

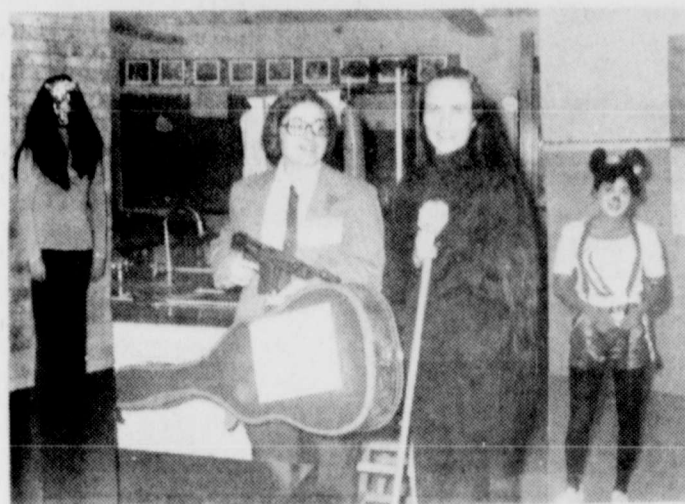

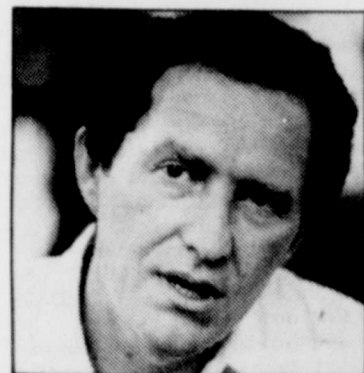

### Birthday Event For Mrs. Richter

Mrs. H. E. (Helene) Richter, of 1401 Avenue K, long-time resident of Abernathy, celebrated her 92nd birthday this past week. Mrs. Richter was born at Johnson City on October 24, 1886. She moved to Abernathy with her late husband in 1923. Mr. Richter was a businessman in Abernathy until his retirement shortly before his death in 1973.

The family gathering on Saturday was highlighted by the attendance of a seven month old great-grandson who was meeting the family for the first time. He came to the U. S. only recently from Frankfurt, Germany, where his father was stationed with the U. S. Army.

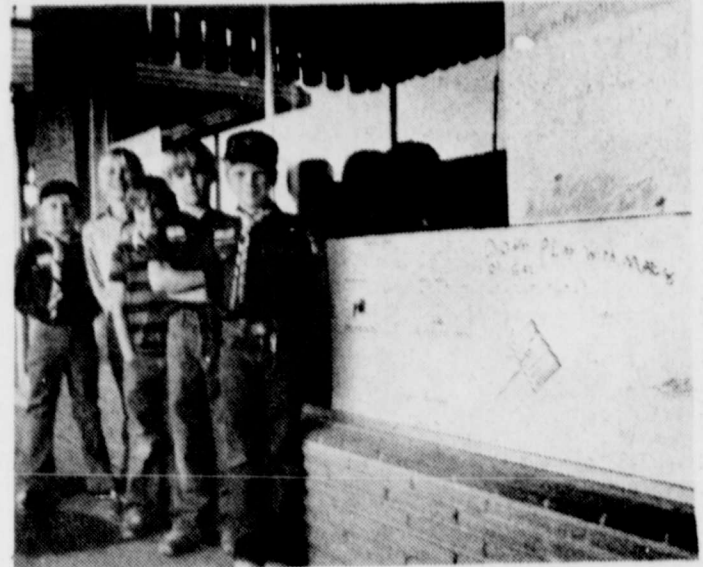

Heath was caught for a two yard loss, then on third down Heath hit McGuire with a 9 yard pass and a first down at the 21. Another pass fell incomplete, then Lindsey skirted left end, picking up good blocking all along the line and also in the secondary, and carried in for the Lopes' initial score. Heath was stopped short of the goal on the extra points attempt.

With just 38 seconds remaining in the first half, the Lopes kicked off to the Longhorns, but thwarted any threat at three plays later when McGuire intercepted a Warren pass on the Abernathy 35 and returned it to the 50.

Scott Morrison took the second half kickoff on the 17 and carried out to the 30. From there the Lopes moved to the Lockney 34, aided by a 23 yard scamper by Dunn and an 11 yarder by Lindsey. Faced with a 4th and 7 at the 34, Cuevas punted out of bounds on the Lockney 14. The Longhorns moved out to the Abernathy 17, then punted out of bounds on the Lopes' 9. A Lopez pass fell incomplete, Lindsey carried for 4 yards, then Cuevas got off a 41 yard quick kick on third down.

