FARABEE PROTESTS HEW GUIDLINES

AUSTIN --- State Senator Ray Farabee has contacted the federal Health Resources Administration in protest of proposed HEW guidelines.

In submitting his statement, Farabee said, "it is important that those responsible for proposing standards understand the needs of smaller cities and rural communities.

"It is not always possible for a patient to be transported to a larger city for treatment. You don't always know when you will need hospital treatment as a result of a heart attack or an accident. Hospitals and other health care facilities should not be eliminated in the same areas which are producing the food, fiber and energy that are so vital to the remainder of the country, '

Farabee continued. In urging HEW to consider these factors before adopting any proposed guidelines, Farabee said, "persons in these less populous areas deserve the same quality of health care as their counterparts in larger cities. Facilities in many of these communities have been built by the people through great personal effort and expense in an attempt to meet critical needs. "

Farabee said that he hopes the response from areas such as the 30th District will help preserve the existing medical facilities in smaller towns and cities.



who are working for Mac Teakell at Teakell Gin in County Line, were hijacked by two armed Mexican men about 9:30 p. m. Sunday. The victims reside in a house about 150 yards west of the Teakell Gin office. The bandits. one armed with a rifle and the other with a hand gun, entered the house, roobed the four men of a total of \$2,700, locked them in the bathroom and broke out the electric lights. One of the robbers was partially masked by a hood pulled down on part of his face. The

other had no mask. Teakell said no one saw car leave the house after

The house in which the victims reside straddles the Hale-Lubbock county line. It was determined that the robbery took place in the portion of the house that is in Lubbock County.

No one was injured in the incident.

HEW's guidelines may put but much-needed, small. community hospitals out of

The national news media and some members of Congress are attempting to make "Social Security" two bad words. . . and to make the SS recipients feel like wards of the federal government. As one of millions who have paid into the Social Security trust fund since its beginning in the 1930's, I do not feel like a villian in the current hassle over shoring up the SS

Here's how the federal government tries to make farmers the villian: "After declining a total of 12.5 percent in April, prices of farm products climbed 2.4 percent in October, signaling higher prices ahead at the supermarket," said a news story with a Washington dateline in Nov. 3rd daily newspapers.

N&C -- A new and dependable labor force, as tractor drivers and for light farm work, is becoming available to farmers. Making up this category of farm labor are retired farmers who would like to work the amount they are permitted to earn and still draw their Social Security payments. They are experienced in the jobs farmers would have for them

N&C -- Abernathy received picture in the November issue of FARMER, magazine. It came in a story about Laurin Prather, who farms south of Abernathy. It had a color photo of Prather along with baled sorghum residues, substitute for silage and alfalfa hay, which he uses in his cattle feeding operations, N&C-Big city newspersons

have worn threadbare the cliche "sleepy little town" in reference to most any town smaller than the one from which they operate. Carlton Stowers said it in a different way"... this generally slowpaced farming community" in reference to Dimmitt, which is near 5,000 in population. Stowers was writing in the Dallas Morning News about the Halloween Eve shotgun shooting death of a 15-year-old girl at a farm home northwest of Dimmitt. The Dallas News' attention was drawn to the tragedy because the couple charged in the shooting death are said to be members of the Church of Wicca -- a religious group which reports say believes in witchcraft. The big city folks have poked fun at small towns by saying "they roll up the sidewalks at 9 o'clock at night. " This one has backfired on them. With rampaging street crime in the big cities, the big city folks are afraid to get out on their sidewalks after 9 p. m. It was about that time one

night last year that we drove,

with car doors locked, downtown Dallas in the Commerce-Elm Street areas. Due to the characters roaming the streets, I wouldn't have gotten out of the car and walked three blocks if they had given me downtown Dallas for making that walk. Later, in that general area, a Dallas News route man was shot to death near midnight while putting the next day's paper in a news stand rack. He was killed and robbed of the few news stand dollars he collected.
