C Of C Begins Unique Plan

The Membership Committee of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce has come up with a new and unique plan to increase the working capital of the Chamber. The new plan calls for the placement of one pound cans, enclosed in a colorful label, in each business firm in Haskell with a request that each employee participate as an honorary member of the Chamber of Commerce by placing a nickel a working day in the container. It will be strictly on a voluntary basis with no salary deductions involved and it will also be open to customers who would like to make a contribution to the Civic organization.

The label pictures an oak tree with acorns and the wording, "Mighty Oaks from Little Acorns Grow" and the lid of the can shows the picture of a kitten with the words, "Feed the Kitty for a Better Community."

At present the local chamher of commerce has a current membership of 155 merchants and individuals from whose dues the necessary funds must come to operate the chamber of comm rce. Population wise, this figures out at 4.3 percent of the local citizens paying for the chamber of commerce organization which is constantly working to make Haskell a better place in which to live and conduct business.

The annual income of the chamber of commerce varies from approximately \$10,300 to \$11,000 with all expenditures of operation averaging \$10,500 annually. Consequently, all promotions of the chamber have to stand on their own feet which with sound planning they have done. However, there is practically nothing left to work on trying to secure additional industry for Haskell.

Including the fourth annual Haskell County Fair which is scheduled for the dates of September 30 and October 1 and 2nd, and the monthly dollar day program the chamber of commerce has been instrumental in backing or sponsoring a total of 75 special events with the sole idea of bringing people to Haskell from out of the trade
