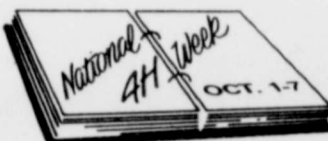

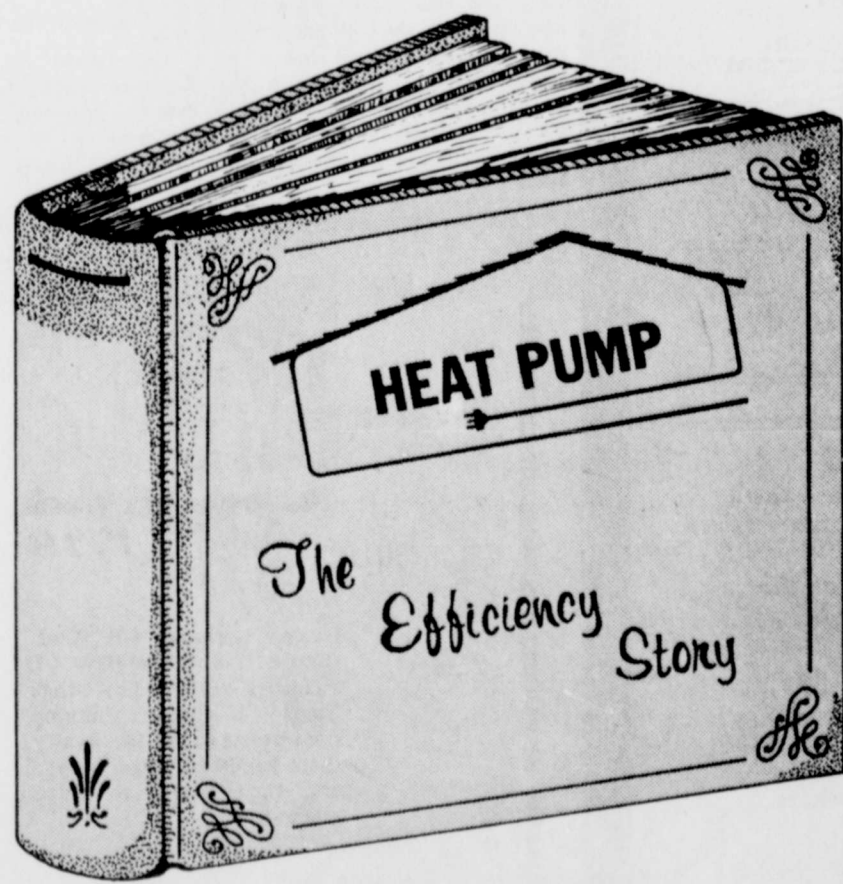

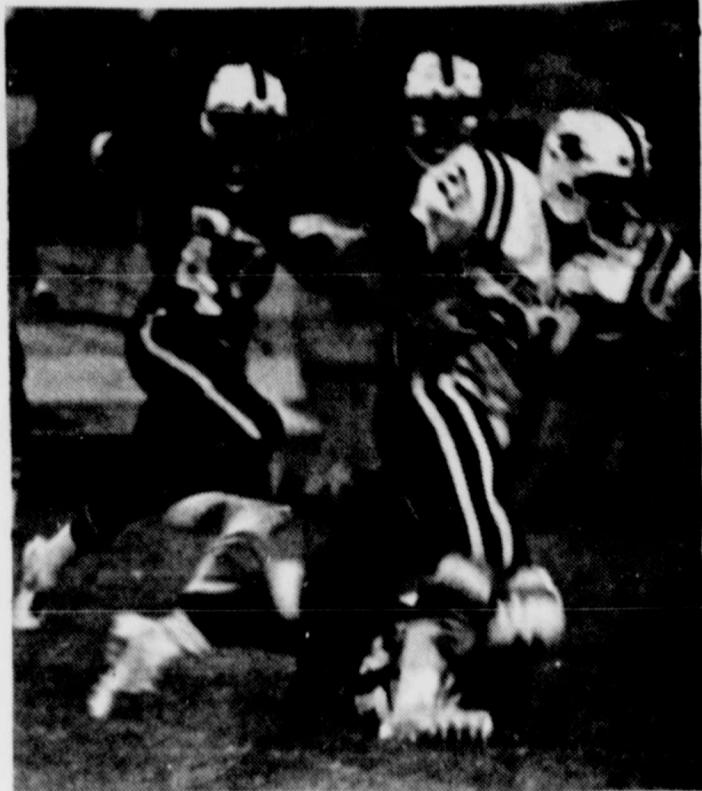

McCune and a no-gainer by Lindsey brought up fourth and 11 at the 19. Cuevas was called upon to try a 36-yard field goal, but it was wide to the right and Hale Center took over at the 20.

