DPS Operation Hits Truckers On Violations

Texas Department of Public Safety conducted a 72 hour road check north of Abernathy June 26 through June 28. More than 380 trucks received citations for violating weight, license, and equipment regulations. An enormous number of other trucks were stopped, weighed, inspected, and allowed to leave because they met DPS standards. The standards are set up to protect travelers, save lives, and reduce road damage.

DPS officers and troopers from Muleshoe, Littlefield, Plainview, Amarillo, and Lubbock assisted local troopers in the check which began at 12:01 AM June 26, and ended at 11:59 PM June 28. Major Bell of the DPS ran the operation. He works directly under DPS Chief Col. Wilson Spear.

Headquarters for the check was Justice of the Peace Jeanne Marr's office north of Abernathy at the Tuo Cio, Abernathy Gin, Struve Implement Co. intersection. Her office will handle the pleas of truckers and companies found to be in violation of standards during the check. Those who call in to plead guilty will pay a fine. Those who plead not guilty must go through her court.

Many states have ports of entry all around their borders. All trucks must stop at these ports to be checked before entering the state. Texas has no ports of entry and many truckers take advantage of the situation. Only periodic special checks like the one in June show how many try to get away with overloads and substandard equipment. Taxpayers foot the bill in road repairs.

Judge Marr pointed out in an interview that the highway department and the DPS are two different outfits. The Texas State Highway Department deals with road construction and repairs. The Department of Public Safety is responsible for law enforcement.

John Martin of Plainview will be the Installing Officer, and Vernon Bartlett, Abernathy will be the Installing Marshal.

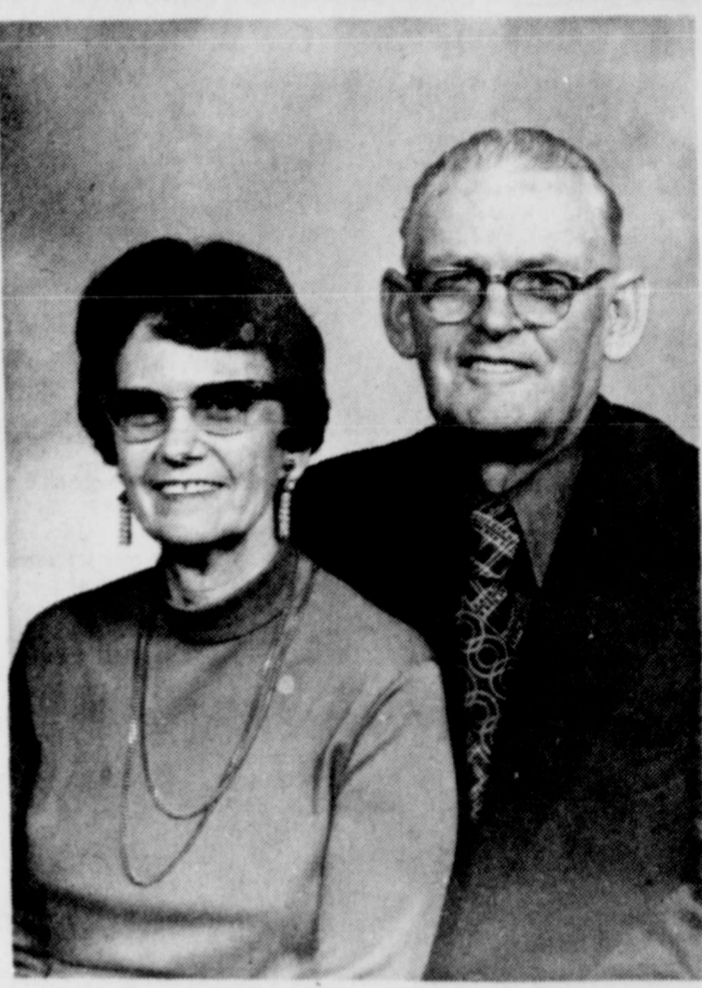

City Water Project Cost Less Than The Projected Budget

In a special meeting July 20, 1978 the City Council accepted the low bid of Panhandle Construction Co. in the amount of \$333,333.30, to construct water works improvements. The contract was awarded to the low bidder, subject to approval by the proper regulatory and funding agencies.

This bid brings the total cost of the water works improvement project to \$628,783.00. The total job had been estimated and funds available for \$671,000. The following is an itemized list of the project.

In these days of budget over-runs on major city projects, Abernathy city officials were pleasantly surprised with an under-run on the city's major water project. The project was budgeted at \$671,000.00, but the actual cost now is expected to be only \$628,783.30.

