## Twelve Abernathy Students Attend Band School

Twelve students from the Abernathy Jr. and Sr. High Band program attended band camp at Texas Tech this summer. There were approximately 1400 students at the camp this year from Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, as well as New York, Michigan and California.

The students were offered full course of study in music including music theory, twirling and drum majoring, small ensemble training, stage band and stage band rhythms. Each student was placed in a band, by tryout, and learned instrument techniques from a specialist on his instrument. The camp offered courses which a student normally does not receive in his home band program because of time or teaching personnel factors. The camp also employs a large staff of private lesson teachers to help students on an individual basis.

In addition to a full course of study, and because many of the students live in the dormitories while attending camp, concerts, movies, dances and games are provided for the students activities at night. The facilities of the student union building are open to the students during the day. The two-week music camp is a great thing for the local band programs, and the students who attend, because it utilizes the summer time to give students a little push on their instruments, as well as fun in a wholesome atmosphere.

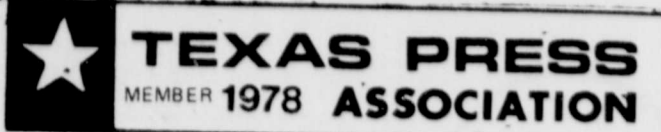
## Texas CowBelles Start Fund For Scholarships

NGC---"It's A Small World!" Department: While the Richard Havens were on their vacation trip last month, they went to a laundromat in Paducah, Kentucky. When the lady who operates the business learned that they were from Abernathy in the Lubbock area, she asked if they knew "that flying preacher" who lives in Lubbock. She was talking about Boyce Evans, a former pastor of Abernathy First Baptist Church. Boyce had conducted two revivals in the lady's church in Paducah, Ky. Also, "It's a small world": the Havens family and Mr. and Mrs. Foy Hendrix of Abernathy and their son, Randy, and family of Temple, by coincidence, drove into the same motel in Hot Springs, Ark., at about the same time, and had a visit together. The Havens stayed and the Hendrix went on to Little Rock to spend the night. Both groups of vacationers were en route to Tennessee and Kentucky.

NGC---From Austin: "Most of the 129 Texas children who died from abuse or neglect in 1977 were white boys between one and three years old," says a report from the Texas Department of Human Resources (new title of the state's welfare department). Criminal charges were filed in only 18 cases resulting in 15 convictions... covering 42,347 reports of abuse involving 90,000 children in 1977, the report said.

NGC---Air Mid West of Wichita, Kansas, announced recently that it plans to file an application with the Civil Aeronautics Board for approval to provide service from Hobbs, Carlsbad and Clovis, New Mexico, to Lubbock and Amarillo, according to John Anderson, chairman of the Hobbs Chamber of Commerce Aviation Committee. In the same application, the airline also will ask permission to service Albuquerque from the same three New Mexico cities.

NGC---This year of 1978 very well could see the election of a Republican Governor and Lt. Gov. in Texas. Bill Clements of Dallas, the Republican nominee in the Nov. 7th General Election, claims statewide, broad-based support from Democrats and Independents, as well as

Built by the late John Jones, father of Mrs. Thelma Wesley, it is the original house on what now is the Lakeview Addition.

NGC---The latest annex to the Original Town of Abernathy is the Pinson Place Addition west of the Phillips Addition. It will be developed by James D. Pope, Max Kester and Billy Smyers. The three men, all residents of Abernathy, are traffic controllers in the tower at Lubbock International Airport.

**Rodeo at Boys Ranch Sept. 3-4**

At Cal Farley's Boys Ranch, thirty-six miles northwest of Amarillo, 385 pint-sized cowboys are getting ready for their thirty-fourth annual Boys Ranch Rodeo.

Practice rides on the broncs and bulls have been going on since June with only about 150 riders expected to appear in the Ranch's rodeo arena over the Labor Day weekend, Sept. 3 and 4. They will be competing in bareback bronc riding, Brahma bulls, steers, calves and even stick horses for the three-to-six-year-olds. It is the only rodeo of its kind in the nation in which boys riding professional rodeo stock under RCA rules are the only contestants.