The Lopes couldn't move the ball and Cuevas got off a 41-yard punt. Taking possession on their own 26, the Owls put their machine in gear and picked up 3 first downs as they ground out good yardage before being stopped when McGuire intercepted a Cox pass on the Abernathy 18 and returned it to the 40.

Again the Lopes failed to move the ball and Cuevas booted a dandy 55-yarder, but got credit for only 35 yards as the ball rolled into the end zone.

The Owls ran only two plays before giving up the ball, again on a Rannels recovery, this time on the Hale Center 33. A 15-yard holding penalty against the Lopes, then an interference call against Hale Center gave the Lopes a 1st and 10 on the Owls' 21. Cuevas connected on a 5 yard pass to Barrera, but on the next play the Lopes lost the ball when Heath was hit as he attempted to pass. The Lopes got it right back when McCune intercepted a Cox pass, but they had time for only two plays before the first half ended.

After the halftime homecoming festivities, the Owls returned to the field a determined lot, and allowed the Lopes only 6 plays from scrimmage during the entire third quarter. And late in that period, the Owls cashed in their chips to take an 8-7 lead.

Cuevas kicked off to Tony Clark and the Owl back took the ball at the 7 and brought it back to the 25 before being nailed by Dunn at that point. Smith hit the line for 5 yards, then Clark added 14 before being stopped on the 43 by Ken Sanders. Three more plays netted only 7 yards and Hale Center planned to punt. However, the ball was centered over the punter's head and as he scooped up the loose ball, he was hit hard by Sanders, fumbled, and Barrera recovered on the Owls' 25. Here Hale Center's defense stiffened, and retook possession on the 16 after allowing Abernathy only 9 yards in four plays. From that point the Owls drove the distance for their only score of the evening, picking up 4 first downs along the way. The drive was capped by Smith's 1-foot drive for the TD, then Gatson carried around end for the two-point conversion, with only 43 seconds remaining in the third period.

Sanders brought the kickoff from the goal line to the 20, and the Lopes picked up two first downs (aided by an 18-yard Heath-to-McGuire pass) before losing the ball on their own 48 on a fumble.

It was four plays later that Lindsey stole the ball from Gatson, putting the Lopes back in business on their own 35. That's when Heath put his arm back in service, tossing to McGuire with the latter making a fine jumping catch for a 16 yard gain. Lindsey picked up a yard, a pass intended for Barrera fell incomplete, then on a draw play Lindsey exerted good second effort to pick up 11 yards and a first down, breaking a couple of tackles in the process.

Lindsey failed to gain on the next play, then Heath spotted McGuire in the open again and rifled a 17-yarder to the versatile junior. Lindsey was called on again for two consecutive runs, picking up enough for a first down just inside the Owls' 10 yard line.

A 5 yard penalty moved the ball back to the 14 1/2, then Heath gained all but 1/2 yard of that back on a bootleg around left end. Heath then tossed another pass to McGuire good for 6 yards, then called on McCune who bulled over for the score from 4 yards out. For insurance, the Lopes tried for two, pitching out to Dunn around end, with the successful play giving the Lopes a 15-8 victory.

With 4:21 remaining, the Owls began moving the ball again, picking up 29 yards on 8 carries before being stopped on the Antelopes 46. With less than a minute to play, the Lopes fell on the ball a couple of times to run out the clock.

Roosevelt Here

The Lopes will entertain the Roosevelt Eagles here this Friday evening, beginning at 8 p.m. The Eagles are 1-1 for the season, fresh off a 12-7 victory over New Deal last week.

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J. F. Buske Is Hale GSPA V-P

Members of Grain Sorghum Producers Association recently cast ballots to select their county president and vice president. The farmers elected to these positions serve as "policy making" representatives from their county to the Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

Steve Lee of Hale Center and J. F. Buske of Abernathy will serve as President and Vice President of Hale County.

The new GSPA directors will take office for a two year term on October 1. Grain Sorghum Producers Association represents grain sorghum farmers in legislation at the state and national levels. GSPA's goal is to speak in behalf of sorghum producers on all farm policy decisions and to see that they get the best deal possible.

