**STEERING COMMITTEE ON BUILDING IMPROVEMENTS SUGGESTS EXPANSION OF PRESENT FACILITIES FOR MEETINGS**

The best solution to Abernathy's public meeting place problem is to add on to City Hall. This was the consensus of the Building Improvements Steering Committee recently appointed by Abernathy City Council to study community needs and recommend a course of action. It met for the first time Thursday, January 4.  
The committee noted that the city hall was designed for expansion and thinks it best to take advantage of original planning rather than construct or buy a separate building. They think expansion of the present building should prove to be somewhat cheaper and look much nicer than a separate structure and be more convenient to supervision by city personnel.  
They discussed the need for at least 3000 square feet of space in the large meeting room. They have no recommendation for library size yet except for certain state requirements, but plan to meet with a library committee to see what is needed.  
Committee members said the city hall was adequate when it was built 20 years ago. The library, however, soon outgrew its space, the city hall staff could probably use more, and the community

certainly needs more than the present meeting room provides. They also emphasized that a project like this requires the support of the whole community and the facility will be for all community groups.  
The committee will meet again Monday, January 15 at 4 PM. Dan Ward is to confer before then with the architect who designed city hall, to see what he thinks is possible. They hope to have the needs assessed and recommendations planned before spring elections.  
Those serving on the committee and present at the meeting were: Minnie Struve and Dan Ward representing the library's interest, Floyd Shipman and Rev. HB Coggins representing the Sunshine Group, Rudolph Struve representing the Lions Club, Don Heath representing the Chamber of Commerce, Ruby Booth, Buddy Bowen and Shana Toler representing young people's interests. Evaughn Hackler is also on the committee but could not attend.  
Hubert H. Selke, an Abernathy building contractor, got the contract to build the present city hall September 16, 1954. It cost \$51,340. The building still looks nice and is sturdy as ever but we're not likely to see a similar price again.

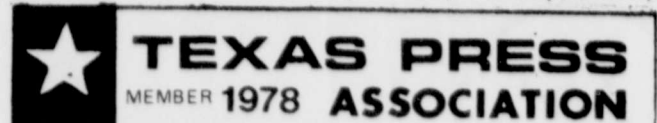

Abernathy Lions are homeless and wandering since Graham's Restaurant closed. This week, President Milt Pope hung the club's charter in City Hall Club Room until further notice. The club prefers to meet in a restaurant but since we don't have one with banquet facilities, they have to make do with the city hall room, Paul Herchman of Sav-A-Lot Family Center serves food for the Lions' noon meal from his new delicatessen.  
The club charter is dated March 15, 1945 and includes the names of A. B. Reid, E. G. Thompson, J. P. Nystel, G. G. Gilliland, Joe Thompson, Ercell Givens, John L. Harnal, W. V. Cunningham, W. A. Richter, R. S. Reid, F. B. Lindey, J. W. Harris, Frank W. Roberts.  
L. I. Nunley, G. L. Jackson, Jack Barton, R. A. McAlister, R. E. Albers, Ted Watts, Walter D. Hupp, W. F. Wolf, Henry M. Simmons, Hilburn Barrick, F. H. Renfro, John Duty, W. V. Swinburn, A. H. Miller, F. B. Lovelace.  
M. O. Hood, Boyd L. Griffith, A. E. Donnell, W. G. Webb, J. L. Irish, D. O. Williams, H. E. Richter, Geo. W. Ragland, Ralph Johnston, J. Frank Nix, Carl Parks, T. B. Stone, Amo Struve, Dan F. Ward, H. C. von Struve, D. L. French and Frank Beauchamp.  
Charter members A. B. Reid, Joe Thompson, Ercell Givens, J. L. Irish, Amo Struve, and Dan Ward are still members of the club. Its first president and secretary-treasurer were Andy Reid and Ercell Givens.  
In 1945, the club met in the banquet room of Graham's Restaurant which was then in the building now occupied by Pope Insurance and the Weekly Review. When Graham's moved to a new building on the highway, the club moved, too. That building burned so they moved to Graham's on Ave. D. When that closed, they switched to First Baptist Church Fellowship Hall for awhile and now to City Hall Club Room.  
Three artifacts go where ever the club goes--the charter, a brass Lions Club bell, and a little enameled pot with an attached squeeze horn. The pot and bell survived the fire at Graham's on the highway. After the fire, Harold Stillwell dunked the bell in something to clean it. It's as good as ever, though no longer shiny.  
The pot still bears scorch marks from its awful ordeal and had to have a new horn. For the information of non-Lions, the horned pot is traditional equipment for the office of Tall Twister.  
The charter escaped the fire. Some Lions president not so conscientious as Milt left it hanging in the flat Graham's Building.

