LITTLE DRIBBLERS BASKETBALL SEASON FOR 1978 BEGINS

Abernathy's Little Dribbler Board of Directors have decided on several changes for the 1978 basketball season.

Numerous towns have dropped out of the Levelland Little Dribbler Association and have formed their own leagues. Abernathy joined the West Texas Junior Basketball League along with Brownfield, Crosbyton, Lockney, Idalou, Seagraves, and New Deal. Each town has two representatives on that board of directors.

The rules to be followed in the Junior Basketball League will be strictly UIL rules, which will help our young people greatly when they begin scholastic basketball play. The only deviations from UIL rules will be: (1) full court press will be allowed only in the 4th quarter and overtime play and (2) the junior players will use the small ball and 8'6" goals. Each town is to use their own discretion in setting up their respective leagues. There will be only a Junior League (ages 9 & 10) and a Major League (ages 11 & 12) eligibility to be determined by the child's age on August 31, 1978. Abernathy will not sponsor a Senior League (7th & 8th graders) because of conflicts with school interests and activities.

There are several reasons why Abernathy decided to change from the Levelland Little Dribblers Association. The price increased from \$40.00 per league to \$100.00 for both boys and girls. Levelland has so many diversions from UIL rules that it is a deterrent to the children to play under changing rules, when they

will follow UIL rules in school play.

Tournaments will be held at the end of each basketball session among the above mentioned towns. Each league will have up to a ten member All Star team, but there will be no compulsory play. The host town will be drawn from a hat and will furnish ten trophies for first place and ten trophies for second place at an approximate cost of \$5.00 each. The tournament will be double elimination until the final game. Tentative dates for the 1978 tournaments are March 30, 31, and April 1 for the boys and May 11, 12, and 13 for the girls.

Birth certificates will be required plus a \$10.00 entry fee for a child to participate in our basketball program.

This new set-up will be on a trial basis for this year, and your participation and cooperation are greatly encouraged.

FARMER'S TAX DEADLINE IS MARCH 15

COLLEGE STATION. --- While most taxpayers have until Apr. 15 (actually Apr. 17) to file their 1977 income tax returns, the filing date for farmers and ranchers is much sooner.

"Agricultural producers who did not file an estimate of their income by Jan. 16 and did not pay the estimated taxes must file their tax returns and pay due taxes by Mar. 1," points out Dr. Richard Trimble, economist in management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "However, if farmers filed an estimate, they have until the Apr. 17 deadline to file final returns."

Trimble notes that several changes were made in the income tax law during 1977 which should be of interest to Texas farmers and ranchers.

A major change was the elimination of the standard deduction and the low income allowance. These two items have been replaced by a flat amount called "zero bracket amount." This amount depends on your filing status.

"The zero bracket amount is not a separate deduction, but the equivalent amount is built into the new simplified tax tables and tax rate schedules," explains the economist. "This is true if you file the 1040 A or 1040 income tax forms. However, a person who chooses to use the 1040 form and itemize deductions will need to make an adjustment if his itemized deductions exceed the amount allowed for his part- (Con't. on Page 2)

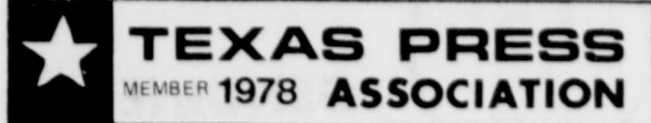

ular filing status." Another change is that the deduction of \$750 for each exemption and the general credit have been built into the new tax tables, so there is no need for the taxpayer to determine these. The general tax credit has also been revised to consider exemptions for age and blindness, adds Trimble. Filing requirements have also been changed for the 1977 tax year. For example, an individual must file a return if his gross income is \$2,930 or more and a

married couple under 65 years of age must file if their joint gross income is more than \$4,700. If both are 65 or older, they may make \$6,200 before being required to file a return. There are many other minor changes, and Trimble suggests several publications that may be of help. One is publication No. 17, "Your Federal Income Tax," 1978 edition, from the Internal Revenue Service. Another, publication No. 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," 1978 edition, is also available from the IRS or from any county Extension office.

