Frontier Savings & Loan Moves Into New Building On Avenue D

Frontier Savings Association moved to new quarters on the corner of 7th and Ave. D last Saturday, December 9. Review staffers discovered Monday that the building is just as attractive inside as out.

The building is much larger than it looks. It contains a large customer service area featuring an inviting fireplace, a conference room, and a coffee room. There's a bathroom and storage room inside and another storage area outside opposite the drive-in window. The inside storage room houses the controls for the time and temperature sign.

Richard Petty of Frank McLaughlin Office Supply decorated and furnished the interior in shades of brown.

He included lots of comfortable chairs upholstered in leather, metal sculptures, a wall hanging, dried floor arrangement, and a beautifully crafted trunk used for a chair-side table.

Staff members Tommy Lane and Janice McKenzie thoroughly enjoy their new surroundings. They are not completely settled and the place lacks a few touches like wood shades for the windows but they invite the community to come visit and have coffee anyway. It's the kind of place in which anyone would love to spend a lot of time.

Frontier plans to have an open house in January. Future plans also include an alley paving project in cooperation with First Baptist Church.

Janice explained the traffic pattern for the new facility. Cars should enter the customer parking lot from Ave. D and exit the same way. Drive-in window traffic should enter the drive from 7th St. near the corner and may exit via the alley or may drive around the building to exit through the customer parking lot onto Ave. D.

Frontier's new facility evidently appeals to young people. The first visitor was a high school boy, the first drive-in window customer was a high school girl, and a college boy was the first depositor.

Harrison Named Secretary Of New School Board Group

President of Abernathy School Board Billie Harrison is also secretary of the newly formed South Plains Association of School Boards. Eddie Courtney, Levelland School Board member, is president of the association. Vice-president is Don Luckey, President of Plains School Board.

The officers were elected at an organizational meeting in Levelland in October. The association represents 53 schools in District 10. Its purpose is to send representatives to Austin to work with members of the legislature on what will benefit schools in the district.

Abernathy School Board voted to join the association December 4. Several of the men took part in the SPASB organizational meeting. Membership costs \$200 per school. Member school boards will take turns hosting association meetings.

Harrison said the association will also offer more opportunity to share experiences. He described several successful ideas the Abernathy board and administration picked up at Texas Association of School Boards and School Administrators workshops.

Every Friday, Abernathy School Superintendent Dr. Delwin Webb sends a report called Friday Flashes to each member of the school board to keep them posted on what happened at school through the week.

The morning after school board meetings, Webb sends a report of the meeting to every school building to keep teachers and staff members posted on what took place.

Harrison feels the sharing of ideas and experiences with other school boards will benefit all the schools involved. There are 10 regional school board associations in the state.

Twenty-Two Citizens Named To School Board's Building Plans Committee

All Abernathy School Board members toured the new and almost finished vocational building Monday night, December 4. Abernathy vocational classes offer training in upholstery and food service but the new building is designed to accommodate future curriculum changes including any kind of shop, cafeteria or dining room.

The board formally accepted the building subject to completion of the "punch list" which details minor corrections and finishing work. Dr. Webb said they no doubt saved twenty to \$25,000 by contracting the construction themselves and he thinks the result is a very good building. It will be open for inspection during Public School Week Open House in March.

BUILDING COMMITTEE
Board members nominated three people each to serve on a building plans committee headed by Harvey Lutrick. Lutrick is head of the Abernathy Stock Show Association which hopes to combine a stock show facility with school facilities. The committee is to check on community needs, see facilities elsewhere, and bring recommendations back to the board. Then it will have no further responsibility and will disband.

Don McKenzie nominated Donald Huffaker, Joe Lovelace, and Diana Lewis; David Pinson nominated Dan Ward, Lewis Lutrick, and Arno Struve; Dan Fondy nominated Mona Toler, Bud Rhodes, and Polly Tucker; Jerry Oswald nominated Loren West, Spec Cox, and Jerry Adams; Bob Riley nominated Robert Pope, Jimmie Davis, and Frankie Mills; Richard Howard nominated Larry Aldridge, Mitch LeMoine, and Jacky Newton; Billie Harrison nominated A. L. Stone, Larry Griffin, Charles Bowen, and Bonnie Hamilton. Half of those nominated have kids in Abernathy schools.

Board members mentioned other people they wanted on the committee but decided a larger one would have trouble functioning and felt the ones named represented a good cross section of the community. They set a March 1 deadline for the committee to report.

