Abernathy Riding Club will open the chutes on their 6th Little Britches Rodeo, Friday and Saturday, July 14 and 15. Grand entry will begin at 6:30 p. m. each night. Admission gate will open at 5:00 p. m. Tickets will be \$2.00 for adults and \$1.00 for 12 yrs. and under and can be obtained at the gate only. Programs will also be sold and are in honor of the Club's "Empty Saddles".

Little Britches Rodeo contestants range in ages of Pee Wees, 11 and under; Juniors, 12 thru 14; and Seniors, 15 thru 17. Open roping for 19 and under in team roping and tie-down calf roping.

Events for the rodeo are bare back, calf and bull riding, goat ribbon race, ribbon roping, steer daubing, break-away roping and goat tying with these events limited to 20 contestants each. Barrel racing, pole bending and flag racing are open in all age groups.

BOARD APPROVES NEW TEACHERS

New teachers employed at the June 29th meeting of the Abernathy Board of Education were Cheryl Saneibrian, Speech Therapist; and Linda Semetko, Junior High English. They will replace Marty Kinard and Sherita Norris, whose resignations were accepted along with Dee Ann Salehi, Honda Special Education Teacher.

Other action items included the purchase of storm windows for both the elementary and intermediate buildings. These should reduce heat and cooling loss by 40% at window openings, and will offer better resistance to wind storms.

Bids were examined for a tractor mower and Thompson Implement was awarded the contract on the basis of his low bid of \$4,675. The tractor will be delivered in approximately two weeks.

August 28th was set as the official budget hearing date with the board to have a preliminary report on August 7th.

Other action items included approval of the bills and granting permission for Greg Gibbs to complete his graduation requirements through the Southern Association of Schools in San Salvador and approved. Texas Education Agency correspondence courses.

Reports on which no action was taken includes Budget Progress; Tax Collection, now 97.01% completed; Revised Point System for Bus Drivers; Building Progress, utilities and heating improvement costs, and Athletic Coach-Player Ratio.

Meeting Place Has Heavy Bookings

Abernathy City Council discussed the town's facilities for meetings at a special meeting June 29. The community meeting room at City Hall is booked almost every week-day night so increasing numbers of clubs, parties, and other gatherings must use the fire department's meeting room. This often conflicts with fire department activities.

Council members decided to meet with Abernathy School Board to see if school facilities can be used for community gatherings. They also reviewed and voted to keep in effect present rules governing use of the fire department meeting room.

The rules state that the room may be used by community organization if no other facilities are available and no fire department meetings are scheduled. Request for use must be made two weeks in advance. Activities involving children under 12 are prohibited unless sponsored by the fire department. Persons wanting the room for private parties will be charged \$20. Users must not alter the room, must pay for any damages, and must clean it and leave everything in proper place.

City Manager Larry Fields said most people don't realize how much the city hall meeting room is used. For example, in June, it was booked 20 times by 12 different organizations. It is already reserved 21 times for the month of July by 12 different organizations.

Center-Street Barriers Set

Street dividers have been installed in the middle of Main Street from Avenue C west to Avenue D. Purpose of the center barriers is to keep motorists who are driving east from making a left turn into parking spaces on the north side of Main, and keeping motorists driving west on Main from making a left turn into parking spaces on the south side of Main. This "country town" driving practice has caused a number of fender-bendings. Those drivers backing out of parking places on Main will have to be very careful now that the center-street barriers will allow less room for on-coming vehicles to dodge the backing-out vehicle. In most cases, the backing-out driver will be at fault.

MUSICAL GROUP PLEASES CROWD AT FOURTH OF JULY CONCERT

One hundred fifty to 200 Abernathy residents attended the Travis Thornton Group concert at Abernathy Schools auditorium Monday night, July 3. Even members of audience better described as fans of the Snodgrass family than country western fans, quickly became enthusiastic fans of the Travis Thornton Group of which Kent Snodgrass, son of Mr. and Mrs. Y. F. Snodgrass, is a member.

The group gave a relaxed but expert performance on a stage filled with instruments and sound equipment. Thornton sang a varied program of old favorites, new pop western songs, and several written by Keith Longbotham, lead guitarist, who also does the group's arranging. Cheers and applause accompanied many of the lively numbers. Several more serious ones left the audience spellbound, including Shenandoah, an instrumental piece featuring

Snodgrass on harmonica.

Members of the group Danny White who plays bass guitar; Rex Mauney, piano; Paul Newberry, banjo; Keith Longbotham, lead guitar; Danny Brumley, drums; Kent Snodgrass, harmonica; and Travis Thornton, singer and harmonica. The instrumentalists also sing harmony background for Thornton.

