# 'Lopes Open Season With **28-13 Win Over Petersburg**

With a positive attitude, dedication and determination, the Abernathy Antelopes of head coach Larry Aldridge "put it together" here last Friday night to emerge victorious over strong Class powerhouse Petersburg. Sparked by long runs by senior runningback Lee Mc-Cune and a goal-line defensive stand, the 'Lopes racked up an impressive 28-13 win.

McCune, who missed most of the season last year due to knee injuries, scored on runs of 89,76 and 31 yards, and set up his 76yard TD scamper by recovering a Petersburg fumble on the Antelopes' 24. The 188-pounder runner tacked a 5 yard pass reception onto his 237 yards on the ground for 242 yards for the night on 12 carries.

Junior halfback Roger Lindsey ended the scoring for Abernathy, capping a 42-yard drive with a 2 1/2 yard plunge for the score. The quick-starting runner carried the mail 18 times for 97 total yards. Also assisting with ball-carrying duties were sophomore halfback Sylvester Dunn and junior flanker Willie Betts.

Junior quarterback Gilbert Cuevas kicked all four extra points, and punted three times for a 34-yard average. He failed, however, on two field goal attempts, one from the 37 and one from the 27, Cuevas connected on 1 of 5 passes for 15 yards, while senior quarterback Tony Heath hit

### Blood Drive Set For Abernathy

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 14, 1978 Hale County - Abernathy, Texas - Lubbock County

South Plains Blood Service personnel will come to Abernathy Tuesday, September 26, to give local people the chance to donate "the gift of life". Abernathians responded generously in past drives. High school students set someting of a record last year, according to Charles Bowen who helps coordinate the blood program in Abernathy.

South Plains Blood Service provides blood and blood components to all area hospitals serving 58 communities when needed. It is a non-profit organization and accepts blood only from volunteers. People cannot sell blood to the service.

Blood needs are increasing due to more open heart surgeries being performed in the area and to the new hospital. This facility expects, in the near future, to do kidney transplants, which will drive blood needs even higher. People tend to be very

generous donors when faced with a special need for family or friends or in case of a disaster. However, hospitals throughout the South Plains need 78 pints of blood every day. Blood recipients are charged only for handling expenses.

There is no substitute for human blood and the human body is the only available source. Since it cannot be manufactured, thousands of people depend on blood donors to assure an adequate supply. The human body

constantly makes new blood. Many people make it a practice to donate blood regularly several times a year with no harm to them-They perform a selves. valuable service.

### Ford Discusses Transmissions

Following is a statement by Herbert L. Misch, vice president-Environmental and Safe ty Engineering, Ford Motor Company:

Ford Motor Company is expanding its intensive study of the performance of automatic transmissions installed in its passenger cars and light trucks.

Since last fall, the Company has been cooperating with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) in the agency's inquiries into reports of inadvertent slippage from the "park" to the 'reverse" positions in some transmissions while the

engine is running. To date the Company has not been able to verify that such slippage actually occurs when the shift lever has been properly engaged in "park, "nor have we been able to identify any design reason for such slippage. Nonetheless, if there is such a problem, the Company is determined to locate it and correct it.

Ford will substantially widen the scope of its investigations, and will continue to provide infor-mation to NHTSA as well as

The amendment quires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.

The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons. The amendment grants

an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be increased.

The amendment prevents local governments from increasing property taxes unless the governing body provides public notice and conducts a public hearing. The amendment requires the legislature to provide by law for each property owner to receive notice of the revaluation of his property and the amount taxes will be increased.

The amendment limits appropriations from state tax revenue to an amount not to exceed Texas' estimated economic growth rate, with the legislature authorized to make exceptions for emergencies.

The amendment prohibits the statewide appraisal of real property for property tax purposes. Enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for property tax purposes is required to originate in the taxing
