



City Considers Paving Project

The City of Abernathy is contemplating a Paving Project this coming spring or summer. Those people presently without paving improvements are reminded of the city's paving policy.

The present policy of the City of Abernathy for curb, gutter, and paving improvements is that the individual property owner bears the entire cost of all improvements abutting their property. The city bears the costs of those improvements abutting city property, to include intersections, curb and gutter radii at such intersections, and that portion of street adjoining the alleys which does not abut on private property. A city ordinance regulates the construction, alteration and improvements of streets and alleys in the city.

Persons desiring curb, gutter, and paving improvements with the city should observe the following steps:

- (1) Come by the City Hall to fill out a request stating improvements desired, or mail a letter to the City Hall to that effect.
- (2) After the required 66 2/3% of property owners involved in any given area have made known their desire for improvements, the City Engineer will prepare specifications and cost estimates.
- (3) All property owners involved will then be notified what their particular costs are, and that amount must then be deposited in an escrow account by at least 66 2/3% of the property owners involved.
- (4) The remaining 33 1/3% percent, or less, which did not voluntarily petition and place their cost of the paving in the escrow fund established for such improvements, will then be placed in the assessment program.

STONE GIVEN GRAIN AWARD

COLLEGE STATION---
(Sp1)---Regional winners have been announced in the 1978 Texas 4-H Grain Sorghum Production Project.

Dudley E. McClurg of Tullia placed first and will receive a \$500 scholarship for producing the most irrigated sorghum in Region I of the project.

Other winners, in order of placing, in the irrigated sorghum division of Region I include Jody Foster, Lockney; Lanny C. Fulton, Floydada; and Don D. Stone of Abernathy. Foster will receive a \$50 U. S. Savings Bond and Fulton and Stone will each receive a \$25 bond.

The contest was conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas 4-H Foundation arranged with Louisiana Seed Company, Inc. and Funk's Seed International for sponsorship of the awards. All entrants in Region I planted Funk's G-623 GBR grain sorghum.

Stone planted about 5.5 acres on June 12. He applied 125 pounds of 10-30-9 with a side dressing of 100 pounds of anhydrous ammonia. He irrigated twice and applied Millogard herbicide. The plot was harvested on Oct. 12 with a yield of 3,781.8 pounds per acre.

These four 4-H members were among 37 across the state who planted and entered a minimum of four acres of sorghum in the production project.

Baptist Church Improvement Work Construction

Construction started January 22 on the first building project undertaken by First Baptist Church in 20 years. The project includes enlargement of the church foyer, choir, and pulpit area and construction of a bride's room and additional restrooms at the front end of the educational building. A covered walkway will connect the new rooms to the foyer.

The auditorium will have new carpet and cushioned pews. The pulpit area is to be completely redone with wood paneling and sliding doors to display or cover the baptistry as needed. The auditorium was last redecorated in 1959. The last construction was the nursery building in 1957.

The church is contracting the work itself under direction of architect Bill Cox of Lubbock and the building committee composed of Chairman Joe Thompson, Dr. Delwin Webb, Joe Lovelace, Y. F. Snodgrass, Myrna Davis, Docia Miller, and Gwen Riley. It will take something like eight months to complete.

The project was planned and begun while Dr. Jacky Newton was pastor of the church. It was financed through a bond sale to church members.

The congregation meets for Sunday morning and evening worship services in the school auditorium while construction continues. The church voted last Sunday night to ask Dr. Dan Kent, Professor of Religion at Wayland Baptist College, to serve as interim pastor until a new one can be found. Pulpit committee members Jim Bob Smith, Ralph Wolf, J. L. Miller, Jerry W. Adams, and Billy Skipper, chairman, are traveling each weekend to hear and interview possible prospects.

OPPORTUNITY PLAN DISCUSSED AT LION'S CLUB MEETING

Guest speaker at a recent Lions Club meeting was Buff Morris, founder of Opportunity Plan, Inc., a program that has loaned five million dollars to average kids needing money to go to college or trade school. Abernathy teacher Sharon Kester also spoke, telling how Morris' program made it possible for her and her four sisters to go to college.

Another beneficiary, Jan Hill, local florist and former teacher, was unable to attend but in a later interview, admitted to being very emotional about Morris and his program.

Morris pointed out that athletes, scholars, and deprived kids have no trouble getting help to go to college. However, ordinary kids with no special abilities, from average, middle income, tax paying families can seldom get help.

