'LOPES LOSE 29-6 IN HARD-FOUGHT GAME AGAINST LOCKNEY LONGHORNS

Have you heard about the guy "who finally got it all together. . . and then couldn't remember what he did with it!"? That's almost the story of the Abernathy Antelopes' hard-fought game against the Lockney Longhorns have last Friday evening. The "Lopes looked good, especially during the first half, and even into the final stanza before Lockney "broke the game wide open". with the final score reading: Abernathy 6, Lockney 29.

The 'Loses were tremendously improved in the passing department, both offentively and defensively. hitting on 6 of 14 passes for 128 yards, and holding Lockney to one completion for only 6 yards. The 'Lopes picked as an additional 183 yards on the ground for 311 total yards, while making 14 first downs.

Quarterback Tony Heath, who connected on 4 of 12 passes for 70 yards, hit tight end David Hunt with 3 aerials for 27,23 and 12 yards, and got credit for an 8 yard completion to split end Randy Gregory on a pass interference call. Quarterback Gilbert Cuevas threw only twice and completed both tosses, one a 53-yarder to split end Joe Barrera and the other to tight end Chad

Major for 5 yards. Heath was the leading groundgainer for the Antelopas, picking up 57 yards, on 13 carries. The sophomore quarterback dida fine job of reading the defease as he executed the

option play. Roger Lindsey also a sophomore, carried 15 times for 53 yards, and senior runningback Loa Mason had 47 yards on 14 carries. Scott Cunningham and Ted Heard added 24 yards.

Mark Pope was the leading man in tackles with a total of 13 tackles. Mike Hill, David Kennedy and Micah Blalock followed close behind Pope with 10 tackles each. Kelly Mills and Ruben Olguin each recovered a fumble in the game.

Coach Aldridge said, Kenneth Sanders and Jimmy Runnels made some big defensive plays at defensive end. Eric Harkey had one of his best games of the

The 'Lopes gave up a touchdown midway in the first quarter when Lockney speedster Danny Clark took a pitchout andraced 41 yards for the game's first score. with Joe Rodriquez kicking tha EP.

Eight minutes later the 'Lopen climaxed a 74-vard sustained drive with a 4-yard TD run by Lindsey. Cuevas extra point attempt was wide, and Abernathy trailed 6-7. The home team had taken over on its own 26 yard line on a fumble recovery by defensive back Kelly Mills. Heath, Mason, Cunningham and Linkey had colaborated on the drive, with a 27-vard Heath-to-Hunt pass-runplay thrown in, picking ap four first downs on their way to paydirt.



FALL EVANGELISTIC CRUSADE TO BE HELD AT NAZARENE CHURCH



AUSTIN-Fireplace wood is rapidly becoming one of the most expensive fuels for the household and one which the homeowner least understands how to buy by measurement, states Agriculture Commi Reagan V. Brown.

Brown advises consumers not to buy firewood by "the pickup load" or by the 'rick". Instead, he says, ask for the exact dimensions of the wood when it is stacked at your home, and buy accordingly.

A legal cord of wood measures four feet high, four feet wide and eight feet long, he notes. ------

then stiffened and kept the visitors off balance until late in the third period, when Lockney scored again just two plays before the final quarter began.

Two field goal attempts by Cuevas during the contest failed, the first just before halftime from the 34 yard line, and the other with 3:15 left in the contest, this one from the 32.

Two fumbles losses by Abernathy andone intercepted pass stopped three Antelope driver, one at the Longhorns' 3 yard line and another at the Longhorn 7. Another drive was stymied at the 27 when the 'Lope' were forced to give the ball up on downs.

Lockney's second TD came with 27 seconds left in the third period when quarterback Billy Sessom went 8 yards around left end on a bootleg play. The 'Horns then added two points on a Steve Warren-to-Danny Wilson pass after faking a kick

The 'Lopas still felt they nad a chance and executed some fine defensive work up until 2:03 left in the game. At the point, Clark slashed off tackle, cut to the sideline and sped 30 yards for his second TD of the night, with Rodriquez adding the EP for a 22-6 advantage.

That seemed to take something out of the 'Lopes, and five plays later the Longhorns scored again after recovering a fumble on the Abarnathy 3. Warren went the final step and a half for the score, and Rodriquez closed out the scoring with his EP kick

The highly-regarded Clark got his sixth 200-plus yards game of the season, romping for 272 yards on 34







"By choosing to increase taxes on gasoline, diesel fuel, oil, and natural gas the Carter Administration is forcing the American farmer to bear the major burden of its energy conservation program," the Congressman from Dallas said, "Costs for fertilizer and pesticides will rise dramatically, thus greatly increasing the costs farmers will have to face. At a time when a farmer can only get \$1.23 for a bushel of corn that cost him \$2. 10 to produce, these