PORTABLE BUILDINGS
The board instructed Dr. Webb to proceed with arrangements to acquire two portable classroom buildings. Webb said they will be paid for with \$40,000 in federal funds provided by the Texas Education Agency. Abernathy

schools must pay the difference if the cost runs more than that. Federal funds will also equip and furnish the classrooms. The board must come up with specifications.

Dan Fondy asked if any strings will be attached to the federal funds. Webb said the contractor must certify that he is meeting wage standards and that the buildings must be used in migrant or other federal programs. Durability of such programs depends on politics, however, and if the program under which they were acquired dies, there will be no penalty for failure to continue specified use.

Jerry Oswald asked if the buildings are really needed. Webb said the school is not critically short of space but recommended they take advantage of the buildings in an effort to get kids out of undesirable facilities (the oldest part of elementary school). TEA has already advertised for bids which must be accepted or rejected by January 31.

BUILDING USE
The board agreed to charge First Baptist Church \$50 per Sunday for use of the school auditorium while the church auditorium is being remodeled. The figure was based on cost per hour of heating and cooling (including pre-conditioning), custodial fees, and personnel to open and close the school facility. This action sets no precedent. The amount was figured for First Baptist Church's request only. Similar arrangements in the future must be handled individually according to school costs.

Board members discussed policy and misunderstandings about use of school buildings by the public. See a related story on this page, cont. to page 3.

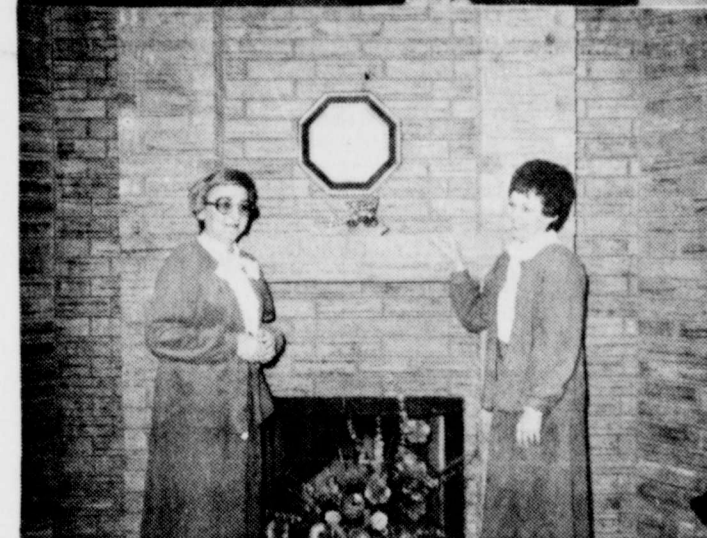

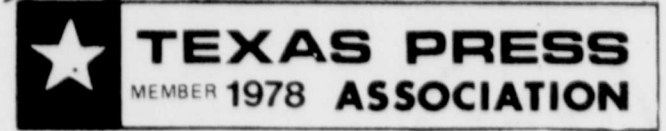
Young Farmers Sell Smoked Turkeys

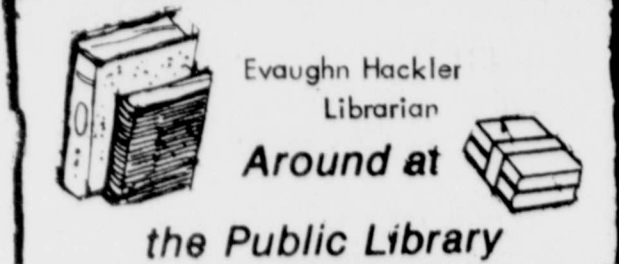

New And Old Favorite Christmas Books Available At Abernathy City Library

Lots of Christmas books are available at Abernathy's library, including three new ones just recently published.

Austin's Shoal Creek Publishers, which has specialized in Texana and regional books, is branching out this season into national distribution with three new children's picture books.

"Gabby's Christmas Wish," "Jennifer," and "Mandy's Laughing Book" are all four-color show cases for the talents of the Texas writers and illustrators who produce them. Publisher W. L. Thompson, who has spent over sixty years in printing and publishing in Austin, said he was particularly proud of the color work on these books.

"I think I enjoy reproducing art more than anything else in publishing," he said, "and children's picture books really are works of art." He entered the children's field last year with two books by James Rice, "Prairie Christmas" and "Cowboy Alphabet," which have a western theme. This year he has chosen non-regional stories with a universal appeal.