NEC---Feb. 12, Abraham Lincoln's Birthday, and the

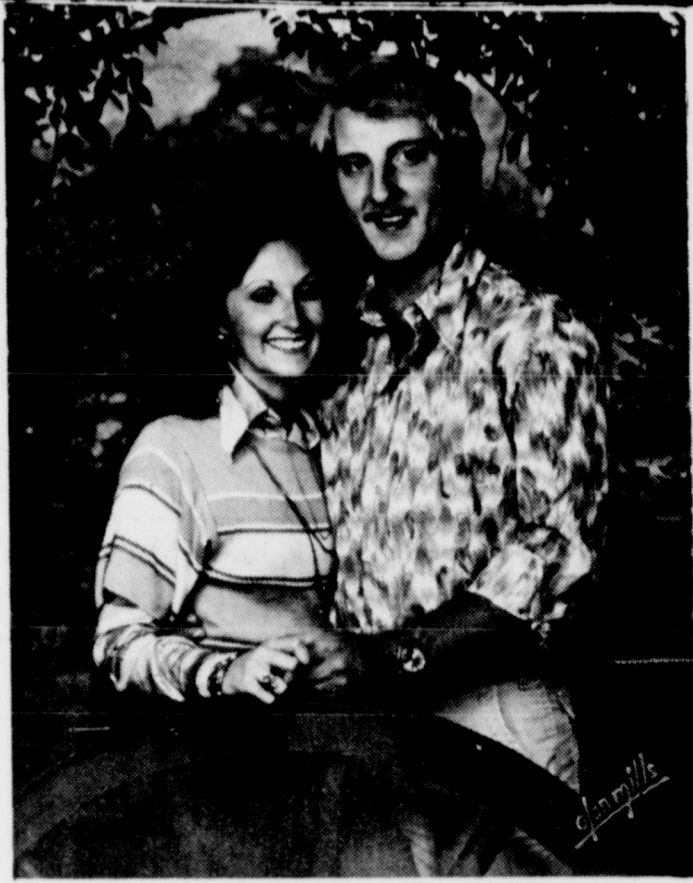

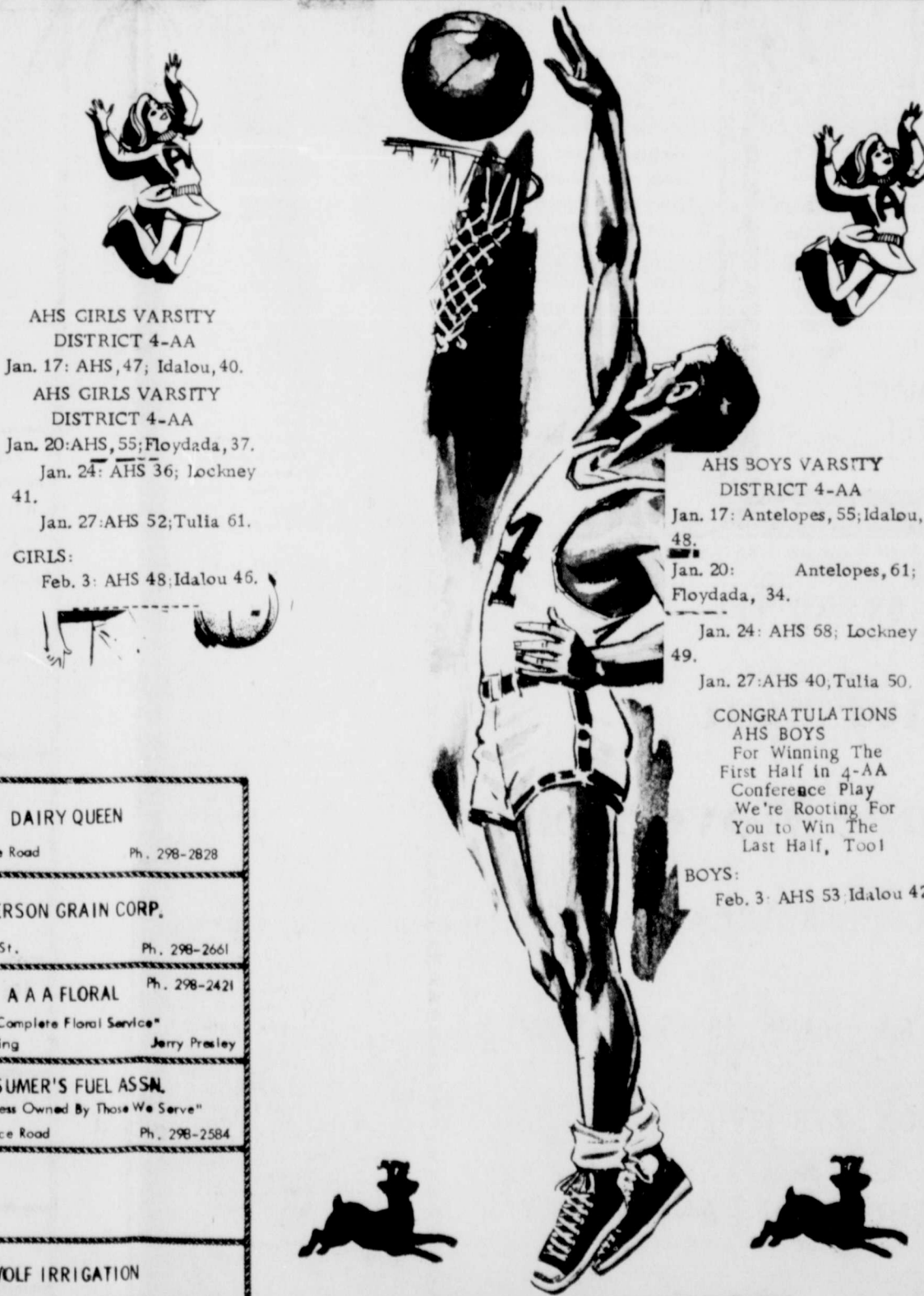

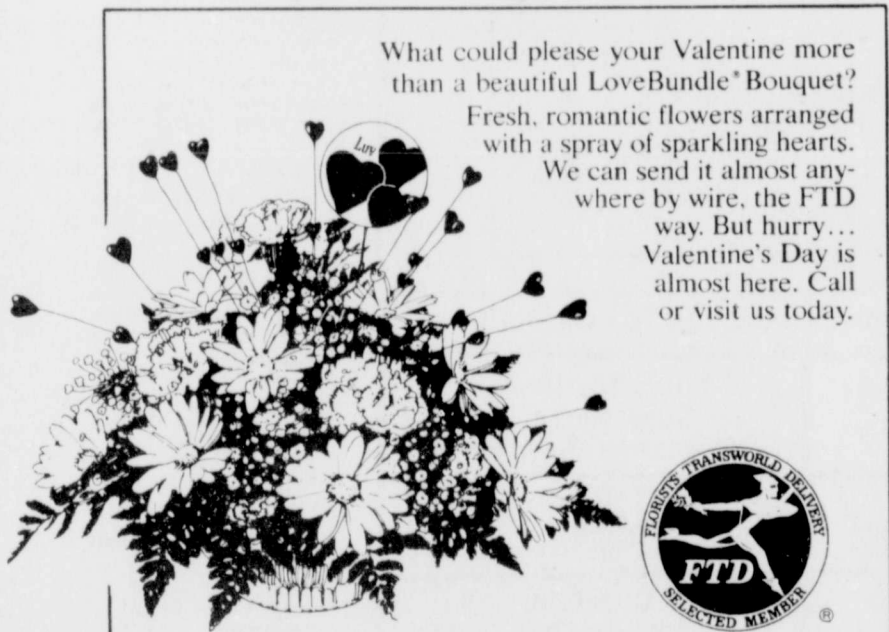

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the City Council of the City of Abernathy, Texas, will convene at its regular meeting place in the City Hall of Abernathy, Texas, at 1:00 o'clock, P. M., on the 17th day of February, 1978, to pass such ordinance and take such action as may be deemed necessary to authorize the issuance of revenue bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$275,000, for the purpose of providing funds for making improvements and extensions to the City's Waterworks System.