The group has been together only six or eight months but is polished and professional. They attract standing room only crowds in Plainview, recently made a recording, and are becoming popular around the area.

Thornton is a carpenter and a Plainview native. Longbotham is music and youth director of the First Baptist Church of Crosbyton and a salesman at Gabriel's in Plainview. Mauney, White, and Newberry are music majors at Wayland. Snodgrass teaches fifth grade in Plainview schools.

RECORD CROWDS TURN OUT TO ENJOY FOURTH OF JULY ENTERTAINMENT

Abernathy's Fourth of July festivities began with a 6:45 AM air show--not military jets but the spray plane specially arranged for by the city so mosquito swatting would not be part of the day's activities.

A good size crowd gathered for the 9 AM Turtle Race managed by Burl Hubbard. The downtown area was crowded long before parade time. Abernathy High School band members and former members led the parade which included several floats, two riding clubs, church youth groups, ball teams, Scouts, mule teams, pony carts, a golf cart, miniature cars, antique cars, Thunderbird automobiles, Cavalry riders, and a hay loader.

Laurin Prather announced and described each parade entry as it came by. The clowns (Pat Dodson and Kathleen Parks) ambled along for the eighth or ninth year handing out treats for kids.

A Cub Scout honor guard raised the flag in a patriotic ceremony in front of City Hall. The band, directed by George Riddell, played the National Anthem and Prather led the crowd in the pledge to the flag.

Fun events, contests of skill, and a cake and pie auction took up the rest of the morning. The contests involved such difficulties as catching raw eggs thrown half the length of the city hall/post office parking lot, playing baseball with water balloons, staying on skateboards, and off jump ropes. An art exhibit, bingo game, and refreshment stands continued most of the day.

After a barbeque lunch, the crowd gathered at Abernathy Fire Station for an afternoon of fiddle music. Thirteen musicians entered the Old Fiddlers Contest. Only one, Emmitt Scroggins, lives in Abernathy. The youngest was nine year old Tracy Walker from Vega.

The fiddlers were accompanied by volunteer musicians on other instruments including Bonnie Workman of Aspermont on bass fiddle, who is a Fourth of July favorite here. She played several requests from the audience on her smaller fiddle at the end of the contest.

The Over The Hill Bluegrass Gang took over for the rest of the afternoon, playing for the fun of it. Members of the Gang were contestants

and accompanists during the contest. The group featured James Attebury of New Deal, Clifton Martin of Wolforth, Bill and Clovis Brannum of Lubbock, Bob Suggs of Brownfield and Solon Wilkins of Abernathy. Dancing exhibitions by O. C. Kelley of Abernathy highlighted the afternoon entertainment.

Crowell Aviation Awarded Bid For Airport Operation

At a special meeting, Thursday, June 29, Abernathy City Council awarded a bid of \$7,500 to Crowell Aviation for operation of Abernathy Municipal Airport for the next five years. Crowell will be responsible for airport maintenance; sale of aviation fuel; aircraft maintenance, repair, sales, and rental parts sales; and flight instruction in the future if needed.

Max Crowell, an aviation mechanic, lives in Lubbock but has conducted limited operations at Abernathy's airport for almost a year. He plans to move a mobile home to the airport for living quarters. Buck Meinzer formerly leased and operated the airport.

Abernathy City Manager Larry Fields said the city is considering several improvements to airport facilities including installation of public restrooms, a pilot's lounge with vending machines, a rotating beacon and runway lights, and work on runways.

Fields said a surprising number of people who do business with Abernathy companies fly into Lubbock and drive out here from Lubbock International. They would fly into Abernathy Municipal instead if fuel and other facilities were available. The city plans to conduct a study to assess the need for 24 hour airport operations.

Abernathy Municipal Airport is located east of town beside Abernathy Country Club. It belongs to the city but the city leases to a "fixed base operator" the buildings and rights to improvements, concessions, and office space. Anyone else can conduct business at the airport with the permission of the city council.

Abernathy's airport is one of the best small town airports in the area and a favorite with practicing pilots.

Boy, 9, Dies After Tree Rope Mishap

A 9-year-old Idalou boy died Thursday night at Lubbock's Methodist Hospital after he apparently hanged himself while playing.

Bradley Joe Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ricky Smith, was playing in a tree near the family's home 1/2 miles north of Heckville when he fell from the tree and became tangled in a rope, according to sheriff's office reports.

Two Slaton men, B. C. Morton and R. O. Moore, were driving along FM 400 about 5:40 p. m. when they saw the youngster hanging from the tree. A thin rope was looped under one of the child's arms and over his other shoulder, the two men told the deputy.