His program is completely separate and different from government aid programs. A person needs only a desire for education or training and a willingness to work. There's no test involved, only an interview with Mr. Morris and recommendations from the student's home community.

Each accepted student gets however much money he or she needs for school and living expenses, a budget to live on, and help in finding a job. Students keep strict account of the money they spend and begin paying back their loan immediately. This continues all through their schooling and afterward until the loan is paid in full without interest.

Morris and aides get student progress reports from teachers and check students' accounts quarterly. When one has unexpected expenses, Morris provides the money to meet them.

Students who accept government loans are supposed to pay back the money when they start earning. Many don't and the huge default has made headlines recently. Opportunity Plan, Inc. loses only 1 1/2% to 2% of the money loaned and then usually because some students choose unprofitable careers. Morris is beginning now to encourage high school students to consider trade schools, financing their

training the same way he does college.

Sharon said she came from a good home but there were five kids and no money for college. Even with a job, she ran out of money to finance the second half of her freshman year at West Texas State, Canyon. Another girl in her dorm, though not rich, seemed to have all the money she needed all the time. Sharon asked how she did it and the girl told her about the Opportunity Plan.

Sharon could hardly believe it but with her bags packed to leave, she stopped in to see Morris. He asked what she needed and she said, "Money." She borrowed \$3300 in two and a half years and owned only \$1120 when she graduated.

Sharon said she knows from her own experience and that of her four sisters that Morris does what he says he will do. That gives kids the security they need to get through college on their own. She considers him her second father and they have continued their association through the years. She closed by saying, "There's nothing wrong with being without money if you don't let it get you down."

Jan Hill's brother had a football scholarship to West Texas but soon decided there must be a better way to get through. He heard of Opportunity Plan, Inc., applied, and was accepted. Three years later he told Morris about sister Jan and was invited to bring her for an interview.

Jan borrowed \$4600 and worked for 3 1/2 years in the library. Opportunity Plan, Inc. set up a set of books for her, she turned in every paycheck to them, and was given money for all her needs, even down to allowances for clothes and beauty shop. She went to school year around and by the time she graduated, had already paid back \$2000 on her loan.

Jan said her parents couldn't even give her spending money and there's no way she could have gone to college without Morris. She's most grateful for the Plan and for the pride and confidence she gained from paying her debt.

Morris handles each

student individually. He financed Sharon's education even though she was engaged. That usually disqualified a girl. He allowed Jan to join a sorority even though that made her case more expensive.

Morris says we need to get over the idea that only the disadvantaged need money. There are places for businesses and corporations to borrow money and there should be for students, too. His program is that place.

He doesn't care if a student is from a rich family, either. He has some who are but the family is split with no one wanting responsibility for the kids. Some families are quite comfortable but not enough to remain so and educate several kids, too.

Morris never asks for co-signers. Students borrow on their own integrity and ability.

Morris' secretary, Betty Boone, invited Abernathy Lions and their wives to visit Opportunity Plan, Inc. headquarters in Canyon for lunch or dinner, more explanation of the program, and examples of what students have done under the program.

The Plan is aiding students in 18 schools now. Committees in area towns work with Opportunity Plan, Inc. to aid deserving students. Local committee members are R. R. Struve, Charles Crow, C. M. Ryan, Amo Struve, Joe Thompson, David Pinson, Harold Thompson, and Hoppy Toler.

YOUNG FARMERS TO MEET HERE FEBRUARY 12

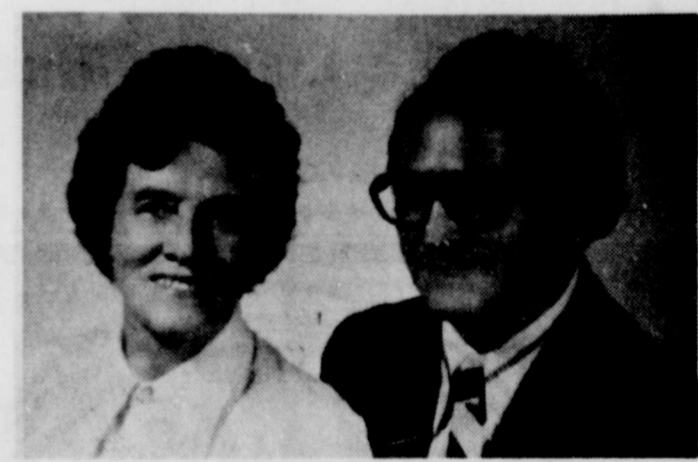
