Tractorcade Stories Filter Back Home As Local Farmers Plan AAM Support

Thirty-eight area farmers met at the Dairy Queen Monday, January 22 to reorganize local American Agriculture Movement efforts and plan further support for the AAM Tractorcade headed for Washington, D.C.

The group set four goals to accomplish in the next few weeks. The first is to truck another tractor from here to join the tractorcade. The second is to recruit more men to take part in it. The third is to enlist men to fly to Washington to meet with legislators when the tractorcade arrives there. The fourth is to round up contributions to make sure all the tractorcade equipment and men get back home.

They figure everybody in town--not just farmers--can help with at least one of these goals. The farmers say they themselves must put aside disagreements and join a unified effort to get anything done.

Tractorcade groups started out from six different places in the Middle and Southwest. Farmers join the groups passing nearest them on the way to Washington. The tractor representing Abernathy, New Deal, and Idalou is with Group #1 on the southernmost route. There are 345 vehicles in the group. Ninety to 100 are tractors and the rest are support vehicles like pickups and campers.

Roy Don Stevenson, J. W. Hamilton, and Willie Dunn left last weekend to meet the tractorcade in Jackson, Mississippi Monday night and take over the tractor so Franklin Dunn and Ray West could come home.

Brian Shadden, Carol Dunn, and Gary Lovelace will fly to Atlanta later to relieve that crew and take the tractor on into Washington, D.C.

All six groups plan to meet near Alexandria, Virginia, February 3 for a huge rally and barbecue. Father Andy, the leader of Group #3 which started in Colorado, will lead the whole tractorcade into Washington, D.C. He's been a leader in the AAM since it began in Colorado 1 1/2 years ago.

Hearsay reports of the tractorcade's progress so far say Groups #4, 5, and 6 froze out in the mid-west but are regrouping in Des Moines, Iowa. The story goes that two or three of the tractorcade had big blades and for awhile, the only thing moving up there was the tractorcade.

Reports say national guard units stopped Group #3 at Kansas City, Missouri on orders from the governor. The governors of both Missouri and Illinois had given permission for the tractorcade to enter their

states but changed their minds. Group #3 leaders decided to ask permission to use a lesser highway and, after meetings and discussions, the governor of Missouri relented. This means that the tractorcade must travel a two lane highway for 120 miles which will tie up traffic considerably. They regained permission, though, to use a major highway in Illinois.

Leaders say the tractorcade wouldn't slow traffic much on major highways since there's more room to pass and motorists slow down to tractor speed to read all the signs they carry and that slows traffic a lot.

Farmers think the tractorcade is having political effect already as a delegation of Texas congressmen reportedly flew down to confer with AAM leader Gerald McCathem. He's supposed to have convinced them that the farm bill already grants authority to move support prices to 90% of parity.

Local farmers plan another meeting at 7 AM Thursday, January 25 at the Dairy Queen. It's a loosely organized group with no officers, but Laurin Prather says they owe a great deal of gratitude to those involved in the tractorcade already and, by participating in one or more of the four goals set last Thursday, everyone can help make the effort a success.

Council Debates Drainage, Grade Slope In Pinson Place; Says Go Ahead With Community Building Plans

At a called meeting Thursday, January 18, Abernathy City Council approved plans for water, sewer, and street installation in Pinson Place. Addition and authorized City Manager Larry Fields to advertise for bids on the water and sewer project. Bids for streets were put off until later at the request of developer James Pope. The developers want to get started as soon as possible and street bids take longer than water and sewer which have to be installed before streets anyway.

Councilmen debated a long time before granting approval because of a mistake in the plans drawn up by the developers' engineers. The plans called for a 1/10% grade or slope instead of the 8/100% previously agreed upon. City Manager Fields said both the developers' and city engineers agree that 1/10% slope would be more desirable to prevent any drainage problems than 8/100% and suggested the council approve the higher slope.

Pope reminded them that the city's engineer was the one who suggested 8/100% in the first place. He said they'd certainly rather have lots of slope but the land is very flat and there's not a whole lot to be done about it. Both the city's and developers' engineers say conditions for drainage will be neither perfect nor critical.

