NGC-Several months ago, a pack of dogs killed a 5 or 6-year-old boy in the yard of his home in Huntsville, Utah. If that ever happens, and well it could, in Abernathy, someone, or some combination of persons, in the local city government will be to blame for the death. Spring is coming, and with warm weather, children will be playing out-of-doors, walking to school and bicycling. NOW is the time for the Mayor, City Councilmen and City Manager to follow the law on the city ordinance books and protect the people of this town, and those who come to Abernathy to shop, from stray dogs. Reports said that last week, dogs strayed from a home across the street from an Abernathy supermarket and chased a woman back to her car when she got out to go in the store. That reminds me of an incident years ago when Mrs. J. L. Miller, Jr., found herself suddenly surrounded by a pack of fighting dogs while walking down Main Street in Abernathy. That incident and the recent one make a poor way for Abernathy to welcome shoppers to town. Also coming with Spring will be people walking and bicycling for health's sake, under doctor's orders. They certainly do not need additional problems of being chased by barking, biting dogs. City officials and employees, admittedly, do have a problem in enforcing the dog ordinance. They run into the "Kick My Kid, Insult My Wife, But Do Not Touch My Dog" syndrome when they start gathering roaming dogs... dogs that ARE NOT kept on a leash or within an enclosure, such as a yard fence. NOW, before some child is killed or critically injured or disfigured for life by a vicious dog or dogs running in a pack, is the time for action. If the six men who make up the City Council believe that strict enforcement of the dog ordinance will hurt their business, I suggest that they resign their elected positions. This also applies to the men whose names will be on the city ballot for the April 1st election. If you think total enforcement will hurt you, now is the time to have your names withdrawn from the ballot. If the City Council discharges its responsibility and demands that city employees enforce the dog law and they fail to do so they should be fired. This total enforcement should be directed at ALL dogs not kept on a leash or within an enclosure... the registered, or subject to register, dogs and the scruffy, mix-breed mutts. In case you think these words are too strong, it's better that they be written NOW than to wait until after some child is killed by a pack of stray dogs. (After I had written the above, and submitted it to my boss for approval or disapproval, Billie Rantz, our co-worker, came in with the information that Chief of Police Clyde Vandygrieff already had started action on

the hounds in the supermarket incident. The City Council should stand behind city employees in their enforcement... regardless of the dog owners involved. Vandygrieff indicated his desire to have the Council re-write the ordinance, bringing it up to date and allowing penalties against dog owners that would bring about compliance. Abernathy's original dog ordinance exempted farmers' dogs that followed them to town behind wagons or buggys. Police should not have to be involved in the gathering-up of stray dogs. Other personnel should be provided for that task. Police involvement should be held to talking to offenders to seek their compliance in keeping their dogs on a leash or in a fenced yard. Fences should be repaired by the dog owner to keep them from getting out and being picked up. The police pull their shifts, but are on call even when they are off duty. They already have enough to do in their designated line of responsibility.)

In other action, the board voted not to use the demerit system of discipline at this time. They did approve the exemption plan for high school students that will be on a trial basis for the third quarter of this school year. Bills for the previous month were approved as presented. Accepted without action were tax collection report, enrollment report and the luncheon report. Oral reports given included: superintendents report on the American Association of School Administrators Convention and the proposed school board members National Convention. The next meeting has been set for March 14th at 6:00 p. m. at which time, plans for the vocational building will be presented by Mr. Herbert Brasher, Architect. At this meeting, the school board will review and edit the new school policies that are being localized by the Texas Association of School Boards legal counsel. 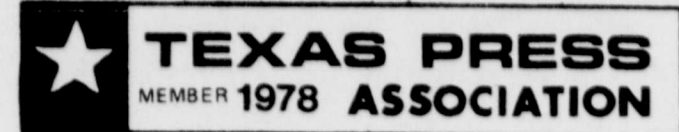

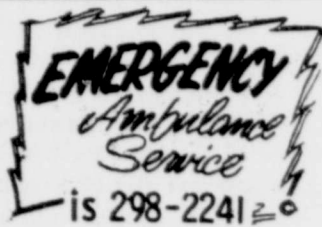

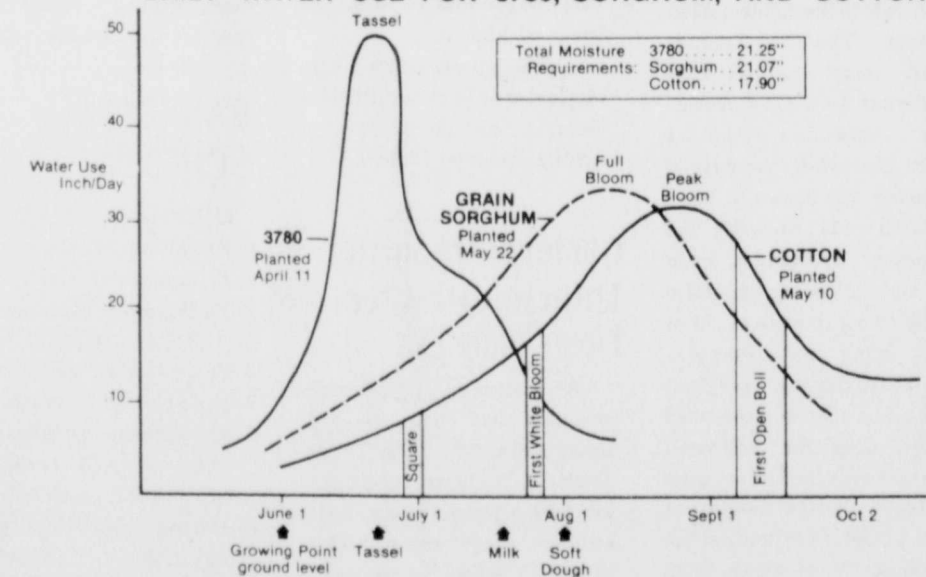

The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at Abernathy City Hall within the boundaries of the above named school district and said place of absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official state holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on each day for said absentee voting.
5. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as near as may be, by the Election Code of this State, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.
6. The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall forthwith issue a notice of said election by posting copies of this order at three different places within the boundaries of said school district, which posting shall be done not less than 20 days prior to the date for said election.
