Cross country running is a new sport in Abernathy High School this year. Eight boys and 21 girls make up three teams coached by Diana Lewis, The runners have done extremely well in competition against 4-AA schools. In a recent cross country meet in Lubbock for 24 schools, Abernathy came in third. topped only by Amarillo High, which is the defending state champ, and Amarillo Tascosa.

At cross country meets, contestants run a course of approximately two miles. The Lubbock meet covered two miles in Mae Simmons Park. The 2.2 mile course at the Brownfield meet was in Terry County Park. Cross country courses go uphill, downhill, into creek beds, around trees, over all kinds of terrain. The runners are given maps of the course and an opportunity to walk it before the meet so they'll know exactly where to go,

Running Benefits

Some, but not many, kids love to get out and run for the sake of running. Others find it a great conditioner for other sports. Many boy and girl basketball players run cross country in addition to basketball practice every day. A freshman girl works out every day with the cross country teams but won't participate in meets. She knows the running helps her in basketball.

Coach Lewis said running builds strength, speed, and endurance--valuable assets in any sport. The word is getting around that the cross country training improves performance in basketball, football, tennis, and track and field events. The universal popularity of jogging has added to students' interest in and acceptance of cross country running.

The runners first went through a program working out with weights to help their breathing by building up the upper body.

People often don't know enough about their own bodies," said Coach Lewis. "They don't know they tire easily because of weak chest and back muscles. "

Heath was caught for a two yard loss, then on third down Heath hit McGuire with a 9 yard pass and a first down at the 21. Another pass fell incomplete, then Lindsey skirted left end, picking up good blocking all along the line and also in the secondary, and carried in for the Lopes' initial score. Heath was stopped short of the goal on the extra points attempt

With just 38 seconds remaining in the first half, the Lopes kicked off to the Longhorns, but thwarted any threat three plays later when McGuire intercepted a Warren pass on the Abe mathy 35 and returned it to the 50.

Scott Morrison took the second half kickoff on the 17 and carried out to the 30. From there the Lopes moved to the Lockney 34, aided by a 23 yard scamper by Dunn and an 11 yarder by Lindsey. Faced with a 4th and 7 at the 34, Cuevas punted out of bounds on the Lockney 14. The Longhorns moved out to the Abernathy 17, then punted out of bounds on the Lopes' 9. A Lope pass fell incomplete, Lindsey carried for 4 yards, then Cuevas got off a 41 yard quick kick on third down.

The visitors moved the ball to the Antelopes 7 where Powell recovered a fumble to stop the drive. Again the Lopes were forced to punt, and Cuevas booted a 40 yarder out of bounds on the Lockney 44. Lockney moved the ball to the Lopes 38 before punting out of bounds on the Abernathy 10.

With a 46 yard pass completion from Heath to Barrera and runs by Lindsey and Dunn, the Lopes marched to the Lockney 40 before again being faced with a fourth down situation. Cuevas went in, but instead of punting, threw a 29-yard pass to Barrera to keep the drive alive. However, the Lopes were stopped, on the 1 yard line when Heath pass intended for Sanders was intercepted. The Lope defense rose up and held the visitors on their own 6 and took over again following a 64 yard Lockney punt. A 15 yard penalty against Lockney a Duran Duran
