Second Primary Voting Set June 3

The Second Democratic Primary Election Run-off voting will be staged at the following places Saturday, June 3, from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m.: For Hale County, Abernathy City Hall and Lakeview Methodist Church; for Lubbock County, Joe Thompson Implement Co. in Abernathy and at New Deal Clubhouse and New Deal School, and at Becton Gin office.

Voting also will take place June 3, in the Republican Primary Run-Off Election. Republican leaders have not reported to the Review the locations of polling places in Hale and Lubbock Counties. Republicans have a very important run-off between Jim Reese of Odessa and George Bush, Jr., of Midland for the Republican nomination for the U. S. House of Representatives, 19th Texas District, the seat being vacated by George H. Mahon, who will retire at the end of his current term, Dec. 31, 1978. The Democrats selected their nominee for Mahon's post in voting May 6. He is Kent Hance of Lubbock, who will meet the Republican nominee in the Nov. 7 General Election.

HOME HEALTH AGENCY OFFERS NEW SERVICE TO CLIENTS

Clients using home health care services often need skilled nursing service by an LVN or RN, but they are ineligible for home health visits because their skilled nursing needs do not meet the Medicare guidelines for "skilled care".

Seeing this special need, the MBFA Foundation, which has delivered home health care in Texas since 1969, now announces a new service to these special clients.

Now those persons who require less than skilled care under the Medicare guidelines, or those who require the skills of a licensed professional (vocational) or registered nurse, but cannot afford to pay the regular charge and have no insurance covering these services, are eligible through the Texas Home-Maker Service, a division of MBFA Foundation.

An example of this type of service would be the client who needs a B-12 or other type of vitamin injection, as has been ordered by an attending physician, and has no Medicare, Medicaid, Veterans or private insurance of any kind and cannot afford to pay the normal charge. Now this patient can have the visits of an LVN or RN in the home at a beneficial rate based on one's individual financial status.

This service also will benefit the patient who has been on the home health service under Medicare, or some other type of insurance

coverage, and has depleted this coverage, but is still in need of skilled nursing service. Now the client can pay a beneficial rate and remain on the service under this new system through MBFA's Texas Homemaker Service.

The service should not be confused with regular homemaker service. This is still skilled nursing care given by an LVN or RN, but just does not meet the Medicare guidelines. The client must be under the care of a physician who will order this service for the patient.

You may discuss this with your physician or you may call the West Texas Home Health Agency for more information. The phone number to call is 747-2814 in Lubbock or in the Abernathy area, Irene Hogan LVN, at Lubbock 795-4128 will be able to answer any questions you or your physician may have regarding this new service.

West Texas Home Health indicates that this new service will provide another alternative to their clients toward better and more complete medical care available in the clients' homes. She adds, "MBFA Foundation's motto is a 'Vision With A Task', and this task is continually being accomplished and the vision is becoming a reality to those the Foundation is privileged to serve."

August 1 Deadline For Booster Club Scholarship

It is time for the Antelope Booster Club to take applications to select a recipient of the Fall (1978) semester scholarship. General Provisions for receiving the scholarship are as follows:

- (1) The recipient shall be of good moral character and shall obey laws.
- (2) Recipient must be a full-time student (registered for a minimum of 12 semester hours) in an accredited college or university.
- (3) Recipient shall show qualities of academic proficiency in keeping with college education requirements.
- (4) It shall be the responsibility of the recipient to request that copies of his or her grades be sent from the office of the registrar to the President of the Abernathy Boosters Club. Such information shall be passed on to the Scholarship Committee.
- (5) Each approved scholarship recipient shall submit a transcript to the Scholarship Selection Committee by August 1. (For recipients desiring consideration for the fall semester) and/or December 1 (for recipients desiring consideration for spring semester.)
- (6) Consideration for scholarship and scholarships awarded shall be based upon need.
- (7) Recipient must have previously completed three (3) semesters of approved college or university work satisfactory before a scholarship can be awarded. Application forms may be obtained at Don's Chevrolet or from Ann McCune at the high school A. C., or by mail 1215-14th St.
- (8) Those having made application previously must update their form with additional grades and other information necessary.

