Junior Basketball Association Buys TV Camera For Abernathy Schools

(By Jacquelyn Smyers) Abernathy Junior Basketball Association recently presented a portable TV camera to Abemathy Schools which the school board formally accepted at its October 2 meeting.

The school has other TV came ras but they were bought with government "program money" and use is restricted to particular activities. The basketball association had a surplus of funds and wanted the money used for the benefit of local kids.

School Superintendent Dr. Delwin Webb said gifts valued at more than \$200 cannot be given to sponsors or particular departments of a school without violating Interscholastic League regulations. The proper way to avoid this is for dollar amounts to be given to be used any way the school sees

To Clinic For Shots The disagreement about immunizations for school children continues. Dr. Webb says his copy of State Health Department rules and regulations says the County Health Department must give the immunizations at school. Hale County Health Department says those rules are out of date and present ones say shots must be given but can be provided at the clinic in Plainview. Dr. Webb wrote the State Health Department which replied only that the rules are out of print and copies will be sent to him when they are

qualified voter. The school board has seven members elected for staggered three year terms. Next April, the places held by Bob Riley, Dan Fondy, and Jerry Oswalt will be open.

When the purchase is approved, the new owners will change the call letters from KDAV to KRLB, "Radio Lubbock" 580 on the radio Big Ed said the programming format will be changed when they begin operating on 580. He said they expect to take over the 580 spot in mid-November, possibly on November 15th.

Lopes Lose Heartbreaker To Muleshoe, 26-20

Having come from behind with two touchdowns in the final 3 1/2 minutes of play to tie the score at 20-20, the Lopes still did not give up after the Mules forged ahead in the final seconds of the contest. The Lopes took over and drove out to the 38, from which point Cuevas booted a 58 yard quick kick on a 4th and 12 situation. Starting from their 4 yard line, the Mules ran only 4 plays before Abernathy took over again on a fumble recovery at the Mules 30. Three plays and a penalty later, Lopes' field goal attempt failed, and the Mules took over on the 29. This time the visitors moved to the Antelope 23, then fumbled, and McGuire fell on the ball. The Lopes picked up a first down before time ran out at

the half. The two teams started out the second half still playing see-saw. The Mules took the short kick on their 30 and moved out to the 39. Northcutt attempted his first pass of the second half, and alert defender Kelly Mills intercepted on his own 34 and returned it to the Mules

42. However a clipping penalty set the Lopes back to their own 36, but from that point they cranked up and went the distance for the

first score of the game. McCune hit off-tackle and rambled 44 yards, his best run of the night. McCune then hit the middle quarterback Tony Heath kept for 3, Lindsey carried twice, the first a no-gainer, scampered around end for 9 yards and a first down at the 4. From there the going really got tough, and Lindsey carried the final two feet on 4th down for the score. Cuevas booted the extra point, and the Lopes held a 7-0 lead.

Center Director Pleads For Continued Health Services

(Carried over from last issue) (By Jacquelyn Smyers) Alice Pace, Director of Abernathy Neighborhood

Center, met with the council to point out the need for continued visits by Hale County Health Department The department nurses. recently halted service to towns though people can still get free medical care by going to the clinic in Plainview.

She and the council discussed various alternatives such as transporting local people in need of services to the health department clinic or to a Health Provider Clinic, also in Plainview, which charges for services but is cheaper than private medical care. The agency Mrs. Pace works for has no funds for transportation and the council wonders if it is the responsibility of local government to provide the transportation or service.

The council thinks many people who complain about the lack of health services are able to get them if they try but if someone else takes the responsibility, they don't. Mrs. Pace pointed out that the ones who suffer for parents' irresponsibility are little children. She also said people fuss about parents who don't work, yet those who work can't get off to take their kids to the Plain-

view clinics. The mayor pointed out that many of those who want free or reduced price medicare services have nice transportation and asked if we do them any favors by taking the responsibility from parents who should do it themselves. Mrs. Pace said it does us all a favor when kids are taken care of. She said some kids went to school last year with mumps, scabies, impetigo, and other more serious communicable diseases the health department nurses were most concemed about. The school sent them to her to find medical care. She said if parents won't take the responsibility, somebody has to. Mayor Thompson said, "I get impatient with the

parents," Mrs. Pace said, Alderman Charles Nelson said his sister is a nurse and has an office in Memphis (near Amarillo). She travels to several towns in that area to give medical care in homes and schools, furnishes her own car but is paid mileage and a salary by some agency of government. The council asked him and City Manager Larry Fields to find out about it.