Approximately 3,000 boys have lived at the Ranch since it was started in 1939, and the rodeo is also a traditional homecoming for the Boys Ranch Alumni Association. Some of the graduates and their families travel long distances to attend.

An added attraction will be Texas-sized barbecue beef plates that will be prepared and sold by the boys for only \$1.50. Reserve box seat tickets at \$2.50 will be on sale at the Boys Ranch Office, 600 West 11th Street in Amarillo. General admission will be \$1.50 for adults and \$.75 for children under twelve. Performances are scheduled for 3:00 p. m. each afternoon, September 3 and 4.

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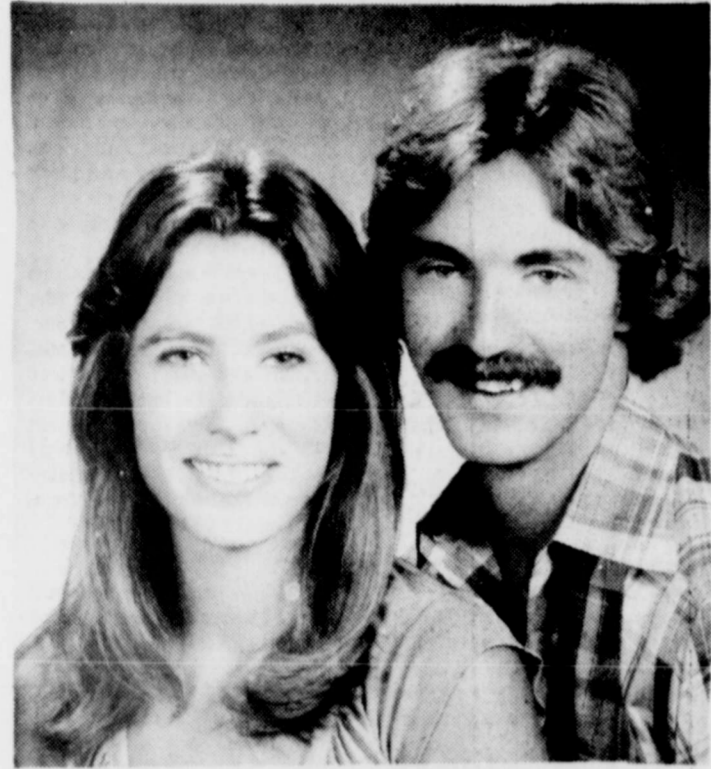

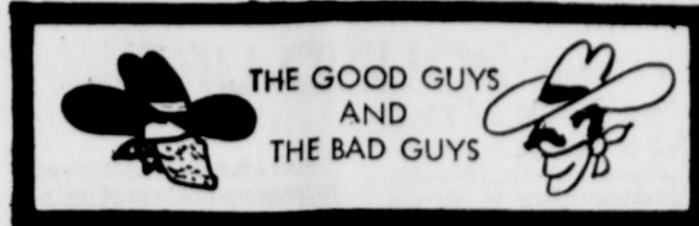

## 4-H NEWS ROUND-UP

This week two more 4-H'ers will be reporting on their experiences on the Minnesota Exchange Trip to Stearns County during July 8-15, 1978.

4-H'ers participating in the Exchange program seem to learn more about themselves by sharing 4-H experiences, family habits and customs, personal values, and community and state patterns according to Assistant County Extension Agent, Vicki Winter.

