\$2 1/2 MILLION DOLLAR BUDGET APPROVED BY LOCAL SCHOOL TRUSTEES; TAX RATE REMAINS STABLE

Abernathy School Board approved amendments to the 1977-78 school budget and adopted the estimated budget for 1978-79 in a meeting Monday, August 29 in Academic Center. Bobby Cuevas and the Weekly Review reporter were the only plain citizens to attend the public hearing on school finances. All others present were school board members, school administration officials, and principals of Abernathy schools.

The proposed budget amounted to \$2,630,297 which is \$60,142 over last year. The board approved a tax rate of 85¢ per \$100 valuation, the same as last year. Valuation of the 180 square mile school district is \$162,657,072.

FOOTBALL SEASON OPENS FRIDAY

Antelopes, Lions, Face Tough Foes In Season Openers

Kickoff time is 8 p.m. when the 1978 football season starts at Antelope Field in Abernathy Friday, Sept. 8. Coach Larry Aldridge's AHS Antelopes will tangle with their traditional season-opening foe, the strong Buffalo squad from Petersburg.

Also, at 8 p.m. Friday, Sept. 8, the New Deal Lions will face the Wildcats at Idalou for their first game of the new football season.

Offensively, the Lopes moved the ball well behind an extremely improved line and the backs ran hard. The areas of concern now are pass blocking and turnover.

Friday the 8th, the Lopes open the season against a Class "A" powerhouse, Petersburg. The Buffalos have good size, are very physical and well coached. Their defense hasn't allowed a score in two scrimmages against Muleshoe and Anton. Their offense is very impressive, led by all-state back Mike Jones, who had over 1900 yards in 1977.

The Lopes came a long way from the Dimmitt scrimmage to the Friendship scrimmage. The linebackers were much more aggressive against the lead play and the overall defensive hitting and pursuit was much improved. All who are interested in Abernathy schools are invited to join the club. Membership is not limited to parents of kids in Abernathy school athletics. The club supports academic as well as sports activities.

Booster Club meets every Monday night, 7 PM, in the school cafeteria. Lewis Lutrick heads the club as president this year. Ann McCune is secretary-treasurer and Lon Ward is vice-president.

Chamber Meeting Thursday Morning

Abernathy High School Football Coach Larry Aldridge was guest speaker at Abernathy Chamber of Commerce's 7AM breakfast meeting Thursday, September 7.

Average student enrollment is expected to drop slightly from last year though cost per student will rise. In 1978-79, 1109 students cost \$1163 each to educate. Last year, for 1104 students, the cost was \$1299 each. The estimated 1100 students for 1978-79 will cost \$1441 each.

The budget is actually seven budgets. The OPERATING FUND BUDGET is the basic one using local and state funds and amounts to \$1,874,537. The Title I, Title I Migrant, and Title IV budget concern federal money for federal programs administered by the state.

TITLE I is a federal program to aid schools with educationally deprived students. Abernathy's Title I budget amounts to \$117,996.

The TITLE I MIGRANT budget amounts to \$171,629 and is for educationally deprived students whose families work full or part time in the farming or food processing industries and have moved in the past five years because of job opportunities.

The TITLE IV budget amounting to \$6,095 accounts for money for the same students as Title I but is used for instructional supplies. Abernathy spends this money on library books available to all students.

The TITLE VII or BILINGUAL EDUCATION BUDGET of \$59,628 is for a federal program funded directly from Washington which teaches English or Spanish as a second language. Abernathy is beginning its ninth year in the program which was funded for five years. There is some question about whether it will be continued after this year.

The STATE COMPENSATORY EDUCATION BUDGET comes to \$20,442. The money is figured on the same kids in Title I but is not restricted to use for that group.

The HONDA CO-OP BUDGET for special education amounts to \$379,972. Honda is not a teaching method invented by the motorcycle company. It stands for Hale Center,

Olton, New Deal, and Abernathy and is these schools' co-operative effort to get funds for special education programs. A school must have 300 special education students to qualify for the funds so most schools band together to get the necessary number.

Abernathy is the agent for the HONDA co-op. Some HONDA personnel work for the co-op and divide their time among participating schools but each school also has local personnel involved in the program.

If Abernathy had a minimum foundation program, only the basic budget would be necessary. Since the school system applies for state and federal funds for additional programs, the other budgets are necessary.

The budgets represent a whole summer of work by Earl Carter, business manager for Abernathy Schools, and Floyd Galloway, who teaches business courses at Abernathy High School but also helps with the work of compiling school finance into budget form. At the meeting, Carter unfolded several yards of figures on paper which, when condensed by computer, made up the first page of the estimated budget. Superintendent Delwin Webb and school board members commended the two men for their work.

