back to full steam, and David Kennedy, who sustained injury to his neck muscles in that same contest, will see some action. Gilbert Cuevas still hobbles some from a recent ankle injury, but should be well enough to see action.

The coaches have been drilling the Lopes defensively against the Idalou offense, and also have been putting together an offensive structure which hopefully will click against the Idalou defense.

And you can be sure that Idalou's coach, Tom Ritchey, will have his boys "up" for this contest. The former Abernathy High School star is noted also for coming up with the "big plays".

According to the AHS

coaching staff, Idalou probably has a better balanced team than any other unit the Lopes have faced this season. "Burlesmith (QB Paige) has improved tremendously since last year," stated assistant coach Jerry Beasley. He went on to state that tailback Ricky Hobbs is a strong runner, and fullback Larry Murphy "is big and likes contact." "Fastest man on the team is slotback Buckles Bryant. "They have four tremendous weapons in the backfield, and their linemen are fairly good sized and are strong. "The coaches indicated that field position will possibly play a key role in the outcome of the upcoming contest.

The freshmen game is scheduled to begin at 5 p. m. to be followed by the junior varsity game.

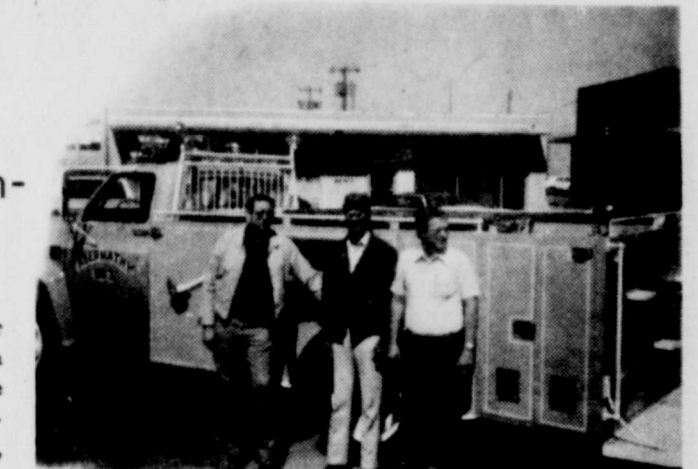

## NEW FIRE TRUCK FOR ABERNATHY

Abernathy now has a new rural tanker fire truck, with a about 1000-gallon water capacity. It replaces an old tanker truck that had some 800-gallon capacity.

The new rural fire truck, painted a yellowish green or a greenish yellow (take your choice) didn't cost the city taxpayers of Abernathy a penny to build. The money came from the fund Abernathy Volunteer Firemen accumulated from money received from the Commissioners Courts in Hale and Lubbock Counties for making runs to rural fires in the two counties.

When the new fire truck project was in the planning stage, it was estimated that it would cost about \$15,000. Final cost of the completed unit was \$8,850. Most all of the work was done by members of the Volunteer Fire Department, with very little cost charged against labor.

Firemen Clyde Vandygriff and Gene Nunn followed the project from inception to completion, doing much of the work, and helping supervise the work of others. They incorporated some ideas of their own, including one

innovation that fire trucks factories may copy. Rather than riding atop the tank structure, the two hose reels were recessed within the body on both sides of the tank. This placement of hose reels has a number of advantages, including being easier to reel out when needed and stored out of the weather when not in use. The tank and other equipment and accessories and tank housing are mounted on a 1973 Chevrolet truck chassis.

The hose and other useable items from the old truck were incorporated into the new tanker unit. Clint Condray, immediate past president of the Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department, is a machinist at Wolf & Sons machine shop, and he redesigned the pump that was installed on the new fire truck.

## NEW BUILDING UNDER CONSTRUCTION FOR ELEMENTARY P. E. CLASSES

A new building is under construction and nearing completion at the northwest corner of the Elementary school building. The 60x80 ft. structure has a steel frame with outside and inside metal walls with insulation between them. There is also insulation directly under the roof with an acoustic tile ceiling. "The building is very attractive inside", Gid Adkisson reported.

The building was not designed nor intended to be a gymnasium, but rather, strictly a classroom for physical education classes for the students in grades 1 through 5. The children in kindergarten do not participate in the program. The physical education classes are not just games but a learning experience for the children; teaching agility, coordination, and motor skills development.

There will be a breeze

connecting the new structure with the Elementary building. It will be heated in cold weather in order for the students to continue with their physical education classes when they are unable to be outside.

Max Kennedy is the instructor of these classes.

that some 1,100-man-hours were devoted to building the new tanker truck, with the work being done in the new fire station.

This is the second piece of rolling fire fighting equipment built by members of the Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department. The first unit they built was completed about two years ago. It is a booster pumper.

Also to be added to the Abernathy Volunteer Fire Department's fleet of vehicles is a new pumper truck to be used in the city where fire plugs are available. A 1977 Chevrolet truck chassis was purchased locally and delivered by Gean Nunn the second week in July, to Tipton, Indiana, where an FMC fire truck body is now being mounted and equipped with all new facilities. The completed unit is expected to be in use here soon after the first of the year. This unit will replace a city pumper truck that will be 27 years old when it goes on standby auxiliary service status when the new city truck arrives. The chassis cost \$8,771 and the FMC fire truck body and equipment will cost \$37,346, a total of \$46,117 for the completed city unit. This will be paid by the City of Abernathy taxpayers. City Manager Larry Fields explains the reason for the expenditure: Mr. Fields says the State of Texas demands that fire trucks to be used within the city be replaced after they are 25 years old. To this, the State allows one year grace period to replace the old truck. Abernathy will get in under the wire with this new truck near the end of the 26 years allowed by the State, including the grace period. The penalty for not replacing the old city fire truck would have been reflected in drastically increased fire insurance rates within the city limits of Abernathy. The new fire truck will save enough in lower insurance premium rates to pay for itself over a period of time. The old city fire pumper is in great condition and will be a valuable

### Help Reduce Dangers On Halloween

COLLEGE STATION----  
Many Halloween accidents occur when excited children dart from between cars, oblivious to traffic, or walk on dark roadway shoulders with their vision and movement severely restricted by face masks and cumbersome costumes.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service urges parents to consider these child-savers:

--Map out a route for your children, making stops at only those homes where you know the residents.

--Review pedestrian rules of safety with the children.

--Tell the children to cross the street only at authorized crosswalks and never between parked cars.

--Remind them to look in all directions before crossing the street and to watch for and obey all traffic lights.

--Instruct them to use sidewalks and not streets for walking from house to house, and remind them always to wait on the curb--not in the street--until the street is clear to cross.

--Make sure the children are easily visible to motorists; select a light-colored costume and generously apply reflective tape to the back, front and sides; decorate the trick-or-treat bag with reflective tape, and give a flashlight to at least one of the children.

--Even better, encourage children to do their trick-or-treating during the daylight hours.

--Make sure costumes fit children properly and do not restrict their movements or vision; remember that make-up will not impair the child's field of vision as masks often do.

--Always try to have an adult near children throughout the evening to serve both as a guide and a quieting influence.

--As an alternative to random trick-or-treating, consider joining other neighbors in staging a Halloween party where each family is responsible for a Halloween game and prizes.
