# DOWN HALE CENTER, 15-8 Lopes Log Third Win

The Antelopes played catch-up ball again last Friday night at Hale Center to overcome an 8-7 deficite and chalk up win No. 3 to the tune of 15-8.

Behind the running of Lee McCune and Roger Lindsey, the passing of Tony Heath and Gilbert Cuevas, and the outstanding pass receptions by Dean McGuire, and stalwart defense by the overall defensive unit, the Lopes of head coach Larry Aldridge pulled out all stops to keep on the winning side of the ledger. In addition to his running, Lindsey scored the first TD after literally taking the ball off the Hale Center punter's foot and hauling it to paydirt from the 28; and late in the contest he wrestled the ball from the arm of Dale Gatson as the owl runner was attempting an end run, with the turnover setting the stage for the Antelopes' winning score. The 65-yard Antelope drive was aided by three Heath-to-McGuire passes, with McCune going the final 4 yards for the touch. Sophomore halfback Sylvester Dunn scooted around end to add the two extra points for good measure.

The 'Lopes had some trouble stopping the Owls' 195-pound fullback Robert Smith, as the locomotive chugged 117 yards on 26 trips to emerge certification. Melanie is the as the game's leading rusher. When the Lopes bottled-up Smith, quarterback Leroy Cox began faking to his running backs, then tucking the ball in and carrying it himself, picking up 68 yards on 10 carries. Cox threw 4 passes, completing one and had two intercepted. McCune was the leading ground-gainer for Abernathy, carrying 15 times for 60 yards, while Lindsey had 57 yards on 19 totes. Dunn carried twice, picking up a total of 7 yards. Heath kept the ball 8 times, but failed to end up with any plus yardage. However, he connected on 4 of 7 passes for 57 yards. Cuevas completed a 5 yard pass to Joe Barrera, then got credit for 30 yards on another attempt to Barrera when interference was called against Hale Center.

The Lopes had only 124 ground yards to the Owls' 259, but added 92 through the air to Hale Center's 5. In the first downs department, the Lopes had 10 to the Owls' 14. Abernathy was penalized four times for a total of 40 yards, while Hale Center had 15 total yards stepped off on 3 penalties. Cuevas punted twice for Abernathy for a 38 yard average, while Hale Center punted twice for a 21 yard average.

### PLAY BY PLAY

Sylvester Dunn brought the opening kickoff from the 15 out to the 35, from which point McCune and Lindsey alternated at carrying the mail, picking up 3 first downs before bogging down on the Hale Center 28. The Lope defense dug in, and aided by a couple of penalties against the Owls, forced them to punt. That's when Lindsey rushed in and with arms streched high, caught the ball in his mid-section as Smith punted. He staggered briefly, regained his balance and rushed to the goal line. Cuevas kicked the extra point to give the Lopes an early 7-0

The Owls brought the kickoff out to the 22, then picked up a couple of first downs before Runnels made his first of two fumble recoveries. Three plays later the Lopes returned the favor when McCune lost control of the wet ball on the Owls 30. Then the Owls fumbled on their second play and Abernathy was back in business just 30 yards from paydirt. McCune rambled for 12 yards and

a first down, but another fumble. lost 3 yards on the next play, but McCune recovered the loose ball. A 5 yard penalty against the Lopes, a 9-yard gain on a draw play by

now. VOLUNTEERED Alice herself worked at the center as a volunteer for two years, helping Esther Sepeda, the first director. She lived on a farm and used to bring her children to school, then stay all day to help Mrs. Sepeda until the kid got out of school again. The Pace family moved to Abernathy seven years ago and Alice succeeded Mrs. Sepeda as director of the center. She keeps at it not for the money, which isn't much, but for the pleasure of helping people. Her daughter is a senior this year. One son is:a freshman and another is grown with three children of his own. Her husband is a welder. EXTRA EFFORT In past years, senior citizens had to go to Plain - view to get food stamps and supplies. Alice used to load them all into her station wagon, take them to Plainview, and make a day of it. Now a food stamp worker comes here the 1st and 3rd Monday of each month and goes to senior citizens' homes if necessary. The oldsters still need help, though, in getting to the Health Provider clinic in Plainview or other sources of medical care. The Neighborhood Center can help people apply for or refer them to other agencies that help with housing, jobs, job training, social security papers, Medicaid-which takes care of dentures, glasses, and hearing aids, or Medicare which helps with doctor bills. People donate clothes to the center and Alice says when she gives a box away, twice that many clothes come in next day. She tries to enroll as many people as she can but misses some. The ones who receive help appreciate it and come by often to thank her. 