The budgets are outlines of school finance, not detailed accounts, and are too long to include in a newspaper report. However, any interested citizen can see a copy of the budgets at the school administration office. We include below a few random figures of most interest to the public.

The biggest budget item is the \$1,873,161 payroll for approximately 200 employees. A breakdown was not available but approximate figures are \$83,896 for general administration salaries; \$80,360 for school administration salaries; and \$1,403,821 for teachers salaries. Salaries of approximately 20 cafeteria workers amount to \$4,500;

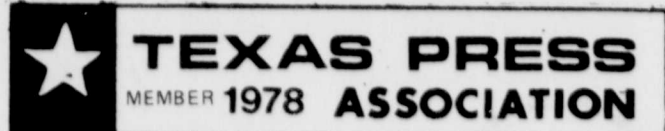

NGC--What you will find on the family farm today is very different from its counterpart 44 years ago. Following is a bill of sale that was executed Oct. 22, 1934. Hugh Pettit found it among his family's papers. The document was an agreement between Hugh's father, the late H. O. Pettit, buyer, and a John R. Langston, seller. The paper was typed on the back of an Abernathy First State Bank letterhead. Capital of the bank that year \$25,000.00, and the late Sam R. Merrill was president. The family farm of 1934 produced more of its own food, including meat, eggs, corn and wheat. The State of Texas, County of Hale.

This Contract entered into this day by and between John R. Langston Party of the First Part agrees to Sell and Convey free of any Incumbrances Certain Personal Property now Located on Section No. 17 Block W. Hale County, Texas, to H. O. Pettit. And more especially enumerated as As approximately the Following:
Eight Head of Jersey Milk Cows,
Ten Head of Jersey Heifers,
One Jersey Bull,
Four Work Mares,
One Work Horse,
One Coming Two year Old Black Filly,
One Sucking Colt,
Six Head of Shoats,
One Sow and Eight Pigs,
All Chickens and Turkeys on said place,
One Batch of Farm Machinery,
Harness Lines Collars etc,
Thirty Bushels of Cotton Seed,
About 37 Bushels of wheat in the Farmers Coal and Grain Co. Elevator.

It being further agreed as part of the consideration that I am to deliver within the Next 30 days Possession to the above Described section together with all Improvements on same to H. O. Pettit or some One Designated by him.
The Possession of the Personal Property named is to be at once.
Witnessed hand this the 22nd, day of October A. D. 1934.

The blood disease afflicts as many as 50 million people...most of them black...and kills half its victims before they reach age 20. Researchers have built a new type of machine that treats blood with chemicals in an effort to cure those with sickle cell anemia. Human testing will begin next year, says a University of Washington researcher who helped build and test one of the devices.

AIR TRAVELER'S "FLIGHT PLAN"

Air travelers can avoid being "complaint statistics" by following a 10-point flight plan.

Last year, more than 16,000 consumer complaints were filed with the Civil Aeronautics Board concerning lost luggage, unhonored reservations and other air travel problems.

A "flight plan" for air travelers depends on several important consumer care tactics.

--Check in on time. Airlines vary on deadlines before departure time, so ask when making the reservation.

--Know that over-booking is a necessity for the airlines due to a high percentage of "no show" travelers.

--Don't be a "no show." Be sure to cancel reservations if your plans change and you are unable to take the flight on which you reserved space.

--If you are "bumped" --that is, holding a confirmed reservation but are denied boarding because the flight is oversold--know your rights.

Unless the airline gets you to your destination within two hours of the original schedule, you are entitled to a refund of your ticket price--or passage on the next available flight to your destination--and compensation equal to the ticket price up to \$200.

You are not obliged to accept the compensation (called denied boarding compensation). If you reject the compensation, you may seek redress through the civil courts if you desire. Denied boarding compensation does not apply, however, to any intrastate air carriers (those operating within one state only) or to any charter flights.

On the other hand, if you accept the compensation, the case is closed and you have no further recourse.

If you decide not to go through with the trip--after you have been bumped--then you only get a refund of the ticket price.

--Reconfirm your return reservation if you are flying to a popular resort area--or aboard.

Failure to reconfirm--normally 72 hours before departure--can, and often does, result in cancellation of your reservations.

If you fail to reconfirm, you are not eligible for denied boarding compensation.

--Label every piece of checked baggage, inside and out.

For the passenger who does not want his name and address visible, concealed labels are available from some carriers.

--Lock your luggage.

--Don't overpack. Usually air carriers will not pay for damage to over-stuffed luggage that breaks.

--Report missing luggage immediately. Failure to report missing baggage before leaving the airport may result in denial of your claim.

--Discuss compensation for missing luggage with the responsible airlines.

--Any problems not resolved with an individual airlines can be reported in writing to the Office of the Consumer Advocate, Civil Aeronautics Board, Washington, D. C. 20428.