"Gabby's Christmas Wish" tells how a cocky little bird helps his wistful friend, a tiny evergreen, grow up to be a Christmas tree. Their story unfolds in soft, warmly colored forest scenes that

have a touch of the old-fashioned in their delicacy and in the golden light that suffuses the oil-painted illustrations.

Wallene Dockery of Lubbock wrote the book and Maurine Zook of Austin illustrated it for children up to age 11.

"Jennifer," a series of liquid-looking water colors, is a lyric evocation of a child in nature. It was written and illustrated by Houston's Jan Waide. "Jennifer" shows a maple tree gradually learning, through her friendship with a little boy, that some humans want nothing from the woods but to enjoy their peace and beauty. Children up to age 10 should enjoy "Jennifer."

"Mandy's Laughing Book" by East Texas author-illustrator Kay Owens Kincl is about a perky little girl who instructs all her animal friends to laugh the way she does. She means well, but she finds out that nobody wants to give up something as precious and unique as his own laugh. In this book cartoons emphasize the amusing quality of knobby-kneed giraffes and pizrical monkeys while suggesting the sensitive feelings that lie beneath a cheerful exterior. "Mandy's Laughing Book" is designed for children up to age 7.

Thompson said he was drawn to the three stories, all quite different in style, because they share a warmth that appealed to him. "I wanted to publish books that would make people smile," he said. He added, "These young Texas writers and illustrators have tremendous talent that ought to be recognized. I hope these three books will bring their work to a lot of new people."

Another Christmas book is "Prairie Christmas" by James Rice. Santa Claus was doing all right. Christmas Eve until he hit the Southwestern Panhandle country. As soon as he did, a blue norther sweeping across the prairies sent his reindeer fleeing for the comparative warmth of the North Pole.

Author James Rice was born in Coleman County, Texas, studied art at the University of Texas in Austin, and went on to teach in public schools for five years. He also wrote "Cowboy Alphabet" with a western theme. Originally designed for children, his books have found many fans among adult readers as well.

One will also find "The Story of Saint Nicholas" and "Christmas Comes Once Again" by Mildred Luchard, who has long been interested in the legends of Saint Nicholas and Santa Claus. But her story is not a retelling of old legends. Instead, she has read widely to find out how people live and what the Christian church was like in the days when Nicholas rode about on his horse, North Star. As a result, her story of the good saint, although based on legend, tells what really might have happened. The last section of the book tells how the legends about him grew, and how our Santa Claus came to be.

Some other Christmas books are "The Story of the Other Wisemen" by Van Dyke, "The Best Christmas" by Lee Kingman, "Christmas Customs Around the World" by Herbert Wemck, "Merry Christmas, Happy New Year" by Phyllis McGinley, "December Decorations" by Peggy Parish, and "Once Upon A Christmas" by Pearl S. Buck.

SCHOOL BOARD NEWS

TB TESTS

The board approved Dr. Webb's plan to hire for one day a nurse or two to give TB tests to Abernathy students. They previously decided to bus kids to the county health clinic in Plainview for immunizations, but Webb said it will take two buses to transport the 300 to 350 kids needing TB tests and cause them to miss a day of school. They will miss very little school if a nurse gives the tests here and the school will be spared the expense of running two buses to Plainview and back.

The county health clinic will provide all materials for the tests. Webb said they don't use air guns for injections anymore because that seems to hurt more than needles. He also said pending legislation will probably do away with the need for all this because of the expense.

MEETINGS

Dr. Webb encouraged board members to attend a Texas Association of School Administrators/Texas Association of School Boards workshop in Austin December 14 and 15 and a Mid-Winter Conference sponsored by the TEA in Austin January 3 or 4. He asked permission to attend the American Association of School Administrators Convention in New Orleans February 14-18.

Because the next regular board meeting date falls on New Years Day, they decided to meet the following Monday, January 8, at 7 PM. Dan Fondy suggested that each board member and Dr. Webb come to the meeting with ideas to present on goals and objectives for 1979.

REPORTS & RESIGNATIONS

The board accepted the resignations of Mrs. Kay Deering and Mrs. Linda Semetko and reviewed a

report on revenues from football season. The season total from high school games was \$10,455.73. Home games netted \$6,886.88; out of town ones brought in \$3,568.85. Revenues from freshman, JV, and junior high games came to \$707.71 and indicates increasing interest in non-varsity games.