Broken down into three divisions, the budget figure is first, followed by actual cost figures: Div. One-Land Purchase, \$69,750.00, the same at \$69,750.00; Div. Two-Elevated tank, 200,000 gallon capacity, budgeted at \$173,550.00, had an actual cost of \$174,600.00, for an over-run in that division; Division Three-water supply line and well

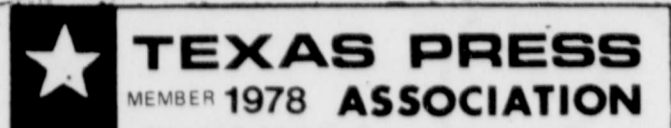

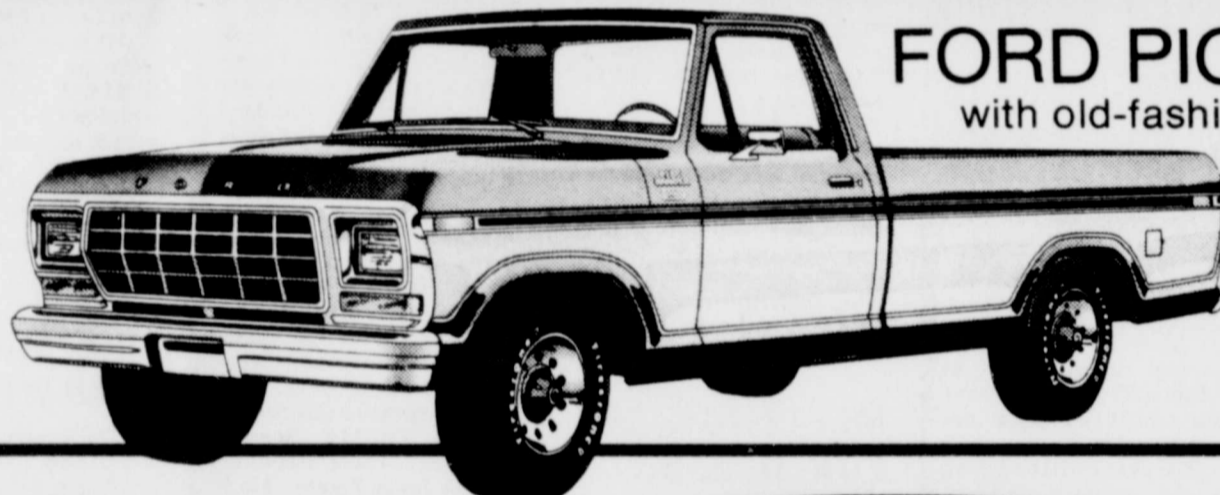

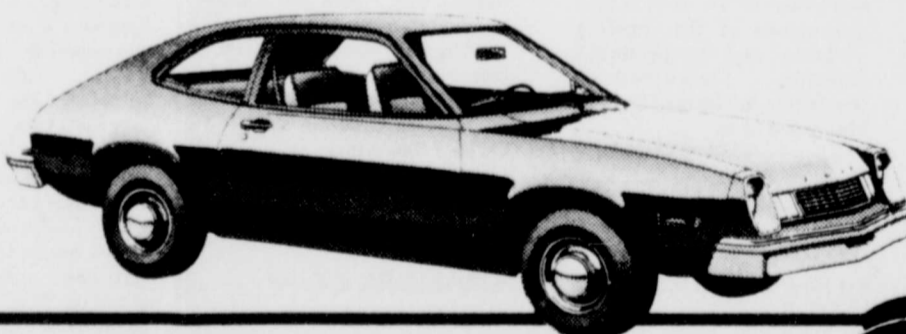

Mail Handling During Vacation

Making arrangements for holding or forwarding mail prior to leaving home for vacations can save customers a lot of misery and inconvenience. Postmaster Lambert reminded local residents today.

"An overflowing mailbox can be an open invitation to burglars," Postmaster Lambert said. "Letting mail or newspapers pile up is advertising the fact that the house or apartment will be empty unguarded."

Householders should ask a friend or neighbor to check their mailbox daily and to hold their mail until vacation's over.

Or, if they prefer, they can ask the Post Office to hold their mail for up to 30 days, or to forward it to the vacation address.

The postmaster offered these additional tips for taking some of the worry out of vacation planning: Vacationers should buy enough stamps for scenic postcards and other correspondence before they leave. They may not be conveniently near a post office later.

They should use sufficient postage -- ten cents for postcards and 15 cents for letters weighing one ounce or less. For letters weighing more than one ounce, the additional postage is 13 cents an ounce.

Mail should be deposited, when possible, at post offices or in downtown, business district collection boxes, where more frequent pickups are made.

Travelers should be very sure they have the addresses and correct ZIP Codes for persons with whom they'll be corresponding. In fact, the Postmaster says, it might be a good idea to write or type them on envelopes before leaving home, just in case. Envelopes and cards should also bear a return address.

"And please write legibly," Postmaster Lambert said.