Burial was in Abernathy's IOOF Cemetery with Chambers Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.
Pallbearers were Andy Reid, Woody Parker, Virgil Zeman, Vernon Bartlett, Lon Carmickle, Herman Lambert, Billy Ward and Joe Dolph Adkisson.
Mrs. Ward died at 11:50 p. m. Thursday in Hi-Plains Hospital, Hale Center, after a lengthy illness.
Survivors include her husband, Dan Z. Ward; two sons, Danny of Tucumcari, N. M., and Nelson of Lubbock; a daughter, Shirley of Houston; two brothers, Rudolph and Amo Struve, both of Abernathy; a sister, Mrs. Wanda Gilvin of Amarillo; and four grandchildren.
Mrs. Ward was born June 15, 1903, a few miles west of Lakeview, and moved with her family to Abernathy in 1912, three years after the town was founded. She was a daughter of a pioneer Abernathy business couple, the late Mr. and Mrs. Fritz W. Struve.
Mrs. Ward was graduated from the College of Industrial Arts at Denton (now Texas Woman's University). She received her degree in 1925, and taught during the 1925-1926 school year at Lakeview School north and east of Abernathy. (Commissioner Lloyd Goldston was a first grade student the year that Mrs. Ward taught at Lakeview). She then moved to Austin to teach in the public school system. There she met her future husband, who also was a school teacher in the Austin system. She and Dan Z. Ward were married Dec. 23, 1930, at Georgetown, near Austin.
She was a Methodist, a member of Abernathy's Chapter No. 877 Order of the Eastern Star and a member of Abernathy's 1935 Study Club.
Mrs. Ward was active in the business that she and her husband operated, Ward's Men Store, until they sold the firm to Hoppy Toler several years ago.
She was the first, and to this date the only, woman to serve on Abernathy School Board of Education as an elected trustee.
Mrs. Ward served terms on the school board during the 1950's.

Mrs. Henderson was born in Carter, Okla., and came to Abernathy with her family in 1927. She was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Vineyard. She was a member of the Church of Christ.
Survivors include her husband, Preston Henderson; two sons, Lewis of Bedford, and James of Midland; a daughter, Mrs. Nancy Luske of Broken Arrow, Okla.; four brothers, J. 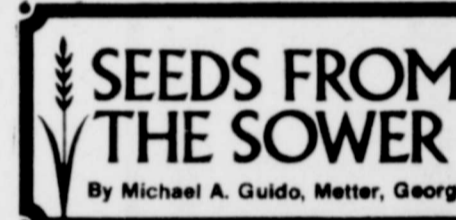

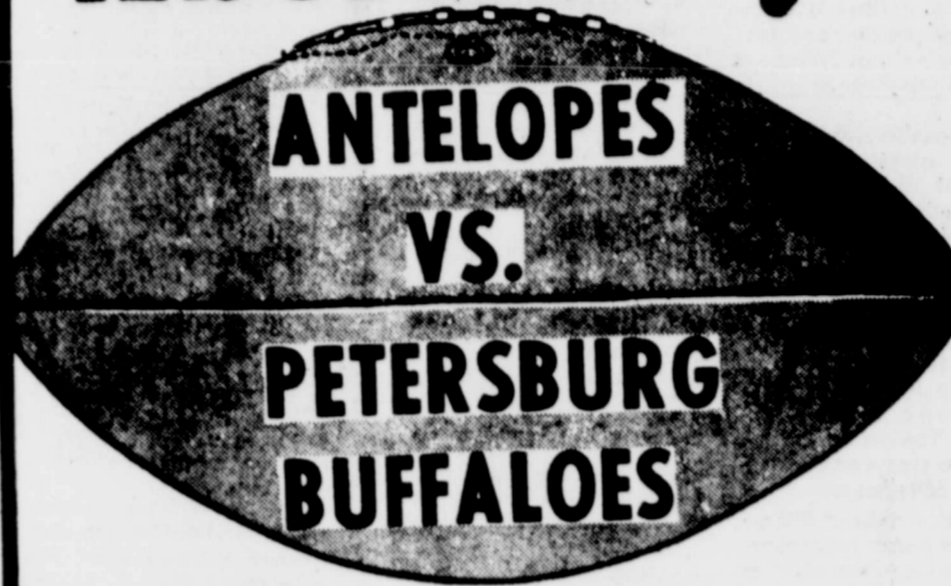

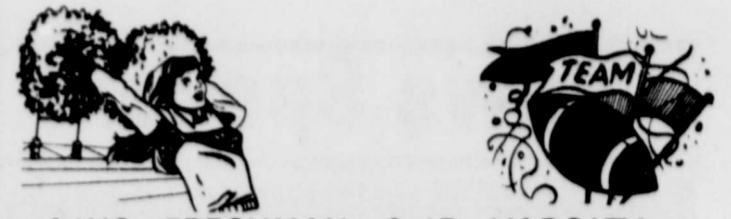

Pioneer Seed Sets Tours At Plainview

PLAINVIEW, Texas--The complexity of the seed business, from breeding hybrids to bagging the finished product, will be explored in a plant and field tour Thursday, September 7th at the Southwestern Division facility of Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc.