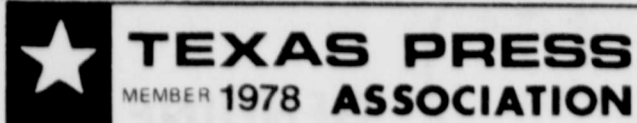
The Review Needs You To Help Us With News

NGC--Democratic voters in Lubbock County will choose between E. L. Short of Tahoka and Don Workman of Lubbock for the office of State Senator from the 28th District. Lubbock County Precinct Four voters in Abernathy and New Deal School voting box will choose between J. B. McAuley and Dardenelle (Dardie) Williamson in the June 3 Democratic run-off for Justice of the Peace office, Precinct 4. Both are Shallowater residents.

NGC--Hale and Lubbock County Republican leaders make no effort to provide The Review with information of locations of their polling places. We have heard a rumor that there is a Republican voting place in New Deal... but, where in New Deal? In the May 6 Primary, an Abernathy man who resides in Hale County called to see if I knew where he could vote in the Republican election in Hale. We haven't even heard so much as a rumor where Republicans can vote in Hale County.

NGC--Hale and Lubbock Republicans have an important run-off coming up June 3. Jim Reese of Odessa and George Bush, Jr., of Midland are seeking the Republican nomination for the office being vacated this year by Democrat Congressman George H. Mahon. The Democrats have their nominee for that office in the November 7th General Election. He is Kent Hance of Lubbock, who won the May 6th Primary election.

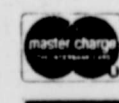

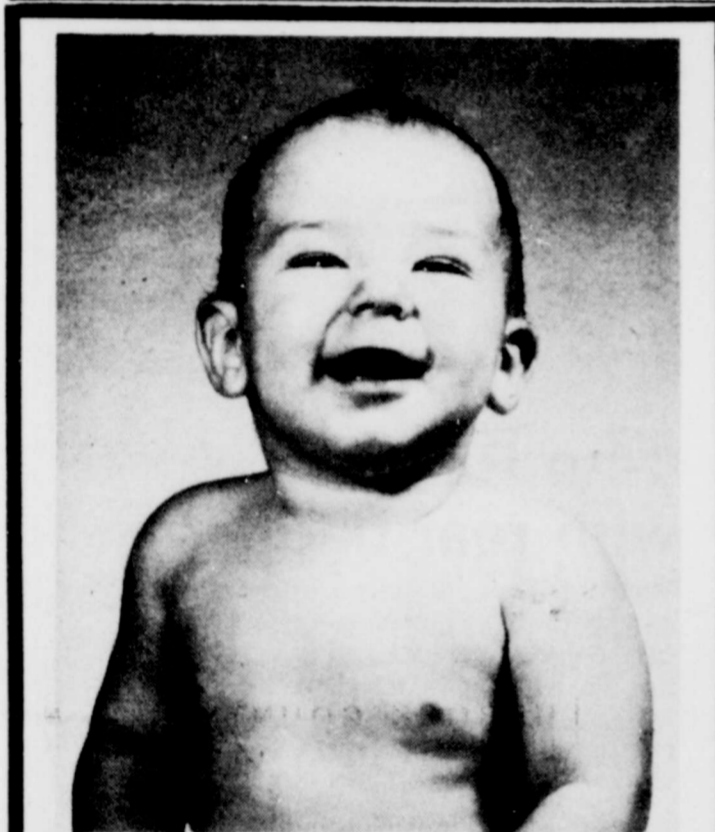

Fast-Acting Member Saves Life Of Man Choking On Meat While Having Lunch

BELLEVILLE, Ill. --Mrs. Elsie Worms, a 62-year-old AARP member, was having lunch when she spotted the emergency.

John Barnes, seated across the table, was choking on a piece of meat. "He started turning red, and I thought he was just coughing," said Mrs. Worms. "Then he turned blue and slumped over in his chair."

