License Plates Renewal Method Changes In '78

AUSTIN---License plate renewal notices for almost 11 million motor vehicles are in U. S. post offices throughout Texas for delivery to owners.

R. W. Townsley, director of the Motor Vehicle Division, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, said the renewal notices were stuffed into envelopes, pre-sorted by zip code, boxed and delivered to post offices to expedite delivery. Work to get the renewal notices ready for delivery started in early October.

"The plate renewals for passenger cars and light trucks (such as pickups) will be different from last year. A new law requires that renewal dates be spread as equally as possible over 12 months, rather than have all expire at one time (April 1) each year," Townsley said.

Since the Motor Vehicle Division does not maintain records by owner's name or birth date, the license number of the vehicle has been used to determine the month of registration renewal in the future.

Renewal notices have been issued to reflect the number of months and the prorated fee to be paid to register each vehicle under the new system.

A complete explanation of the new system is enclosed with each renewal notice for passenger cars and light trucks (one ton or less). It is imperative that vehicle owners not lose the registration notice as it must be presented at the county tax collection office to obtain new license plates.

Because of the new system, registration may take longer this first year than ever before. The new law authorizes county tax assessors-collectors to start processing the renewals a month early.

Your county tax assessor-collector is ready when you are--any time starting with the county's first work day in 1978.

"Look for your friendly postman to bring your license plate renewal notice shortly after Christmas," Townsley said. "Do yourself a favor--take your renewal notice to your county tax office and register early. You'll be sorry if you don't."

VEH DEDICATION SET FOR JAN. 5th AT NEW DEAL HIGH SCHOOL

State Representative Kent Hance will deliver the principal address at the dedication ceremony of the New Deal Vocational Home-making Facility. The dedication will be January 5th at 6:00 p. m.

Other invited guests will be Mr. Jess Irwin Jr., Commissioner Texas Rehabilitation Commission and Teresa Thomas, also representing TRC.

Other guests will be New Deal School Administration and members of the board of Education.

Vocational Education (VED) is a home economics course in job training. The course is specifically designed to help students enter the world of work. Job possibilities included are commercial sewing, commercial laundry and clothing services, custom drapery making, food services, bakery services and many more.

The class is for students ages 14-21. New Deal has a class from high school and junior high school. Students enrolled stay in this class for 2 consecutive class periods. This time is needed in order to duplicate actual work experience.

New Deal's Vocational Education has had several projects this year. Students

began by sewing potholders and learning to operate a machine. Students were given an opportunity to achieve an "operators license" on the sewing machines.

Students then constructed their own uniforms for the restaurant operation to begin soon. The restaurant will be called The Lions Den and will be decorated in school colors.

For the Christmas season, students baked cupcakes and learned to decorate as bakeries do. The cupcakes were sold to individuals for Christmas parties.

Students in Vocational Education steam pressed the draperies in the cafeteria for the Thanksgiving Program. The class is currently repairing the drapes in preparation of coming events.

With the coming of spring will be many new experiences for VEH students. Field trips are planned to clothing factories, McDonalds, other restaurants, bakeries and stores. On several occasions the Lions Den restaurant will be opened for business to interested persons. The class hopes to construct draperies for the Lions Den this spring.

Abernathy workshop set for applicators

A training workshop for private applicators has been planned by County Extension Agent Ollie Limer and Abernathy Young Farmers Chapter in order that Hale County producers can have another opportunity to complete a training program leading to certification as private applicators.

The training session is set for 7 p. m. Monday, Jan. 9, at the Abernathy High School Vocational Agriculture Department.

The Private Applicator Certification Training Program, one of the optional means of qualifying for certification as a private applicator of restricted-use pesticides, includes a discussion of laws, labels and labeling, pesticide safety, mixing and calibration, and pests and pest damage identification. The

program is prepared by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service and includes a review of certain questions relating to the information presented.

THE SESSION will require approximately three hours to complete, Limer said. Those attending and seeking certification as private applicators will have an opportunity to complete a request for certification which will be forwarded to the Texas Department of Agriculture for issuance.

As an alternative to participation in the program, Limer said an individual may qualify for certification as a private applicator by submitting a completed questionnaire to the TDA following a review of self-study materials. The self-study materials are available at the County Extension office.

COTTON GROWERS TO MEET JAN. 5

PLAINVIEW--- Cotton producers of Hale County will hear reports on the research and marketing progress of their commodity when Cotton Incorporated holds an annual report meeting at 7 p. m. Thursday, January 5, at the Massey Community Building in Floydada.

Cotton Incorporated is the fiber company of American cotton producers, Ollie F. Limer, county extension agent, said.

Limer said the meeting will center around a specially-made color-sound motion picture giving a company-wide view of 1977 accomplishments. This will be followed by a brief update by a key member of the Cotton Incorporated staff.

The marketing outlook for 1978 also will be discussed.

There will be ample time for questions and discussion, and producers are encouraged to bring their wives, Limer said. He said the wives will be especially interested in parts of the film dealing with textile and product development.

The annual report meeting will give producers a firsthand look at what Cotton Incorporated is doing for them in production, textile and economic research, Limer said. It also will show the marketing, merchandising and advertising efforts carried out by the company on the behalf of the producer.

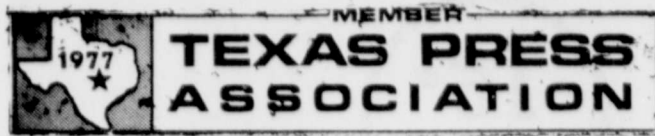

The homemakers who provide services are local residents, trained and supervised in performing the in-home care duties. They participate in a paraprofessional training program covering a variety of topics on aging, including physiology and psychology of aging, personal care, Red Cross first aid, nutrition related to elderly needs, consumer education, safety in the home, and sources of assistance for disabled and older persons. This enables the homemaker to expand educational and employment opportunities, and provide a beneficial service in their own community.

They used 51% minced croaker and king mackerel fish mixed with 49% fatty pork trimmings. They served the fish sausage links to 45 housewives at the Calhoun County Sea Fair. The ladies like the fish sausage and indicated they would buy it if it became available on the market. The next batch the agents prepare they will change the ratio to 60% fish and 40% fatty pork. The


51-49 ratio made the product a little too greasy. The fish used are abundant in the Gulf of Mexico off the Texas coast, and both, the croaker and king mackerel, usually are thrown away after being caught.

N&C--The 1978-1979 edition of the TEXAS ALMANAC produced by the A. H. Belo Corporation, parent company of The Dallas Morning News, is being distributed.