The visitors moved the ball to the Antelopes 7 where Powell recovered a fumble to stop the drive. Again the Lopes were forced to punt, and Cuevas booted a 40 yarder out of bounds on the Lockney 44. Lockney moved the ball to the Lopes 38 before punting out of bounds on the Abernathy 10.

With a 46 yard pass completion from Heath to Barrera and runs by Lindsey and Dunn, the Lopes marched to the Lockney 40 before again being faced with a fourth down situation. Cuevas went in, but instead of punting, threw a 29-yard pass to Barrera to keep the drive alive. However, the Lopes were stopped, on the

1 yard line when Heath pass intended for Sanders was intercepted. The Lopez defense rose up and held the visitors on their own 6 and took over again following a 64 yard Lockney punt.

A 15 yard penalty against Lockney, a Cuevas-to-Dunn completion for 9 yards and an 8 yard run by Sanders put the ball on the Lockney 35. A Heath-to-Barrera pass was incomplete, then on the next play Heath was almost trapped by the Lockney rush, was forced out of the pocket and threw on the run to Lindsey who outmaneuvered the defenders and outraced them to the goal line.

Again Heath was stopped short on the attempt for two extra points. The Longhorns managed only two plays following the ensuing kickoff before the Lopes took over on another fumble recovery. This time they put together a 40 yard drive to the 2 before relying on Cuevas' toe for the field goal and the winning margin.

The Lopes will travel to Idalou Friday night to battle the undefeated Idalou Wildcats of Coach Tom Ritchey. The former Abernathy player has brought his Idalou team to the forefront of the District 4-AA race with a 2-0 record. All other teams in the district have lost at least once.

Game time Friday night is 7:30.

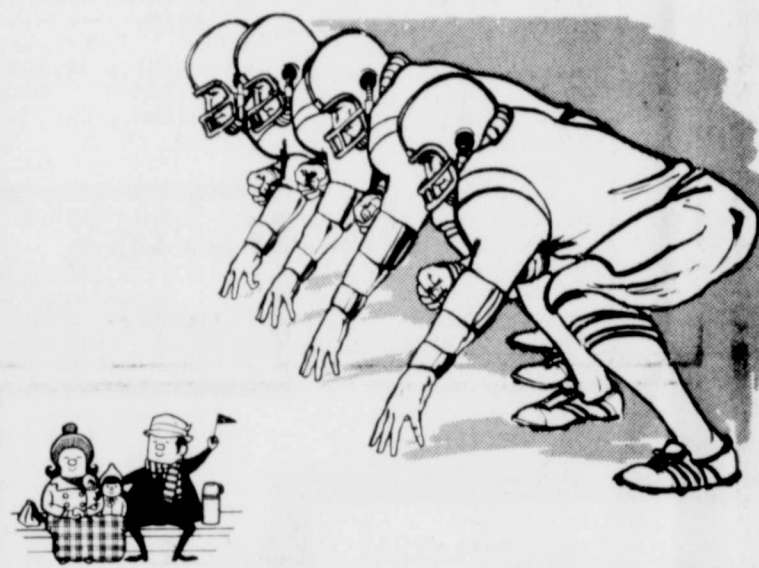
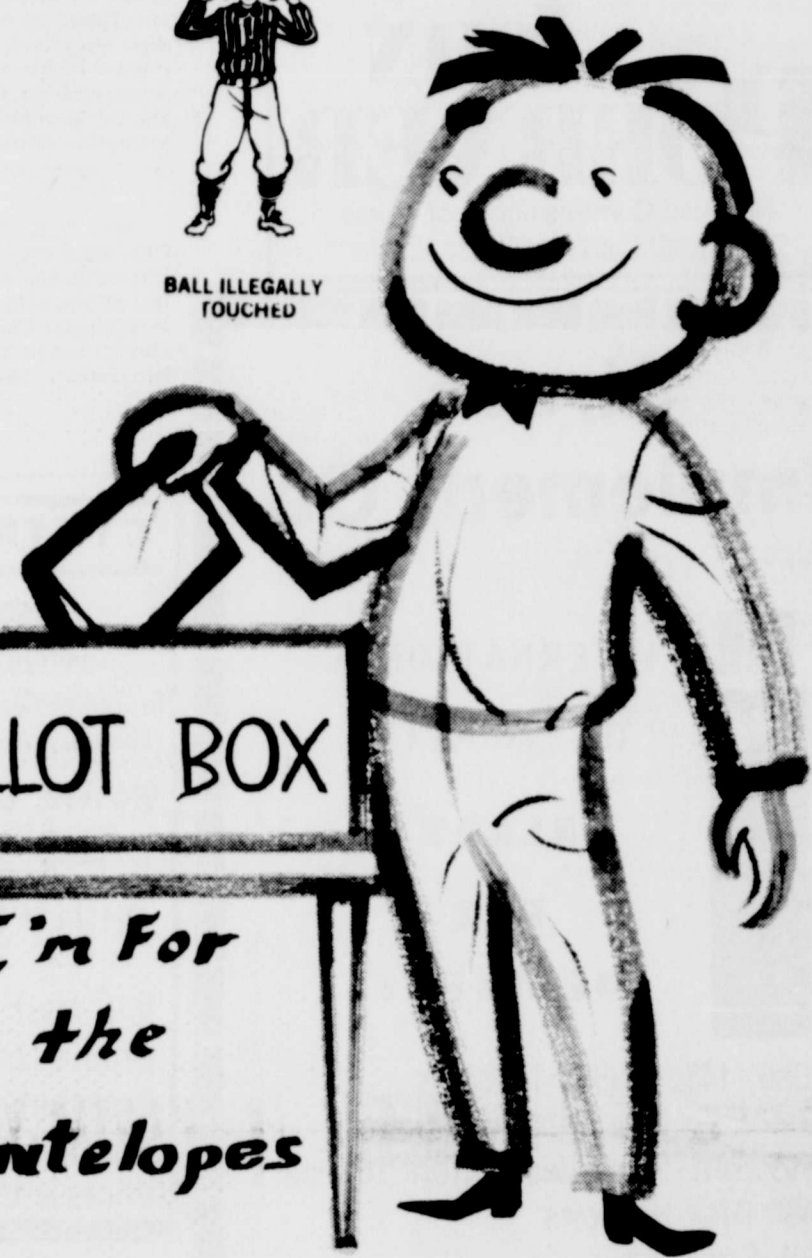