Mrs. Worms jumped out of her chair and used her expertise in the Heimlich maneuver to save his life. The Heimlich method involves standing in back of a choking victim, applying pressure by grabbing the victim's abdomen to force air out of the lungs, thus dislodging trapped food particles.

Mrs. Worms, who learned the rescue method in 1969, applied pressure to Barnes' stomach for 10 minutes. "I knew what I had to do-I just kept hugging him and finally a piece of meat popped out of his throat," she said.

She has also been trained to administer mouth-to-mouth and cardiopulmonary resuscitation, methods she used to

keep her husband alive for 45 minutes when he was having a heart attack. Her efforts, however, were futile and he died later in a hospital.

After rescuing Barnes, she said "he thanked me, relaxed, and then we played bingo."

Two women receive first distinguished alumni award

Two former Plainview area women, Mrs. Billie Harral Hines and Mrs. Gilbert (Ann Walker) Brown, were named recipients of the first Distinguished Alumni Awards ever given by Wayland Baptist College.

The awards were presented during spring commencement ceremonies in Harral Memorial Auditorium which was made possible several years ago by contributions from Mrs. Hines.

A 1924 Wayland graduate, Mrs. Hines of Phoenix, was born near Altus, Okla., and came to the Texas Panhandle plains in her youth. After graduating from Wayland, then a junior college, she went to Mary Hardin-Baylor College for the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Expression in 1926. She returned to Abernathy. They managed expanding ranching interests in Colorado, the Texas Panhandle, and in Hale County until the death of her husband in 1961. When their son, Jack, who also attended Wayland met an untimely death in 1964, she chose to memorialize her husband and son by investing in Wayland.

In 1927, she married a Wayland classmate, John L. Harral, a rancher-farmer and they made their home in Abernathy. They managed expanding ranching interests in Colorado, the Texas Panhandle, and in Hale County until the death of her husband in 1961. When their son, Jack, who also attended Wayland met an untimely death in 1964, she chose to memorialize her husband and son by investing in Wayland.

SHE RESERVED the proposed Fine Arts Complex as her own project. As a result, Harral Auditorium was completed in 1968 with the pipe organ added a year

later. A music wing was completed in 1973, and this year, the speech and art wing will be completed.

Wayland president, Dr. Roy C. McClung said, "She has invested \$1.25 million dollars for the enhancement of the Christian potential in youth in Wayland Baptist College."

Born near Plainview, Mrs. Brown has been associated with this city and Wayland all her life. She married Gilbert Brown in the early 30's and they began the management program of farming and ranching that has provided the basis for noble benevolences far and wide, added McClung.

"SHE HAS BEEN youth-oriented from her own youth. Serving in the College Heights Baptist Church in Plainview for many years, she has taught and ministered to high school and college students through the years. Many young preachers and others preparing for religious vocations have enjoyed the hospitality of her home, her diningroom table, and her sympathetic encouragement," he explained. "Ambition and desire to serve mankind have always motivated her to stretch her own strength day by day. In her adulthood, she enrolled in Wayland Baptist College to study and to get a college degree along with her older son in 1961. A gifted mind and strong self-discipline made her an outstanding student."

She moved to Canyon in 1964, where she continued study at West Texas State University, became a teacher on that

faculty in English and psychology, and distinguished herself by serving as the first Director of the University Counseling Service Center. "Her work in her church, her services as a college teacher, her counseling services privately and then her professional service in a medical clinic in

Amarillo, have marked her as an outstanding Christian teacher, counselor, and a friend," he said.

Following commencement activities, a \$120,000 Brown Memorial Chapel was formally dedicated. It was made possible by Mrs. Brown and her husband, Gilbert.

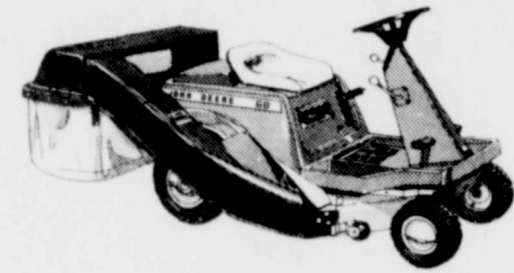