This was the largest year ever for football revenues and the first time tickets cost \$2.50 instead of \$2. Basketball game tickets cost \$1.50 and 75¢.

Dr. Webb reported a November school enrollment of 1117. He said the lunchroom is operating in the black, serving lunch to 646 students and breakfast 144. Breakfast counts have increased each month, from 87 in September, to 130 in October, to the present figure. Webb said this has been the case in every school he's heard of.

TEACHER WORK LOAD

Dr. Webb gave board members charts showing the average number of students each teacher has per day. He said Abernathy Schools' teacher/student ratio is considerably under state recommendations. Elementary school averages one teacher to 24 students, junior high averages one to 30, and high school averages one to 18.

Don McKenzie asked for numbers of students per class but Webb said it is very complicated to figure because class enrollment changes each quarter. There was some question about a junior high Spanish class that reportedly has only one student. Dr. Webb said he thinks it has six now but said that still isn't enough to justify a class.

Profiles and Things

The results of a recent survey taken in history classes comprising seventy plus students even startled the instructor. Of those seventy plus students, only TWO raised their hands when asked if they had watched any segments of Centennial on TV. Conversely, 98 percent of those same students raised their hands when asked if they had watched various football games and series during the same time period.

Realizing people are weary of jaded polemics and that lay society has its own version of our public schools does not deter the writer from offering his opinions. But these opinions have been gleaned only after years of conscientious observation.

It is time to put the dot over the I. Home environment and parental guidance can no longer take a back seat and shift the blame if society is to prevail.

Recently a public school teacher sent over 60 progress reports home to parents explaining their children were in danger of failing. She received ONLY ONE reply.

This apathy is not confined to the one system. This attitude of getting the "kid" from under the feet and letting someone else worry with them is prevalent throughout the entire nation.

Some people are totally pessimistic. Others offer the lame excuse that both parents are employed, preventing them from assisting

with studies or teaching their children proper manners and goals in life. It is high time, and hopefully not too late, that society admit public school systems are not a panacea for the nation's ills. Equally, the schools are not responsible for behaviour contrary to a civilized people. To help, yes; totally responsible, no. No longer can we afford the luxury of "packing" our children off to school, complacent that once sent the home is no longer involved.

The old saw that discipline begins in the home is very true. The same applies to study. The teachers in this nation can try to teach for the 55 or 60 minute classroom period. Once the students leave the confines of the public school buildings, responsibility reverts to the home. Let us all hope and pray this responsibility is accepted---and soon.

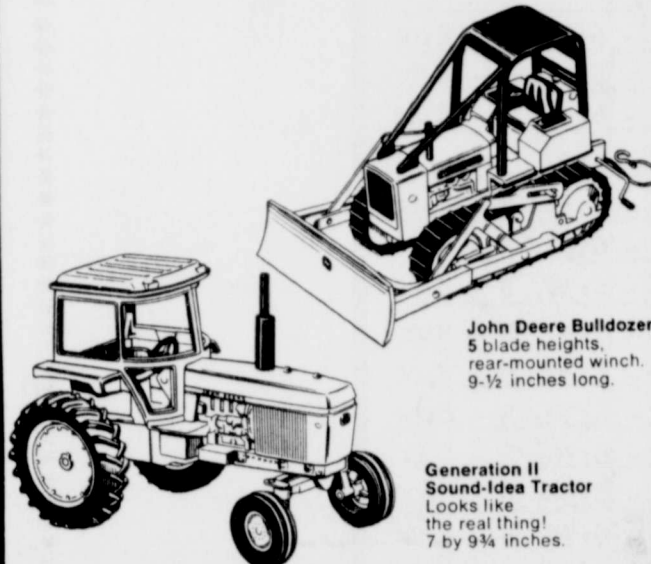

As for high accolades, no groups more deserving than the 1,117 students who make up the Abernathy schools student body—"one of the best in the state."

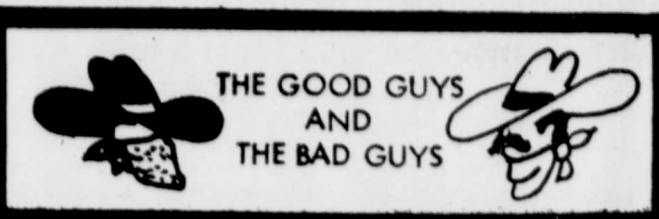