Phillips Addition, constructed on adjacent land just as flat, has a 6/100% slope. Fields said he's had few complaints about standing water, but not enough slope causes "birthbaths" (water which stands in little pools). Pope said streets in Pinson Place will be dug out below ground level and constructed so water will drain to the gutters and not stand on asphalt. "Birthbaths" in the gutters will cause no maintenance problems with streets and will evaporate quickly in this climate.

Pope said the difference between 1/10% and 8/100% doesn't sound like much but that it will take two or three times as much dirt to spread the higher slope over several lots and be twice as expensive. Curbs will be laid at ground level, the streets dug out, and lots filled in to the top of the curbs.

Thompson said the council doesn't want to put undue expense on developers. Neither do they want to approve anything that will cause problems for the city. Pope asked how much street repair has been needed in Phillips Addition these 15 years of its existence.

Fields had conferred with the city engineer who said he could live with 8/100% but the slope will probably be 6/100% in some places because it's hard to get it even. If you want 8/100% minimum all over, you must aim for a higher slope. Engineers cannot guarantee, however, that there will be no birthbaths in with the higher slope. A lot depends on the contractor.

Thompson said he thinks the uniformity of slope is more important than percent of slope. Councilman Harold Thompson said if 6/100% is doing the job in Phillips Addition, 8/100% ought to do it in Pinson Place. Kester said all figuring was done with 8/100% in mind. The higher slope was just a mistake on the plans.

The other councilmen said 8/100% was OK with them since the city engineer will oversee the construction to make sure it's properly done. Bids on water and sewer installation will be opened at the February council meeting.

The council approved another change in the plans concerning entrances to

alleys. The engineer drew concrete aprons at each alley entrance like those always used in Lubbock. However, Abernathy alleys don't have them and they cost too much to consider. The council granted permission to skip the aprons.

WATER PROJECT
Fields gave councilmen a financial report on the current water improvements project and a letter from Universal Tank & Tower, the company building our new water tower. The letter said their field operation is three weeks behind schedule and asked that they be allowed until April 30 to finish instead of March 6. The council approved the request.

It's almost time to pay the contractor on the project but \$246,000 that the city will get from Farmers Home Administration hasn't come yet. The city is depending on that money to meet its obligation so the council authorized the mayor to issue time warrants until FHA sends the money.

The financial report shows \$661,687.11 in funds available including city revenue bonds, state jr. lien bonds, interest on C/D's, and the amount due from FHA. It shows expenditures of \$274,062.59 to Panhandle Construction Company, the project contractor; \$3,937.50 to Universal Tank Company; \$39,949.75 to Parkhill, Smith, & Cooper, the engineering firm. Miscellaneous expenditures include \$69,750 to Bob Riley for land purchase, \$2,000 to Lee O'Neal for land purchase, \$7,062.50 to Underwood Neuhaus for a worth of small expenses.

After all funds are in and all expenditures met, the city will have \$21,198.24 left over from the project.

COMMUNITY BUILDING
Fields said the Building Improvements Steering Committee has gone as far as it can without preliminary architectural drawings and cost estimates. Arnold Maeker, the architect who designed City Hall, will do

preliminary sketches for \$2,000.

Councilmen thought that was awfully high and tried to think of some other way to go. Fields said, however, that people have got to know what the project is going to look like and how much it will cost before they vote. He said it just depends on how serious the council is about building the facility. Money for the plans will have to come out of revenue sharing funds.

Councilman Thompson thought they should be able to get the preliminary plans cheaper but said it's either spend the money or drop the whole project and a lot of people seem to want it. He thought, though, that a good builder could tell them all they want to know. Fields said he could check around but Maeker has the original and only plans of City Hall.

They decided to go ahead with the project and have Fields negotiate the price of preliminary drawings with Maeker or any others willing to be consultants.

The discussion turned to financing the project. Fields said it will probably be necessary to raise taxes a little to pay for it. Mayor Thompson thought that shouldn't be necessary because of some bonds to be retired soon. Fields said there's no way to tell until they confer with the city's bonds consultant.

MINORITY REPRESENTATIVES

The mayor and council noted recent protests to the school board for failure to appoint representatives of minority groups to its building plans committee. They had no complaints about the city's Building Improvements Steering Committee but thought they should include representatives from these groups, too.