The rope was tangled in the branches but a sheriff's deputy said it was unclear whether the rope had been tied to the tree.

After Morton and Moore cut the child loose, two unidentified men stopped and administered artificial respiration to the youngster and revived him.

Despite the efforts of the two men, however, the youngster was dead about 6:30 p. m. on arrival at Methodist Hospital.

The only witness to the incident was the boy's five-year-old sister who, reports indicate, was playing on the ground.

Abernathy's EMS ambulance took the victim to the hospital in Lubbock.

Last rites for Bradley Joe Smith, 9, of the Becton-Heckville area were conducted at 10 a. m. Saturday in Abernathy Church of Christ with Condy Billingsley, minister of the church, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. Murray Brewer, Lubbock Baptist minister.

Burial was in Abernathy Cemetery under direction of Chambers Funeral Home. The boy was dead on arrival at 6:30 p. m. Thursday at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock after he apparently hanged himself while playing. He was playing in a tree near the family home when he fell and became tangled in a rope, according to sheriff's office reports.

He was born in Abernathy and was a student at Idalou Elementary School. He attended Abernathy Church of Christ.

Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ricky Smith; sister, Darla, of the home; a paternal grandmother, Leona Willingham of Lubbock and a maternal great grandmother, Mrs. T. U. Hunt of Lubbock.

Bradley Joe was the nephew of Mrs. Gene Stephens, and was a great-nephew of Mrs. Lavail Bishop Lacy, both of Abernathy.

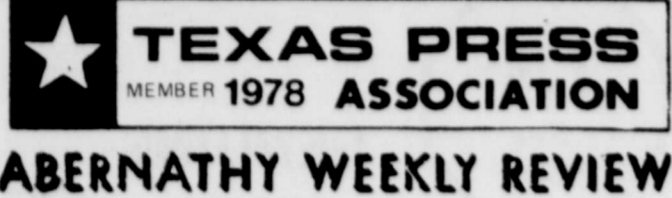

WATER IMPROVEMENT PROJECT REACHES HALFWAY MARK

The City of Abernathy is halfway through a \$671,000 water improvement project. Target date for completion is February 1979. The project was planned to meet demand on Abernathy's water system for the next nine years including allowances for the town's growth.

The project involves a new 200,000 gallon storage tank, distribution lines to tie it into the watersystem, the necessary controls, drilling a new water well, conversion of an existing well recently purchased by the city, and installing 20,660 feet of 12 inch supply line to tie in the two new wells.

Financing for the project came from three sources. The city financed \$150,000 through first lien revenue bonds; the Farmers Home Administration granted \$246,000; the Texas Water Division Board financed \$275,000 through second lien bonds.

NGC--Have a relative or a friend take you to the airport if you are flying out of Lubbock International. Parking space is hard to find. The new terminal has been in operation almost two and one-half years and boardings have increased beyond the projected figure when the facility opened. For the first five months of this year, 180,000 passengers have boarded planes at Lubbock International Airport. This figure represents a 70 percent increase over the first five months of 1977. Director of Aviation Marvin Coffee is moving on the parking problem, but it will be a few months before the situation begins to loosen. Included in parking facility plans is a two-level, 670-car capacity structure that should be ready sometime in 1979. Also, more ground level parking is to be made available to customers when employee parking is moved to another site.

NGC--If CBS News thought it had a scoop on the July 2 presentation, it is way behind the times. One feature on the evening news showed customers picking their purchases of fruit and vegetables on the growers' places. That's old hat in this area. For years, we've been picking vegetables in the fields of L. L. Ray, Rt. 1, Hale Center. Info for others who have been doing that, too: This year, the check-in, check-out place has been changed to the house about one-half mile west of the Rays' home where this has been done in the past. A daughter-in-law of the Rays will have charge of the operation in the new location... a half-mile west. The Rays' vegetable farm is north and west of Hale Center, or north and east of Mayfield. Also, peach customers in orchards west of Seminole have for years picked the fruit they bought.

Mrs. Spies was the youngest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James E. Fitzgerald of the Lakeview Community.

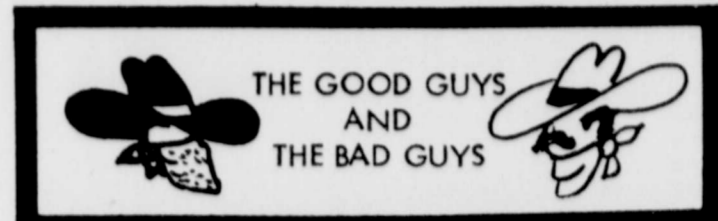
