Members attending the annual meeting of Plains Cooperative Oil Mill were Manager Edward Breihan's report to the membership. He reported net earnings of \$11,339,008 from the processing and marketing of the 439, 301 tons of 1977 crop cottonseed receipts. The final crush, completed on November 26th, reflects a seed price of \$110,02 per ton on the 1977 crop. Of this price, PCOM members received \$97.65 per ton in cash, \$11.81 in equity credits, and \$5.56 was applied to dormant plant expenses and prior years' corporate

Breihan stated that, "Member equity in the mill increased by \$6,990,302 from the past season's crop and is now back to a respe ctable \$12,500,000." He continued, "Working capital is reasonably adequate, almost all fringe problems are gone, and a new \$10,000,000 solvent plant construction problem is underway, with expected completion in November, 1979. " He paid tribute to the 87 gins and 14 elevators, working with dedicated

employees, for their cooperation and support. Breihan added, "This report reflects the degree of financial stability to which this mill has returned to just three short years. " Other special reports presented to the meeting included a report by Presid-

ent Joe Rankin and a slide presentation on the AIC National Institute of Cooperative Education by Teddy and Vicki Smithson, a young farm couple from Dimmitt, whom the mill sponsored to the National Institute.

### Holiday Death Rate Is Expected To Be Higher

AUSTIN --- The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today warned that the upcoming Christmas and New Year holiday periods could be the dead-

liest in recent years. Colonel Wilson E. Speir said that while traffic deaths statewide have been running about eight per cent over last year, death counts for the 1978 July 4th and Labor Day holiday weekends ran 40 to 45 per cent over 1977.

Based on these trends. Speir estimated that 44 persons will die in Texas traffic during the Christmas weekend from 6 p. m. Friday, December 22, through midnight Monday, December 25. He said another 35 deaths are likely in the New Year period from 6 p. m. Friday, December 29, through mid-

night Monday, January 1. At the end of preliminary holiday counts last year, 34 deaths were reported in the Christmas period and 30 during the New Year holidays.

Speir said all available DPS troopers will be on duty, and they and local officers will be working to keep traffic moving safely.

"I have asked our personnel to place special emphasis on removing drunks and reckless drivers from the streets and highthe DPS director added.

"We will continue to work with the news media to keep motorists posted on unusual traffic conditions, and to advise them on where and why serious holiday accidents are occuring, Speir said.

He noted that if present trends continue through the end of December, the state's traffic death toll will reach or exceed 4, 000 for the first time in history. A record 3, 698 persons died in Texas traffic during 1977.