Grain sorghum targets were set at \$4.07 per hundred weight in the 1977 Agricultural Act, while corn targets were set at \$3.57 per hundred weight for the 1977 crop. The increase in grain sorghum targets was the result of Grain Sorghum Producers Association working to establish a Nationwide Cost of Production Study in 1973, and getting Congress to set the targets of sorghum in relation to corn based upon the cost of production rather than the nutritional value.

Deficiency payments were made to grain sorghum farmers on 1977 allotted acres in production. This payment was 68¢ per hundred weight times the normal farm yield on allotted acres. Amounts ranging up to \$20,000 per farmer were paid to grain sorghum producers on their 1977 crop, as a result of this GSPA provision. It could be as much as \$40,000 on the 1978 crop for producers complying with the feed grain program.

Other activities of GSPA include foreign markets sales promotion. It is estimated that each additional million tons of feed grains exported will increase the producer's income by 8¢ per bushel. The newly elected GSPA Directors will be supervising these activities and they invite every sorghum producer to join this worthwhile program.

Road Projects Bids Received

AUSTIN-Ashland-Warren, Inc. of Cambridge, Mass., was the apparent low bidder this week on 7.13 miles of improvements on IH-27 in Lubbock County.

The project is estimated to require 400 working days from 0.2 miles south of Loop 289 in Lubbock to 1.3 miles north of the Monroe overpass. The project will cost \$14,033,785.

The work will involve installation of storm sewer, preparation of subgrade, asphalt stabilized base, asphaltic concrete paving, continuous reinforced concrete paving, median barrier, lighting, signing, pavement marking, delineation and a guard fence.

The Highway and Public Transportation Commission will consider awarding of the projects at a later date.

Weatherization Assistance Is Available

The Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA) announced that the Central Plains Community Action Program, Inc. agency has been awarded a \$3,170 contract under the Weatherization Assistance for Low-Income Persons Program for eligible persons residing in Hale County.

Ben F. McDonald, Jr., Executive Director of TDCA indicated that funding for this 12-month contract which began September 1, 1978, is made available through TDCA's Economic Opportunity Division by the U. S. Department of Energy.

Through this contract, homes of elderly and handicapped low-income persons will be improved through the use of storm windows, caulking, insulation and wall repairs so that energy consumption is reduced and high energy costs to the home dweller are lessened.

The purpose of the loan is to finance service for 1,100 additional consumers; to finance 107 miles of distribution line; and to finance system improvements.

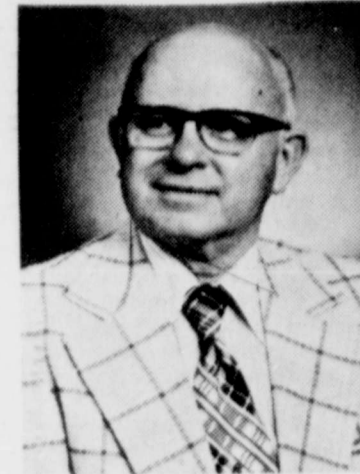
Charles Bucks Reports New Record Is Set

LOS ANGELES-Continental Airlines carried more passengers in August than any other month in its 43-year history, according to Charles A. Bucks, executive vice president of marketing. Revenue passenger miles totaled 909,621,000, an increase of 21.1 percent over the 751,273,000 flown in August of last year. The previous record was achieved in July, 1978, with a total of 855,390,000.

Available seat miles for August of this year were 1,256,725,000, up 7.6 percent from the previous August's 1,168,057,000. Load factor increased 8.1 percentage points from 64.3 percent to 72.4 percent. Cargo ton miles totaled 24,866,400 versus 24,197,000, an increase of 2.8 percent.

Year-to-date traffic totals for Continental as of August 31 were as follows: revenue passenger miles, 5,688,256,000 versus 4,702,587,000, up 21 percent; available seat miles 9,208,292,000 versus 8,342,647,000, up 10.4 percent; cargo ton miles 185,065,000 versus 180,935,600, up 2.3 percent; and passenger load factor 61.8 percent versus 56.7 percent, up 5.4 percentage points.

Bucks, a former Abernathian, and a graduate of Abernathy High School, is a longtime employee of Continental Airlines.



Dale Maret Is Rep. For Salvation Army

The Abernathy Salvation Army Service Unit will be represented by Mr. Dale Maret, Salvation Army Field Representative. It was revealed today by Mr. Jimmy Gragg, Service Unit treasurer.

Mr. Maret's appointment was announced recently by Mr. Dan Eddy, Texas director of development for The Salvation Army. Region five is a Salvation Army designated 29-town area that includes Abernathy and covers all of the Panhandle and much of the South Plains.