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**GSPA ELECTS DIRECTORS**

Lubbock, Tex. ----The Texas Plains Region of Grain Sorghum Producers Association will be represented by five directors at the National GSPA meeting in Dallas on February 1-2. The Texas Plains Region (Region III) is composed of the High Plains and Rolling Plains areas. There are approximately two thousand GSPA members in this region which produces 15 percent of the nation's grain sorghum.

In a December meeting, county and district representatives elected A. W. Anthony, Jr., Friona; Robert Green, Hartley; K. B. Parish, Springlake; J. B. Cooper, Jr., Roscoe; and Melvin Barton, of Dimmitt as their Regional Directors. The Regional Directors from eight regions in a five-state area make up the National GSPA Board.

Three recommendations were approved at the Region III meeting and will be presented at the National Board. The recommendations are that GSPAs: (1) work for "parity of income" and use cost of production with a fair return for management and capital as the basis for achieving it through government programs, sales prices, etc.; (2) promote an extended loan, (reserve program,) in which the farmer's minimum release price would not be below the full cost of production, plus accrued charges and a 15 percent profit; and (3) support the general concept of the new Federal Crop Insurance Program as presented to Congress last fall by USDA. The National Board should, however, carefully watch the development of the law to see that producer's interests are maintained.

Grain sorghum promotion has been left up to the producer, and Grain Sorghum Producers Association is an organization of grain sorghum farmers who are doing just that. GSPA was founded in 1956 as a non-profit organization to promote the use of grain sorghum, improve farm legislation, prevent surpluses, develop worldwide markets and improve the quality of sorghum through research.

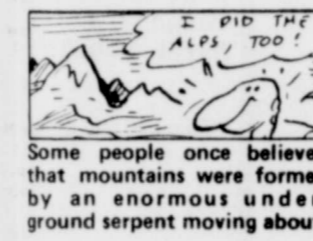

**County Agent Urges Farm Soil Tests**

The soil is a good starting point for improving farm income in 1979. A complete soil inventory with a soil test is suggested by County Extension Agent, Ollie Limer, and it provides a producer with the opportunity to reflect on the production problems on farms of pasture and wheat and acre ages. "The soil testing program is a logical step since fertilizer recommendations are keyed to the economical use of plant food," Limer states.

Presently, many producers in Hale County are uncertain about what crop will be planted. This uncertainty, plus the late harvest season, has prevented soil testing and fertilizer application. "If the producer is undecided as to what crop will be planted," Limer says, "then, it is recommended that the alternative crop to be planted also be listed on the information sheet. This approach will allow the producer to evaluate the fertilizer requirements and cost on both crops before determining which crop should be planted."

The county agent emphasized the importance of submitting soil samples which are representative of the field. The results of the laboratory analysis will be as accurate and representative as the soil sample submitted for testing.

Agricultural producers will find that soil testing can help solve many of their soil fertility problems. The county agent invites any person interested in soil testing to contact his office for instructions on how to take soil samples, the information sheets to accompany the samples, how to prepare them for mailing, and the charges involved.

"And finally," he reminds, "there is no time like the present for taking and submitting soil samples for testing."

**The Speaker Reports**

**AUSTIN**---The integrity of voting records in the Texas House of Representatives is assured for the future with a new vote-toting system that has been installed.

Since 1941 the House relied on an electro-mechanical system, and in recent years the 38-year-old device has proven susceptible to malfunctioning. To eliminate delays caused by the need for manual vote verification, expense of special made parts and to preserve accuracy, the House in its last session approved a request to overhaul the problem-prone board.