Mrs. Pace talked about the need for a building for a day care center and said when one is found, she will supervise it instead of the Neighborhood Center. Councilmen expressed concern over who would do all the things she has been doing as director of the Neighborhood Center. She said if the churches could send someone over once a day, they'd be surprised how much they could do.

PINSON PLACE. The council approved a request by James Pope and Max Kester, developers of Pinson Place, that the council okay their developing a smaller amount of land for Phase I than originally planned. Everything else agreed to will still hold. The concept and plat remains the same. The developers want their own engineer but the city engineer must inspect all work so they and the council discussed who pays which engineer for what job.

RADIO PROBLEMS City workers have problems keeping in touch with City Hall by radio. The EMS and firemen have communication problems, City Manager Fields checked into the cost of an

extension on the present radio tower but councilmen said there would still be a dead spot because of the water towers. They suggested seeing how much it will cost to make the radio tower higher than the water towers.

WATER SURVEY The High Plains Water District approached the city about doing a water survey but must have a written request from the city. The council talked about letting them do one because it never hurts to know what you have. However, Mayor Thompson said several years ago he served as chairman of a group from several towns to get the Texas Water Board to study how to get water from White River to area towns needing it. They found the cost of importation prohibitive and the study showed Abernathy's best course to be the one already planned -- buy water close around to add to the supply. Of course, Abernathy was more fortunate than other towns in having additional supplies available.

SWPS RATES Fields gave councilmen copies of an ordinance recommended by a steering committee representing 32 towns affected by a Southwestern Public Service Company rate increase request now before the Public Utilities Commission. The ordinance approves a rate

increase but not the monthly automatic fuel cost adjustment The council took no action but will study the ordinance and decide whether Abemathy should go along or not. Fields said he thinks the company will pass rising fuel costs on to the consume by setting yearly rate increase requests high enough to cover the costs if it is permitted to do so through the monthly fuel cost adjust-The council must ment. decide by October 15. The purpose of the ordinance is to show the Public Utilities Commission (which controls rate increases) that citizens are concerned.


SUBSTANDARD BLDGS.

The council instructed Fields to publish notice of ordinance governing disposition of substandard structures. The ordinance is basically the same as Lubbock's with changes appropriate to the needs of a smaller town. It requires a board of appeals composed of three or five local citizens appointed by the council. The councilmen thought it might be unfair to put business people or long time residents in that position and hard to find anyone willing to serve. For example -if a building was declared substandard by the city and the owner wanted to appeal, it might be hard for a friend on the appeals board to turn the owner down. Fields said citizens have to take responsibilities though and he felt enough qualified citizens could be found to stand the pressure in the interests of the city.

Councilmen said an elected person expects pressure and that it might be better for the council to act as an appeals board. They want to think about it before deciding for sure at the next meeting. They also discussed the need for a demolition fund so if a building owner won't tear down his substandard structure, the city can have it done and bill the owner. Some owners prefer that method because it's less bother for them

HANDICAPPED PARKING -David Pinson said he had a request for school parking space designated for the handicapped. Dr. Webb said the school can get signs to mark the spaces. He said a survey of Abernathy schools' provisions for the handicapped show need only for a couple of wheelchair ramps andenlargement of a couple of restroom stalls.

McCune picked up 4 yards, a pass intended for Barrera fell incomplete, then pass interference was called against a Muleshoe defender when he tripped McGuire, the intended receiver, at the 2 yard line. Sanders hit the middle for a yard, then Lindsey burst through right guard to tie the score at 20-20. With the pressure on, Cuevas' EP kick was slightly off to the left.

Another on-side kick put the Mules in business on their own 46 with 1:01 left to play. To complete d passes, one for 13 yards and another for 32, put the ball on the Lopes' 9 yard line, then Shanks went through the middle for the score. The Lopes blocked the EP try, but the Mules held what turned out to be the winning

margin, 26-20.

Tony Heath, who hit on 7 of 9 passes for 135 yards, carried 13 times for 56 ground yards, while Cuevas hit on 2 of 5 passes for 47 yards. McCune was the Lopes leading ground-gainer.

picking up 85 yards on 17 carries, while Lindsey had 44 on 15 trips. Sanders' 5-yards total gave the Lopes 190 yards on the ground, plus 182 via air for a total of 372 yards. The Mules had a total of 376 yards, 264 on the ground and 112 through the air, with Shanks the leading ground-gainer with 119 yards on 19 carries. The Lopes were penalized 6 times for 46 yards, while the Mules had four 5-yard penalties.





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