Tours of the Plainview complex will begin every 15-20 minutes from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., said Don Tschirgi, information director for the Southwestern Division. In addition, a noon luncheon catered by Sutherland's Barbecue of Amarillo will be served.

The public is invited, Tschirgi said, and there will be no charge for the tour or meal. Pioneer has extended a special invitation to seed dealers and farmers throughout the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles and New Mexico.

"One of the basic things we try to explain with these tours is the complexity of the seed business," Tschirgi said. "It takes quite an effort over a number of years to breed and grow quality planting seeds. The special care must be taken as the seed is handled in the production process and bagged for sale."

"We offer tours so that people see our complex and understand what is done here," Tschirgi said.

A 40-minute tour of the Pioneer fields, guided by company agronomists, will include all the corn, sorghum and forage crop varieties marketed by the Southwestern Division. Breeding and stalk rot nurseries will also be toured, along with an alfalfa test plot and breeding greenhouse. The tour will stop at the sorghum breeding station for an explanation by a sorghum researcher and at the cotton breeding station for a brief discussion with a cotton breeder.

The new offices and enlarged production facilities of the Southwestern Division will be surveyed in a 30-minute tour.

A \$4-million expansion for the Plainview complex was completed in December, 1977. The three-year expansion effort resulted in major additions to bulk seed storage, seed preparation and warehouse facilities, as well as a new administrative office building. All of these areas will be included in the tour.

The Pioneer facility is located four miles north of Plainview on Pioneer Road, off the business route of U. S. 87, one-half mile east of the Producers Grain Corporation elevator. Pioneer personnel will direct visitors once they reach the complex.

Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Inc., is the world's largest agrigenetics organization, founded as the Hi-Bred Corn Company in 1926. In 1962, the company established the Pioneer Sorghum Company in Plainview, later designated as the Southwestern Division.

School Trustees Approve Budget--

\$26,270 for eight bus drivers and a foreman; and \$79,425 for nine full time and four part time maintenance people.

Buildings and debt services used to be the second biggest item but Dr. Webb said Abernathy school system is becoming debt free in terms of norms. All the buildings except the Academic Center are paid for. The state says a debt ratio of 8% means a school is on good financial footing and Abernathy's debt ratio is 3/8 of 1%.

The second biggest item these days is plant maintenance and operation which will cost about \$252,675. The schools plan to spend \$105,750 on utilities (a percentage is added on each year in hopes that it will cover rising utility costs; \$171,125 on supplies and materials; \$37,500 on sanitation supplies and plumbing services; \$13,390 on health services; \$119,389 on guidance and counseling; \$81,452 on pupil transit (including driver salaries and bonds, garage work, vehicle parts, maintenance, and bus replacement); \$42,905 on library, instructional resources, and media services; and \$32,342 on insurance.

\$27,500 is budgeted for extra-curricular activities and trips (like the band's coming trip to San Antonio. Money is also set aside for professional trips for teachers and administrators.

School Facilities Survey
Dr. Webb reported on the survey he made of school facilities to see if any might be used for community meetings. Schedules of room use in each building showed only two rooms empty for one or two periods each day and one not used regularly afternoons but often occupied for extra activities.

The survey considered only daytime use which board members took to be the city council's main concern. Discussion centered on the building known as the Old Antelope Inn, now in use for vocational classes which will soon move to the new building under construction.

School Board President Billie Harrison said he would pass the information on to the city manager with the offer to work with the city as possible to solve the community meeting space problem.

Bids & Boosters
After considering clarifications on insurance bids from Richard DuBose Insurance and Hubbard Insurance, the board voted to accept the bid from Hubbard. It also agreed to let Abernathy Booster Club use school facilities as possible.

Health Department
Harrison read a letter from Dr. Baldwin, Board Chairman of Hale County Health Department saying the department is unable to continue vaccination clinics other than in Plainview and asking for help in setting up a meeting of health department officials and the school board. The letter said a health department official had tried many times and been unable to set up a meeting with Dr. Webb, Harrison said a check of phone call records showed only one call and Dr. Webb was on vacation at the time.

The school will send notices to all parents that they must take responsibility for their children's vaccinations themselves. Webb said the health department volunteered the service 10 years ago. He invited health department representatives to attend the next school board meeting Monday, September 11 at 8 PM. The regular meeting time falls on labor day so the board agreed to change it to the following week.