Kevin Igo of the Halfway 4-H Club stayed with the Floriann Donnay family in Kimball, Minnesota. One of the things he enjoyed participating in during the 4-H exchange trip was the Club Project Show that the host family was involved with. This was different from anything he had ever seen or participated in with Hale County 4-H clubs, but was a very interesting experience. The local 4-H club met at the farm where the tour was to begin, and they then visited in turn each farm where a 4-H'er had a project for the upcoming County Fair. At each farm the kids who lived there would show their projects that they had been working on to get ready for the big fair. County Fair is a very important 4-H activity in Minnesota. ### Bluebonnet Quilting Club

Every Wednesday afternoon from 1 to 5, The Bluebonnet Quilting Club meets to practice its specialty. This steadfast group has been quilting and donating to charity the proceeds from their handiwork since 1929 or 1930. The club kept no records until recently so there's no telling how much money they donated over the years. The club name came from the blue sunbonnets the ladies made and wore as their "uniform" during the club's beginning years. The club doesn't piece quilts. It takes the top that someone else has pieced, adds a batt and lining, rolls it on a quilting frame so it will be easier to work with and, using tiny neat stitches, fastens the whole thing together.

#### No Dying Art

Evidently, piecing quilts is still a popular pastime because the ladies never lack for quilts to work on. They have more than 30 on their waiting list right now and say their talent has always been that much in demand. They kept no record of how many quilts they've done over the years but one member guesses they complete more than 20 in an average year. That adds up to a lot of quilts and a lot of donated money.

The club charges for its services according to the size of the quilt and the difficulty involved in quilting it. The ladies charged \$25 for a recent quilting job but \$50 for a king size quilt in a very difficult pattern. They donate their time and give the quilting fee to various schools, charities, and deserving organizations.

#### Pattern Names

Quilt patterns have colorful names like Log Cabin, Drunkard's Path, Wedding Ring, and Yankee Pride. The Bluebonnet Club just finished a quilt done in the Pinwheel pattern. Their most difficult was a large one in the Flower Garden pattern. It was pieced with hundreds of small double knit hexagons. They thought they'd never get through but it made a beautiful quilt.

#### 4th Of July Quilt

This is the third year the club has made a quilt to be given away at Abernathy's Fourth of July celebration.

Department of Public Safety reports indicate the youths were southbound on FM 400 and the Bumam vehicle was going west on County Road 63 at the time of the accident.

#### District 2-T-2 Lions Eye Bank

The District 2-T-2 Lions Eye Bank, Inc., was formed in 1974 to serve as a clearinghouse for the donation of eyes and for collection and distribution of donated eyes for graft or transplant surgery on people with damaged or diseased eyes. The District 2-T-2 Lions Eye Bank serves a 21 county area on the South Plains. It is sponsored and supported by 73 Lions Clubs, including Abernathy Lions Club, with more than 2700 members. Sustaining memberships, life memberships, sales of white cane lapel pins, contributions, donations and memorial gifts are used to support the bank's activities.

Since its organization, the bank has processed 72 eyes. Since January 1977, it has furnished 20 eyes for local transplant operations. Currently, the bank has on file 2010 donor cards.

Eyes are donated by living persons. A donor card is signed giving permission for the eyes to be used after the donor's death. The donor then notifies his next of kin and personal physician of his gift.

When eyes become available, they are used by physicians for patients on a waiting list. Because waiting lists are long, eyes frequently are transported to the sight where they are most needed.

A nationwide volunteer network of amateur radio operators (ham operators) goes on the air four times each day to monitor the availability of eyes and the locations where they are needed. The ham network assists the nation's 64 eye banks in matching needs and available eyes. Information about available eyes is turned over to medical personnel who determine the suitability of available eyes for individual patients.

Transport of eyes is managed through a network of volunteers using the most efficient means possible to move the eyes across land or by air.

Lions eye banks do not charge for their services.

TRANSPANTATION The cornea, the transparent covering over the pupil and iris of the eye, is the most frequently used portion of the donated eye. Corneal transplants can replace clouded, damaged or diseased corneas to restore or improve vision for many patients. In some cases, a partial thickness corneal graft is used to replace damaged layers of the cornea rather than replace the entire cornea.

Other portions of the eye may be used for repair or correction of certain problems which may cause reduced vision or loss of sight.