Months of investigation in reviewing leading companies and the operation of machines in other states produced a \$190,000 package well below the \$920,000 bid for a computerized voting system for the Texas House in 1973.

The new machinery automatically enters into the record, enters floor votes and insures the integrity of voting stations. A display board with freeform capabilities spells out information about legislation under consideration, produce the day, time, number of the measure being acted upon and vote totals.

Instead of having to conform to a machine's capabilities, the House is able to operate under its present rules because of custom

features incorporated within the board.

Those familiar with the old voting system in the House will have to look closely to see any sign of change. Tally boards with members' names on each side of the rostrum remain as does the outer shell of the summary board above the rostrum. This was done to pare cost and retain the historical flavor of the chamber.

A significant change is the drastic reduction in space needed to contain the machinery. The components of the new board consist of a control panel and hardware cabinet and is 1/5th the size of the old machine, which filled a small room.

Individual voting stations on each member's desk was replaced with recessed hardware which blend with the desk tops and allow yes, no or present balloting with a keyed control.

More than six months was needed to complete removal of the old components and to effect the changes necessary to modify the system.

I am pleased with the efforts to find an economical and efficient system which will care for the needs of the House for years to come. There is no doubt that this system best suits our needs for the dollars that were expended.

### Natural Fibers Fashion Contest And Show In April

4-H'ers should be interested to know that skills in home sewing and fashion will earn rewards for the top contestants in the second annual Natural Fibers Fashion Revue at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center in April.

The fashion revue is one of the major events which will open the 1979 South Plains Farm Show at the Civic Center April 5-7.

Adults, 4-H'ers, and youths from Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma will compete for hundreds of dollars in prizes and will model the apparel they have created from fabrics which are predominantly cotton, wool, or mohair.

The revue is designed to emphasize elements of good clothing construction, home sewing and fashion, as well as the use of natural fibers, said Becky Culp chairman of the planning committee. She is area clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Amarillo.

The competition will have three divisions: 1. Young teen (grades 6-8), 2. Teen (grades 9-12), and 3. Adult.

Eligible garments must be made from a fabric that is all cotton or wool or mohair, or from a fabric that is a blend containing at least 50 percent cotton or wool or mohair.

For example, Ms. Culp said, a fabric of 70 percent wool and 30 percent nylon is eligible. Mohair may count with wool toward the 50 percent minimum wool percentage, she explained. Thus a fabric containing 30 percent wool, 20 percent mohair and 50 percent acrylic would be eligible, as an example.

Accessories such as blouses, trim and inner construction fabrics are excluded from this requirement. Contestants are eligible to enter one ensemble. Single items such as pants only, a skirt or shorts only are not considered a complete ensemble.

The entries will be judged on construction as it affects the overall appearance, compatibility of fabric and design, quality of work, creativity overall appearance, accessories, becomingness, fit, poise, and representation of current fashion trends. These are all skills that can be gained through 4-H projects, states Assistant County Extension Agent—Mrs. Naomi Wheeler.

A panel of judges will determine first, second and third place winners in each of the three divisions, Ms. Culp said.

Any Hale County youth are encouraged to consider participating in this fun event. Call the Extension office (296-7466) for an application or further information.

### What To Do: If A Fire Strikes

Every 57 seconds, a home fire breaks out somewhere in this country. To increase your chances of escaping from a home fire, it is essential to map out an escape plan well in advance. This plan should be reviewed by everyone in the family, because when fire breaks out it's often too late. If you have practiced a home escape route, and are awakened at night by the sound of a smoke alarm, the early warning will help you to leave your home safely and quickly.

To help protect your family, you should:  
Install smoke detectors on every level of the house, especially on the ceiling at the top of the stairs near the sleeping areas. A smoke detector may alert you before a fire reaches the dangerous high heat stage.  
Everyone should know two exits from every room in the house. Second story windows may need a rope or chain ladder to help occupants escape safely.  
Hold periodic fire drills with the family, including a planned meeting place outside the house for a head-count.
