Report On Trip To United Nations

(By Toby Barrick) The 29th Annual United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth sponsored by the Odd Fellow and Rebekah Lodges of the United States and Canada, began for the Texas delegation with registration on Sunday afternoon, June 25, 1978, at Ennis, Texas, Lodge Hall. Supper was served by the Ennis lodges to all delegates and their families.

The chartered bus left Ennis Monday at 7:30 a. m. with 25 youths from all over Texas aboard, along with tour director, Mr Robert E. Wilson, Jr., and two assistant tour leaders, Muriel Musick and Cheryl

Every day began with a devotional led by one of the delegates, and on Sundays we also had devotions

Some of the stops we made en route were at Memphis, Tennessee, where we visited the home of Elvis Presley and the Hotel where Martin Luther King was assassinated, and at Nashville where we visited the Grand Ole Opera. We dnesday we arrived

in Washington, D. C., and spent the next two days and nights there. We really enjoyed sight-seeing in Washington, D. C., needed much, much more time than we were allotted. We toured the White House and the Capitol building. Although congress was not in session, we were allowed to enter and sit in the Galleries of the United States Congress-just to get the feel of it. Some of the other points of interest we visited were: the Washington Monument; the Lincoln Memorial; Monticello, the home of Thomas Jefferson; the Iwo Jima Statue; Arlington National Cemetery, where the Kennedy graves are located. We saw the Eternal Flame on John F. Kenne dy's grave and witness the changing of the Guards at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

We also saw a portion of the Smithsonian Institute. We really needed a lot more time here, but we did see the HOPE diamond. wow! We visited the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, where U. S. currency is printed, but they were not passing out any samples. From Washington, we went to New York.

We arrived in New York City on Sunday, July 2, and were assigned rooms at the Taft Hotel. Delegations from Colorado, New Jersey and Massachusetts were also registered at this hotel, and rooms had been assigned so that each youth would share a room with a youth from one of the delegations other than his own. In this way, we became acquainted very quickly and participated in the planned activities, as a group, for the entire week that followed.

Viewed on an emotional level, TIME TO RUN is the deeply moving drama of the conflicts that are tearing a family apart-conflicts that develop between husband and wife, and between father and son. In an attempt to find freedom from the evergrowing host-Jeff takes to the ilities, hoping to discover some meaning in his confused life.

Approached from a religious perspective, TIME TO RUN is also a story of friction between Jeff and his girlfriend, Michelle, played by Barbara Sigel, is a familiar face to television viewers. In 1968, a group of utilities representing about one-third of the generating capability in the country was formed to join General Atomic in support of the program. It, also, has had limited financial support from the federal government and

SOUTHWESTERN JOINED the industry group in 1974 when it made the offer of the plant site and the \$100-million.

Helium Breeder Associates was formed in 1976 by some of the original members of the utility group. HBA was started to serve as the organization to contract with the federal government for research and development. When it was established, it was hoped that there would be a significant increase in the federal support of the gas-cooled technology which, in turn, would develop additional utility support.

Southwestern will continue to research nuclear fusion as a charter member of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation. In the fusion process, the atoms are joined, rather than split, and the hydrogen in seawater is the fuel for making electricity.

'We will continue on our plan to use coal as our base fuel. We will, also, look at other nuclear alternatives and continue our support of the fusion program. The decision we have reluctantly made about the gascooled breeder will not, in any way, interfere with our ability to serve our customers, either now or in the future," Springer concluded.