The council didn't appoint individuals to the committee but asked organizations to send representatives to serve on it. They decided to talk to local minorities and see who they want to participate.

ADVISORY COUNCIL RECOMMENDS PLAYGROUND AND SCHOOL NURSE

The Parents Advisory Council (PAC) meets monthly and acts as liaison between the school, the programs, and the community. The 24 members are grouped according to interests and the ages of their children. Lee Blanco is president of the council and a member of the elementary group which also includes Arnie Young, Bruce and Paula Laurence, and Helen Casey.

The junior high group includes Keith and Susie Ellis, Carl and Penny Kelley, Felipe and Mary Lopez, and Dean and Jan Wesley. Rebecca Barrera, Andrew and Della Guillen, Sue Johnson, Della Mae Mason, and Catarina Rodriguez make up the high school group. Maybell Glass is a non-parent member.

School board members Don McKenzie, Jerry Oswalt, and David Pinson attended the workshop as did faculty members working in the program. Bowen was most pleased with the turnout. Nearly 30 people, including three students, participated.

The council made two specific recommendations which Director Bowen promised to relay to the school administration and school board, something the parents have suggested for several years. The other was for an enclosed play area with

crawling and climbing structures for kindergarten, pre-kindergarten and early childhood classes.

Bowen said the PAC is not a figurehead group as in some schools and a November audit of the programs by field consultants of the Texas Child Migrant Program showed the plans from last year's workshop were carried out.

He attended a Midwinter Conference in Austin this month which acquainted schools with new legislation concerning the Title I programs. Speakers stressed the importance of involving the community in the programs, getting input from many groups, and giving them the opportunity to learn about the programs and recommend changes. The Abernathy PAC does this. Bowen himself is a member of the Migrant Advisory Council for Region XVII Education Service Center located in Lubbock.

Abernathy teachers working in the Title I and Migrant programs are Kathy Sprawls and Adell Hale, pre-kindergarten; Imogene Amerson, primary; Golden Ferguson, intermediate; Jan Johnson, junior high; Debbie Hunley, high school. Aides are Billie Jean Spruiell, student records; Amy Garcia, school-community relations; Susie Harkey, and Ann McCune, high school; Mary Lopez, Janey Rodriguez, Ramona Garcia, and Susan Bigham, elementary.

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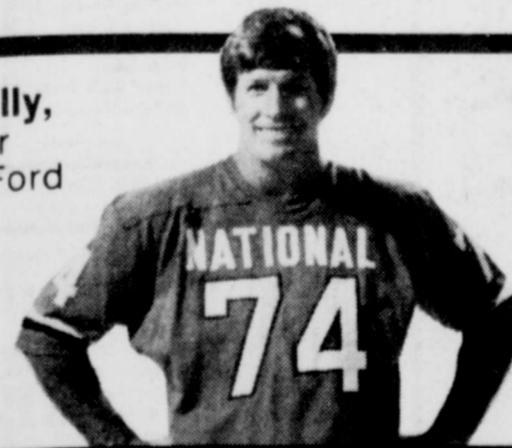

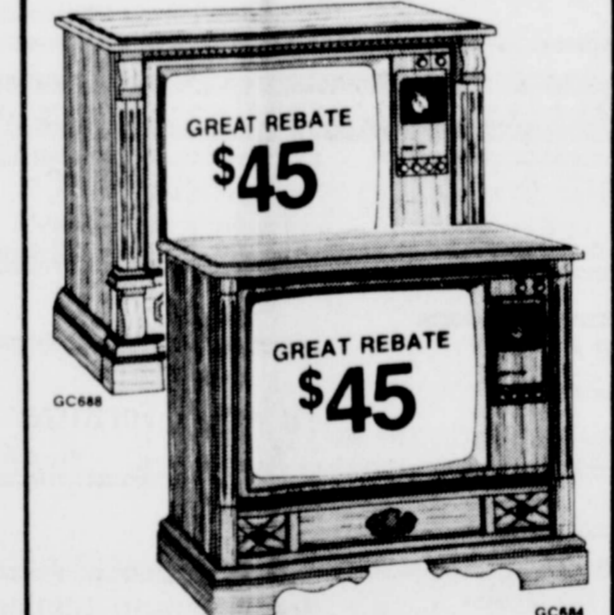