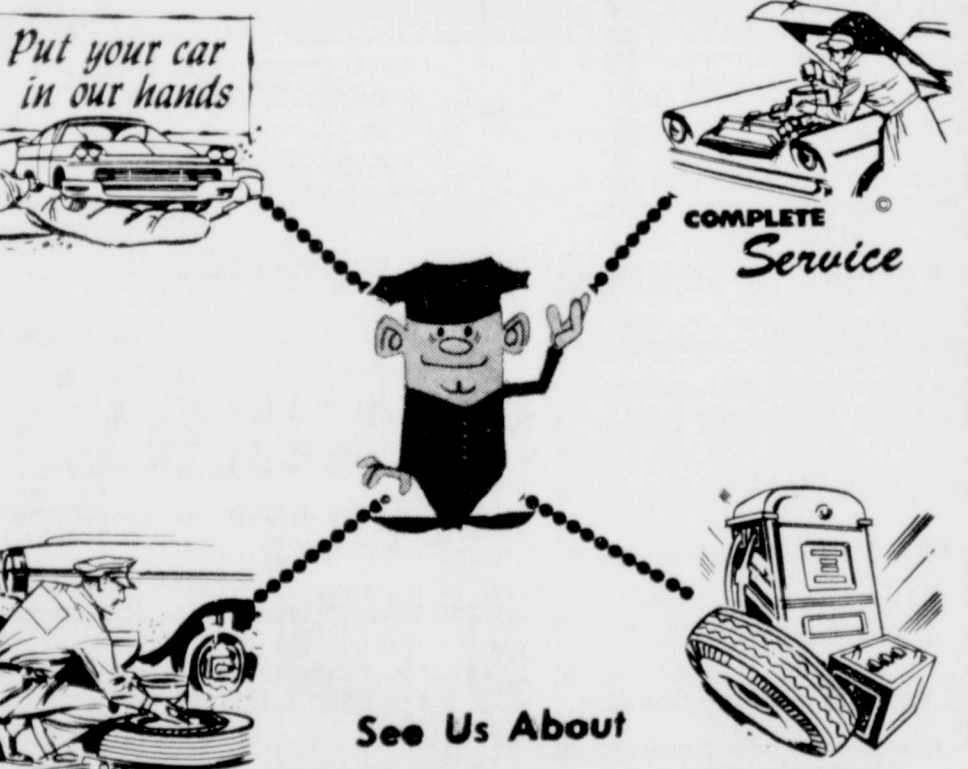
